

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### EDITOR'S NOTES

While typing the queries for this issue, thoughts about queries in general kept coming to my mind.

This past two months our society has received a few queries, and some of these queries concern this area. We do check various indexes to help people IF A SASE IS INCLUDED with the query.

When our committee meets to consider queries, we are giving of our time and effort, and we believe we should help those who show consideration of this fact by making our work as simple as possible. If a SASE is not included, then it is evident the person making the request is not willing to do their share.

I do try to print all queries that are received in this quarterly, but if you have sent in a query, and did not include a self-addresse and stamped envelope, don't wait for an answer. Write again, and include that SASE.

Another thought about queries. I often see queries which begin Desire information on ..... (long list of surnames)... Now, unless your surname is very rare, I believe it is far better to give more information about your surnames of interest, such as a time period and a locality. Some people evidently do not realize how wide spread the families of Jones, Smith, Bates, Greens, Taylor, Edwards, etc., were.

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One of our members, Mrs. Dorr, has furnished us with information concerning the California Genealogical Society's Library. An excellent library you should investigate when researching in San Francisco. There is a small daily charge for non-members, but it is open to the public.

The library for many years was located on Pacific Avenue in San Francisco. They have relocated, and are now at 625 Polk Street, in San Francisco, (this is the Civic Center area). The Board felt that this building with its good security and close proximity to the records of the City and County of San Francisco, and the San Francisco Public Library, and its accessibility by the inter and entra city transportation; and the availability of public parking, will now provide the membership and other genealogical researchers with an excellent Library and Headquarters. ## Mrs. Fronia Martha (Scoggin) Smith

1851-1?

The following narrative is extracted from information obtained in 1932 by Mr. Lance D. Smith, who questioned his mother, Mrs. Fronia Martha Smith, about her experiences. This is printed with the permission of Mrs. Earlda Cole, of Live Oak, California. Mrs. Smith was Mrs. Cole's grand-mother.

Following is a brief statement made by Lance D. Smith naming the immediate members of the family. Ny father was George W. Smith who was born in Springfield, Missouri, November 24, 1838. He was a Captain in the Civil War under General Sherman, was wounded three times, died at the age of eighty-nine years, in Los Angeles, Calif-ornia, and is buried in the Soldiers' Home at Sawtelle, California. He was married to my mother, Fronia M. Smith, at lilot loint, Texas, October 5, 1873. In 1880 their first son, Earl, was born at Waco, Texas; in 1885 the second son, Carl, was born at Austin, Texas; in 1887 the third son, Lance D. was born near Milburn, Brown County, Texas, about twenty miles South of Brownwood; in 1889 the fourth son, Walter was born at the same place; in 1892 the first daughter. Pearl, was born. In 1892 my father, George W. Smith, drove a team of mules, Jack and John, from Milburn, Texas, to Eddy, New Mexico, and homesteaded 160 acres of land in the new irrigation project of the Jecos Irrigation and Improvement Company. On May 1, 1893, the entire family in covered wagons, driving their horses, left Milburn, Texas, and arrived at Vaud, New Mexico, fifteen miles South of Eddy, on the 18th day of May. On the 1st of July 1895, Nell, the last child, was born, making in all six children --- all of whom are living at the present time --- From here I will let Mother tell the Story.

Well, I was born in York County, South Carolina, June 15, 1851. Ny father was of Irish descent, his name was Lawson David Scoggin. His father and two other brothers came over from Ireland; they settled in South Carolina and I do not know much about them, but in time, they all married and had families.

I never saw my father's father, or any of his people. They had a sister, Martha, who married a man by the name of Albert James. These brothers and their sister came from an aristocratic family, so were naturally very particular about their dress. (Martha was a sister to Fronia's father)

My father and his brothers were known to be very straight and quiet, but one was mischievous. I don't know whether the mischievious one was my father or not. I remember the story about the boys going to a big party one night. They all dressed in their best clothes with their long broadcloth coats; but the mischievious one sewed a piece of blue and white checked bed ticking around the

bottom of his coat and went to the party. When the other two saw him at the party and that he had done such a ridicolous thing, they felt very embarrassed and humilated and threatened to whip him when they got home--which they tried to do.

