THE BEGINNING AND HISTORY OF THE TRENTON U. B. CHURCH

During the year 1885, Charles Neville and I. N. Christmore with a group of young people, worked up an interest in having a Sunday School for the young people of the community. The group would meet out doors on Sunday afternoon under the shade trees on Snow Creek on the then George McKee farm, now owned by Raymond Cranor. They spent the afternoon singing gospel songs. As a result, a Sunday School was organized in the school house  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile west of the Trenton Church. The M.E. Minister came from Coffeyville and held Sunday Services until the weather got bad and the mud roads became impassable. It was then discontinued.

## Valeda churches cont'd

In March 1885, Mr. A. J. Bessey from near the territory line southwest of Edna, met with the quarterly conference that was held at Altamont. A request was made that someone be sent to preach for them at the Trenton school house. Rev. B. F. Low was instructed to look after that point. That meeting was adjourned to meet at Parsons June 20th, 1885, and at that time two new classes were organized. These were Trenton and Bowman and they were admitted to the quarterly conference. Cash reported paid for the quarter was \$42.50.

W. B. Christmore was elected Assistant Supt. in 1884 and served either as Superintendent or Assistant Supt. until he was elected Supt. in 1898, just a few days before President McKinley declared we were at war with Spain. Mr. Christmore was elected to succeed himself for nineteen years, then asked to be retired in 1917. Different ones have served as Supt. since then. R. J. Thornton was serving as Superintendent when the Trenton Church closed its doors, May 29, 1966, after having been in operation for 81 years.

Among the first members of the first class in 1885 were: Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Bessey, C. H. Neville, I. N. Christmore, Mr. and Mrs. Fullerton. The following have served as Secretary since the class organization: Mrs. Magee, A. J. Bessey, Mrs. Redick, Elmer Bessey, Ruth White, Floyd Pike, W. B. Christmore, Earl E. Neidigh, Mary White and Mrs. Blanche Thomas, who was elected Secretary Nov. 15, 1923, and has served continuously since. She did not miss a dozen meetings during that time.

The classes that reported to Parsons at the quarterly meeting in 1885 were: Altamont, Prairie Hall, Hiatt, Parsons, Trenton and Bowman. Since 1885, forty-seven ministers have served on the charge and nineteen Superintendants. Trenton and Valeda were on the Valeda charge until Trenton closed doors May 29, 1966, on account of no attendance and no interest.

### THE VALEDA UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

In 1968 the Evangelical United Brethren Church and the Methodist Church united to become the United Methodist Church. By 1971 it was evident that a new Educational Building was needed. The ground breaking services were held on the site on April 18, 1971. This was a very inspirational service for all those in attendance, as dreams were to become a reality.

The building was built by the men of the Church and community. The money for material came from many; some as love offering, some as memorials for loved ones, others gave up many of the things that they wanted and put the money in the building fund, still others gave for the Glory of God and to help build His house. Yes, they all gave until it hurt a little. All went over and beyond the call of duty. Much good fellowship resulted from the fact that while the men would work the women would cook good meals for them. This inspired them to more and continued work.

The Dedication service for the new building was held March 26, 1972. The Rev. Richard Johnson, District Superintendent for the Parsons District gave the Dedication Address. Mr. Kenneth Ransom of Denver, Colo. sang the "Holy City". The ladies of the Church prepared and served a fine noon meal. About one-hundred and fifty were in attendance and much enthusiasm was evidenced.

## Valeda Churches cont'd

The Easter Services for April 22, 1973, broke the record for attendance. We had 106 at Church. It had been promised that if we had over 100, the Sunday School Superintendent, Mr. Darrell Neville and Minister Olin K. Hamlin would eat dinner on the roof the following Sunday. There was much merriment as they did just that---they ate their dinner on the roof!

We are happy that there are many memorials in our Church that will live and be useful for many years and give us wonderful memories of our loved ones who have gone to their great reward:

The lighted crosses that burn every night are in loving memory of Mrs. Vela Wingfield. Yes, this faithful member, Mrs. Wingfield, taught a Sunday School class in this Church for over sixty years.

The Cross and beautiful velour backdrop in the sanctuary were memorials: The Cross, from the Segar family, was given in loving memory of Virgil, father, husband and friend. The velour backdrop was given by Mrs. Opal Neer, in loving memory of her husband Verl.

The coat rack and hangers were also given in memory of Virgil Seger, by his family and friends.

The Methodist Hymnals were given in loving memory of Mrs. Ernest Vaughn, Mrs. Hamlin's mother and the drapes were given in loving memory of Mrs. Fannie Hamlin, mother of Olin K. Hamlin.

