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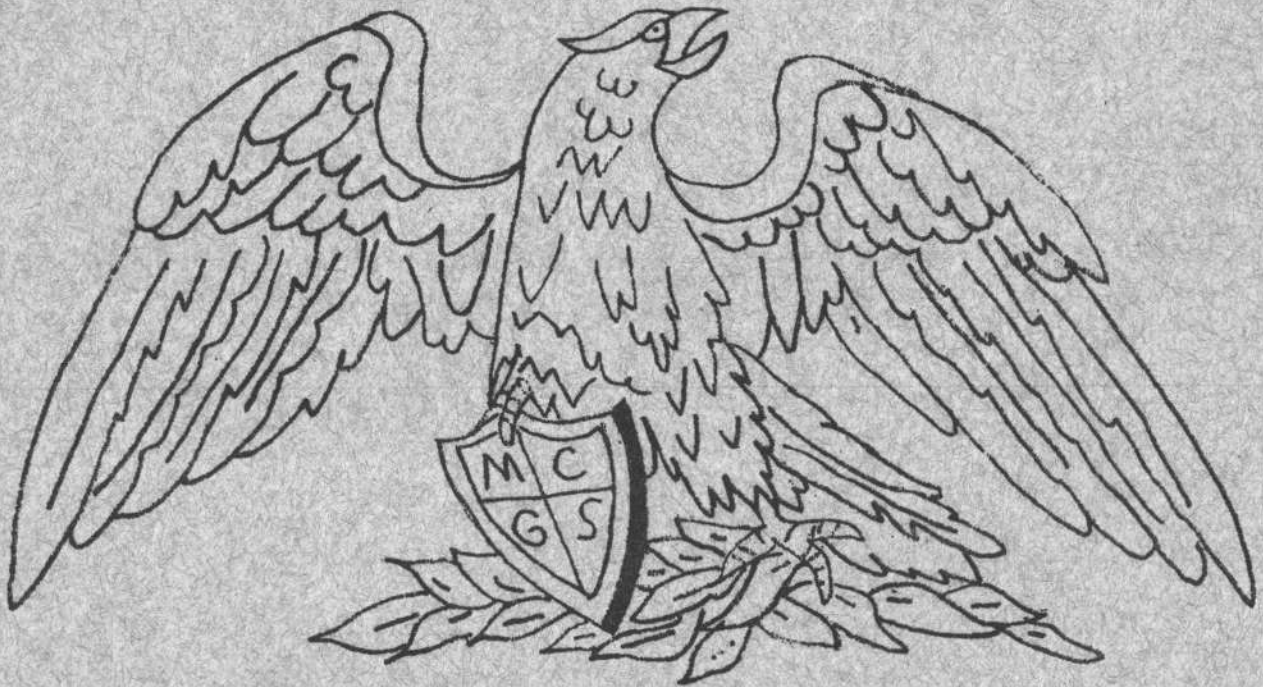

The London Family by Mrs. P.W. Hiden

Some years ago, Miss Lila London, of Farmville, kindly lent the writer an incomplete family tree compiled by Mrs. Anne London Higginbottom probably about 1885. On the death of Mrs. Higginbottom's only grandchild in 1930, the London family Bible came into the writer's possession. The following notes are based on these two sources, supplemented by some search of county records.

