MEMORANDUM OF HENRY SHIBLEY, VANBUREN, ARKANSAS

(Continued from Vol. IV No. 1)

Obituary. Died at his residence in Ralls County, Missouri, on the evening of March 10th 1892, Singleton W. Boyd, age 71 years, 10 months, 16 days, was born in Westmoreland County, Maryland on the 26th day of April 1810. Moved with his father in 1818 and settled near Frankford, Franklin County, Kentucky.

He moved from Kentucky in 1828 and settled in Ralls County on what is now known as the Widow Smith farm.

He united with the M.E. Church in the year 1830. He was a soldier in the Black Hawk war in 1832. He held a commission in the old state militia for 19 years.

He married August 9th 1836 to Nancy Ellis. He organized the first Sunday School ever held in Ralls County at what is now known as the Eads School House.

While in Kentucky, and a very young man, he belonged to the Ky. State Guards and was one of the guards at the execution of Beauchamp for the murder of Col. Sharp. (It was Beachum, not Beauchamp, executed).

During the Black Hawk war he was at Rock Island while the Indian Chief, Black Hawk, was a prisoner at that point. He took an active part in raising volunteers for the war with Mexico.

He was always obedient to the legally constituted authorities and his influence was always on the side of peace and good order. His death has created a void which will be hard to fill. Thus one by one the old landmarks of our county are passing away. Very few of these who were citizens of the county when Mr. Boyd came to it are left to tell the tale of early hardships and privations. May the clouds of the valley rest lightly over his remains. He was kind and affectionate in all the relations of life and a zealous faithful Christian.

1883, April 12th. My beloved wife departed this life at 2:20 A.M.

13th. Funeral services at my sons and burial at Oak Grove burial grounds in a place of her own selection.

May 2nd, 1887. Speaks of neglecting diary and of another trip to Missouri. Started 26th of last Sept. and returned 24 Nov. 1886.

Memorandum. While at my Aunt Anne Mariah Gullocks she gave me the family record of my grandfathers, David Parkes, prepared by Uncle Lemuel Woodworth Parkes long years ago, which I will now record before writing up my memoranda.

David Parkes was born 28th of June 1766. Sarah Woodworth was born 22 Feb 1771 and they were married the 8th of March 1788. Sarah Parkes died Feb 11, 1841. David Parkes died April 26, 1845.

Philander Parkes was born Jan. 10th 1789, was married Oct. 28th, 1810, died Dec. 1857.

I recollect him as a peer man with a considerable

family, his oldest a daughter grown. Uncle was given to drink and when drinking was very noisey hollowing along the road. This was about 1828.

Martin Parkes was borned 17th Feb. 1791, married Sept. 12th 1813, died May 27th 1851. His wife's name was Dolly Campbell, a small woman. He was a spare man, slim and appeared frail phisically, he was a man of consederable thought, given to unbelief accounted for animal life by spontaneous generation. He was a Darwinian before Darwin. He was strickly moral and temperate and hard run for things of this world to some extent at least.

Eydia Parke was borned Sept. 9th 1795, was married to Harry Shelps Dec. 9th 1811. They were both rather large and inclined to be fleshy. She died July 19, 1837. Raised a large family of intresting children. Shelp was a farmer in good circumstances.

Elizabeth Parke was born 19th of May 1797, married Dec. 25 1814, died Feb. 1st 1870. She was my mother and a better woman never lived or died.

David Parkes Jr. was born Dec. 20th 1799, married June 9th 1822, died June 9th 1824. I have no recollection of ever having seen him, have frequently heard him spoken of as a man of extraordinary beauty, a very handsome man, I saw his widow once.

Sarah Parkes was born Nov. 20th 1801, married Nov. 28, 1822 to a man by the name of Prine (Perrine) lived in the western part of York State. I think I saw them once, know nothing of the family. She died Oct. 30th 1874.

