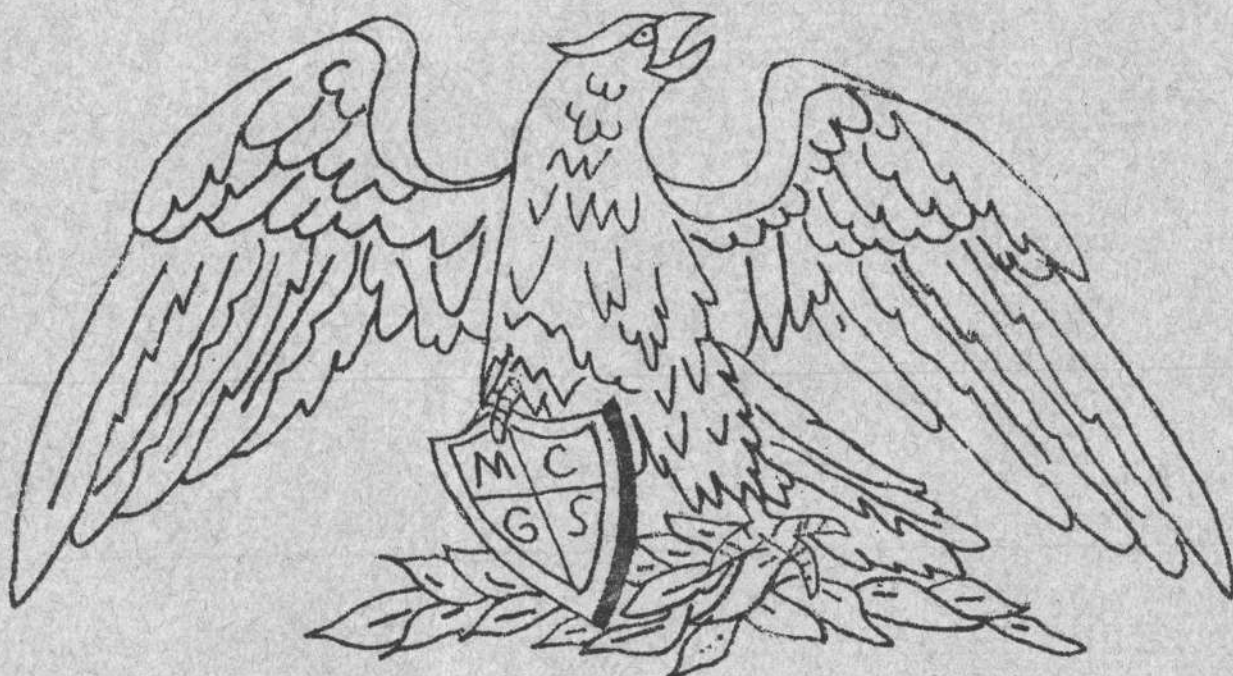

MEMORANDUM OF HENRY SHIBLEY, VANBUREN, ARKANSAS
(Continued from Vol. III No. 2)

The day was pleasant though rather cool to me; ice had formed $\frac{1}{2}$ in thick. My sister insisted upon furnishing me with a shawl, which I did not think I would need but found quite agreeable before we got to my brother's sometime about dark and was glad to meet his kind family and find them all well. About two miles before we got to my brother's we past the new place of my brother-in-law, A. D. Hickman. Stepped and saw him and my good sister Cyrena. They thought they would come to see me the next day at my brother's.

Nev. 7. Sunday cloudy and quite cool. A. D. Hickman and family came to see us. I went home with them at night. They have lately built and moved into a new box house and is not yet comfortable.

Returned with A. D. Hickman to my brother's John. Jacob Selada was there building a corn crib. Wrote two letters, in the evening went to the Point. Mailed my letters and met with several old acquaintances. Called on Ann Hendrix, Cyrena Sheep.

Nev. 9. My brother John took his wife and me in his two horse buggy for a visit to our uncle Samuel P. Shibley. He is comfortably situated with a fair amount of this world's goods. Having a farm of about one hundred seventy five acres of fertile land in good state of cultivation, a considerable part being creek bottom and sometimes overflows but not often. He has a two story frame dwelling of commodious size and design, well and tastefully finished inside and out. And beautifully located on an elevation of rare beauty, a well arranged cellar under the whole.

