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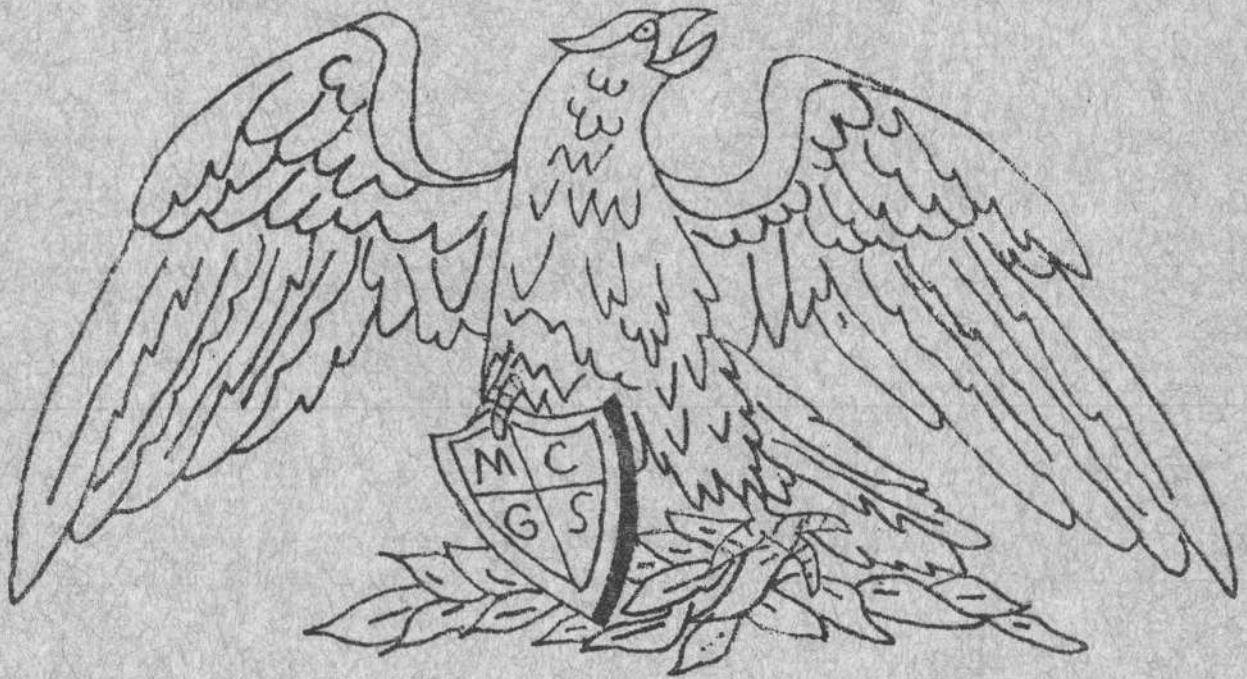
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MONTGOMERY COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

Whereas I, Soloman Stansberry of Laurel County, and State of Kentucky have it in contemplation to visit the West and perhaps spend some time absent from the County of Laurel and whereas I am _____ of some estate in the said County of Laurel hereinafter mentioned and knowing the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death and being desirous to make such disposition of my said estate as to me seems just and satisfactory and being at this time in good health and sound mind and disposing memory do hereby make and publish this my last will and testament. I give and bequeath to my sons John and Jarvis Stansberry and my daughter Minerva Stansberry my tract of land lying in Laurel County on the waters of Big Laurel being the same I bought of William Stansburrys containing one hundred and fifty acres more or less to be equally divided between the same John, Jarvis & Minerva Stansberry. In testimony of which I have hereunto set my name and affixed my seal this 22nd day of September, 1846.

The following record concerns a different Solomon Stansbury who also lived in Laurel County, Kentucky and died there on April 1, 1842.

