

### GREAT BEND.



T is not the aim of the publishers of this book to launch forth in the glowing terms of the usual "writer up" of cities aspiring to future 琴 greatness, but it shall be our endeavor to state in plain and concise A terms the FACTS relating to our past, present and future prosperity. It is doubtless known by most of the citizens of this prosperous young city that the name "Great Bend" was derived from the fact that it is located on the banks of the Arkansas River where that broad stream makes its most northern sweep in the State of Kansas. At no point in the broad Arkansas Valley is there a better location for a thriving, prosperous city than the one selected fifteen years ago by the small party of Eastern capitalists who drove the buffalo from his grazing ground and platted out this city of happy homes for present and future generations. Located in the center of one of the finest agricultural counties in the State she has an inexhaustable territory containing 18,000 prosperous people from whom she draws trade, and who look to her various branches of mercantile industry for necessary food and raiment.

Barton county was organized in 1872 with a population of 600 souls, to-day 18.000 people reside within her borders, and she has eighty-five school houses and employs ninety-six teachers, despite the visitations of grasshoppers, drouth and the various drawbacks experienced by all newly settled counties in the Great West. A description of Barton County is not pertinent in this book, from the fact that our citizens are all well posted on the many advantages offered in the way of adaption of soil

and climate to the growing of all kinds of vegetation. The tables of statistics hereafter given will be of interest in showing to some extent the vast resources of the county which is proud of Great Bend, as the head center of her business and the incentive to her prosperity.

#### PUBLIC BUILDINGS.

We are justly proud of our public buildings, first of which is the county court house, which was built in 1873 at a cost of \$30,000. This is the handsomest and most valuable building of the kind in Kansas west of Wichita. It is well built, of brick and stone, and stands in the midst of a forestry of beautiful shade trees, the principal business buildings of the city being grouped around this ornamental grove, La Fayette Park by name. This lovely grove is the admiration of all strangers and a fit illustration of the rapid and sure growth of all kinds of shade and fruit trees in this city and the surrounding country. With proper care and cultivation the most humble home can be made an Eden of shade in summer and a warm shelter from the cutting blasts of Boreas, by the judicious planting of trees, and many of our streets and avenues are thus ornamented and embellished. In the court house are the offices of the various county officials, a list of whom will be found on another page, together with a list of the city officials, school board, corps of teachers and the officials of all public enterprises herein mentioned.

#### PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The first school building was erected in 1873 at a cost of \$3,000, is of frame and still in good repair. This building was sufficiently large to contain the "shooting idea" until 1878, when a larger and more substantial building of brick and stone, containing four large rooms, well ventilated and properly furnished, was erected, costing \$8,000. In October, 1886, a heating apparatus was put into the buildings at a cost of \$600. But a few years after the erection of the fine brick structure there arose a pressing demand for more and better arranged room. and the school board found it necessary to rent outside rooms for the accommodation of several departments. Besides the two large buildings above mentioned the C and D Primary grades new occupy two large store rooms directly opposite the school house grounds, which grounds and buildings, by the way, are located just one square west of the court house, and are handsomely ornamented with shade trees. As there is a greater demand for business buildings than the supply will meet it behooves our city to immediately take steps towards building another commodious school structure, and cease sinking money in high rents.

For the fall and winter term of 1886 there were enrolled 492 scholars, twenty-three in the high school department, 178 in the grammar grade and 301 in the primary grade. Great Bend being a city of the second class, under the laws of the State of Kansas, the schools are directed by a Board of Education. This Board engages the Superintendent and teachers, and holds a general supervision over the schools. We can truthfully state that no town in the State containing the same number of scholars has better school facilities than Great Bend, and many cities of larger proportions and greater age are far behind us in school work. Besides the Superintendent, who receives a salary of \$1,125 per school year, there are employed eight teachers at salaries of from \$45 to \$60 per month. For names of teachers see tables of city officials, etc. In 1885 the school census showed 635 children in the city, of school age, and in 1886 this number is 780, showing an increase of 145, or 23 per cent. in one year, which item in itself is well worthy of especial notice.

