## MEMOIR

The silver cord is loosed, the golden bowl is broken, the pitcher is broken at the fountain, the wheel broken at the cistern. Soon the dust shall return to the earth as it was, but the freed spirit of John L. Perry hath returned to the God who gave it.

Never a child, on mothers breast, fell asleep more gently than did he on Monday morning, October 5th 1925, just as the hands of the clock had passed the midnight hour, while his beloved wife, of nearly sixty years, a son Frank and the family physician were by his bed ministering to his comfort and requests.

He was born in Franklin County, Pennsylvania, on April 20th 1843, being in his eighty-third year at the time of his departure from this life, being one of eight children born to John and Mary Smith Perry, pioneer residents of that eastern state.

His parents soon left their native state, migrating to Ohio, the Journey being made partly by barge down the Ohio river, landing at Gallipolis, Ohio; thence overland into the central part of the state, where in Champaign County they located on a farm, it was while his parents resided here that John met, and in the course of time, married Lucinda Bradley on May 5th 1866.

To this union ten children were born, all of whom are living. They include Mrs. Minnie Johnson, of Coffeyville, Kansas; George A., of Santa Monica, California; Frank, of Tampico, Mexico; Mrs Fannie Willhite, of Fullerton, Calif. Clint G., of Venice, Calif.; W. Clifford, of Fullerton, Calif., Mrs. Anna L. Ford, of Anaheim, Calif.; Roy H., of Gardena, Calif.; David H., now enroute to southern Africa, and Ray, of Long Beach, California. There are twenty-nine grandchildren and thirty great-grandchildren. Two brother, James and William Perry, of Indianapolis, Indiana, and one sister, Mrs. Lizzie Snyder, of Urbana, Ohio survive.

Nineteen years of Mr. and Mrs. Perry's life were spent in the state of Kansas, four years in Texas, and it was from this latter state that they came to California in the year 1900. Six of these last twenty-five years have been lived in Santa Monica.

Mr Perry not only heard and responded to the call of his country, but to the call of the Master into a life of Christian service. For many years he was identified with the Methodist Episcopal Church, but in recent years with the Church of the Nazarene, which church he attended on his last Sunday morning, his last Sunday and day on this earth. His translation was akin to that of God's servant Enoch, "who walked with God and was not, for God took him", or like that of Elijah whose mantle fell upon Elisha, who was more effective in service because of his contact and association with this good man.

Mr. Perry was fortunate in having unusually pious parents and these, his children and grandchildren are fortunate in having left them to the legacy of a devout Christian father and frandfather.

There are time when eulogies seem so inadequate to express the worth of a man. This is one of those times, but Uncle John Perry needs no eulogy, his consistant, faithful, devoted Christian life speaks for itself.

Servant of God, well done,  
Thy glorious warfare's past;  
The battle fought, the victory won  
And thou art crowned at last.

John L. Perry was the Great-Grandfather of Max Tongier,SR.

and divided the county into three townships about nine miles in width, extending across the county east and west. Beginning at the north they were named respectively, Drum Creek, Verdigris and Westralia, with voting places at Fitch's Store, Verdigris City and Westralia. The REGISTER, published at Oswego, by E. R. Trask was made the official paper. At a meeting July 7, Capt. Daniel McTaggart and Wm. C. Dickey were authorized to establish a Ferry on the Verdigris near the county seat, and H. C. Crawford, E. Dennis and W. L. Baily, Directors of the Westralia Bridge and Ferry Co., one at Westralia. The first survey and location of a public highway was from Westralia to the west line of the county.