Lemuel Woodworth Parkes was born the 6th Dec. 1806, Married April 13, 1829, died May 9th 1882. He was a small man a thoughtful, shrewd business man, engaged mostly in selling lottery tickets and Pawn brokerage, and made a bushel of money. One of his sons bought a farm some twenty miles from the city of New York, had a fine residence, kept a carriage to receive fashionable friends from the city, coming by boat to within about one and a half of his place, where he entertained them in good stile, but after a while his money was goen, his nice place sold. He then went to the City and worked for a salery. My uncle was a pleasant man and a good writer, I corresponded with him for a long time. His wife was a plain kind sort of a woman.

Anne Mariah Parkes, Sept. 26, 1808, married May 8th 1824.

Smith A. Parke was born Dec. 8th 1814, March 19th 1841, I have not got the date of his death.

James Parkes was born June 8th 1793, died Apr 13, 1797. He lacked from April 18th to June 8th of being four years old. I have heard my grandmother speak of him.

I have many recollections of these relatives that is very precious to me, but perhaps I have writen as much as will be profitable.

I have writen my Uncle Henry Shibley, Rural Grove, NY

Henry Shibley Genealogy

Dear Nephew

April 10 1887

We received your letter of the 13th of January and were much pleased to hear from you, hoping that these few lines may find you and yours enjoying good health and prosperity.

Henry Shibley, your grandfather was born January 12th 1762 died April 3, 1853 aged 91 yrs 51 days, was married to Elizabeth Shonts June 5, 1788 and Elizabeth Shonts was born Oct. 18th 1767, died Oct 11, 1847 after four score, lacking 7 days.

And now for the genealogy of the Shibleys. Henry was born of John Shibley a native of Switzerland, who came to America quite a long time before the Revolutionary War and took an Irish girl for his wife and had two sons by her. When these sons were grown they settled in the lower part of Pennsylvania. After these sons were born he returned to his native Switzerland and was gone eighteen or twenty months.

In a few weeks after his return his wife had a daughter born and because of this unfaithfulness he lived with her no more. Then he married a woman by the name of Anne Wagman by whom he had four sons and five daughters, now these are their names - Christiania, John, Susania, Margaret, Henry, Anna, David, Jacob and Lizzie.

And now to return to my Father and Mother Henry Shibley and Elizabeth, my mother was the daughter of Jeremiah Shonts (whose father and mother came from Holland) the first born of twelve children, whose mother was a redheaded Yankee woman and her maiden name was Louise Adams.

My father and mother were married, as stated above and lived together three score years, nearly.

They had seven sons and two daughters as follows -

John Shibley was born April 9, 1789 and married to Sarah Roberts June 27, 1822 and died by accidental drowning in the Tunkhanock Creek, May 15, 1841.

Jeremiah, born May 8th, 1791, died at three years of age.

Jacob Shibley born July 12th 1793 and married to Elizabeth Parkes Dec. 25th 1819 (or 14) died Oct. 12th 1872.

George K(ork) was borned March 18, 1795, died May 31st 1870, never married.

Mahala Shibley born June 8, 1797, died August 27, 1879, never married.

David Shibley, borned September 4th 1799, married to Clarissa McKinstrey Feb 14 (or 19th) 1821, died April 23rd 1872 and his wife Clarissa died Feb 13 1855 and a few years after his first wifes deth, he married a widow lady who is still living aged 86.

Cyrena Shibley was born March 27th 1803, was never married.

Henry Shibley was born Jan. 30th 1805, married Jane Frank Nov. 14th 1832 and she died Nov. 26 1847, and March 15, 1850 he married Caroline Thorp, and she died May 3rd 1878.

Samuel P(otter) Shibley was born Dec. 5th 1806, married Mary Seeley Sept. 18th 1833. This finishes the Pedigree.

I have not got the dates of your father and mother, will you in your next give the dates of their deaths.

The Shibley family resided in Schodac Rensselaer Co, NY and father moved from there about the year 1792, on the farm we now occupy of 230 acres on which there was a log cabin covered with bark and four acres of land cleared, built a new house 5 or 6 years afterwards and we occupy the same with remodeling and additions.

Dated April 20th 1887

1886 (Tells of another trip to Shibleys Point Mo, back 1886)

Oct. 12 John, his wife and I started for Iowa at 4:20 am by the way of Ottumwa to Des Moines, arrived at Des Moines at about 11:30 it is a splendid City of about 40,000 inhabitants and is the capital of Iowa. We met with W.K. Lucas whose wife is a sister of Phil Shoops, they were before marriage Shonts and women of more than ordinary good sense and housekeepers, given to hospitality.

