GLEANINGS from INDEPENDENCE by Virginia

SOUTH KANSAS TRIBUNE - Published weekly, Independence, Kansas
Excerpts beginning May 17, 1971

Among the interesting localities of Montgomery County to which the stranger is daily referred is the valley of Onion Creek. The creek rises in the western part of the county and running in a south easterly direction empties itself into the Verdigris River near Coffeyville, three or four miles north of Parker. It is a more delightful part of our county, suggestive of future abundance, home comforts and substantial wealth. Manufacturers may thrive, merchants get rich, and bankers by cent, percent, accumulate colossal fortunes, but all comes from Mother Earth.

The valley of Onion Creek exhibits a large tract of country, blessed with every conceivable variety of first class farming lands all watered by the creek. On numerous branches on either side with a generous sprinkling of clear springs between. One of these springs on the farm of J. E. WAGNER is well worthy of a visit-----The general course of Onion Creek is southeast and in sheltered spots are to be found incomparable farms of J. S. SPROUCE, T. S. RODABAUGH: CAPT. W. J. MAY: E. E. MAY: COL. CALEB MAY, WILLIAM M. PARNELL, J. S. LURCHIN and many others, each one of whom seems to have the best farm on the creek.

CAPT MAY has a fine orchard, apples, peach and cherry trees----One of the farmers, Mr. RODABAUGH has near a hundred volumes of historical and scientific works in his log cabin.

On the west side of the creek two miles south ROUND TOP SCHOOL house on the farm of WILLIAM SEARS is a remarkable spring-----a fine stock farm----one hundred head of cattle.

MESSRS NALL and CRIBB have 130 head of fine cattle; J. B. DYER on Spring Creek has a fine stock of dry goods, groceries, boots, shoes, hardware, etc.

J. R. SWEARINGEN has a blacksmith shop on the east side of the creek nine miles southwest of Independence.

JOHN STREET, ten miles south of Independence has a fine nursery of sweet potatoe plants, cabbage plants-----

DR. J. M. MILLER, a practicing physician has a farm north of Coffeyville.

And, so it is throughout the whole county-----is thickly settled, abundantly supplied with mills, shops and physicians, lacking only school houses and churches. Farm improvement makes it equal in any respect to old settled regions. Montgomery County though one of the very best is, after all, in most respects, but a fair type of our noble State.

Early Citizens of Montgomery co., Kansas

The following are biographies of settlers which appear in the History of Montgomery County, Kansas, published by L. Wallace Duncan, Iola, Kansas, 1903.

MARION E. KELSO

Marion E. Kelso, who lives in one of the handsomest residences in the county, on a beautiful elevation overlooking the rural village of Havana, and one and a half miles from that place, is another of the "elect of '71" though he was but seven years of age when his parents settled in the county. He is one of the thrifty farmers of the county, controlling 1,146 acres, and his place is the embodiment of neatness and rural elegance, and bespeaks the careful management of a master husbandman.

The father of Marion E. Kelso, Thomas Kelso, was a native of Virginia, where he was reared to young manhood. Thence he migrated to Johnson county, Iowa, where he met and married Sarah Welch, and where he continued to reside until 1868, and where his wife died in 1865. She left him with a family of six children, of whom our subject is the only one living. The father came to Kansas in 1868, and settled first in Lyon county, thence, in a short time, to Neosho county, where he located near the Osage Mission. He was attracted to Montgomery county in the year of the great influx, namely, 1871, and filed on a claim upon a part of which our subject now resides. For a number of years prior to his death, in 1892, Mr. Kelso was in poor health and thus Marion, very early, became his father's "right hand man." They spent two years together in Eureka Springs in the vain hope of improving the father's health, and with this exception, Marions Kelso's residence in the county has been continuous since his seventh year.

Our subject was born in Johnson county, Iowa, on the first of December, 1864. Deprived of a mother's love and care when but a babe in arms, he grew to sturdy manhood under the father's care and, in the meantime, secured a good common school education. August 11, 1887, the marriage of Mr. Kelso and Miss Belle Lamb was celebrated. Mrs. Kelso is a native of Montgomery county, a daughter of Elroy and Mary Lamb, and has borne her husband seven children, as follows: Pearl, Thomas, Iva, Lesley, Zora, Floyd, and Ernest.

In the cultivation of the homestead of three hundred and forty acres, Mr. Kelso finds ample opportunity to demonstrate his ability as an agriculturist, his other

holdings being rented. His handsome and modern residence is built against the bluff and commands a most beautiful view of all the surrounding country.

In the social life of the community, Mr. and Mrs. Kelso are helpful factors. Their influence is wielded at all times in the interest of better conditions in the matter of the educational and civic life of the Community and they are liberal supporters of good schools, good churches and good government. Their place is secure in the hearts of a host of friends, whom they delight to honor in their regal and hospitable house.

JOHN HENRY KEITH

The Keith family is one of the oldest in American history and was prominently identified with our colonial period. It furnished a Colonial Governor for Pennsylvania and, when the Revolution came on, demonstrated its patriotism in the ranks of the Colonial forces. They were of Scotch ancestry and the archives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Virginia and Kentucky, show them to have played an important and honorable part in the history of their states. Governor Keith is one of the grand-ancestors of the subject of this review.