My uncle moved from New York State to his present place in the fall of 1855 having failed in business as a merchant, had very little means. His present circumstances is a good illustration of what patient industry with taste, judgment, integrity and economy will accomplish.

His eldest daughter, Mary Elizabeth (lovingly known as Lib) gave me the following memorandum of the family--

Samuel P. Shibley moved to Adair Co., Missouri, Nev. 1855. Mary Elizabeth married Thomas J. Gilmore March 1856 and had two sons now in Montana. Gilmore died Nev. 1866. In 1871 she married James C. True, had one daughter Ada E. True died December 1874.

Louise married Charles Conley December 1861. Conley died 1870. She had two children (daughters) by Conley. Married Washington Herriford (?) December 1874 have one, Myrtle. Cyrena married Adam Sheep Feb. 1866. Have five children, three sons and two daughters. David Henry is in Dakota Territory. Married Ramsen's daughter in Feb. 1863, have two sons and one daughter, moved to Dakota in the spring 1880. His address is Spearfish, Lawrence Co, Dakota.

Samuel is in Kansas, merchandising, was married in June 1880 age 42 years.

George and John are at home in charge of the home place. Late in the afternoon my brother and wife returned home. I remained at my uncles. Rained some this evening.

Nov. 10. Rained some during the day. I remained at my uncles being pleasantly entertained by him and his family. Toward night my brother came with a lead horse and we went to our brother George's stayed over night.

Nov. 11. Cold and freezing some. My brother went with me to my brother in laws Enoch W. Burns. He gave me the following memorandum of his family.

He (Enoch W. Burns) was born May 30 1817 his wife Susan I. Boyd was born Nov 26 1820. They were married June 7 1840. She died Feb 15, 1871. Their daughter Susan Mary was born Oct. 6, 1843, died Jan 21, 1863. William R. born May 22, 1845 married Fanny Brasher, they had two children, a son and a daughter. (She died Nov 18, 1880 as I afterwards learned. They were living in Colorado at the time of her death). Louisa E. born Feb 27, 1847 married George W. Kendrick April 19, 1865 had one child, a daughter. Enoch Wesley born May 12th 1849, he is in California, expected home soon. Margaret I. was born July 15 1851. She married Samuel R. Weed Aug 13, 1868, died Feb 17, 1878 left three children, one son and two daughters. One of the little girls is adopted by my sister Sarah Ann Burns. James J. (T) born Nov 4, 1853 married his cousin Melly Hickland, have two children - sons, one 5 the other 3 years old lost a pair of twins last fall. George S. born March 19, 1856, married Julia E. Shaver in March 1880, lives on the place with his father. Denis M. born Sept 12, 1858. He is in Colorado, expected home. Ellen M. born July 11, 1861, died Oct 25, 1877. Urbanna born Feb 15, 1869. She is at home. (Some about the farm). This evening brother John went home and I returned to brother Georges and stayed overnight. Weather cloudy and cool.

Nov. 12. Brother George and I went to Spring Creek, called at John Scebeys. He was not at home. Went to E. M. C. Merelecks, he was not home. Went to his son's, William Mereleck, took dinner with him. He and his wife were very (kind) and sociable. In the evening his father came along going home. I had not seen him for more than twenty years. He knew me although he had not heard that I was in the country. George and I went over to his house and spent the time very pleasantly until a late hour in pleasant and, to me, interesting conversation.

Nov. 13. After breakfast, went over to John Scebeys, stayed until after dinner then went toward his home met his son who told us of his horses having just run away with a

waggon. They had run about a mile and a half along very stumpy roads at full speed and never done any damage. A remarkable case. The weather quite cool.

Nov. 14. Quite cold this morning. George and I went to the new school house to meeting. This was the first religious meeting held in the house. George Burns preached an excellent sermon, his remarks were practicable and liberal. Met with several old acquaintances. After meeting, Betty Hickman and her daughter Molly Burns were very solicitous for us to go with them to dinner - excused ourselves and promised to visit them at some other time. George Burns went with us to dinner at my brothers.

After dinner George Burns started for his appointment to preach at night at Shibleys Point and my brother George and I went later for the same meeting. Arrived at the meeting met Josephus Burns and his wife. At the earnest entreaty of George Burns I spoke to the people from the Sermon on the Mount. Stayed over night with George Burns at H. Hendrix. My brother George returned home after meeting.