After breakfast Parke Gulick came with his wagon and took us 3/4 of a mile to his mother's our Aunt Ann Mariah Gulick, she is 78 years old the 26th of last Sept and has been the mother of 7 children - Lonette was born 1825, married Peter Schuy (Schrey?) in 1845. They raised two sons in West Side (Ia). Henry Shelp Gulick born Jan. 6 1829, married July 4th 1849 lives in Denison Ia, cap of Crawford Co. Have 3 daughters and one son, their youngest daughter is an extraordinary singer. Sarah Jane born 1832, married Richard Waganer 1852, have two sons and three daughters, live at West Side. Syntha Ann born 1838, married Charles Jones April 1862 have no children, live at West Side. Emma was born 1839, married 1865 to Geo L. Harris. Had three children. She died in 1883. Lived at West Side.

William O Gulick born 1844 died in the Army from wounds Aug 27, 1863, Brownsville Ark.

S P Gulick born 1845, married Aug 1886, lives with his mother. Thus ends the genealogy of my aunts.

After dinner I visited with William N Becker an old school mate, when we were boys. We went to school together at the old school house in Montgomery Co NY. He married a cousin of mine Cynthia Ann Parks daughter of Martin Parks. We were special friends when boys, this reunion was a great pleasure.

1886. Oct 17th. Sunday, Fair, spent the day with at W N Beckers his son Wilber wife and family were there.

Oct. 27. Returned to Missouri.

Nov. 29. Returned to Arkansas.

Dec. 1st. I am 71 years old.

November 23, 1891, returning from a trip to visit Smith.

At eleven took the train, behind time, for home and arrived at Frisco passenger depot about one thirty. The Valley Train from Kansas City was standing on their track, my brother George came to our car and said he had just been on the other cars and found our sister Cyrena and her daughter just arrived from Oregon. Then while we walked the valley train ran down to their depot where we met my sister and her daughter Minta, William and his family, Baxter and his family, Dr. Shibley and wife and my brothers wife Malissa, my sister and daughter I had () seen for eleven years. So we had a time of general rejoicing.

Nov. 28th. Sister Malissa started home expecting to stop at Carthage Mo. and visit her sister and friends for a few weeks when my brother would meet her there and then go on home. She started at 2 PM and at 2 AM Smith arrived to make tree delivery and owing to hard times was not very successful.

Dec. 1st 1891. My 76th birthday.

Last entry November 30, 1895.

Several pages maxims and definitions.

Notation on back of second sheet -

My uncle Henry Shibley died Oct. 5th 1895, was buried on the 7th.

Uncle Samuel P. Shibley died Sept. 24, buried 25th (1895)

NOTE ON HAVANA, KS, CEMETERY.

In the August, 1968, November, 1968, February, 1969 and May 1969 of the DESCENDER we published a REGISTER OF FUNERALS of Havana, Ks. These were taken from the record of Lewis H. Vore, a carpenter who changed his trade to making coffins. This was not a complete list of the Havana Cemetery. It was a list of Funerals for which he had made the coffins.

There may be some duplications of names. The following is the Havana, Ks Cemetery list:

HAVANA, KS., CEMETERY

In 1871 Emanuel Trotter donated two acres north of the present schoolhouse for a Cemetery and gave a Chapel, therein, on the front of which he had inscribed "Christian Union Privilege Church". He and his wife are buried in the shade of a large cedar tree northwest of the Church.

The Havana Cemetery is located at Havana, Caney Township, Montgomery County, Kansas.

