MARIAN DALTON EPPERSON

9 March 1906 - 28 December 1974

The Montgomery County Genealogical Society pays tribute to the memory of Marian Dalton Epperson. Mrs. Epperson was a charter member of the organization and served as editor of the "Descender" until her death, with the exception of a few months. Her talent and ability will be greatly missed by the society as will her association by a multitude of friends.

Mrs. Epperson was born in St. George, Kansas, the daughter of W. B. and Ellen (Alsop) Dalton. Her father was a state senator and served as head of the wheat commission for many years.

Following her graduation from the St. George school system she attended Kansas State University at Manhattan where she was a member of Pi Beta Phi. She received her degree in 1928 and taught in Denison, Kansas, and at the Topeka Business College.

On 8 August 1932, she married W. C. Epperson and they are the parents of a daughter, Suc, now Mrs. Roger McCoy of Salt Lake City, Utah.

For 15 years she was head of the Montgomery County TB Association and has been active in Red Cross work in addition to service in genealogical fields. She was a member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church.

In addition to her husband and daughter, she is survived by two grandchildren, Michael and Leah; a brother, William A. Dalton, Topeka; and an aunt, Miss Winnie Dalton, Manhattan.

FROM THE LEDGER OF L. F. DICK The Trip from Indiana to Kansas 1868

September 7, 1868 - Made settlement with Wm Dick (father) up to date for house rent and other indebtedness. He being indebted to me for nine dollars and eighty-three cents.

September 19, 1868 - Came into Illinois about two o'clock p;m. Our entrance was into Clark County. We find it so far, a most wretched looking country. It is very broken, terribly hilly - no good land has been seen. Some pretty good oak timber - none other of any account. The surface of the ground is covered with sand from 18 inches to two feet deep; crops look very bad; hardly any wheat has been raised. The people as a general thing look hard and ragged - live in small huts; seem to be indolent. Their animals look likewise. We found a large majority of them are Seymour men, and, as we have found it all along in such neighborhoods, a great many notices of sale of lands for delinquent taxes. Rained from 11 a. m. until 9 p.m. Slept in the barn of the widow Armstrong. Found the folks very clever.

September 20, 1868 Started on our way about 9 o'clock. Rain had ceased. Found the country much the same as yesterday until this p.m. when we found it some better - especially the Dawlson Prairie which is very beautiful. To the north we could see a great way. It slopes up nice in that direction. The corn crop looks well in the prairie though it is late and is bitten a little with the frost. We saw but little fruit except wild grapes which we saw in abundance. We passed through the little town of Livingston - set up on a hill - rugged with stone above the surface. The liquor business seemed to be the go - nearly all the business houses had the sign "Saloon, Beer, Ale and Liquors for Sale". Upon inquiry as to what party in politics has the majority, we were answered overwhelmingly, two to one for Seymour. We next came to Marshall. A very beautiful little town, the C.S. (County Seat) of Clark County, Illinois. The public square and business part of town lies on the crest of a beautiful hill which ranges north and south, sloping gradually on either side for half a mile. People look intelligent had good clothes on. Said they were expecting a railroad soon. Found them a majority for Grant. We next came to Auburn, a nice little village, the size of Arcadia, lying in the center of the Dawlson Prairie. We next came to Martinsville, lying on the western edge of the Dolson Prairie. The size of Cicero. A very business-like place - looking up some. The railroad is to run through it soon. Found a number of the G.A.R. politically about half and half. We stopped for the night onehalf mile west of this place.

September 21, 1868 - We started on our way at 7 a.m. Swapped my shot-gun to Mr. Swan for a shot-gun and rifle combined. Gave \$16.00 to boot. Had bad roads for four or five miles then came into a branch of Parkers Prairie, called Cumberland. Found it a fine rolling prairie, well improved. Water tolerably good. Fruit trees growing nicely and plenty of them. Some fruit on them. Both peach and apple. Corn very heavy though not quite ripe. Came in abundance and good. Just commenced working it up. Bought half gallon of molasses; paid 25¢. Prairie five miles wide. Then we passed through a belt of timber, five or six miles wide. Very poer - both timber and land, though thousands of hoop-poles

may be cut from it. We next came into Woodberry Prairie, some three or four miles wide. Land pretty good but no crops at all, except oats. Too dry, the cause. We next came through another belt of timber, some six miles in width and a more desperate looking county I never saw. I can find no language to express my opinion of it. We shot a squirrel and pidgeon; had them for supper. We came through Cumberland and Casey, both in the Cumberland Prairie. Nicely situated, about the size of Strawtown, though we found them to have a great deal more to drink. Greenup came next and a more hell doomed place I never saw. Though small, we did not feel safe in it. The people here were all for Seymour and Blair. Its situation is on the Ambro River. We stopped for the night eight miles from Dutch-town.

