The HISTORY OF CHATHAM COUNTY 1771-1971 arrived. It

mentions about five or six Brantleys on eight or ten pages. As you will remember, it is rather an expensive item and it would probably be enough for your purposes if I send you xerox copies of the pertinent pages. These, of course, are all descendants of the John and Hannah who moved from Isle of Wight County, Virginia to Orange County about 1735. However, John sold his land in Virginia to a James Brantley which makes one wonder about those other branches of the family.

You asked. Alas, our DAR Patriot, Joseph did not win his recognition in bloody battle. He only "supplied pork to the Continental Forces." Rather a comedown but I suppose that someone had to mind the store and feed the troops. He does seem to have been active in civilian affairs, Peace Commission, Road Commission, Justice of Peace, Etc. He was probably no longer young for he is mentioned as serving in

the Granville Militia in 1754.

I hope you are not expecting too much for my efforts in England. It was less than a flashing success. First, let it be said that the English, who are helpful and obliging to the last degree, are just not interested in that small group of eccentrics who left for the American Planetations in the seventeenth century. Even the Eager-to-serve British Tourist Agency admits that most lists of migrants and such have been published in the United States and are not available in England. The Civil Registry at Somerset House is practically perfect as far back as 1837 but back of that almost useless to any but the most efficient and determined researcher with endless time.

However, starting with the solid fact that Edward Brantly's will had been recorded in Virginia in 1679 and with a good deal of "sorta" information, I considered that I might have a challenging but not impossible task. We "knew" that the name had probably been Brandli, likely a Norman who arrived with William the Conqueror, and that the family left from the Parish of St. James Clerkenwell. "Left" is the operative word. There was not a single Brantly in the Greater London Telephone directory and only one in

Edinburgh.

As recommended by British Tourist, I started with the Library of the Royal Genealogical Society. Royal, in the sense that it is large, old and well sponsored (like Yardley's Scap and Guinness Ale) not that it deals only in royal genealogies. It is very far out (geographically)—three dollar cab ride which is practically forever in London—and the open hours were stranger than those of a New Zealand Pub. I never did make contact except over the phone when a weary voice told me, "Mail in thirty dollars and we will see what we can do."

Thirty dollars seemed largish for such a weakly given

offer and I thought I should give it a bit of a try myself-beginning like with the British Museum. "I wish you luck," said a gloomy American PhD who was researching there. "Any-

thing they can't find, up to and including 1965 journals, they report, 'It was lost in the bombing.'"

I thought, "Poor dear. He just deesn't understand the system." Alas, he spoke but the simple truth. It was neither his paranois or mine. At least, I heard the same from three reference librarians in local libraries. I had no trouble getting a pass to the famous reading room where Lenin formulated the Communist party but it did me no more good than if the catalogue had been in Sanscrit-which indeed it may be for all I know. As I stood obstructing the traffic and trying to remember something in my training that would be useful, a very young librarian said, "Luv, here you learn patience or you learn to climb the wall. Still and all, I think you would do better at Kensington. is more genealogy, you know. Now just you run along."

Which I did after a respectful tour of the superb middle east collections and a snack in the tearoom which is probably what made Lenin write off the whole capitalistic

system. Even by English standards it is bad.

Kensington Library, in a small extension of the delightful Kensington Gardens, is rather modern. It even had an elevator. At Westminister Public they had taken pity on my hurting feet and sent me to the third floor in a dumb waiter full of books. Modern or not, there was nothing in Kensington's meager indices of any Brantleys. Even allowing they were humble folk -- it has always been my opinion that people who were really comfortable in England did not. leave -- I was truly feeling very put upon -- and probably looked it.

It pains a good librarian to say a flat, "I can't find it. This one, with a bit of masterly evasion said, "Why don't you go out for a bit of a look at the church." Talk to the curate and the schoolmaster. They might know something."