#### THE CENTRAL KANSAS COLLEGE

was located at Great Bend in September, 1885, under the auspices of the Congregational Association of Central and Western Kansas. An elegant building, admirably adapted for purposes of instruction, is being erected by the citizens of Great Bend, and will cost when completed and furnished not less than \$25,000. This building is of brick and Cottonwood stone, its dimensions being 92x96 feet, three stories and a basement, is located sixteen blocks west of the court house square, and will be an ornament to the city. It stands on a fine campus of lifteen acres. A boarding house of native stone is also being erected by the trustees at a cost of \$5,000. These buildings will be ready in time for the second, or winter term, which begins January 5, 1887. The fall term began September 29, 1886, about thirty students being enrolled. An endowment fund of \$25,000 is promised. The object of this college is to furnish the most thorough education to the youth of both sexes. Its standard is high, equal to the best colleges, while at the same time it adapts itself to the various needs of this portion of the State. The preparatory course begins with the common branches; normal and business courses are added to the classical and scientific courses of other colleges. Special attention is also paid to music and art.

#### METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

Great Bend circuit of the M. E. Church was organized in the year 1873, Rev. A. Hartman being the first pastor. In 1875 a comfortable parsonage was built of frame, and on January 20, 1878, the first church building in Great Bend was dedicated. This structure is of frame, 30

by 50 feet and did service for the rapidly increasing attendance until the present year, when by far the largest and most costly church editice in Western Kansas was commenced and is rapidly nearing completion. This building is of frame, the main part being 34x60 feet, with two wings, 14x32 feet each, and one wing 16x26 feet, the total dimensions being 73x74 feet. This building will comfortably seat 600 people, and will be lighted by either gas or electricity. The approximate cost of this magnificent house of worship when completed and furnished will be \$9,000. Adjoining the church building on the west is the new parsonage, built in 1886, being a commodious frame residence, two stories high, costing \$1,500, exclusive of grounds. Rev. S. H. Enyeart is the present pastor, now filling his second appointment at this charge. In March, 1885, the roll of members contained eighty-five. The present membership is 158. This church organized the first Sanday school in Great Bend in 1877.

#### PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

The members of this denomination number upwards of eighty, which is a good showing considering the fact that they had no organization until June, 1885. Services were held in the court house until October 3, 1886, when their new house of worship on the corner of Broadway and Williams streets was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies. The building is of brick and stone, the main building being 36x50 feet, with a west wing 16x32 feet. From the northeast corner of this model of architecture a spire will rise to the height of seventy feet. The present building is considered but a wing of the church which is to be, and at some future day the building will be extended east to Williams street, making it one of the largest church buildings in Kansas. As at present projected the building will cost \$12,000. Rev. J. W. Thompson has had charge of the flock since its organization and it is steadily increasing in numbers under his ministration.

#### CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH.

This was the second church building erected in Great Bend, is quite a fine house of worship, of frame superstructure, and capable of seating 300 people. It was erected in 1879. The church was organized in 1872, with a small membership. The membership now numbers 140 of the representative citizens of our city; Rev. W. A. Bosworth is the pastor. The house of worship has been recently improved and beauti7ed, and a handsome and commodious parsonage was this year erected at an expense of \$1,400. The entire value of this property is about seven thousand dollars.

#### GERMAN M. E. CHURCH.

The German society of the M. E. church commenced work in Great Bend as early as 1875, Rev. J. J. Eichenberger being the first pastor, assisted by C. G. Fritche. In October of the following year Great Bend circuit was organized with thirty-flve members, Rev. John Adam Mueller having charge of the flock. In 1880 he was succeeded by Rev. W. H. Stein, who in turn gave place to Rev. J. H. Dryer two years after. Mr. Dryer remained two years, when Rev. H. H. Hackman, the present pastor, took charge. Mr. Hackman was returned to this charge in 1886, and Rev. Wm. Haegele was appointed as an assistant. The membership at present numbers seventy-nine. In 1879 the parsonage was built at a cost of \$1,500. Their new church building is located at the corner of Broadway and Williams street, is a tasty frame, 24x36, with a fifty foot spire, and is a fair exemplification of the prosperity of this organization. The building is erected at a cost of thirteen hundred dollars.