Dr. James Augustus Hahn was born May 4, 1804. His father, Dr. John Hahn, was not only a physician of ability, but served two terms in the Federal Congress at Washington. He and his wife, Margaret, died early leaving three children, two daughters and one son, who were consigned to the care of their maternal grandfather, Henry Swayer, and two uncles by marriage, Fredric Graffe and Trevor, gentlemen of responsibility and residents of Philadelphia. By them, James, the second child, when duly educated, was placed under the instruction of Dr. William Gibson, who was Professor of Surgery in the old Medical College in Philadelphia, the University of Pennsylvania. He graduated in the year 1824 with credit to himself and to the satisfaction of his friends and Preceptors. Before his majority he married "Maria", the second daughter of Joseph Netterburgh, a gentleman of rank and a native of Switzerland. In 1825 with his wife and infant son Henry, he left Philadelphia and established himself at Millerstown, Leigh County, Pennsylvania, nine miles south of Allentown. He remained there for about three years, then left for Bath, a village seventy-two miles from Philadelphia. He did not stay long at this place, but emigrated to Fayette, Seneca County, NY. After changing his place of residence several times he went to Canoga in the year 1833, about 1838 to Bearytown and in the early spring of 1840 to Waterloo, subsequently to Marshall, Mich. and from there to Chicago where he died. The following obituary notice is copied from a Chicago paper.

"Dr. James A. Hahn, a physician of repute and the President of the Board of Health, died yesterday evening (Oct. 25, 1875) at his residence, 430 Michigan Avenue. About a week ago, the doctor contracted a severe cold which grew rapidly worse, finally settling into pneumonia. All the medical skill available had been in constant attendance, but was not able to alleviate his suffering or stay the ravages of Death. He rapidly sank from the moment he was obliged to seek his bed until his decease. Dr. Hahn came to Chicago in 1854 and has been a constant resident since. He has occupied quite a prominent sphere as a politician as well as a Physician. In 1868 he was elected Alderman for the third ward and ably and honestly represented his constituents in the council for three terms. He was city physician under Mayors Sherman and Rice and by Mayor Colvin was appointed a member of the Board of Health. That body chose him to preside over its deliberations. Dr. Hahn was born in Berks County, Pennsylvania in 1804. He studied medicine and graduated from Jefferson Medical College in 1824. He was soon after made the resident physician of Blockly Hospital in Philadelphia. Professionally he ranked among the highest and socially was esteemed by all. At the time

of his death he was in his seventy-first year."

Fredrick Graffe married Mrs. Margaret Hahn's sister. He was the Constructor and Chief Engineer of the "Schuykill Fairmont Water Works" at Philadelphia, perhaps the originator, but of this I am not certain. I have understood that a bust with inscription commemorative of this fact is placed in the building or grounds at Fairmont. Another sister married Trevor, a wholesale Dry Goods merchant of Philadelphia. You must remember that I was too young to know myself of these things; I only repeat what was told me later in life. I was about nine years old when I attended the christening of Henry S. Hahn at his Grandfather Swayer's; they lived on the west side of seventh street one door north of Arch, no member of the Doctor's family being present except his sister Rebecca, the old folks and myself.

Judith, the elder sister was placed in the care of her Aunt. I presume the father's sister who resided at Wolmsdorf, Pennsylvania. She remained with her until her marriage with Isaac Eckert of Reading, Pennsylvania. The youngest stayed with her Grandfather Swayer until her marriage with Dr. John Hester, son of ex-governor Hester of Pennsylvania. She, like her mother, died young but left no children. In person she was fair with light hair, frail in appearance, a different type from her sister, Mrs. Eckert, who resembled her brother, Dr. Hahn. After the christening I had (communication) with Grandfather Swayer's family on several occasions. Through his means I made several visits to Millerstown and found the old couple always genial, pleasant and accomodation. When Henry was ten years old he accompanied his parents on a visit to relatives at Reading, and Philadelphia. Dr. Eddy took charge of Dr. Hahn's practise while he was absent, Grandmother and I having charge of the house. On the 4th of September following I was married and left for Waterloo, NY.