Military Record of Solomon Stansbury during the War of the Revolution

First enlisted as private as a militia soldier for term of three months in Baltimore, State of Maryland in the year that the British sailed up the Chesapeake Bay. Company commanded by Luke Wiley Lt. Joshua Wiley and Major Joshua Stephison and Lt. Darby Luxe in Regt. commanded by Col. Tally. Enlisted shortly before the Battle of Brandywine. Later served as private for two 3-month enlistments in North Carolina in company commanded by Captain Hardin, Lt. Thomas Barnett and Hugh Barnett, Ensign, and one 5-month enlistment in North Carolina troops. (from: General Services Administration records on file designation W-8759)

RICHARDSON FAMILY CANE

This cane was made soon after the Revolutionary War. It is supposed to be made from a cane root, the head is ivory and the metal trimmings are silver. It has descended from father to oldest son for five generations and two more generations are waiting their turn.

James Richardson was the first Richardson the family knows anything about. He came to the United States from Ireland about the time of the Revolution and was a soldier on the side of the United States in the war. After the war he settled in the east Tennessee region and had the cane made. He was a large red-headed Irishman. His oldest son was Samuel Richardson.

Samuel Richardson immigrated from Tennessee to Kentucky and later to northern Missouri. He was a farmer and a Captain in the war with Mexico. He later lived in Miller county, Missouri. His wife was a Cherokee Indian, Mary Jane Bunch, who left the tribe. She was born in 1799. His oldest son was James Monroe Richardson.

James Monroe Richardson (not named for the President) was a member of the legislature of the state of Missouri for one term. He was active on the side of the Confederacy. After the Civil War he was one of the early settlers in Labette county, Kansas and lived there until his death 15, February 1895. He was born in East Tennessee in 1820, moved to Missouri in 1829, married Frances Ann Stephens in 1843 and went to California in the Gold Rush in 1850 till 1852. His second wife was Cordelia A. Hinds, a widow and a sister of his first wife. His oldest son was James Madison Richardson.

James Madison Richardson was born March 15, 1844 in Miller county Missouri and entered the Confederate Army at the Age of 17. He was captured and held prisoner for some time. He moved to Labette county Kansas in 1869. He then went to Oklahoma on the first train on April 22, 1889 in the Oklahoma Run, settling near Stroud and lived there till he died. He had two sons, the older being Fred Orlando Richardson.

Fred Orlando Richardson served three years in the infantry during the period of the Spanish-American War and the Philippine occupation. He was a farmer, soldier, telegrapher, and then became a banker, for 23 years. He moved to Corona, California in 1920 and bought a bank there. His oldest son was Roy Richardson. Fred Richardson possessed the cane in 1956. At that time Roy Richardson lived in Whittier, California and had a son Gordon Powell Richardson, making seven generations of oldest sons to possess the cane.