#### CATHOLIC CHURCH,

This church was organized in 1874 but the present church building was not erected until five years later. Father Schwemburg was the first pastor and remained until 1879, when he was succeeded by Father Wolf. At the time of its organization the church had but thirty members, but like all branches of religion in our city, it has grown, and now has a following of one hundred and fifty. For a number of years the church was in charge of Father Epp, of the Ellinwood circuit, but in 1885 the rapid increase of the flock necessitated a resident shepherd and Father J. B. Disselcamp was sent to this charge. Under his supervision the old church building, being in a bad state of repair, was moved to the lot it at present occupies on Broadway and completely renovated, at a cost of \$1,500, and is now one of the roomiest and neatest buildings in the city.

In addition to the church buildings before mentioned, the colored people are represented in both the Methodist and Baptist denominations, each organization having a neat place of worship and a fair membership. There are also a goodly number of the followers of Campbell in our community, and although they have no regular organization as yet, they occasionally congregate and listen to the doctrine as expounded by some visiting brother. The society has taken steps toward the erection of a meeting house, and in fact, already have a foundation and building material on the ground for that purpose. Great Bend is justly proud of her churches, and no better criterion of the condition of society can be had than the number of slender spires pointing heavenward throughout this community and the surrounding country.

#### GREAT BEND ELECTRIC LIGHT COMPANY.

In 1885 the Great Bend Electric Light Company was organized with an authorized capital of \$25,000. The plant of this institution occupies a substantial stone building on Peter Avenue. Since its inauguration the system has given universal satisfaction. The system used is the Weston incandescent and the capacity is three hundred lights of sixteen candle power each. The whole line is under the control of the attendant at the generating station, the works being equipped with rheostats, potential indicators and switches. The motive power is furnished by a beautiful Payne automatic cut-off engine of twenty-five horse power, taking steam from a tubular boiler. Tue whole is a specimen of the latest electrical and mechanical science, and is arranged in the neatest and most tasty manner. There are ten large copper wires leading from the station to which are connected smaller branches leading into every business house and most of the public buildings. The system is so arranged that the lamps in any building can be turned off singly or all simultaneously by the use of a gang switch stationed in any convenient part of the building. The cost is less than coal gas, the company charging but \$1.50 per month per light. How many of our readers know of a city in the east of 3,500 inhabitants where private parties employ two hundred and fifty electric lights?

#### GREAT BEND OPERA HOUSE.

One of the finest buildings in the city is the Opera Block, on the square, the east and north fronts are built of Kansas City pressed brick, with heavy, white stone trimmings, and the balance of native brick. This building was erected by the Farmer's and Merchant's Bank in the summer of 1886, the ground area being 50x140 feet, three stories high in front and two in the rear, with a roomy basement. The opera hall is one of the finest in the west in every respect. Its dimensions are 50x56 feet in the clear, with stage room of 21x50, including the wings and dressing rooms. The ceiling is above the usual height, being twenty-five feet in the clear, and the entire furniture and arrangement is planned with all the latest improvements for comfort, convenience and artistic effect. The auditorium has a seating capacity upwards of one thousand. Below the hall are three large store rooms and east of the hall on the second floor are commodious office rooms. The Farmer's and Merchant's Bank occupies the northeast corner on the ground floor. The cost of this building, exclusive of theater furniture was \$25,000.

#### PAP THOMAS POST, G. A. R.

This organization has a fine two-story brick building on Main street, with dimensions of 25x60 feet. The first floor is occupied by a store

room, which nets a neat sum to the veterans each month. On the second floor are the quarters of the post, the quartermaster's department, armory and store-rooms are in the rear, and a hall in front. Pap Thomas Post No. 52, Department of Kansas, was organized in 1882. Present membership 140. Auxiliary to this post are the Woman's Relief Corps and Sons of Veterans, each with a fair membership, the W. R. C. taking an active part in caring for the sick and indigent.