Nov. 15. Cloudy and cold. Josephus Burns insisted upon my going home with him some 15 miles distant five miles beyond Green Castle in Sullivan County promising to go with me to John Michalls and to bring me back whenever I got ready to come. Concluded to go with him. We started about 10 AM. Stopped at George Shibleys and took dinner, on starting on Melissa furnished me with a quilt to wrap up with and which I hardly thought I would need but when we got on the open prairie I found it of great service. Arrived at night and found all well at their house.

Nov. 16. Cold with piercing wind. Think I had not felt such piercing wind for the twenty years. I stayed in doors. My niece gave me from memory the following memorandum of her own and her fathers families. F. Josephus Burns and Lucretia Jane Boyd were married about 1855 or 6, had two children William Pierce and Lucretia Jane - son died in March 1879. Janie, as she is familiarly called, married Joseph Alfred White in Aug 1875 and they have three daughters. They live at Shibley Point - owns and runs the grist mill. Lucretia died about Feb 1858. Josephus married her sister Mary E. Boyd Sept 1860. They have five children. Cyrena Alice was born Oct 1861 married Abram Collins, March 4, 1880. Live with Josephus and Mary. George Samuel will be 17 years old the 25th Feb next. Emma Viola was 12 years old last May. Paris (?) Elmer was nine years old in April last and Anna Florence age six years last April. Samuel Middleton Boyd died November 30, 1877. His wife died Oct 23 previous. Middleton, after death of his wife took a decline and failed very fast - could not, some of the time be kept warm in bed. Thomas Boyd married Katherine Braneman and they have five

children and live in California, Dixon, Solona County. Margaret Edna married Jesse Whitworth, they have four children - oldest a son about 19 years old. Their second is a daughter about 17 years old, the other two are young girls. They have a very good home on Goshen ridge 1 mile east of Martins Store, Putnam Co., Mo. William Hamilton married Milly Bland, they lived on Blackbird and he was doing quite well, had a waggon and good team when he fell a victim of the charms of a wiley school marn and left a fond and worthy wife and three children, much to the mortification of his relatives and friends and to his own ruin. Ann Eliza married Sterling Mills, died Jan. 9, 1878. Left five children, three sons and two daughters. Mills is said to be doing quite well, is keeping house with part of his children, the others are with his mother. Emely Minerva married Newton Hatfield they have five children - 4 sons one daughter. Martha married Hiram Hatfield, they have four children. Benjamin married Mary Bish have one child, a son James married Margaret Bish. He died in 1879, left one daughter. David married Rebecca Bish have one child, a son.

Nov. 17 - 19. (Tells of Josephus farm and leaving and returning to brother Georges). Went over to James Burns to redeem my promise of a visit to Betsy Hickland and her daughter Molly. Betsy reminded me of her venerable old mother in her manners and conversation.

Nov. 20. Cold. Took memorandum of Georges family. George S. Shibley born Sept 15, 1824. Melissa Onstot born Feb 7, 1829, married Nov 13, 1845 in Falls County. Children - James William born Aug 23, 1846, in the time of the late war, joined the Federal Army and was killed by a Southern scout in Washington Co., Ark. on April 7, 1864. John Harvey born Mar 19, 1848 married Margaret Maddox Oct 8, 1869, have had five children. Two sons living - Earnest, age 4 and Lemuel, age one. They live in Miller, Mendacino County, California. Sarah F. born Feb 17, 1850 and died Dec 16, 1850. Anna Mariah born Oct 31, 1851 married Harrison Hendrix in 1871, has had three children, one son died, two daughters living - Ida, age five, Jessie F. age 3 years. Henry Jerome born Nov 28, 1853, died June 1859. Cyrena born Sept 12, 1855. Married John Ford in 1875, have had three sons - one dead - two lived. Melburn, age five ye ars, baby without name age nine months. Mary Edna born Aug 1861, married John Roding Oct 7, 1880. George Albort born Feb 23, 1858. Jacob Dudley born Sept 16, 1864. Lemuel Pleasant born Jan 21, 1867.

Nov. 22. Bro John and I went to old man Thomas Saunders I stayed all night.

Nov. 23. Returned to Johns, in the evening he took me over to Jephtha Siboles. Ice 6 to 7 inches thick.