At a meeting August 27, George Hoag was appointed Sheriff, Capt D. McTaggart, County Treasurer, and E. K. Kountz, Probate Judge. Emigration kept pouring in and everything ran smoothly until the approach of the annual election, occurring on the 2nd of November. In this the issue was made upon the location of the county seat and the election of a board of commissioners in its interest. The politics of a candidate was not a subject of inquiry if he was right on the main question, which was generally determined by his location east or west of the river. Independence having grown rapidly pressed her claims for the county town, and the east side were not willing to lose it. The nearness of these towns to the geographical centre of the county was the main argument. At Verdigris City the exact centre was just across the river, while at Independence the little lone jack oak, still standing on the hill south of town, was always pointed to as the centre, having been ascertained by actual measurement. The question was in doubt and some argued there should be a survey made and the county town located on the centre spot. Montgomery City, located at the mouth of Drum Creek, was also a formidable rival for the county seat. Before the election Verdigris and Montgomery cities pooled their issues and located Liberty, near the present site of McTaggart's Mill, and entered the bantling as their candidate. Every inch of ground was contested, as it was regarded a life and death struggle for the towns, and the settler wanted the county seat on his side of the raging Verdigris. The voting precinct for Independence was at Verdigris city, and at day break, on the morning of the election, two wagon loads of men were started for the purpose of getting control of the election board. The drive on the home stretch from the ford to the city was made at full speed, but being discovered by the bystanders, they arrived only in time to be given as a matter of courtesy, one member. At these polls nearly every vote was challenged and sworn in. And there was at this early day, repeaters. Two wagon loads of men, in charge of G. J. Dalee and L.L. Wood, voted in the morning at Verdigris city, and in the evening at Fitch's store. About 375 votes were cast, but in the canvass of the vote, that of Drum Creek was thrown out, for the reason that the returns were certified as a "copy." This elected Liberty the county seat, a board of commissioners in her interest, and what was known as the east side ticket throughout. The west side candidates filed notice of contest before the Probate Court of Wilson county to which Montgomery, for judicial purposes, had been attached. The cause was heard on the 23rd of December, the plaintiffs

being represented by C. M. Ralstine, of Independence and F. A. Bettis of Oswego, and the defendants by Goodell Foster and John A. Helphingstine of Liberty. So important were the destinies hanging on the ragged edge of this conflict, that L. T. Stephenson carried Mr. Bettis on horseback from Oswego to Fredonia, through a blinding snow, a distance of 65 miles arriving at 3 o'clock a.m. on the day set for trial. The Court decided, in effect, that there had been no election and it very logically followed there could be no contest. No canvass of vote cast at this election is shown in the records, and the only reference made to it is that on the 13th of December, Ed. Foster appears with a certificate of election as County Surveyor, and it was ordered that he enter upon the discharge of his duties. Ed being the only one of the thirty candidates elected, it probably required this special order to install him. The old board continued to hold over and caused the log court house and county clerk's office to be moved to Liberty while the west side contended that the county seat was still at Verdigris city. Things remained in statu quo until about the 1st of May, 1870, when Independence send Hon. Charles White to Topeka, with a certified copy of the court records in the contest case and he returned with the appointments of a new board of commissioners, consisting of W. W. Graham, Thomas Brock and S. B. Moorehouse. This new board was taken by Mr. White and L. T. Stephenson to the site of Verdigris city, where, seated in their wagon, they organized by the election of W. W. Graham, chairman, appointed John A. Helphingstine county clerk, Samuel Van Grundy county treasurer, B. R. Cunningham sup't of schools, and J. K. Snyder register of deeds. They designated the Independence Pioneer as the official paper, and ordered that the District Court to convene May 9th, be held at Independence and the various county offices be kept temporarily there. After a few weeks the old board surrendered the records and the new one had clear sailing. This little piece of strategy, as a matter of fact, settled forever a question which has cost many of the counties of Kansas thousands of dollars.

On the 13th day of May an action brought in the District Court to compel the County Board to move the County officers to Liberty was dismissed at Plaintiffs cost. Goodell Foster the wheel horse of Liberty, was the first to accept the situation, and move to the County seat. A few months later he traded all his corner lots in what he had believed to be the "future great" to a merchant at Liberty for four hats of medium quality. Thos. Harrison, Frank Willis and N. Bass soon followed. The question of County seat was finally settled at the ensuing November election, Independence receiving 839 votes and Liberty 560.