#### MISCELLANEOUS FACTS.

An omission to mention the natural thoroughfares of the city would be gross neglect. Main, the principal street, runs north and south through the city, and is the thoroughfare upon which the heavy freighting and all transportation from the depot of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad is now conducted, La Fayettee Park being located on its east-side, between Broadway and Lakin Avenue. Forest Avenue. Broadway and Lakin Avenue rank next in business importance, and quite a number of business houses are also located on Peter Avenue, east of the square. All our streets are level, with a solid, smooth natural surface, requiring but little work to keep them prepared for travel in all seasons of the year. The Great Bend Street Railway Company was organized in 1885, with a capital stock of \$20,000, holding a twenty year franchise, and there is every reason to believe that in the spring of 1887 their cars will be bringing the stockholders handsome dividends upon their investment. The route proposed to be covered by these tinkling harbingers of civilization and prosperity is from the Santa Fe depot to the north side of La Fayette Park on Main street, and thence west on Broadway to the grounds of the Central Kansas College. thoroughfares are well sprinkled during the summer months.

The level nature of the ground upon which a great part of the resident portion of the city is built has made it necessary that ditches should be dug to carry off the surplus of water in times of heavy rains, which occur here during the spring and fall seasons. Two main ditches have been dug at the expense of the city, one in the north and the other in the south side of town, at a cost of \$3,200, and they admirably perform all that is expected of them.

Until the past year the question of pure water had been one that greatly bothered our citizens, the water produced being brought from ten to fifteen feet below the surface. Pumps were driven until they reached the level of the Arkansas River, and as that was so near the surface, in most instances pure water, devoid of surface seepings, could not be obtained. But now there is no better or purer water in the country than

that in use by our people who have driven to the proper depth. This pure, soft water is obtained at a depth of from lifty to seventy-live feet, and as in driving down to that depth several stratas of hard, tough clay are encountered, there is no possible chance of surface water getting into the pump and an absolutely pure flow of water is obtained.

An industry of no small importance, and one that has but recently been brought to any great degree of perfection in this section, is the making and burning of brick for building purposes. There are now three yards in the immediate vicinity which are training out thousands of first class brick weekly. All the business houses now in course of erection are principally of native brick. In this connection it is well to state that there is also an abundance of brown sand stone within three miles of the city, and upon the divide between the Valley of the Arkansas and Walnut Creek, in Barton County, within easy distance of Great Bend, a fine, white lime stone is quarried, and is used quite extensively in our buildings.

In the matter of associations for the public good we have the Great Bend Board of Trade, an organization composed of the staunch and enterprising business men, and having sufficient capital at command to offer liberal inducements to any enterprise that is adapted to the building up of our city and the prosperity of our people.

The Building and Loan Association is another organization of great public benefit, as by the assistance it affords the man of limited means who desires to build a home, many cozy cottages have risen up in our midst that otherwise would not have adorned our avenues. During the last two years \$13,223 have been loaned by this Association, and as it is entirely a local corporation, composed of our own citizens, the business it has done shows a willingness to "help one another" that is commendable.

As an example of the social inclinations af our people no better evidence is needed than a glance over the list of secret and benevolent organizations. All societies are in a prosperous condition and all the leading men belong to one order or another, and sometimes to several. There are the Free Masons in three branches, with a membership of 140; the Knights of Pythias in two branches, with a membership of 100; the Odd Fellows in three branches, with a membership of eighty-two, and United Workmen with sixteen members. A complete directory of these lodges will be found on another page.

In this broad liberty enlightened land of freedom, where every man is sovereign of his own destines and a peer among his peers, there is no private industry, no business conducted for private weal, more condusive to public good than that of the newspaper publisher. He bolsters us up in our times of adversity and voices our praise in time of prosperity. Our city is now beyond the need of any bolstering process, but the opportunity of rejoicing is here, and our papers have taken up the cue and are spreading the good news abroad in the land. The Great Bend Register, republican, is the oldest newspaper published in the city, has a good circulation and a fair advertising patronage, and is owned and edited by E. L. Chapman. It is a nine-column folio sheet, and does credit to the editorial and mechanical management. The Inland Tribune was next started as a republican paper under the ownership and editorial management of C. P. Townsley. It is a seven-column folio and neatly printed. The Barton County Democrat, under the management of Dewey Langford, holds the reins of its political belief and gives the news in an able manner. The Democrat is a six-column quarto, and both it and the Tribune have fair circulations and a liberal advertising patronage.

