MAYFIELD CEMETERY
Elmore County, Idaho

This little cemetery is perched high on a hilltop overlooking the Old Oregon Trail. Not a spear of grass, no bush nor tree gives evidence of its location.

When visited by the writer, in 1933, someone, with little sentiment, was endeavoring to dry-farm the place, the rotted, wooden markers were scattered about, the fence removed and only a few stone tombstones were still standing.

Tradition says the first grave there was an Indian girl. As there was no record kept we have to rely on the pioneers yet with us for these names:

1870 Mrs. Stanton and a child- typhoid victims

An unnamed emigrant woman

An unnamed emigrant girl

1878 Jimmy and Obe - small sons of James and Anna (Blaylock)
Corder

Maggie- child of Mr. & Mrs. Corder

A daughter of Mrs. Jane (McMillan) Stewart

A baby daughter of Mr. A.W. Beck

Mrs. Joseph Mains, mother-in-law of William Williams.

HISTORY OF MAYFIELD

On a fall day in 1864 a sixteen year old girl drew her ox team to a stop on the Old Oregon Trail. Coming towards her was a herd of cattle, probably 500, raising a cloud of dust and bawling uneasily. The girl driver handed the reins to her twelve year old sister, who sat beside her. "Hold these, Alice, a minute...I'm going back to get Father to take the oxen while the cattle pass. They might become frightened and run." She climbed down and ran back to the wagon behind them, "Father, I'll take the mules, you take the oxen!" So the transfer was made.