On the 24th of June 1870, the Board canvassed the vote of the county on the proposition to give \$200,000 in bonds to the L.L.&G.R.R. Co., for the building of twenty-one miles of road within the county. The total vote was found to be 2140. For the proposition 1340 and against 826, whereupon the subscription was ordered made and the chairman instructed to forthwith deposit the Bonds in Escrow and transfer the stock as provided. September 5th, 1870, the first tax levy was made, being for \$4,000 for state and county purposes, and was derived from personal property only

there being no real estate taxable. At the Annual Election in November, W. W. Graham, H. D. Grant and John McDonald, were elected Commissioners and Seth M. Beardsley Co. Clerk. Graham was re elected Chairman of the Board at their organization in January, 1871. May 17, 1871, a contract was made with E. J. Farnsworth for the building of wrought iron bridges across the Verdigris at Independence and Coffeyville, and the Elk River at Elk City. July 21, the first Funding Bonds to the amount of \$15,000 were issued. The county was now in the fullness of that prosperity which we have before referred to. At the election in November, 1870, Frank Willis had been elected County Attorney, and there seemed to be a kind of incompatibility with him and the Board. During the summer of '71 misunderstandings resulted in a complete estrangement, and the board ignoring Frank, employed one E. W. Fay to appear in all cases in which the county was or should become a part, for one year. Fay was a kind of itinerant Lawyer, with headquarters at Peru, Howard County, who was selected by the board on account of his eminent social qualifications. E. M. Beardsley had been appointed County Agent and was directing the affairs of the county with sonsummate skill. About the same time also, a difficulty had grown up between the board and L. T. Stephenson, Clerk of the District Court. The board had required Stephenson to give an additional bond which he declined to do, whereupon they caused a notice to be served upon him that the office of the clerk was declared vacant.

On the receipt of this order, Stephenson wrote and caused to be published in the county paper under the seal of the court, the following characteristic PROCLAMATION:

"I, L. T. Stephenson, Clerk & c., do by the power vested in me by law, proclaim the offices of County Commissioners of Montgomery County, Kansas, vacant until such time as men endowed with a sense of honor and honesty can be found to fill such vacancies. The present Board will therefore within 24 hours after notice hereof, turn over to the County Clerk all the books and records of their offices and "Vamoosh the Ranch."

(signed) L. T. Stephenson  
Clerk of the District Court

Some were surprised at the dangerous power vested in the Clerk, but the proclamation was as harmless as the order of the board.

On the 28th of July Messrs. Stillings and Fenlon of Leavenworth, Albert H. Horton of Atchinson and E. W. Fay of Peru, were employed to defeat the delivery of the R.R. bonds to the R.R. Co. and the same day County warrants to the amount of \$2500 were issued to A. H. Horton. August 23, we find the board passing the following remarkable resolution:

"WHEREAS it has come to the knowledge of this board that sundry evil disposed persons, foremost among whom is one Frank Willis, occupying the position of County Attorney, have industriously circulated false, damaging

and slanderous reports, concerning the conduct of the affairs of this county, under the immediate charge of this board, and whereas said reports are each and every one of them false, and calculated to create discord and arouse petty jealousy, the effect of which is inimical to the best interest of the county, and whereas through their orator, Frank Willis, said reports have come to the knowledge of his Honor, H. G. Webb, in his official capacity as Judge of the 11th Judicial District, therefore be it ordered by this board that the Hon. H. G. Webb be, and he is hereby requested, if in his opinion he may deem it practicable to appoint a committee of citizens to inquire into and investigate said charges and report the same to the Court of his information and for the information of the public. ordered that the County Clerk be instructed to furnish his Honor H. G. Webb, a certified copy of this order."

This apparent vindication of their official acts by lodging a challenge for an investigation at the very seat of justice, was a relief, but the extreme mental effort is said to have been momentarily bad. Chairman Graham was faint, County Agent Beardsly swooned away and even a pallid hue stole over the cheek of Fay, whereupon they promptly administered the following infallible restorative: W. W. Graham cash and ex-officio services \$283. E. M. Beardsly, cash and services \$956. E. W. Fay, Attorney, \$200. Board of Com (aggregate) \$144. We are not informed that the Judge took judicial notice of the request, but it seems he might have done so and then with propriety have asked the board to grant the Court a similar committee.