September 22, 1868 We started at $6\frac{1}{4}$ this a.m. - travelled 21 miles. Saw nothing interesting. Corn has almost been parched by drouth. We saw thousands of acres that cannot make more than 4 to 4 bushels per acre. Potatoes are an entire failure. Apples, some few, Saw some very fine orchards - just beginning to bear. The land is somewhat indifferent though. We saw more blue grass than we have seen before. Our roads were very bad. Tentopolis is a nice little town in the timber between 200 and 400 inhabitants. Has a very large Catholic Church. Religious school here - library, 2 stories, and basement. They are now working on the western part of the convent. They told us it would take them five years to finish the building.(illegible).....the c.s. of the county of the same name. Is the size of Noblesville. Is on theIllinois Central R. R. A very brisk business place. The Terre Haute and St Louis Fair (??) line R. R. which is now being built passes through this place. A great part of the prairie we saw today lies out of Doors. Land is worth from 12 to 25 dollars per acre. Saw some small droves of cattle and hogs. Stock poor, common. Stop for the night on the edge of the Blue Mound Prairie.

September 23, 1868 We started this a.m. at half past 6. Travelled 30 miles. Shot a duck. The morning was very cool. Saw some prairie chickens, everything being fair. Blue Mound Prairie looked grand. We passed Nante-villa in the prairie - a small place. The land here is good - though not of the blackest soil. It is of a rather grayish color and produces well. Water is found about 15 feet under the surface. Springs or running water - we saw none. We next came to Vandalia, c.s. of Fayette County, and formerly the capitol of the state. It is about the size of Noblesville - a very stinking place - not at all policed, and withal a very hard looking place to be called great. We found it Democratic. Bluff City - thats all. We came through some very rough looking country from Vandalia to Mulberry Grove a small town. Land rent is one third in the field grain or \$2 per acre.

September 24, 1868 Rained all day. Travelled 30 miles. Came through Mulberry and Looking Glass Prairies. Very rolling, nice groves of timber. Well improved - good crops. Wheat not yet threshed and not much got sowed. Decidedly the nicest country we have yet seen. Greenville, the c.s. of Bond County, is a fine place. Enterprising and well built. Has clever people - in fact, it is a place where a stranger can feel safe and at home. It is largely Republican. There are but few running

streams in this country. Water lies under the surface from 30-40 feet and is brought up by windlass mostly.

September 25, 1868 Had a nice day to travel. Travelled 35 miles. Arrived at St. Louis, 6 p.m. Saw some very fine country and some rather indifferent, though the timber was good for prairie. All prairie land is well improved. Has many orchards but very little fruit. Crops are much better than we have yet seen in Illinois. Nine miles from St. Louis, at Collinsville, we came into the Mississippi Bottoms. Most excellent land, though some very wet. Not much timber. Some very fine bluegrass pastures. Saw some good cattle - stock a shade better than any we saw in the state. The road through the Bottom is the most miserable that ever toll was collected from. High grade - say 4 to 6 feet on top plank stone, in alternate sections. More holy than righteous. Came very near ruining our wagon. Marine, Troy City and Collinsville, all nice little places, the size of Noblesville, Cicero and Plainfield. Land worth from 35 to 150 dollars per acre. Crossed the river in a ferry-boat to St. Louis. Went directly to post office. Received a letter from Mollie. Heard bad news. Felt bad all night. Put our horses at the Planters! Stable. Put up at the Laclede Hotel. Had good beds. Dined on pork and beans, roasted. Relished the dish muchly. Took a small tramp over the city. Like it well.

September 26, 1868 Got up at six. Paid one dollar for bed. Felt better. Went to the Pacific Depot to see about getting to Warrensburg by rail. Found we couldn't stand the bill - then went to see Cap't Boyd of the Steamer, Jennie Louise. Contracted to go to Lexington or Kansas City - either for \$8.50. Bought our feed of Mr. Arnot. Took our traps and had them loaded, then went to the hotel and wrote some letters. Started on our trip at 6 p.m.

October 1 1868 Arrived at Kansas City at 2 p.m. Have had a fine trip but took us longer than we expected. River very low. Passed over some bars with only two feet of water. Saw very little of the country. Passed some nice villages and towns. Stalled on a sand bar - were shipped to Kansas City, 30 miles, on the Steamer, Octavia, with Cap't Labarge. Had a fine time. Three wedding parties on board - dancing. Seymour - Nigger crew. Found Abe at the wharf. Was glad to see us. Stopped with him at Mrs. Scotts where we had good grub and a good time. Went to the P.O. and got a letter from Hiram. Then over to the depot and waited his arrival. He arrived at 5 p.m. then took a hunt for Brother Jake. Didn't hear of him. Wrote a letter to him. Found an Indian, a.m., Mr. A. S. Hains of Muncie - in the Food and Commission Business. Had a chat with him - is a fine fellow.