Frederick W. Bremerman b. 27 May 1814 in Baltimore, Md., d. 20 Nov 1890 at Indianapolis, Ind., aged 76 yrs. 5 mos. 25 days. Buried in Frederick (Md. ?). On 11 Feb 1834 he m. Malinda Trout who was b. 6 Jan 1816. Married by Rev. David F. Shaffer. Malinda d. 5 Sept 1894 at Georgetown, D.C., aged 78 yrs. 7 mos. 29 days.

Our first son b. 2 Feb 1835, d. 7 Feb 1835 aged 5 days.

John Lewis Bremerman our second son b. 30 June 1836, d. 26 July 1914 at Philadelphia, Pa. aged 78 yrs. 26 days. On 25 Dec 1883 he m. Sarah A. McGee who was b. 9 Jan 1852.

Jacob Harmon Bremerman b. 8 Mar 1838, d. 6 Sept 1906 aged 68 yrs 5 mos. 28 days. On 8 Dec 1870 he m. Martha A. Hackney.

Anne Eliza Bremerman b. 17 Mar 1840, d. 7 Jan 1916. On 11 July 1866 she m. Charles T. Peck who d. 29 Aug 1883.

William Frederick Bremerman b. 26 Jan 1842, d. from being thrown from a horse 17 June 1856 aged 14 yrs. 4 mos. 21 days.

Charles Edwin Bremerman b. 20 Aug 1843, d. 27 July 1921. On 28 Nov 1876 he m. Sidney J. Tribey. On 13 May 1891 he m. Mrs. Mary Bourke.

Charlette Amelia Bremerman b. 19 April 1845, d. 7 Aug 1922. On 28 Dec 1869 she m. Rev. J. E. Darby who d. 21 Nov 1922.

Thomas Henry Bremerman b. 12 July 1847. (No death record given). On 23 Feb 1869 he m. Carrie Reaver.

Laban Trout Bremerman b. 25 Oct 1849 in Baltimore. Dr. Laban T. Bremerman d. 31 Mar 1922. On 3 Oct 1872 he m. Helen Katie Rhinehart.

James Howard Bremerman b. 4 Nov 1851, d. 31 Dec 1918. On 14 Sept 1895 he m. Lillie A. Bangs.

Otis Emory Bremerman b. 26 Feb 1854, d. 21 June 1854, aged 3 mos. 26 days.

Malinda Sabina Bremerman b. 24 May 1855, d. 11 Nov 1861, aged 6 yrs. 5 mos. 18 days.

Elisha Wilson Bremerman b. 23 Dec 1858, d. 8 Mar 1859, aged 2 mos. 13 days.

Lewis Trask Bremerman, son of John Lewis and Sarah Bremerman, b. at Indianapolis, Indiana 21 Aug 1893.

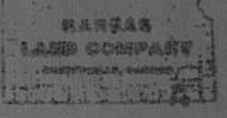

SEVENTY-ONE YEARS AGO

By Tack Norfleet , 1960
Coffeyville, Kansas

Early in April 1889 a covered wagon train originated in Mound Valley, Kansas and started for the first opening of Oklahoma for settlement by the white man. Oklahoma was a small territory about the size of six counties and completely surrounded by Indian Territory.

Those in the wagon train consisted of Bob Harbison and Ivy Prescott, the Evans family, Amos Hogelin family, Jim Harper family, and Levi Wilmoth, Marvin Mayginnis, and Del Smith, M. Jane Norfleet family, Major Anderson, and Kesslers, Miss Jennie Jacobs and Miss Ellis, two young men from Edna or near there, Frank and Jim Hulen with trail wagons hauling the grocery stock of Jim Ice and Mat King.

They went by Coffeyville and left there on the old Whiskey trail going southwest near Jake Bartle's store and mill and three or four residences all made of unplanned lumber, then on southwest by Osage agency, Gray Horse, the sub-agency, and crossing the Arkansas River near Hominy Post, then to Pawnee agency and down the east side of Oklahoma in the Iowa and Otoe reservation, two blanket tribes who wore body coverings mostly for protection. A large bunch of them came into Guthrie every day.

Oklahoma was guarded by U. S. Soldiers to keep the Sooners out and they directed the growing crowd of city lot claimers to a spot due east of Guthrie and held them there until noon, April 22, when the cannon was fired which started the race for land or lots in the city.