When the Dutch came over in the year _____ there was among them a son of a family of high rank, known in the old country as the Barons of Barronsbar. John Burger was our great, great, grandfather. He had three daughters, Jane, Hannah, and Betsy, and as each grew to womanhood and married, he being wealthy, dowered them handsomely, with lands, houses and everything that was customary in those days for rich men's daughters to receive. Jane, the oldest, and our great grandmother, married a Swede from Denmark, by the name of Johnson, by whom she had three children, Hannah, Eleanor and John, named evidently for his Grandfather Burger. At the breaking out of the Revolutionary War, Mrs. Johnson was living with her three children in the house and on the property her father had given her. Hannah, the oldest, was about fifteen, Eleanor twelve, and John ten years of age. I infer that her father who was an Alderman

of New York City, and her husband were dead, as I never heard them mentioned as living during that period. A rumor that the British were coming to take possession of New York, caused a panic among the inhabitants, and those who could fled in every direction. With the assistance of her servants and children, Mrs. Johnson packed up their silverware and valuables, and digging holes secreted them wherever she thought was a place of safety. Then sewing her jewels and money in the skirts of her dresses, with changes of clothing in pails and baskets, fled to the "Highlands" to seek her sister Betsy, who with six children had preceded her. After weary days of travel, sleeping on logs and stumps of trees, subsisting on berries and such things as they could gather, getting bread and milk from the small farmers, tired and footsore they reached a deserted house where her sister had taken refuge with her children. The dwelling was a large unfinished building, standing on the main highway. The family were all sick with the ague, then the common disease of the country. Assisting her sister as best she could, she remained here some little time without any especial disturbance, until one bright morning they were startled by the sound of approaching cavalry, which proved to be the advance guard of the British army. At the word "Halt" the troops came to a stand. An officer with two orderlies was seen to descend, and approaching the house they demanded admittance. Great Grandmother stood in the center of the room with her children at her side. When he saw her he involuntarily stopped with a motion as though to lift his hat, then demanded to know who were the inmates of the dwelling. She replied by saying, "I am lately from below, called here by the sickness of my sister's children." Then laying her hand on her son and drawing him toward her said, "This is the only man in the house and, for aught I know, the only one for miles around, but look for yourself and search if you deem it necessary." Then pointing to the next room where the sick lay. The officer entered and looked with compassion at the sufferers; as he withdrew to the outer room and saw the desolation everywhere apparent, he said, "You will have little to fear from the cupidity of the Camp followers. I will place a guard at the door to protect you as far as I can." With another involuntary movement as though to salute, he joined his troops and with the word "Forward" rode away. Before the house in the front yard was a well with a large sweep and a bucket attached. When the main army came up they demanded water. Pails, pitchers and dippers were brought forward and the three children drew water for the soldiers who drank and filled their canteens, until they were completely exhausted. As the army advanced the guard was withdrawn; the camp followers seeing nothing to tempt, did not molest, but contented

themselves with taunts and jeers, boasting of the booty they expected to get in New York. History will give you an account of the taking of the city by the British, the length of time they held it, and of what damage was done in the burning of buildings and destroying of property. That possessed by the Burger family, Great Grandmother's and all was swept away in the prevailing loss. Under the impression that the water in the wells was poisoned, the British soldiers cleaned them out, thus finding what had been placed in the bottom for safety. A strong box containing papers and other treasures belonging to the family was buried under a disused cider press, on land owned by "Uncle Jerry Davis" a relation who lived on or near "Stony Point". It was placed there as not likely to attract attention, but it did not escape discovery and shared the general fate. The British took Stony Point, but the Americans recaptured it guided by a Negro named "Pomp", born there and knowing every inch of the way. In consideration of this service his master, who was Uncle Jerry Davis, gave him his freedom. The soldiers who had passed Great Grandmother's door, retraced their steps, a dejected and sorry looking set, divested of all but their side arms. Again they asked for water and again it was drawn for them by Hannah, Eleanor and John. After this event, Great Grandmother and her children went higher up in the mountains, among a more populous neighborhood and wealthier farmers. They afforded aid by building a log cabin and helping her in various ways. In consideration of this she opened a school for the instruction of their children, furnishing the house with what was necessary and most of the clothing with money sewn up in her dress when she left New York. The simple household affairs were easily managed and assistance given in the school by Hannah, the eldest daughter. How long they remained in this neighborhood I do not know; there must have been a change for as Hannah advanced to young womanhood, her society was much courted. Although not a handsome girl she was possessed of much natural vivacity, great wit and a beautiful voice for singing. On one occasion she was invited by the ladies who gave an entertainment for General Washington and his officers to sing before them. The song was highly complimentary, the refrain being, "God bless our Congress and brave Washington". At a like festive occasion she became acquainted with a Mr. Dolbeer, the proprietor of an inn, then called Tavern, at a place called Knight's Bridge, or King's Bridge. With this marriage, the family went with Hannah to her new home; the husband did not live long, and his widow with her mother and sister, returned to New York. John, the brother, had been placed out some time before to learn a trade. What became of him afterward I never heard.