The very beautiful carpet in our sanctuary is a gift and Memorial from the Nuss Family, Gay and Francis. It helps beautify and make more comfortable the house of God.

The beautiful and comfortable Pew Cushions were given as memorials from several church members, so they remind us when we use them that they are in loving memory of many.

The beautiful candles on our Communion Table were a gift to the Church from the Darrell Neville Family.

The doors for our serving window in the kitchen were given by Mrs. Josephine Martin, while the tables and chairs in the Educational Bldg., were given by several members, again as memorials.

The new flags were a memorial from Mrs. Jimmie Marvel and family in loving memory of their husband and father, Mr. John Marvel.

The beautiful lighted Bulletin Board, in front of the Church, was given by Mrs. Opal Shores and Family in loving memory of all their family who had gone to their great reward, especially the husband and father, Mr. Kenneth Shores.

In May 1976, a miracle happened when we found an organ at a very good figure. Everyone was in agreement that we should buy the organ. Many fine large donations and gifts were given toward buying it and it has been an outstanding addition to our worship services. Mrs. Halden Moon is our organist, with Miss Betty Neville as assistant organist.

Valeda Churches cont'd

At Easter in 1978 Miss Betty Neville presented the Church with a large Bronze Cross for our Communion Table. This, in loving memory of all that have and are, worshiping in the Church. Also to the glory of God for His House.

The Church has been the scene of many Memorial Services, for which it is always willing to serve.

The Church is also used for many civic or community meetings, with all of these groups being very proud of what the Church has and do their best to keep it that way.

The Church is getting to be noted as a fine small Wedding Chapel, the present minister has had approximately eighty weddings in or around the Church. As best we can check, these participants have come from some twelve to fifteen states. These have ranged from the smallest wedding to a large one with people having to sit in the Educational room. We know that a few of the people have felt and been able to find God through Jesus Christ in this fine Church.

The events I have noted above are not outstanding as area events but they are important to the congregation of this church, as the thing which makes the Church THE CHURCH are the people in it. We have found that they are the finest to be found; as they try to make the Kingdom of God a part of their living. It is their Church and they are proud of it. They make the job of minister a privilege and a pleasure to be working with such fine God loving people.

They bought the hay and the ripe golden grain.  
Bud Owens bought rabbits, furs, pelts, and hides,  
Caught by trappers and hunters o'er the rolling country side.

Claude Wingfield was the trader buying cattle, sheep and  
swine,  
Shipping them to city markets, o'er the local railroad line.  
Mable Murphy ran the swithboard making calls night and day,  
To the neighbors here at home and to places far away.  
There were thrashing machines--Pearson, Murphy, and Green,  
Who thrashed out the grain with its ripe golden sheen.  
Ike Samuels was our barber in that far off olden day,  
And he clipped and he shaved in his own special way.

Early Citizens of Montgomery County, Kansas

The following is a reprint from biographies which appeared in the History of Montgomery County, Kansas published by L. Wallace Duncan, Iola, Kansas 1903.

ISAAC M. ARGO ---In the vicinity of Costello lives some of the most enterprising and industrious farmers of Montgomery county, among whom is the gentleman whose name heads this notice. He has been a resident of the county for nineteen years and he and his family are esteemed for their many splendid qualities and personal virtues.

Isaac M. Argo dates his birth from the year 1854, in Champaign county, Illinois. His parents, David and Mary (Shreve) Argo, came to the town of Neodesha, Kansas, in 1872 near which place they preempted a claim and where they continued to reside until their death.

Our subject was eighteen years of age when the family came to Kansas and he aided his parents in opening the farm until he passed his legal majority. He then began life on his own account and, in 1891, started an establishment of his own, being joined in marriage that year with Miss May, daughter of James H. and Margaret (Weller) Ashbaugh. His wife's father was a native of Hardin county, Kentucky where he was born in 1817, the mother, also being a native of the same county and state. They were early pioneers of Montgomery county, Kansas having settled here in 1869 and preempted the farm where Mr. Argo now resides. Two of his daughters, Mary and Martha, also took and proved a claim of a quarter section of land nearby. Mr. Argo died in 1882, and his wife passed away in 1889, leaving six children: Mary I., now deceased; Martha A., who married Garland Watson and lives near Kansas city; Margaret, deceased; Victor, who lives in Colorado; George J., also of Colorado, married Fannie Ashbaugh, and has a son, William; the youngest child was Mrs. Argo.