Greens' Early Virginia Immigrants gives on page 208 the names of three Londons who came to Virginia quite early; John London 1636, imported by John Gookin, Gent., _____ Co.; John London 1637, by John Burnette, New Norfolk Co.; and Humphrey London 1639, by George Menefee, Esq. of Charles River Co. No farther information about these early immigrants has come to light. The following scattered references have been found in different places. In Westmoreland Records, O.B. 1662-64, p. 24, Feb. 24, 1663, Capt. George Mason having been sued acknowledges his indebtedness to Mr. John London, merchant. In Essex Records, O.B. 1703-08, p. 297, Nov. 11, 1706, the action for trespass brought by Jacob Devilliard against Christopher London is dismissed. In Essex Records, D. & W. 14, p. 445, Oct. 17, 1715 James Boughan sells 100 acres in Essex Co. to John London of King and Queen Co. A reference in Essex Land Trials 1715-31, p. 75 shows that this land was on the head of Gilson's Creek, adjoining land James Boughan sold William Wilson. Apparently John London moved into Essex and lived on this land, for when he sells it Mar. 10, 1718 (D. & W. 16, p. 12) he is described as John London of St. Ann's Parish, Essex Co. It seems probable that he is the same person, who, as John London of King and Queen Co. patented Sept. 28, 1728, 950 acres on the branches of Terry's Run in St. George's Parish (S.L.O. Book 13, p. 371). The Spottsylvania published records contain no reference to this land. In Caroline Records O.B. 1746-49, July 3, 1748, Peter Copeland sues Mark London. In Chalkley's Abstracts of Augusta Co. Records, Vol. 1, p. 47, Sept. 4, 1750, is this entry; called court on Jane London---not guilty of the felony but bound to the peace toward Bryce Russell and Alexander Walker. In Albemarle Records, O.B. 1744-48, p. 336, Dec. 1747, Sarah London sues John Anderson and also Henry Jennison. In both cases the defendants prayed leave to imparlo and the cases did not come to trial in that volume. Unfortunately, the succeeding volume is missing, so that no further information on Sarah London is available. Essex O.B. 26, p. ____, Feb. 19, 1765, Archibald McCall sues David London. The Douglas Register has one London item: Henry Lane and Sarah London, a son Richard born July 27, 1774.

Leaving these scattered references, where we can prove no connection, we come to James London who was in Albemarle Co. about 1747, and find ourselves on firmer ground. Our first reference to him is in Albemarle Records, O.B. 1744-48, p. 356, Mar. 11, 1748, when he is allowed pay for one days

attendance at court as a witness for Richard Fletcher Gregory. On p. 364, of the same Order Book, June 9, 1748, in the list of land surveyed from June 1747 to June 1748, we find James London had 250 acres surveyed. This may be the land described as being on the North Branch of the Stony Run of Buffalo for which he obtained a patent Sept. 5, 1749 (S.L.O. Book 27, p. 410). On March 10, 1756 (S.L.O. Book 34, p. 51) John London patented 185 acres in Albemarle. It seems probable that both James and John London were sons of the John London of King and Queen who patented land in 1728 and that they had joined the many families from King and Queen and Caroline counties who were steadily moving westward.

Our scanty knowledge of John London who patented the 185 acres in Albemarle gives only a few details of his life. He seems to have lived on the south side of James River and is probably the John London who served from Bedford County in 1756 (Boogher's Virginia Gleanings, p. 61). Bedford then embraced Campbell, so if he were living in the eastern part of Bedford he would be directly adjacent to Halifax where we find him in 1764, voting in the poll for Burgesses. (Halifax Records, D. B. 3, p. ____, Nov. 1764). In 1773, as John London of Halifax, he sold to Joseph Wittshire the 185 acres he had patented in Albemarle in 1756, which, by division of the counties, were now in Amherst. (Amherst County Records, D. B. "D", p. 126, Dec. 20, 1773). The will of John London is in Charlotte County records, W. B. 1, part 1, p. 169, dated April 14, 1777, and probated Dec. 1, 1777. Describing himself as "of Halifax County", he leaves to his son Isiah land in Charlotte County on Sandy Creek, "it being part of the land I bought of Benjamin Atkins", to son John "land I bought of John Haley lying in Charlotte Co. and the remainder of the land I bought of Atkins", "rest of my estate to be equally divided between the whole of my children"; "son Isiah and daughter Delpha to be executors". Witnesses William Rawlins, Jas. (X) Enroughty, John Thompson. In the 1782 Census, Isiah London was living with his family of six people in Charlotte County. In the same census an Owen London is listed as living in Halifax County with but one person in his family.

The following from the Halifax marriage bonds refer either to John London's children or grandchildren: John London and Jane Clardy Nov. 14, 1789; Isiah London and Elizabeth Dunkley (Dunsley) March 23, 1789; Daniel Littleberry and Keziah London Feb. 17, 1790; Owen London and E. Whitlow Jan. 7, 1795. A Charlotte County marriage bond may refer to this family: William Ryan and Gilly Lunnon Feb. 22, 1800, also this from Mecklenburg: Henry Lunnon and Mary Elam Dec. 13, 1802, Philip Ryan, Sec.