Thy grandfather was a planter and when he died, his widow married a man who made my father learn a trade. He made my father leave home and live with others to learn this trade of tanner. The people he went to live with were not very kind to him and did not give him enough to eat. (In those days people were considered 'rich' if they had negroes and mules) There was an old negro man who would steal food for my father to eat. They all made corn dodger and put it in a skillet to cook. That is the kind of bread they used. My father was kind of dainty about eating breakfast. The food they had did not appeal to him, although they had lots of meat, corn dodger, and coffee. Before dinner he would get so hungry he would nearly die for something to eat. This old negroe's wife was a cook, so this negro would steal a piece of bread and tuck it under his sweaty arm, and take it to my dad to eat. These negroes were all slaves.

My mother's name was Martha Emaline Davis. I only knew her sister, Sara, as all her other sisters stayed back in South Carolina. I remember Aunt Sara had the first stove I ever saw. The fire box was much lower than the top of the stove. Aunt Sara married a Baptist preacher named John Adams, who used to preach at Bethel Church. He also taught school. He owned a place across the letit Jane river up in the mountains. They had several children, Fronia, Cass, Emma, John, and Theodosis, and some little ones whose names I can't remember.

My mother was very beautiful. Lany people used to call her the prettiest woman in the country. My mother's mother came over from England, and her father was Scotch Irish. My mother's parents settled in York County, South Carolina, where they all lived together. Nother and father were married in York County.

There were thirteen children in our family. There was an older sister, Hassie; second, myself; third, Ed; fourth, Rufus; fifth, linerva; sixth, John; seventh, Ethie; eighth, Rena; ninth, Ella; tenth, George; eleventh, Nathaniel; --I can't remember the other two babies. There was lots of malaria, chills, and fever in that part of the country. All but four died in infancy, John lived to be six or seven years old. The four left were Ed, Ethia, Rufus, and myself.

I don't remember much about York County, SC, as I was only about two and a half years old when we left South Carolina. I do remember getting ready to come to Dardanell, Arkansas, in 1854. We lived there until after the Civil War. We moved in a covered wagon drawn by two big gray mares, Mollie and \_\_\_\_\_\_. We took our dog, Rawleigh, with us. I remember crossing the Mississippi River at Nemphis in a ferry boat. There was a great big ferry boat with a place below for the wagons and horses and the passengers were above on a higher deck. I remember a woman on board who had a mean little child who just ran around all the time, keeping her mother busy looking after her. One time she bumped into me

when I was just the distance of one plank from the edge of the boat nearly knocking me into the water.

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We lived twelve miles South of Dardenell on a farm where we raised corn and cotton. There was a big tan yard on the farm, known as Scoggin Tannery Yard. My father bought the place. He almost lost it, but didn't ... /e used oxen and horses on the farm. /e raised our own oxen,

'e used oxen and horses on the farm. 'e raised our own oxen, and Father used them to break up the ground. He used a turn plow and bull tongue (a kind of shovel affair). When the corn was planted, after the furrow was opened, someone had to go along and drop the seed in the furrow; then another person would come along with a plow to cover the seed up. When you asked a farmer in Texas had he planted his corn, he would reply, 'la laid off, I dropped, and ma kivvered'. I can remember dropping the corn myself, That was Ed's and my job. Also dropping pumpkin seed. We had an orchard--apples, plums, peaches, and cherries.

Le lived in a two story log house; big logs hewn flat on the inside and notched at corners to fit nicely with about a six inch board as batten to stop the cracks between the logs. We didn't acquire any slaves until during the war.

The country near Dardenell was heavy timber covered. We had lots of neighbors.

We went to a one room school house made out of hewn logs, made from the timber. Wooden planks were used for seats, and a man teacher taught us all. I began my first schooling there. We used McGuffy's Speller, and McGuffy's Reader. I remember when I was in the first reader, I learned everyone of the poems by heart. A poem from my first reader was:

I like to see a little dog, And pat him on his head So prettily he wags his tail, /henever he is fed. Some little dogs are very good, And very useful too And you know that they will mind, What they are told to do So I will never beat my dog, And never give him pain

Poor fellow; I will give him food, And he will love me then. Another I learned was Lazy Sheep I also studied grammar, arithmetic, and geography.