To the house of Mr. and Mrs. Argo have come two children: Victor N., born February 1, 1884, and David, who was born July 23, 1902. In his social relations Mr. Argo is most happy, being a member of the Modern Woodmen, and ready at all times to take part in any movement which has for its object the improvement of society about him. He is not active in the matter of politics, but is pleased to support, by his vote, the platform of the Populist party. (page 304)

THOMAS J. WARNER --- On a farm in Lewis county, West Virginia, Thomas J. Warner of Rutland township, was born December 10 1866. He came to mature years about his native heath and acquired the rudiments of a country school education. He left the old home in 1896 and went into old Virginia where, in Rockbridge county, he was engaged in farm work for four years. Deciding to seek his fortune in the west, he returned home in a few months and then migrated to Welch, Indian Territory, in September 1901. Having not found the object of his search after a few weeks he came up into Kansas and, at Jefferson, in Montgomery county, he bought a farm of one hundred and sixty acres, which he parted with at sale after cultivating it one year. He came to Rutland township from Independence creek and owns now a quarter section of section 14, township 33, range 14.

Mr. Warner's father was George G. Warner, born in Pendleton county, West Virginia and a son of John Warner.. The latter had children: William, Zebedee, George G., James, of Taylor county, West Virginia; M.J.H. of Labette county Kansas; Mrs. Rebecca Smith and Catherine. George G. Warner married Lucinda Clark, of Lewis county, West Virginia, and a daughter of John and Margaret (Bonnett) Clark. The five children of this union were: Ida F., Thomas J., John M., of California; William W., of West Virginia; Mrs. Glennie Zinn, of Ritchie county, West Virginia.

April 24, 1890, Thomas J. Warner married Irena J. Mohler, of Rockbridge county, Virginia and West Virginia, respectively. The two children of Mr. and Mrs Warner are Mary L. and Ida M.

The varied pursuits of the farm have occupied Mr. Warner through life. The efforts of his active life have been fairly rewarded and he is today master of the situation that confronts him. In politics he is a Democrat and he and his hold allegiance to the Methodist church.

Woodford co., Kentucky 1794

In the name of God Amen. I, Anthiny Thompson of Woodford County and the State of Kentucky being in a low state of health but sound of mind and Memory do make this my last will and Testament in the following manner and form.

Imprimis. I give and bequeath to my Daughter Elenor Thompson Thompson, one negro Wençh named Venus that I lent her, and her increase and her two children and one negro Boy named Jesse, and all the stock and household goods lent to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my Daughter Judith Bell all the Stock and household goods that I lent her and one negro Girl named Queen and her increase and five hundred and fifty two and one-half acres of land out of the Land that I am to have of Anthony Thornton to be equal in quality with the said Land that I am to have of the said Thornton, but in case the said Land is lost she is to have fifty pounds in lue thereof out of my other Lands to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my Son Robert Thompson one negro man named Isaac, together with the stock and household furniture that I lent him, and the Certificates that I sent as an order to him to receive of Samuel Brockman, to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to Susanna Thompson two negro girls named Hannah and Alice, and their increase, one Bed and Furniture, and one mare worth twelve pounds, saddle and Bridle and twelve pounds of Stock, to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my son Anthony Thompson the land whereon he now liveth containing one hundred and seventy-seven acres but in case the said Land is lost he is to have fifty pounds out of my other lands, and one negro man named Peter and the stock and household furniture that I lent to him and his Heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my son Nathan Thompson the land whereon he now liveth containing on ehundred acres but in case the said land is lost he is to have fifty pounds out of my other lands, and one negro boy named Frank and Stock and household furniture that I lent him and one mare worth twelve pounds to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my Daughter Sarah Thompson, two negro girls named Cate and Sarah, and their increase, and all other things as I give to my daughter Susanna except to

negroes to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my Daughter Mary Thompson two negro Girls named Lucy and Jenny and their increase, and all other things as I gave to my daughter Susanna to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my Betsy Thompson two negroes the one a girl named Betsy and her increase, and a boy named Juby and all other things as I gave to my Daughter susanna except negroes, but in case any one of her negroes die before she comes of age they are to be made good out of my Lands to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my son Henry Thompson the Tract of land wherein I now live containing one hundred and twenty acres. After his Mothers death or he becomes of age, and one negro boy named Ned, one Horse worth twelve pounds, Saddle & Bridle, one feather bed and furniture and twelve pounds worth of Stock to him and his heirs forever but in case the land be lost or the negro boy die before my son Henry becomes of age they are to be made good out of my other lands.

Item. I lend to my beloved wife Ann Thompson during her life the land whereon I now live and all my estate real and personal that is for her support but to be under the care and oversight of my Executors and if the said Executors should find the Taxes too heavy for the Estate they are to sell off any out Lands for that use, and if my wife should die before my son Henry becomes of age the the said Estate shall be kept together til my son Henry comes for his support and my Daughters unmarried, and at her death, or Henry comes of age to be equally divided amongst my before named Legatees, as Witness my Hand and Seal this 7th day of May, 1794.