Those two notes from Prince Edward County Records, though very late may be of help to someone: D. B. 27, pp. 36-37, Caroline S. London, daughter of Thompson A. Waddoll and wife of John G. London of Knox Co., Tenn. gives power of attorney to Abner C. Waddoll to dispose of her part of the

estate of Thompson A. Waddoll, dec'd May 10, 1855. Also D. B. 26, p. 361, Sept. 27, 1853, deed from Sarah Y. London, Philip N. Ryan and Sarah A. Ryan, his wife, to Robert A. Smith of Prince Edward County for \$50.00, 11 acres, "it being dower land left her by Benjamin London of Prince Edward County".

Returning now to the James London who was living in Albemarle in 1748, we find him in 1763 purchasing 400 acres on the north side of the James River and on both sides of Tooker's Creek. James Dillard, Jesse Evans, Moses London and Chas. Perrow witnessed the deed. (Amherst Co. Records, D. B. "A", p. 229). According to the family tree, he married a Dillon. His relationship to the Moses London who witnessed the above deed is not clear. In the Amherst Co. O. B. 1773-82, p. 190, July 7, 1777, he is called heir at law of Moses London and ordered to have administration on "said decedent's estate", but at the next court Aug. 4, 1777, administration is granted to Alexander Chignall for whom Joseph Cabell, Gent. and Edmund Wilcox go security. It seems more likely that James was a brother of Moses than his son. According to the family tree, James London and _____ Dillon had two children, James Jr. born 1740, according to his deposition and Larkin. The date of James London's death is not known. In the Vestry Book of Loxington Parish, p. 10, is this entry: James London to provide for Elizabeth Miller, May 14, 1782. On the next page is this: James London, Jr. to provide for Elizabeth Miller, July 27, 1782. It would seem that the elder James London had died in the interval between the two entries and the son had fallen heir to his father's responsibilities.

Despite search, no trace of James London's wife has come to light in the records. There were Dillon's in Caroline County who went into Goochland and Cumberland Counties. It is presumed that James London's wife was of this family, there is no reason to doubt the statement made in the family tree that she was a Dillon.

James London, Jr., in Chalkley's Abstracts of Augusta Co. Records, Vol. 2, p. 131, deposed in a suit in Amherst Court on Oct. 9, 1811, that he was 71 years old, and further that he had lived in Albemarle, near the land which was in dispute since his infancy. He was therefore born 1740 and died in Amherst 1827. His statement that he had lived since infancy in Albemarle is in exact accord, it will be noticed, with his father having 250 acres surveyed in Albemarle between June 1747-1748. This land after 1761 was in Amherst County. In 1768, Jas. London, Jr. bought 461 acres on the branches of Perrage Creek (Amherst Co. Records D. B. "B", p. 358). About this time he married Mary Turner, born April 6, 1751, died 1840 (Loose paper in London Bible: "6 day of April, 1840, Grandmamma London will be 89 years old"). Mary Turner's ancestry will be discussed later.

There were ten children that we know of by this marriage, but the exact order of their births is unknown.

1. William; went to North Carolina where he died before 1820, leaving issue mentioned in his father's will as "my son William London's heirs".
2. John (1774-1823) for whom see below.
3. Elizabeth married Aug. 3, 1801, Stark Whittington, who probably died about 1825. In Bedford Co. Records, W. B. "I", p. 154 are the accounts of James L. Whittington guardian for his wards, Eliza Murroll, Lucinda Scott, Addison Whittington, Lomira Whittington, Frances Whittington and Reuben Whittington. These accounts began in Sept. 1825 and were settled May 23, 1836, when apparently the youngest child had come of age. James L. Whittington is bequeathed land in the will of his uncle, James London, who died 1836 (Amherst Co. Records, W. B. 9, p. 200). There is in Amherst a marriage bond for James Whittington and Harriett Gregory, Jan. 29, 1828 and another Sept. 17, 1838, for James L. Whittington and Lucy Burch. They are probably for the same person, James Whittington marrying (1) his first cousin, Harriett Gregory and (2) Lucy Burch.
4. Susannah married Obodiah Henderson, D.S.P.
5. Nancy married Aug. 22, 1805, Lewis Gregory; issue: (a) Lewis Gregory married Mary Jones, issue: Margaret m. _____ Fitzgerald, issue Mildred, Emma, Eddie; (b) John Gregory m. _____ Minor; (c) Harriet Gregory; (d) Harrie Gregory (These last two, whose names suggest that they were twin daughters, are not given in the family tree but are named in their grandfather London's will).
6. Sally, married Dec. 15, 1821, her first cousin, Irvine Loe London, son of Larkin London and Mary Dillard; issue Aranda London, m. John Bass; issue Luther and Alice.
7. Polly, married Dec. 19, 1799, Thos. Gregory. According to a paper in possession of Mrs. Banks Davies Hurley, Polly London was born Sept. 5, 1783, and her children are given as follows: William L. Gregory born March 17, 1801; John Gregory, born Nov. 30, 1802; Lewis Gregory, born March 24, 1804; Reuben C. Gregory, born Oct. 10, 1805.
8. Martin, married Nov. 29, 1813, Nancy Eads. According to the family tree he went to Kentucky.
9. James, born not later than 1782, d.s.p. 1836. According to the family tree he "died of love".
10. Lucinda, married Thomas Knight.