My mother, M. Jane Norfleet, a widow, got a lot facing the south on about the highest point on Cleveland Avenue in East Guthrie. My brother, Ivy Norfleet, got a lot on Cleveland Avenue on Capitol Hill facing the Capitol Square. Ice and King located on Cleveland Avenue and Division Street. Other Mound Valley people located on Noble Street and some took claims from six to ten miles east of Guthrie.

The population of Guthrie before the opening consisted of a railroad agent and a maintenance crew including John and George Christy and their sisters, Bell and Lotta, formerly of Mound Valley, and about four other men, one of whom was Jim Burris who later married Lotta. The population the next day after the opening was estimated at ten thousand, mostly men.

My mother was one of the few women, and when a man in a wagon, without a loud speaker, drove over the city announcing a meeting to organize a Baptist church, my mother was the only woman who attended with about a dozen men. The meeting was held on Noble Street on an old flatboat that had been drug up there.

Guthrie was quite a city without any law and when trouble started someone would go a half-mile for the soldiers. My brother, Ivy, got a job sprinkling streets and my other brother, Dott, and I took turns driving one sprinkler, and when a riot started we had like a reserved seat.

A few other Mound Valley people went on the train so that was about the part Mound Valley had in the first opening of Oklahoma to the white man.

The Dillon Family in America
Compiled from authentic and traditional records of the family,
by Charles B. Davis, High Point, N.C. 1909.

Luke Dillon, a native of Kilkenny, Ireland, and a weaver by trade, won the affections of Susannah Garrett, daughter of a man of wealth and fame in Ireland, and married him against her father's wishes. This act so angered Mr. Garrett, who looked upon young Dillon only as a common laborer and much inferior to his daughter, that he disowned and disinherited her. About the year 1710 young Dillon and his wife emigrated to America, settling somewhere in Pennsylvania, where he, together with his wife who had also learned to weave, supported themselves by their calling.

Tradition informs us that about seven years after the emigration Luke went to a mill on horseback, five miles from his home and started on his return late in the evening facing a severe snow-storm, and as the custom was in that day he carried a bottle of whiskey in his pocket believing, as many before him had done, that by partaking freely thereof he could keep himself warm. It is supposed that in his efforts to ward off the increasing cold he drank too much and becoming intoxicated alighted from his horse and sat down by a tree where he fell asleep, from which sleep he never again awoke. There by the side of the tree he was found six weeks afterward. His horse, when freed of its rider, found its way home on the night of the storm.

The parents or ancestors of Luke Dillon are unknown to the writer. Three children were born to him before his death and a fourth one a short while thereafter. The following is a record of his family:

CHILDREN OF LUKE DILLON

1. Hannah Dillon, (died young)
2. Daniel Dillon, born about 1713; died 11 mo. 12, 1805
3. William Dillon born about 1715; d. Oct./Nov. 1762
4. Luke Dillon, born about 1717

The last named son is supposed to have been killed for a fine gun he carried.

After the death of Luke Dillon, Sr., his widow, Susannah, married a man named Bridge and moved near to Philadelphia where more children were born to her and it is said that she became quite wealthy.

The two boys, Daniel and William, doubtless joined the great tidal wave of Quaker migration which started from Pennsylvania to the Opeckon or Hopewell neighborhood in Frederick County, Virginia in 1732. Here they both settled and were married and it was here that William Dillon doubtless spent the remainder of his life. Tradition informs us that there is a little creek in Frederick County which yet bears the name of Dillon's

Run. No doubt but what it runs through the lands once owned by the Dillon boys and it was here on the banks of this babbling little brook that one of the early Friends' churches was built which is today known in their history as Dillon's Run.

It was here that the Dillon boys first met the Haworth, Rees, Wright, Stanfield, Hockett, Thornburgh, Hodgson and Fisher families who were in the Quaker migration from Pennsylvania. After a short stay in Frederick County County the wave of emigration again started for Cane Creek in Alamance County, North Carolina and Bush River in South Carolina. It seems that the families above mentioned including many others with that of Daniel Dillon were borne on by this wave of emigration, some of them stopping at Cane Creek and others passing on to Bush River. Daniel Dillon settled at Cane Creek and later moved to New Garden in Guilford County, N.C.