Daniel Keith was born in Virginia in 1776, and died in Warren county, Kentucky, in 1875. He was the great-grandfather of the subject of this notice and the founder of his branch of the Keith family in the state of Daniel Boone. He served in the Henry Clay regiment of Kentucky troops in the Mexican war, took part in the Taylor campaign and among other achievements, aided in the capture of Monterey. He married Miss Gardner and had three sons, namely: John, William, and Isiah.

John Keith and Mary Edwards were the paternal grandparents of our subject. The former was a native Kentuckian, born in 1815, and died in Warren county, in 1891. He engaged in the ministry in early life, after having completed an academic education, and became a power for good all over the state. He was a forcible speaker, was an expounder of the doctrines of immersion and close communion and, on the issues of the Civil war, took strongly to the side of the Union. He and Mary (Edwards) Keith were the parents of: Daniel, Ivey, George and Henry.

Ivey Keith, father of John Keith, of this record, was born in Edmonson county, Kentucky, January 14, 1846, and passed his active life as a farmer and grower of stock.

Warren county has been his home from youth and in 1863, he enlisted from that county for service in the war of Rebellion. His was "1" company and his regiment the 52nd infantry. He served as a private, was in several battles and was wounded. He has taken a good citizen's interest in the affairs of his county and has affiliated with the Republican party. He married Jennie Finney, born in Warren county, Kentucky, February 17, 1846, and a daughter of Jack and Lucinda (Thomas) Finney, people of Irish blood. The issue of this marriage is John H., of this notice: Addie, wife of Buford Larrance, of Kentucky; Clay, of the Indian Territory; Euclid, a farmer and lumberdealer of Kentucky; Emmet, Samuel E. and William L., of Kentucky.

John H. Keith came to manhood on the farm and was educated in the common schools, academy, normal school and business college. Ready for life's responsibilities, he chose teaching school as a profession, while casting about for the real work of his life. A few terms sufficed and he engaged in a systematic preparation for the law. He was admitted to the bar in Warren county, Kentucky, November 14, 1889, and spent the first two years after admission to practice in his native county. In February 1892, he left his native place and located in Muskogee, Indian Territory, where he resided 'till October 1893, when he made Coffeyville, Kansas his home. For ten years he has been engaged in the active and effective practice of his profession in Montgomery county, and is among the wellknown members of the bar.

Mr. Keith has taken an active part in the politics of his town and county. He was City Attorney of Coffeyville five years, was chairman of the Democratic County Central Committee for three years and now represents the 29th legislative district in the Kansas legislature. He was chosen in a Republican district, where he ran three hundred votes ahead of his ticket, and was one of two Democrats on the county ticket elected. In the legislature of 1903, he was a member of the committees on Judiciary, Railroads, Mines and Mining and Private Corporations. In a business way he is connected with several Coffeyville enterprises, of some of which he is confidential adviser.

Mr Keith's family consists of two sons, Walter and Paul. In fraternal matters he is a member of the Modern Woodmen, a Select Knight and an Elk.

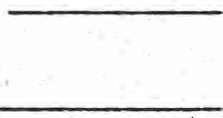

WILL OF WILLIAM DANIEL
1869, N. C.

In the name of God Amen the 27th day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty nine. I Wm. Daniel of the State of North Carolina and County of Martin. Being through the blessing of God in a sound state of mind and memory but calling to mind the frail tenure of life, and that is appointed to all men once to die do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament that is to say principally and first of all I recommend my soul in to the hands of Almighty God who gave it me. And the disposal of my body I leave in the entire discretion of my friends. With respect to my worldly goods I dispose of it in manner here following Viz: I dispose of my real estate in manner following Viz: I lend to my beloved wife Mary during her life term or widowhood the land whereon I live with all its appurtannance, thereto belong Bounded as follows beginning at the mouth of Dukes branch on Smithwicks Creek, thence up the swamp to a marked white oak, thence near east to the Chalton Island Swamp to a marked gum thence with the swamp to the first prong of Dukes branch, thence that prong to the main branch to the beginning and at the death or marriage of my wife, I give the aforname premises with all the appurtances thereto belong to my son William H. Daniel.

I give to my son Simon C. Daniel a piece of land beginning at a marked tree a white oak on the mill swamp thence up the swamp to the mouth of a small branch at the Pikins hole point thence up the branch to the cross branch thence up the cross branch to Chalton Swamp, thence with the Chalton Swamp down to a marked tree a pine thence near west to a marked tree an oak on the Mill Pond the beginning.

I give to my son Daniel (Mrs Wright says this should be David, a mis-copy) R. Daniel the ballance of my Simon Daniel tract of land. The balance of my land I give to my three daughters, Mary E. Whitley, Sarah M. Manning & Hannah J. Cory to be equally divided between them. I give to my son Wm. H. Daniel one bed and its necessary furniture my carpenter tools, Blacksmith tools and coper tools I also give to my daughter Sarah M. Manning one bed and its necessary furniture out of my property My wish and will is for all my just debts if any to be paid out of my perishable property that can be best shared discredionary with my executor and my wife. I now lend to my wife, Mary during her life or widowhood all my unmentioned property both within doors and without doors to her common use and at her death to be equally divided between my six children, David R. Daniel, Simon C. Daniel, Wm. H. Daniel, Mary E. Whitley, Sarah M. Manning & Hannah J. Cory.

I leave for my executor to settle my small estate my beloved friend and nephew Joseph D. Biggs..