John London, born in Amherst Co., June 11, 1774, died March 21, 1823, son of James London (1740-1827) and Mary Turner (1751-1840) and grandson of James London and Dillon, married Dec. 31, 1809, Tirzah Higginbotham, born Feb. 17, 1783, died Aug. 1, 1841, daughter of Captain Jno. Higginbotham (1726-1814) and his wife Rachel Banks.

7. Mary Banks London, born Feb. 18, 1820, died Nov. 17, 1892, married Oct. 19, 1852 Dr. George W. Davies
8. William Augustus London, born June 18, 1821, died at Poplar Grove, Amherst Co., Aug. 2, 1888, married April 13, 1842 Harriet J. Bailey of Charlotte Co. (Lived 18 years at Smithville, Va.)

Larkin London, brother of James (1740-1827) is listed in the 1782 Census as head of a household of two persons. It seems very probable that the Wiatt and Lavender London, not given on the family tree but closely identified with him in Amherst records, were his sons by a marriage taking place prior to 1782. Larkin London married Dec. 2, 1789, Mary Dillard, daughter of William Dillard of Amherst Co. (Amherst Co. Records, W. B. 8, pp. 344-345). Mary, wife of Larkin London, received 39 acres due her by inheritance from her father William Dillard, July 1833. Larkin London died intestate, and on Sept. 19, 1836, Wiatt London with Nelson J. and Irvine L. London gave bond to administer his estate (Amherst Records, W. B. 9, p. 241). According to the family tree Larkin London had the following children: 1. Mathilda, married July 18, 1836 Henry Haggard 2. Irvine Lee, married Dec. 15, 1821 his first cousin Sallie London 3. Richard H. London 4. Nelson Jefferson London, died 1853, and Wiatt London and Richard H. London administered his estate (Amherst Records, W. B. 13, p. 244).

Wiatt London was constable for Amherst in 1815 (Amherst Records, W. B. 5, p. 513). He married April 20, 1835, Rachel Mahaly Scott _____.

Lavender London married April 21, 1800, Jane Wright. He was appointed inspector of tobacco, Oct. 5, 1805 (Amherst Co. Records, W. B. 4, p. 281).

A few words should be said about Mary Turner (1751-1840) who married James London (1740-1827). She was the daughter of Terisha Turner and his wife Sarah, who is said in the family tree so frequently mentioned to have been a Wimpoy. Our earliest reference to Terisha Turner is found in S.L.O.

Book 27, p. 519, when he patents 250 acres in Goochland on the south side of James River on the branches of Snow Quarter, Dec. 15, 1749. On Oct. 29, 1751, describing himself as Terisha Turner of Albemarle, he sold to Michael Rowland 200 acres in Cumberland County in the heads of Deep Run, a branch of Muddy Creek. Sarah, his wife, relinquished her dower rights in this land (Cumberland Co. Records, D. B. 1, p. 442). The names of Terisha Turner's parents and the date and place of his birth are unknown. It seems probable, since the Wimpey's were from Caroline, that he was from that county or King and Queen. He was likely born between 1705 and 1710, and must have been a very old man when he died. His will dated May 7, 1793, probated April 19, 1802 (Amherst Co. Records W. B. 4, p. 34) mentions son James, to whom he gives two negro boys; son Stephen, 700 acres in Granville Co., N. C.; son John, 519 acres on Fry's branch in Amherst Co.; son Henry, 519 acres on Pottage Creek in Amherst Co.; son William 519 acres lying between lands of son Henry and son John; daughter Mary London, three negroes; daughter Sarah Stovall, one negro girl; wife Sarah, 450 acres "land on which I live, also 100 acres lying on Briery fork of Green Creek in Albemarle", at her death this land to go to son George.