We had to pay to go to school then. Nost of the schools would be open for four or five months and when they ran out of funds they would have to close the school.

The school was three-quarters of a mile from our farm, close to the Baptist Church. The negroes did not go to the school.

We didn't have any negroes working for us before the war. Father had a white boy, Ruebin Coker, apprenticed to him to learn the tanner's trade. When the war came, he went to the war, which left us without any help. Reuben served three years and nine months, after which he came back home but he did not work for us anymore.

In the evenings men would come to our house and stay until bed times talking about the war? Mother would be sitting in her big rocker near the fire place and I would sit next to Mother and listen in awe.

At this time we lived in this log house that had an upstairs with two bedrooms. The house was built rather long, and the kitchen was quite a ways from the house, as was customary to build in those days. We did the cooking over an open fireplace in pots, skillets, and frying pans. The pots were hung on pot racks by hooks over the fire in the fireplace, and the food was brought from the kitchen to the house in all kinds of weather. Later father built another log kitchen adjoining the house. We had two fireplaces in the house and one built outside with the intention of building another room on but never did. On the east side was a long hall and the kitchen was built at the end of that with a fireplace in the kitchen to cook with. We used iron pots and skillets. Dutch ovens, etc.

skillets, Dutch ovens, etc. Nost of the people had from 160 acres to 240 acres of land. A lot of the land wasn't used. Out in front of our house it was a long way before anybody lived. Our cattle stayed on outside land. We had lots of horses and cows.

We were poor, but we were called quality because we did not have negroes. By father always took, from the time I can remember, the Tennessee Baptist paper, then the county paper.

My father was a Union man. He did not believe in secession and would not secede. He said there never would be anything as good as the Union. The neighborhood split up. Ty mother's opinion was the same as my father's.

The Yankees who believed in secession came from the North to the South for protection and to save their lives. The Northern army took everything and left desolation in their tracks.

Most of the people in the South volunteered. The South thought that the Northern people were trying to rob the South of their negroes and set them free.

We had five refugees from the north who boarded and stayed at our house for quite awhile. The five refugees who stayed with us were all shoe makers. One of them, Frazier, used to sit and sing the "Vacant Chair: and other songs, and talk about his family. Another of his favorites was:

'Farewell, Mother, Home and Friends; We may never meet again Soon amidst strangers I may roan; Oh, the parting gives me pain'

As the Northern troops drew nearer Frazier went on further South and we never heard of him again.

These men were all good in shoe making. They line and bound shoes, very good and fine. Father supplied the whole neighborhood with shoes. He took wagon loads of shoes to the surrounding country; and made lots of money. One time he took a wagon load to the Cherokee Indian Nation. With the money he received for the shaes, he bought a negress, Rachel, for whom he paid \$1,300.00. She was the first negro we had.

My father paid these men a good price for their work. All the people around came to our place to get their shoes, and our tan yard was quite a place to see. The hides used were gotten from

(-) solar as description cows. Some of the people would bring their hides to sell to my father, then they would buy their shoes from him. It used to be mine and my brother, Ed's job to gind the tan

bark. We had a great long shed and in it was a big rock about ten feet in diameter and 18 inches thick, like a grind stone wheet. By means of a vertical pole and cross pieces, an oxen pulled the wheel round and round in a circle over the bark. After going around two times, the bark was straightened out in front of the wheel and ground to a fine pulp that tanned the leather. Tan bark comes from the oak trees. Men strip the bark off the trees in the spring of the year. This all had to be dried and hauled in and stored away under the shed.

The Arkansas Jayhawkers moved into our own community. Rass Foster was one of them.