Winix Was one of the first settlers Pioneer of New York Called then New Amsterdam Settled 1646 from Lower Holland on the Ryine My Grandpa Winans One of the first settlers in Otsego Co N.Y. 10 miles West of Otsego lake Sometimes called Glimmer Lake 3 miles wide & 9 miles long headwaters of Susquenha River on side hill in Bently Hollow 3 miles to Westford He & Deacon Bently settled together & Old Mr Bently has told me of the hardships he & Grandpa had that part of Otsego Co Was heavily timbered & Grandpa had log rooting bus to burn up legs & brush so they could farm Otsego Co is very hilly & Stoney but the best apples & the sweetest corn & Potatoes & berries & trout fish & best grass in the world & dont forget the mable sugar I have made a good many thousand lbs of it & Buck wheat Cakes good butter & maple syrup are hard to beat My Grandpa Cleaveland settled 40 miles below Hartford Conn little town called Burlington His farm was hilly & stony My Grandparents settled before the revutionary war & some big stories they told me about the war My father Russel Humpury Winans Went to Mich & settled one of the first at Ann Harbor near whare the Great Mich University is now & I was born in Ann Harbor 1846 May 16 Makes me now 74 years old My father when I was 5 years old was the best Architect-Builder in the state of Mich & he bought lumber at Detreit & shiped across lake & once he was 3 days & nights hanging to masts & cought cold & run into Consuntion Dr ordered him east He sold house & lot for 4 Thousand spot east & we went to Elmira on shemung river In one year Dr said he must get on oceon to save life he bled at lengs We got as far as Preston Hollow Livingston Co & Pa bled at lungs & died So Ma & I went to Burlington Conn to take care of Grandpa Ezra Cleaveland he was 84 & Mether did not want to live & took cold & verry sick & we went to Uncle Milton Wrights Westford Otsego Co N.Y. & Ma Died & left us 3 thousand dels lets of silverware & fine Clothes & Papa had a watch & a wonderful teal Chest that I wanted but were all sold for the benefit of Milton Wright & family I lived with them most of time but Uncle Herace Winans of New York helped me & made it Verry pleasant for me when I could get to New York When I was 14 years old Uncle Milton & I went to Ft Edward N.Y. to build a House for Rev Brown His Brother in law Mr Brown was quite wealthy & a wonderful goed Baptist Preacher & owned 8 acres & we built him a very fine 12 room house this was 1861 Capt Walters was raiseing a Co for Harris Light Cav Lt Col Kilpatrick & Walters told me I could go Just say I was 18 years old So I enlisted & I was sweet on Mr Browns Girl Ella & as we went to bed I told her goed by I was going to Washington next day She went down stairs & told Uncle Milton & he locked

me up & watched me until our Co had gone Next day Mrs. Brown sent me down town to get some stitching done & as I had a little money I took train for New York But found my Reg had gone So took train for Phila they had gone to Baltimore So I found my Reg at Baltimore We Camped a few days & then to Washington a few days & into Va across Chain Bridge We Saber drilled until my wrist was nearly wore out & then we got horses & saddles & I got a lovely horse & good saddle & revolver & now trouble just commenced We drilled all the time & mad raids to burn bridges etc. & when we were out on one scout about 100 miles the Rebbel Cav 10 to our one surrounded us & we cut through & had a running fight for nearly 200 miles & verry lit to eat When we got to camp I went to bed had Chronic diarea & did not get up for reel call Next night I paid no attention to reel call & seen down came a Corp & file of soldiers & said Capt Walters wanted me He stood me on a barrel about 2 hours & then asked me if I thought I could get up to reel call I thought I could I was mad & told Capt I was going home He said all right I had not sworn into U.S. Service yet So I wrote to Uncle Milton to come & get me & I would pay all exspences & in 3 days he walked into Camp Next day I told Col Kilpatric Uncle wanted a pass to Washington & Uncle gave me his old pass & I put on civillian clothes & I was Milton Wright I told Uncle to ge across Petemac at Chain Bridge & I would cross on Long Bridge We met in Washington & that night took train for Ft. Edward N.Y. & Mr. Brown said I had a fine time but cost me about 300 dols I told him 300 want much He told me he did not want a Sen in law that spent money so easy So I went up to Westford Otsego Co N.Y. & went to school & next year Uncle Milton gave me 8 dols per month to work in farm In Sept Ed Buttler came ever from South Valley & said I had such exspieriance as he was raiseing a Co for 152 N.Y. Vel I could be Sargt So Sept 29 I enlisted & we were 2nd Brigade 2 Div 2nd Army Corps Petemac Army & I was in every battle until June 22 64 I was shot all te peecies & sent to Phila Bulk Head Hesp 65 & vine St Was there one year Descharged June 29 65 & went back to Westford N.Y. & went to High School Next year Went to work for Warren Wright Celliers N.Y. Dec 28 1869 I married Lucina Bushnell of Worcester Otsego Co N.Y. She was the most lovely girl I ever saw Pretty nice form & the most lovely disposition We lived together 40 years & she was an angel & I am so lenely without her In 1870 we moved to Nerwich N.Y. whare we had te children C.R. Winans was bern Feb 2 1881 on my ranch near Spearville Kans Worked with me on farm & at carpenter work til 21 Then