October 2, 1868 Started at 7 a.m. for Kansas State Fair. Arrived there at 10 a.m. \$L.35 for round trip. Had a fine time. Saw a fine display of fruit, cattle and horses - indeed, the finest I ever saw. Saw a Gent. from Coffee County. Heard from Suttons - were all well. Returned at 3 p.m. Put on Tanner suits and went over to Independence. Was met by about 500 Rebs, hallooing for Jeff Davis, Seymour and Blair and calling us "Damn Yankees", Sons of B and threw stones at our lights. Struck John C. on the shoulder with a club. Followed us up the stairs of the C. H.(?) Dares us to resent an insult. A young Reb shot a Union boy at the foot of the stairs. Colonels Bureman and St. John notified the

mob that we had come in peace and would go away so, if permitted. If not, we would give them a big fight. They then dispersed and let us go to the train. When the train had moved about 40 rods, they again attacked us with stones and shot through the cars a number of times. We let them have it, warm, but with what effects, we don't know.

October 3, 1868 Rigged up and started for Holden at 9 a.m. Travelled 30 miles. Fed at Independence. Got bit by a dog. Saw some fine country. Got into the Sny Hills; talked with a Rebel Soldier - named S. Thomas. Were treated very kindly. Changed some money for him. Wanted us to send him a buyer for his farm - asked 25 or 30 dollars per acre.

October 4, 1868 Started at 7 a.m. Passed through some of the most desperate looking country I ever saw in the Sny Hills. Some good timber. Is a place for horse thieves to rendezcous. Got to Lone Jack at noon - is a nice place for a town, though not much to be seen. Has a college. Fed there. It was 12 miles from Holden and most beautiful country. Got to Holden at 8 p.m. Saw D. Nation. Couldn't get our mail. Got the directions for Koch's place only two and one half miles distant. Started and got lost. Had to go about four miles out of our way. Got there at half past 11 p.m. Found a hearty welcome awaiting us. Old Mother Koch and Mollie got us some supper. Felt good to be in good beds. Had to talk Dutch with them.

October 5, 1868 Got up early. Dispatched a warm breakfast. Got our guns and went to Holden for our mail and to see Brother Jake, H Lehr and Mother start for home. Got a letter from Mollie. Felt better - then went hunting, accompanied by "Brother" H. Garloch. Killed one squirrel. Too dry and windy for game. Saw some good land along the Black-water. Returned at dusk and found a warm supper awaiting us at Dewey Koch's. After supper we set down and wrote some letters.

October 6, 1868 Started to Warrensburg at 7 a.m. Arrived at 4 p.m. Put up at Livery and had the Gals fed. Got some grub for ourselves and dog. Took a ride over town, then went to Mrs. Elliott's. Got accommodations out-doors and paid two dollars for them.

October 7, 1868 Got up early and started for Holden. Met Dr. Tyson at the Eads Hotel. Had a fine chat with him. Do not like the town or country around. Found Mr. Thomas Allen and took dinner with him - found them glad to see us. Saw the finest country around Holden which we have seen yet. I like it the best. Land rates from 10 to 12 dollars per acre, raw, and from 15 to 25 and up to 40. Stopped overnight with Jake Revel. Boys didn't stay with the girls. A comment.

October 8, 1868 Got up early - went over to Daddy C s. Had a chat with "Rev." Evans. At 8 a.m. started to Harrisonville. Saw some of the most beautiful country - high and rolling - good black soil, from 2 to 8 feet deep - tolerably well watered - not enough timber. About 1/3 settled. Fine orchards set out and doing well - tolerably fair corn - wheat looking splendid. More than half the ground sowed that is under fence and some sowed that is not fenced. Reached Harrisonville at 5 p.m. (to be continued in the next issue of the Descender)

"On the 17th day of February, 1872, School District #85, County of Montgomery State of Kansas is hereby formed and bounded as follows, " so reads the record written in longhand by

"Nathan Bass", County Superintendent.

Patrons were to meet in the house of L. Songer on the 4th of March, 1972, at 2 o'clock P.M. to prefect the organization, which they did, naming the district "Roberts" after the patron on whose land the schoolhouse had been or was to be built. Date of the sale was August 21,1872 and the price for the 12 acre tract was \$15.00. Josiah Roberts and wife signed the deed.

It is an odd but significant fact that at a time when the total county population was below thirty thousand, these rural districts had the highest potential enrollments. The census of 1889-90 gave the Roberts district a total of forty-six persons between five and twenty-one years of age. Ten years later it was nineteen.