The Haneys' were well to do. They joined the North. They were related to my Mother's people. They came to see if we had any ammunition. Father was there. They told him he would either have to go to the South or take up arms here. He said, I will stay home and see who are my friends. First thing we knew Haney came and robbed us taking about ten of our fifteen horses. Father said, The Southern army never did me that way. The North wanted him to come in and pledge allegiance. He replied, I believe in the Union, but I have not taken sides. I am a Union man. He went and was with the lrovost Larshall at Dardenell and took the oath of allegiance to the North before Lance D. Smith's dad, who was to become my future husband. After he had taken the oath, these people came and took everything he had. (The Jayhawkers who had joined the North did this). They took bales of cotton, corn, and everything. Father thought that was a dirty way to do. He wanted to get away, so he took the negroes and mules, and leaving the women behind, he went South just enough to get away from the Northern army. The Jayhawkers went in the show shop which was about one-quarter of a mile from the house--it was full of grain, corn--and took all of that; and took every horse we had and killed the cows to eat, and took all the guns and many other things. They would camp in our big yard all night hitching their horses

to the trees. There was a big cherry tree by the porch to which they tied their horses as well as to all the other trees in the yard. You can imagine the mess our yard was in by morning, all covered with horse litter and corn shucks--very distateful to us

women folks. 'Jhile my father was gone, my mother, sister Hassie, Ed, aged eight, and I aged ten, were alone one night when the Northern soldiers took possession of our kitchen where they set up all night making ginger bread, coffee, etc. They used up everything, leaving us nothing to eat but some corn bread. I could not eat corn bread. Ed and I were sent to the mill in the wagon with oxen. Ed thought he had put a piece of corn bread in his pocket. We got so hungry. We got an early start, so we got to the mill by the time they usually ate dinner, so I went in to visit with Mrs. Boggs. This time the dinner was over. I was starving. Ed fed we little pieces of his bread--just little teasers. I never tasted such good

corn bread in my life. That taught me a lesson to always take something along to eat when you are going to be out for the day. We got five or six sacks of corn and wheat and started home. Ball and Jerry, the oxen, could just trot like horses. They were brown with white spots.

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Dad had to hide out in the field and mother would take food to him at night, because he had been to Dardenell and sworn allegiance to the North.

Dad was old and old people like that did not go in the army. He was a tanner, and he did not have to go. He did more good at home. The Southern people that belonged to the North and had joined the Northern army did all kinds of wrong; they came and took everything in the world he had but a horse. They would join the Northern army to get protection. I do not know the exact reason why pa had to hide out.

Four of them came back to see their families and to get clothes. They had to be very careful that the Bushwackers did not see them. They were watching our house carefully and we could hear the army for a long distance. When pa came back they must have known that he was back. The other three men that came with pa ate at our house. The bushwackers were after my pa and the other men.

I was twelve or thirteen years old and la put me to standing picket. I had never seen any of the Northern soldiers.before. I was up on the fence when I suddenly saw a lot of men coming down the road in uniform. They were Northern Scouts. They were always scouting around. la and the three men all ran back into a big thicket back of the house near a creek. There was a sort of wood thicket back of our house, then the creek, then the mountains. I had run in to tell the men they were coming so they could get away, but the Northerners got everything, their guns, pistols, and even their hats. They left us without anything in the World. Took all saddles, guns amunition, horses-leaving us nothing.

saddles, guns amunition, horses-leaving us nothing. After awhile, la went down to my Uncle John's, who was a Baptist preacher and did not believe in war. la took the two negroes and mules with him.

Thile is was gone, we raised cows and chickens every year, a little corn. I think we had given up raising cotton then. We made our syrup. The Northern soldiers would take everything that took their fancy. Often times they would practically clean out everything. They never showed any consideration for our needs or wants.

The Jayhawkers were just men around the country, most of them people we knew; but they would come to our houses and rob people of everything they had in the house. They even picked up little things such as trinkets and stuck them in their pockets.

My la had gone down south to get away from these people. They told him they were going to kill him. When he went to Uncle John's he took the negroes with him to keep the Jayhawkers from getting them. He did not know the negroes were going to be freed.

He was gone several months when he came back to see how we were and to get some clothes. The Jayhawkers were always snooping around the house, especially at night.

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The Jayhawkers killed one old man, about 80 years of age and very feeble. He said he could not leave home, there was just him and his wife living alone. One night the Jayhawkers went there and hollered. As he opened the door he said, "Yes, what do you want?" They shot him down right there and rode off. I guess it was two miles from our house and there was just his wife with him. They had been killing men all around.

When father came home he had four or five men with him. One man was named Ben West.