Willis, the orator of the maligners, remained at liberty chaffing under the indignity of being ignored. He however continued to draw his salary with great regularity, and never lost an opportunity to express in his distressing guttural tones his opinion of the board and his substitute Fay.

Matters progressed in rather an unsatisfactory way until the annual election in November, which resulted in the election of J. C. Frazier, W. J. May and W. S. Renfro, Commissioners, and John A. Helphingstine, County Clerk.

Upon the organization of the new board in January, 1872, there was a disposition on the part of the old board and County Clerk to hold over. Upon the refusal of the County Clerk to vacate, a warrant was issued directing the Sheriff to take possession of and deliver to the new County Clerk all the books, records &c. pertaining to the office. The warrant was placed in the hands of Dr. H. W. Miller, Henry E. Gill and others, who took forcible possession of the effects of the office and delivered them as directed.

Then followed a season of investigation, a kind of sounding process, to ascertain the dept of water, the bark was in, and whether or no there was a better channel.

After lightening her ballast she was veered to the Northward on smoother seas with fairer skies.

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#### MacKESSOCK

The surname MacKessock derives from the Gaelic Mac Iosaig (son of Isaac). Thus, it appears to have the same origins as that of the surname MacIssac, a surname in use among ecclesiastics of early Scotland. Variations of the name include MacKissack, MacKissock, MacKisseck, and others.

In 1476, the lands of Ardere, Barony of Glastray, were resigned by Mariot M'Kesek, daughter of Molmoria M'Kesek

On the coast of the Firth of Moray, there is a sept of MacKissock who probably came there with Colin Campbell, 6th Earl of Argyll (10 Sep 1584), who married Agnes Keith (16 Jul 1588), widow of James Stuart, Earl of Moray, half brother of Mary Stuart, Queen of Scots.



## HISTORY OF MONTGOMERY COUNTY, KANSAS 1909

FRANK CARL -- In the spring of 1869, a young German boy found himself settled on the prairies, nine miles northeast of where Coffeyville is now located. This young man, Frank Carl, was thousands of miles away from his native country and without friends or acquaintances. He was born in German, October 15, 1832. His parents died when he was a small child and he was taken by his relatives, who brought him to years of maturity. When he was about twenty-four years of age, he learned of the country across the sea, and, gathering together his all, he set sail for America, where he landed in 1856.

For a short time, he worked in New Jersey, on a farm, and then went to Cincinnati, near where he followed the same work for five years. He married in 1858 to Mary Eich, a native of Germany. In 1861 they moved to Illinois and settled in Woodford county. When the great war came on he enlisted, in August of 1861, in Company "K", Forty-fourth Illinois Infantry. He served three years and was in many hard-fought battles, receiving a painful wound at the battle of Chickamauga. In 1864, after three long years of hard service, he was discharged and returned home to Illinois, where, for some time, he was engaged in the saw-mill business.

In 1869, Mr. Carl moved his family to Kansas and settled on a claim nine miles northeast of Coffeyville, where he has since remained. His farm consists of four hundred and eighty acres of the best land in the county, and, on it, has been erected a good residence, a large barn and good substantial out-buildings. The place is well shaded with native trees, which Mr. Carl himself planted. At the beginning of his residence in this state, the place was wild, being over-run with Indians, and it was hard to get provisions and other needed articles from Humboldt, as all these had to be hauled by wagon. After overcoming all obstacles--grass-hoppers, chinch-bugs, etc.--he finally reached a position where he could rest, and turn the farm over to his sons. Until later years, Mr. Carl has handled large herds of stock, but dropped this industry, also, with his retirement from the farm.

Mrs. Carl died, in 1888, at the age of fifty years, leaving six children: William, Matthias, Joseph, Clara, wife of Herbert Dixon; Annie, deceased; and Ella, at home and the house-keeper for her father and brothers; Annie was the wife of Jacob Staats and lived in Coffeyville until she died, leaving one child, Carl Staats.