Eleanor too was now a young lady, who though not so gifted was equally attractive and possessed more beauty than Hannah. Her genial manners made her a favorite among her young companions and her society was much sought after. Although her mother belonged to the Church of England she became a Baptist, and it was at this period that she became acquainted with Joseph Netterburgh, a native of Switzerland. He was one of two sons; what rank his father held I do not know, but his mother was called "Lady Barbara". She died while her boys were still young, leaving property to be equally divided between them, John and Joseph. On the anniversary of her death, the bells were always tolled, the tenants on the estate assembled, gifts were received and bread given to the poor, the same as the "dole" once offered on the English estates.

The will required that the boys should be placed under the charge of thirteen executors, each executor serving one year. They were independent of their father but remained under his care. At the expiration of thirteen years, the boys, having attained their majority, assumed control of their property, and soon after on horseback, accompanied by their tutor and servants, set out to finish their education, as was customary with the sons of gentlemen in those days. They journeyed together for some time, then each having a choice as to the countries they should visit first, the brothers separated, never to meet again. On going from one port to another Joseph was shipwrecked and picked up again by an American vessel loaded with mahogany on her return trip to New York. Destitute of everything but the two garments he had on, he was cared for and his needs supplied by the Captain, but was obliged in various ways to repay the debt, by hard work until the passage ended. He found himself in a foreign city without money and without friends. His necessities compelled him to seek employment until he could hear from his friends as many months must elapse before aid could reach him from them. In this extremity he resolved to apprentice himself to a tailor as his only means of support, and in intervals of time although master of three languages, German, French, and Spanish, to overcome the difficulties of the English language. It is inferred that he received aid or in some way prospered for in 1790, he married Eleanor Johnson and shortly afterward left New York for Philadelphia. On the fourth of June, 1792, their first child was born and was named Eleanor, after her Mother. Grandfather Netterburgh was in religion, a Roman Catholic, his wife, a Baptist; they compromised the matter by agreeing that should more children be born they should alternately be christened by the Romish and Baptist Churches. Out of the

seven, there reached maturity, Henry, an only son, born October 14, 1797, and Marian the youngest, born August 18, 1805. Mrs. Dolbeer, whom we left in New York with her mother, married the second time, a man named Taylor, and I have every reason to believe that Moses Taylor, the merchant prince of New York who died a few years ago, was her son by this marriage. She had four children, two girls and two boys. Grandmother Johnson, after this event, came to Philadelphia and lived with her daughter Eleanor. Married and settled in a country that he was obliged to make his own by adoption, and soon surrounded by a growing family, it would have been difficult for Grandfather Netterburgh to retrace the long distance that separated him from his old home, however much he had wished to do so. A letter from his father, received when Henry was about seven years old, asking him to either come himself or send his son, with the power of attorney, if he had one old enough, saying, "I am growing old and wish to divide what is left between you and your brother John. Bonaparte has pillaged, burned and destroyed every thing; there is nothing left but the land." After receiving this letter, Grandfather made active preparations for departure. His absence from home would make it necessary that much be done before taking such a long journey. In pursuance of this object in settling his affairs, he, accompanied by a friend, left the city on a hot July day and is supposed to have been prostrated by a sunstroke, for on reaching an Inn, he was taken sick. It was too long before assistance came, too late, for the next morning he was dead. What followed or if any efforts were made afterward to recover any of the property, I do not know. Grandmother kept the family together and educated the children. Eleanor at the age of seventeen was married to Horatio Lawrence Melchoir and Maria, at nineteen to Dr. James Augustus Hahn. Henry Steinmetz, (so named for a friend, the only son was of a roving disposition. I know little of what befell him, only as Grandmother told, the last she heard from him he was on his way to France on the same vessel that carried La Fayette back after his last visit to America.