I agreed that it might be worthwhile and abandoned my faith in libraries. Much against my better judgement, I was about to undertake a bit of basic research that would

certainly lead to nothing.

It was no problem to make an appointment. The rector's wife assured me that the curate would be having a noon service and would be delighted to see me and show me around. The school master sounded charming and both of my contacts gave me enough directions about public transportation to have landed me in Liverpool if I had followed it. The greatest friend of any traveling female is the local cab driver. The new Lucipi constitution and agent the best

I had not entirely wasted all those library visits. I knew that the site had originally been named Clerks Well because the ancient Company of Parish Clerks met there annually to perform miracle and mystery plays. It is mentioned by Stow in 1063 as being, "Not far from the west end of Clerkenwell Church but close without the walls that inclose it." The village that grew up around the well had been very small even at the time of Elizabeth I but after the plague of 1666 and the fire of 1667 more and more people were forced to find places outside the city wall—and Clerkenwell became for the first time residential. Perhaps because of its origin, it seems to have ever had a high proportion of entertainment establishments and the great Sadler's Wells theater was built around a nearby well. But by, the time of the great plague the Brantleys were gone.

Clerkenwell is now a shabby jumbled section of greater London w ith a considerable colored population. At the intersection of Farrington (an extension of King's Cross Road) and Clerkenwell a huge water trough still stands. Until very recently, cattle were unloaded at King's Cross Station and driven to nearby Smithfield Market for slaughter. Smithfield is to meat what Covent Carden is to vegetables and Billingsgate is to fish. These are the ancient markets that feed London and long before treins came, the herds were driven down the Great North Road. One wonders if Smithfield hams in America were cured by a process learned in the old market. Since the Green and the church (and the water trough) are about a mile and a quarter from the Tower of London and less than half a mile from the old City Wall, and since the Tower was built and staffed by Normans, it is a pleasant speculation that perhaps, after all, the Brantlys were among the Buffeteers (which the English changed to Beefeaters as in gin) who guarded the Castle.

The Green, final reminder of that ancient village, was a dreary triangle of under-privileged grass shaded by stunted city trees. When I arrived at noon it was pleasantly filled with locals from nearby small businesses scaking up the pale sun. On the site of the great Wunnery of St. Mary (founded 1100), the high wall still incloses St. James Clerkenwell. It was rebuilt about 1700 and looks a little like Bruton Parish Church of Williamsberg except for the surroundings and a sort of functional antiquity that just seems old-fashioned. It had recently been re-painted inside. Some of the old mosaics had been uncovered and the general effect was pleasant and airy.

A service (for half dozen souls) was in progress and as I waited for it to close I had great hopes that the curate might have something to offer. Alas, the rector's wife had over estimated her man. Though I was obviously waiting and waiting, he gave no sign that I was visible.

In justice I will say that he was taken up with a visiting clergyman with whom he was discussing the fine points of distinguishing old stained glass. Though the stained glass of St. James bore no resemblance to that of Westminister, it was his own and he was proud of it. Since the Brantleys had left before the church had been remodelled, it was not very reasonable to expect anything much so after an hour or so I tramped off in search of the Parachial School. Didn't expect much there either but the headmaster had sounded vastly cordial and I hoped that at least my feathers would be smoothed after the curate.

Now that was different. Clerkenwell Parchial School was founded in 1700 and in 1765 the children were moved to the "new" building which is attributed to a very famous architect, William C. Myline. I doubt if I saw any of the original structure since it appears to be wholely surrounded by a vast number of lean-tos and others being added; but what I did see reminded me equally of Oliver Twist and mill town boarding houses. I don't believe there are any resident students but many of the teachers are Anglican Sisters.

Pupils very varicolored.