F. N. BENDER -- Well and most favorably known to the building trades of Independence and esteemed as a citizen, we present F. N. Bender's life work, in brief, as a factor in the internal development of the county seat. Comparatively young in years, but old and trained in experience in the craft, his efforts have accomplished much, as a more detailed account of his career would reveal.

He was born in Fulton county, Illinois, of parents, Tobias and Elizabeth (Sinclair) Bender, the father a retired cabinet-maker, of Kansas City,

and a leading member of the M. E. church. Tobias Bender was born in Dauphin county, Pennsylvania, in 1830, and began his wanderings toward the setting sun, before the era of railways, some time in the 40's. His trip carried him down the Ohio river, up the Mississippi and Illinois rivers, to Peoria, where he settled and resided till about 1856, when he moved to Fulton county, Ill. In 1882, he came to Kansas and resided on a farm, near Independence, till 1897, when he removed to the city which is now his home. His wife was born in the State of Pennsylvania, in 1836, and is a devoted mother and Christian lady. She is the mother of ten children, four of whom yet survive, as follows: Mary, wife of Robert Swartz, of Kansas City, Kansas; F. N., of this article; Jacob S., of Kansas City, a plate-glass worker and an inventor of some note; Edward, in the same business with Jacob, in Kansas City.

The birth of F. N. Bender occurred August 11, 1860. His education was acquired in the Illinois public schools and, at the youthful age of thirteen, began to learn his trade. He continued it, zealously, till he had acquired a wide knowledge of carpenter and cabinet work and then became a journeyman carpenter. He took up planing-mill work in 1886, in Kansas City, where he went that year, remaining some ten years. As a builder in Independence, he has filled contracts on some of the good structures of the city, dwellings and business houses, and his work has shown him to be master of the trade he follows.

July 3, 1884, Mr. Bender married Emma Belle Mills, a daughter of Elisha and Margaret (Burns) Mills, native, respectively, of New York and Pennsylvania. Mr. Mills was a hotel man in Davenport and Buffalo, Iowa, and, from 1873 to 1883, in Independence, Kansas. He was born October 24, 1818, and died December 4, 1901, in Independence. His first wife was Miss Parker, who bore him six children, of which number three yet live, viz: Mark, of Colorado; George, of Renwick, Iowa; and Charles of Ida Falls, Idaho. Three of the seven children, born of his second marriage, survive Mr. Mills, namely; Mrs. Bender, Lyle L., of Salt Lake, Utah, and Ernest, of Independence, Kansas. Mrs. Bender's mother was first married to Thomas Walker and has four children living by that union, as follows; Thomas, of Joplin, Missouri; David, of Coffeyville, Kansas; Josephine, widow of John S. James, of Davenport, Iowa; and Laura, widow of C. W. Middleton, resides in Independence. Mr. and Mrs. Bender's children are Clyde M., deceased at ten years; Hazel Urma, Lila Marie, Oscar N. and Harry.

Mr. Bender has passed all the chairs in local Oddfellowship. He is a member of the Woodmen, Red Men and Elks. He was elected a member of the Board of Education of Independence, in 1902, and is a Republican in politics.

Mr. Bender is a musician of some note and is a member of the Independence Concert Bank, of which he is president, and is an alto player.

Know all men by these presents that I do hereby think proper to make this my last will and testament this third day of July One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty Seven and first it is my will that all debts and funeral expenses shall be paid, and further it is my will that all my lands shall be divided between my son Mathew Vanduyne and Isaac Vanduyne's children, to be divided as they may agree there to and further it is my will that all my goods and Chattels shall be sold and the money arising from the sale there of shall be divided to my four daughter's children as hereafter mentioned that is to say to Mary SEWARD late Mary Vanduyne, to Elizabeth HUNT late Elizabeth Vanduyne, to Charlotte MARTIN late Charlotte Vanduyne, and also Sarah SHEPARD late Sarah Vanduyne that is to say to the children of the four before mentioned daughter's children equal as the law directs to each daughter's children at the same proportion as though they were all living at the time of my death and further I do hereby nominate, constitute and appoint David CONGER & Jotham CLARK to be my exectors of this my last will and testament the day and year first written above.