The flouring mills of Great Bend are as well known to the trade throughout Kansas and the Southwest as any others in Kansas. They are both located in the southern portion of the city, in close proximity with the tracks of the Santa Fe railroad, and have a combined capacity of two hundred and eighty barrels per day. The first mill was located here in 1876, and had a capacity of but fifty barrels per day, and from the crudest machinery then in vogue they have advanced to the most improved known to the flouring world. Each mill occupies a four story building, with a roomy basement, and use improved engines of 140 horse power. The process of reduction used is the Hungarian. Each mill has storing capacity of 30,000 bushels. It can be said truthfully that the milling interests of Great Bend lead all others. At the head of these institutions are men who stand foremost in the financial world of Barton County, and are all public spirited, enterprising gentlemen, prominent for their industry in public enterprises and skill in manufacturing.

Our grain elevators, of which there are three, are capable of handling an immense amount of grain yearly. They are fully equipped with the best modern machinery, having powerful engines, commodious grain bins and substantial buildings. They are located on the line of the Santa Fe railroad, and through them a great mass of B arton county's grain product is distributed to the four points of the compass. One of these elevators has a milling department, for the manufacture of corn and out meal, graham flour and all kinds of ground and chopped feed. There is one other feed mill in the city which runs at certain seasons of the year.

A full description of the numerous other branches of business which go to make this city worthy of notice in the commercial world would occupy too much of our limited space. In addition to the branches of private business before mentioned, we have in our city four lumber yards, employing from four to six men each; three banks, six hotels, nine livery stables and two feed and sale stables, four coal yards, four hardware stores and six farm machinery and implement dealers, five dry goods and grocery stores, twelve grocery stores, five dry goods and clothing stores, five millinery stores, two boot and shoe stores (all dry goods and clothing stores also carrying a stock of boots and shoes,) seven drug stores, three harness and saddlery manufacturies, two jewelry stores, two cigar and stationery stands, one news dealer, two photograph galleries, two feed stores, two produce dealers and shippers, ten real estate and loan offices, ten law offices, three dentists, three ment markets, one packing house, three bakeries, four restaurants and confectionery stores, two sewing machine agencies, three wagon and carriage shops, twelve carpenter shops, two furniture and undertaking stores, one carriage repository, one barb wire manufactory, two barber shops, one exclusive job printing office, one marble yard, one tailor shop, one nursery, one cigar factory, one bed spring manufactory, one notion store and numerous dairymen, express and draymen. Two large busses and numerous hacks and carriages carry passengers to and from the depot. The LEADING men in this busy congregation of trade and traffic can be found well represented on our advertising pages. In giving them your work and your custom you can feel assured of fair dealing and just compensation.

#### RAILROADS.

Great Bend at the present has two railroads. The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe, being the pioneer road of the Southwest, reached this point in 1874, and has been our only medium of traffic with the East and West. This road connects with the Atlantic and Pacific Railroad at Albuquerque, New Mexico, and forms the great "Middle Route" between the Missouri River and the Pacific Coast. It is well ballasted, with steel rails. A fair sized depot building and freight house is located at the foot of Main Street near the substantial iron bridge which spans the Arkansas River at this point and gives us access to the south part of the county.

The Great Bend Extension of the Santa Fe was built during 1886. It leaves the main line at this point and follows up the Valley of the Walnut. It is now completed to the west line of Rush County and is in operation between this place and Walnut City, Rush County, a distance

of thirty-four miles. It will eventually pass through Ness, Lane and other Western counties in Kansas, and through Colorado to Denver, tapping the finest stock grazing territory of the west. On this page you will find a correct time table for both the main and branch roads.

Another railroad in prospect, and one we can speak of as a certainty, is the Denver branch of the Missouri Pacific. This road is under bonds to be into Great Bend by the 15th of November, 1886, and as the road is almost completed to within ten or fifteen miles of the city, there is no doubt but that they will make this point in the allotted time. Statistics have been obtained to show that Great Bend received over the Santa Fe road in 1885, for consumation in the city and distribution through the surrounding country, lumber and building material, coal, farm machinery and all lines of general commerce to the amount of \$2,150,000, and shipped out of the town grain, stock, mill stuffs and general produce amounting to \$975,000. Figures of this kind, when founded as they are, on facts, are bound to reach the eye of Eastern capital and cause a reaching out for a share of this trade.