Sarah Turner died in 1807 (Amherst Records W. B. 4, p. 274).

Of the children of Terisha Turner:

1. James Turner married Rebecca Hamner, daughter of William Hamner and Elizabeth Henley (Wood's Albemarle Co., p. 215). James Turner died 1806 leaving a large family. His will is in Amherst Co. Records, W. B. 4, p. 223.
2. Stephen Turner, married Sarah Hamner, sister of his brother James' wife. Their daughter Mary, born March 13, 1771 married Jan. 5, 1788 William McGuffey Rives of Dinwiddie Co. (Reliques of the Rives by J. R. Childs, p. 159). The will of Stephen Turner, dated April 29, 1799, was probated June 1, 1801, and is in Amherst Co. Records, W. N. 4, p. 8).

According to a letter of Mary Turner Rives (Reliques of the Rives, p. 159), her uncle, John Turner, and her aunt Sarah Stovall, moved to Kentucky, as did some of her uncle Henry Turner's children. In Chalkley's Abstracts of Augusta Co., Vol. 2, p. 131, Henry Turner deposed in Campbell Court in a suit Oct. 12, 1811, that he was 53 years old. In Chalkley's Abstracts, Vol. 2, p. 492, William Turner made a declaration Aug. 21, 1832, that he was born in Albemarle in 1760, that during the Revolution he was at Albemarle Barracks under Captain Thurnond, that he was in a company at Rocketts under John Christian of Amherst County, also that he was Sergt. under Captain Benjamin Higginbotham at Yorktown and was made ensign on the march.

The earliest reference the writer has found to the Wimpeys is in Essex County Records, O.B. 1716-23, p. 166,

Aug. 19, 1718, when John Wimpey and Mary his wife, sue George Pottit. In Caroline County Records, O.B. 1741-46, p. 260, May 10, 1743, Robert Rogers is ordered to pay John Wimpey 250 lbs. tobacco for his wife, Mary Wimpey's attendance at court. In 1750, he appears in the list of tithables in Lunenburg Co., and in the same year bought land there (Lunenburg Co. Records, D. B. 2, p. 140). His son, John Wimpey, Jr., who had married Eleanor, daughter of James Byrom of Essex (Essex Co. Records, W. B. 8, p. 239), died about 1752, leaving two children, Henry and Elizabeth. In 1754, Eleanor Wimpey deeds all her household goods to her children, Henry and Elizabeth, and appoints their grandfather, John Wimpey, Sr., and their uncle, David Wimpey, to take charge of the children (Lunenburg Co. Records D. B. 4, p. 126). Mary, wife of John Wimpey, Sr., died between 1756, when she joins her husband in a deed for 1100 acres to Lyddal Bacon, and 1761, when her husband made his will. This will, dated Sept. 4, 1761, proved July 6, 1762 (Lunenburg Co. Records, W. B. 2, p. 16), makes provision for the two grandchildren who had been committed to his care and leaves the remainder of his estate to Benjamin Atkins, without specifying relationship. The fact that he does not mention Sarah Turner as his daughter is not proof that she was not his daughter, for he makes no mention of David, whom Eleanor Wimpey specifically stated was her husband's brother. It is probable that he had made some settlement on Sarah when she married Terisha Turner, hence made no mention of her in his will.

Alexander Weed B. 9 Sep 1769 in N.Y. state, D. Mar 1849 at Rochester, N.Y., M. Sep 1793 at Stillwater, N.Y., Elizabeth Irish, B. 22 Feb 1773 at Pawling, Dutchess co., N.Y. A sister of the noted Rev. David Irish, Baptist minister of Fleming, N.Y. Her parents moved to Stillwater, Saratoga co., N.Y., when she was a child. She D. 22 Feb 1838 at Scitio, Cayuga co., N.Y. Alexander Weed was the son of Gilbert (1740-1823) and Abigail (1745-1823) (Hoyt) Weed, pioneers to Springport, N.Y. They moved from Stillwater to Scipio, Cayuga, N.Y. in 1795, Alexander received a pension for service. He was put in command of the troops under Captain Granger and Col. Samuel Canfield. Alexander and Elizabeth had the following children: (1) Eliza, M.----Fox, (2) Dorcas, M. Timothy Miller, (3) Charles, (4) Sarah (Sally), B. 1796, M. 1817 Abram Snapp, B. 1794, (5) James, (6) Alanson, (7) Alexander, (8) Rial, M. Ruth Austin.