My sister and I saw the Federals and thought that they were going to try and get us to tell where the men were so I started on the run over to a neighbors house. John and Margaret Moss and I came back down this way to go to the camp where Pa was hiding by the side of the woods to warn him. Just as we got to where we could see the camp, we saw them riding on their horses. Just as we got to the camp on one side, the Federals came up on the other side shooting from their horses. I saw my father run right east from the Federals. The men all scattered and went different directions to what Ia did. The Federals shot and killed Ben West. Margaret's father ran in the direction of us, and they killed her father before he got to us. Her brother, about nineteen, ran into his sister's arms. The soldiers cursed him and told him if he did not get away from the girl they would shoot them both. He stepped away from her and one of the soldiers shot him and he fell and just lay there for quite awhile. We both ran to him. The soldiers just left the dead men there.

My father had just a little bullet wound in his side, a flesh wound. The men just shot until they were out of ammunition. They were mostly men who knew us and were neighbors, only some farther away. They told Pa to go to his own house and they would dress his wounds. They helped him on his horse and I rode right behind him on the big white horse.

The soldiers stripped his shirt off, and dressed his wounds. I can just see it glazed the ribs. Ma put something on it. She knew what to do. The soldiers told him not to stay in the house because somebody would, come back and kill him, but to go to the back of the field and camp and they would come back and see how he was getting along.

The next day we saw them riding along the side of a big hill back of the farm. We thought maybe they were going to kill him, but he hadn't stayed where they told him. The next day he came to the house and we cooked him a good meal. Then, he and ma started out about 2 or 3 in the afternoon. They walked, they had nothing else, and they couldn't ride the chickens. We had a little place down the river three or four miles away. All they took was a change of underwear. I remember mother had just woven a cloth cape and lined it. She made it all by hand, carded and had a long nap like fur on the outside. They started walking in the rain. I don't know whether pa had an overcoat or not. They stayed all night in that house, and it rained all night long. Mom sat on the floor and pa lay his head in her lap. Ma just sat

there listening. Once in the night they were scared by snoring, it was hogs. The hogs had run in under the house to get out of the rain. The house was built up on stilts. Any noise scared ma and pa. They stayed there until day-break, then they walked up the river until they came to the crossing which was quite a ways.

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There was no bridge, Pa pulled off his pants and put them around his neck and pulled his coat tail up and waded the river. Ma stood on the bank just at daybreak and waited for him to cross. The he had two or three miles to go to Aunt Sarah's and she hid him out.

My oldest sister, 14, myself, Ed, and Rufus, were home alone, no neighbors closer than two miles. Ma got back for breakfast about 9 or 10 o'clock. She had quite a long walk. It was very muddy and she was all wet.

While Pa was staying at Aunt Sarah's, she hid him out all the time so the Federal soldiers could not find him. He thought he would just go wild being hunted all the time, having to listen and expecting all the time to have someone kill him. He was finally able to go further South until the war was over.

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We had it kinda hard. We borrowed oxen. The women folks and we children plowed and planted corn and cotton and worked all the time. The soldiers and Jayhawkers kept taking everything. They always seemed to come on Saturday afternoon.

We girls worked in the fields during the week days, but we had to scrub the floors and do the cleaning around the house on Saturday. My eldest sister used to say that was the reason they came Saturday afternoon. They used to take our leather and shoes and even the cloth ma made on the loom. Ma would weave all day and then she would cut the cloth out at night. One foom full would make some of the clothes for Ed and Rufe. On cold mornings my feet would get so cold, I went barefooted as I had no shoes, so I would make the cow get up and I would stand in the warm spot where she had been lying while sister milked. When we went to milk, it was my job to hold the calf off.

At the end of the stairs we had a gun shot pouch that pa ket shot in made of deer skin, with a tail at the end of it. It was made square, and had a flap over the top.

There was one soldier that came every week and searched our house. Everytime he came upstairs he would stick his hand into the pouch to see if there was any ammunition. I decided to play a joke on him the next time he came. I filled the pouch with soft cow manure. The whole family was watching when he went right upstairs and stuck his hand in it. All the little children stood their looking. Mother didn't exactly approve, but she went about her work. He left muttering to himself and slinging his hand. That was the last time he ever came to our house.

Shortly after this they gave us orders to leave our home. They said we were harboring Rebels, because we were harboring pa.