married & went to work for Frank Calvin Nengahala Penn Died verry sudden Apr 1803(?) Benjamin E. I, James Clark, being duly sworn, on oath say that I was born March 10th 1843 in Champaign County, Illinois, (I am unable to give the town or township) and removed with my father and mother to Crawford county, Wisconsin, but was too young to remember the date, my postoffice in Wisconsin was Mount Sterling and was there when I enlisted at the age of 18 in the 12th Wis. Inftry. Co.K, after being finally discharged July 16th 1865 at Louisville, Ks., I returned to Crawford county, Wis., about the year 1871 I removed from there to Brownsville, Houston county, Minn., where I resided until about the year 1875 when I removed to Lyons, Clinton county Iowa, where I resided until about the year 1879 when I removed back to Crawford county, Wis. and during my residence there my postoffice was Belle Center, and resided there until about the year 1882 and still retaining my residence in Crawford county, Wis., I removed to another location where my postoffice address was Wooster, where I resided until the year 1895 when I removed to Clark county, Wis., and during my residence in Clark county my postoffice addresses were Pittsville and Brook; about the year 1911 I removed from Clark county, Wis., to Dunn county, North Dakota, where I have resided ever since in which county my postoffice address has been Manning until about two months ago I changed it to Dunn Center:

I was too young to know the place of my birth and did not learn the facts until about the year 1876 when I settled up an estate belonging to my mother in Champaign county, Ill..

The above AFFIDAVIT was made by James Clark when he was 71 years of age.

This was contributed by Margaret Lucas, Coffeyville, Kansas. Whose maternal great grandmother was the Polly Ann Clark (Bacon) mentioned in the above affidavit as a sister of James Clark.

The History of Montgomery County reveals this locality as the spot where the Osage Indian made his last stand before the white man's advance in spreading civilization over the plains of Kansas. He was crowded off the reserve in 1825.

Some of the early settlers of Montgomery County are as follows:

Elk City located on the claim of James E. Kelly (Kelley) 1868, later moved to the Pittman claim.

M. D. Wright came to Kansas and Montgomery County in 1870. He was Postmaster in 1872. He was born 12 Nov 1832.

Whig Southard was the first Postmaster of Elk City.

John and Samuel Kopple came to the County in 1869.

J. P. Morgan was Chairman of Municipal Government in 1871.

William Osborne was the first Justice of Peace.

Samuel Weston, born, Bangor, Me, 1857, resided at Boston. Passed the Bar Examination in 1879 and practised law at Elk City until 1893. Later went to Meade, Kansas in the Lumber business.

LaFayette M. Carson, born 1 July 1857, was a farmer, south of Elk City. He died in 1875 and was burried on the farm Family Cemetery.

James A. McDowell came to Kansas in 1869. He was born 9 Oct 1858 in Kentucky - Irish descent. His father, Allen McDowell was born in Kentucky. Married, Martha Freeman, daughter of Hardy F. Freeman. James A. McDowell, married Lola Lewis, daughter of Abraham and Martha (Reed) Lewis. Three children, Avis B., 1894, Frances B, 1896 and Allen B, 1898.

Wm. B. Wood, born 28 June 1868 in Kentucky to Thomas F. Wood. His Grand father, Jeriah Wood. Thomas F. Wood, married Eliza A. Morgan. There were two children, Wm. B. and John R. During the 1885 Elk River Flood Mrs. Wood, (Elize) and a son Thomas F, 10 yrs of age were drowned, 16 May 1885.

Joseph Gentry Sewell - History with the west began when he settled on Sec. 30 -Twp 33 - R 15 in Montgomery Cty in 1871. He died in 1882. He was a native of Averton Cty, Tenn. Born 6 Dec 1829. His father was W. D. Sewell who was born in 1899, married Susan Brown.