Mr. Hamilton looked like the perfect image of a school master and his pipe never left his hand-even when he held a cup of tea in the other. His office was shabby and cold but the tea appeared at once. His interest was soon explained. He had no idea of who his grandfather was (or perhaps his father, for all I know) and he was completely awe-stricken that I had tracked mine so far in time and space. Looking back, I think he must have been an orphan or something. It is rare to find anyone so interested in ancestors unless they are immediate and personal. After I had contributed five pounds to some worthy cause of the school and we had drunk several cups of tea, I prepared to leave.

"But you must," said Mr. Hamilton, "see the well. It had been lost for centuries until they started to rebuild the library. Just go to the desk in the library and they will give you a key or send someone with you. It is just two mimutes just down to the bettem of the street."

This did not especially appeal. I have long since learned that the English "just two minutes," means two minutes to a four-minute man-which I am not. And it is usually further complicated by cobble stones and gravel. Still, the glow of Mr. Hamilton's interest followed me after our cordial good-by (and I must send him a Xmas present) and I decided I would take the two minutes to the foot of the road (or the bottom of the street) and see the Clerks Well, now in the St. John's Street Islington Library. Talk about Modern-this might have been modeled after the UN Building-all glass and chrome. I rather

timidly approached the reference desk and stated my business--with an apologetic explanation of my interest.

"Ah," said the librarian briskly (her desk plate said Mrs. E. V. Lewis), "Then you will want to see the Harloian Society publications. One moment, please."

She returned in a moment with three shabby volumes and

said, "This should do it."

I took them diffidently and said, "Would you have time for a drink with me later?"

"Sorry," was the reply. "Have an appointment with the dentist. Must leave at once."

1613 Feb 13--a child still born to William Brantley In case you are interested, the Harloian Society was registered in 1902 for the purpose of transcribing, printing and preserving manuscript material including parish records that are of genealogical or heraldic interest—named for Robert Harley, first Earl of Oxford (1661-1724) whose great manuscript collection is one of the proudest possessions of the British Ruseum. I never did see the sell because Ers. Lewis had taken the only key with her to the dentist-but I was cordially invited to return next day. I never did but St. John's St. Islington and Mrs. Lewis had restored my faith in my profession.

And that, dear, is the way it went. Perhaps someday I will find the link between Robert (what a busy man he was about 1602-4), Richarde and William and the Edward who was in Isle of Wight fifty years later. I was so elated that I took a double-decker bus, leaped off when I recognized the landmark of St. Clement Dane and walked back to the hotel

feeling that at last I had a toehold in London.

COLONY, SCHOOL DIST. #101 WOODY DELL, IST. #101 1878-1947 Township 34, Range 16 The name Woody Dell and Colony give some indication of the development of the area north of Coffeyville around Kalloch in the 1870's and 1880's. As the railroads were extended and population increased in the Kalloch District #2 those people west of the railroad petitioned for a new school to be built for their children. Accordingly the then County Superintendent, C. T. Beach, issued an order setting aside an area to be known as Woody Dell, #101 on June 25, 1878. It was 1881 before sessions were held here. On that date 81 pupils were enrolled in the school house built in the northeast corner of Section Early in that year a quarter section of land in Section 24 along the Eastern line of this new district was divided into 20 acre units and called the Votaw Colony. Here Mr. Daniel Votaw, a Quaker, brought a number of Negro families from Texas and settled them on his tracts. This accounts for the name of Colony which the district took and the large number of children in their school. The great flood of 1885 destroyed the cotton crop of

these people and ended the colony, though several of these people remained in the county and became respected citizens. At any rate by 1890 the enrollment was down to 41 and in

1900 to 316

The organization of the district took place in the home of Mr. Joseph Savage on August 15, 1878.

Though the enrollment, was small, Colony school maintained its idenity until the reorganization era of 1947, when it and several other districts were taken into the Clymore, District #15 effective March 1, 1947. That portion of the area west of the river was attached to the Cedar Bluff, District #61 but the building, grounds and contents went to Clymore. At a public sale held in December of that year all the assets were sold and the receipts given to District #15.