Jonathan Southwick

Jonathan Southwick, b. 15 August 1786, D. 22 Feb 1852, son of George and Lydia (Sargent) Southwick, m. Martha Irish, b. 3 Feb 1791 in Danby, Vermont, d. March 1864 at North Collins, New York, daughter of Jonathan Irish. Martha's brothers Israel and Wilbur attended the Quaker wedding. Jonathan was a Quaker minister and was transferred from the Queensbury, M.M. on the 4 May 1809. They transferred to the East Hamburg, New York M.M. the 11 Apr 1811. East Hamburg M.M. was under the jurisdiction of Pelham, Upper Canada M.M. until 1813, when the Erie county New York Friends had their own M.M. Soon after their marriage they started out for Erie county New York bringing their household goods on a sledge drawn by oxen. He was a farmer and nurseryman. He was blind for 25 years, loosing sight of each eye in separate accidents. They had the following children: (all were born in North Collins, New York) 1. Hannah, b. 8 July 1812, d. 27 Jan 1897, m. 28 May 1841 to Nehemiah Hull, b. 20 July 1800, d. 9 Aug 1884, He was a Quaker.--2. Mary, b. 22 Mar 1814, m. 12 Jan 1841 Timothy Austin. -- 3. Elizabeth, b. 5 Jan 1816, m. 28 Apr 1845 Abner Taft.--4. Jonathan, b. 16 June 1819, a farmer and fruit grower, m. 1 July 1842 Sarah Hull, b. 19 Apr 1825, she was the daughter of Nehemiah Hull by his first wife, Bathsheba Hoag. --5 Stephen b. 4 Feb 1821, m. 12 Dec 1838 Rachel Wood Irish, b. 1 Oct 1820.-- 6 Anna, b. 27 May 1823, m. William Hull, b. 3 Sept. 1827, a farmer and son of Nehemiah Hull by his first wife Bathsheba Hoag.

Alsop Family Bible

Richard Alsop was born October 19, 1841. The eleventh and youngest child of Richard and Sarah Alsop of Garthmill, parish of Berriew, county of Montgomery, North Wales. Richard was married to Jane Fryce, of the same place, she was born April 7, 1841, they were married Nov 17, 1865. To them were born a daughter Emily Jane, at Abernaut in said parish of Berriew, on Oct 17, 1866. A son John Richard born at the Forest, parish of Kerry, county of Montgomery on Nov 22, 1868.

The family emigrated to America in April 1870 and settled at Wakefield, Clay county, Kansas, where on July 15, 1871 their daughter Frances Annie was born and son Edward Henry, May 12, 1874.

Jane the beloved wife and mother died at Wakefield, on Dec 16, 1875 and was interred in the Madura Cemetery, Dec 18th.

Ellen Brown was born at Brimpton, Berkshire, England on July 12, 1838. She came to Kansas in 1871 and was married to Richard Alsop at Wakefield, Dec 5, 1876. To them were born Ellen Charlotte, Oct 23, 1877 and Alfred Charles, Mar 25, 1879. This second beloved wife and mother departed this life at Wakefield, Jan 9, 1899 and was also interred in Madura Cemetery, Jan 12th.

John Taylor, son of Robert Taylor and Mary Hodges Taylor was b. Jan 1657, d. 1747 in Little Compton, R.I., m. 1st wife Abigail, b. 1660, d. 16 Sep 1720. Married 2nd wife Sarah, b. ---, d. 1764. The will of John Taylor, b. Jan 1657, d. 1747, little Compton, R.I., was dated 24 Apr 1745 and proved in 1747. Executors were his sons, John and Robert. The will mentions; his wife Sarah, son Philip, deceased, daughter Margaret Woodman, dau. Lydia Cook, grandsons Joe Taylor and Samuel Irish, grandsons Joseph and Philip Taylor sons of Philip, granddaughters, Mary Davis and Hanna V. ---, Ana Irish, Susanna Palmer, Abigail Taylor and Deborah Taylor. Great- grandsons George, Jonathan and Joseph Wilbur, great- grandchildren of Priscilla Wilbur, Job, Abner and Ann Wilbur.

This was taken from the records of Orrin Wilbur, he is a descendant of one of the sons of Thomas and Susanna (Irish) Wilbur, as printed in "The Descendants of John Irish".
