

Researching Old Newspapers

As one looks about the city or community where he or she resides, it is interesting to note the older houses that still remain intact. The researcher is often curious to discover the date of construction, original owners, as well as any changes or modifications that have occurred in the past. This article, intitled "Last Year's Building Boom." was copied from the January 2, 1889 edition of The Coffeyville Journal. It will be noted that these structures were for the most part built during 1888 or nearly one hundred years ago.

Among other things that the reader may determine are such conclusions as: The Willard Hotel was named for its owner Willard S. Upham; At least a portion of the "Plaza Building", that is, that part referred to as "Perkins Opera House" or north end of the Plaza area, was constructed during the summer of 1888; the handsome residence of George Slosson at the corner of 9th and Willow Streets, later became the Skinner-Hamlin Funeral Home. It is presently the site of the First Baptist Church; the Long-Bell Lumber Company mentioned here was located on the south-east corner of 8th and Maple Streets, now occupied by the Columbia Building. Other interesting facts are the mention of the Kansas City Pressed Brick and Terra Cotta Co. being moved here. The school house mentioned near the cemetery may have been the Spalding School.

It is conceded that no city of its size in this part of the country, has enjoyed a more healthful growth than Coffeyville. There has been a constant influx of population, a continued march of improvement, an increasing accumulation of wealth; and prosperity has flowed upon us, in an ever-rising, ever swelling stream. This has been the result of no evanescent "boom" but a healthful increase due to our advantageous situation and the enterprise of our citizens. While this is incontrovertible, few realize the wonderful rapidity and extent of our growth. The city has been reaching out in all directions and her streets are being solidly built up with beautiful homes. Journal reporter has taken the trouble to inquire of some of our builders and contractors and as a result has compiled the following list, of business and dwelling houses, constructed during the year 1888:

Barndollars had built for them a new store room, between their old building and the hardware store. It is a two story, brick structure, 22x85, with an expensive galvanized iron front and large plate glass show windows. It was erected at a cost of \$2,500, the side walls being those of the two buildings above mentioned. It was erected for their clothing and furnishing department and has a commodious and convenient show room on the lower floor, with a ware room above.

Perkins operahouse building owned by 'Squire Perkins, was constructed during the summer. It is a two-story brick structure with roomy basements and is about sixty feet wide by sixty long. The upper story is fitted up for an opera house and fills a long felt want in this city. The ground floor is occupied by various business men and a billiard hall, and barber shop are run in the basement. It is a very handsome building. C. M. Wilson did the wood work.

The Willard hotel was put up by W. S. Upham, Reuben Hess being the contractor. It contains twenty two rooms and is two stories in height. It is a convenient and very creditable structure.

J. R. Hall has put up a 23x40 two story brick block with basement on 9th street, just west of Bump's grocery store. It contains two business rooms on the lower floor, one occupied by Mr. Hall as a tailor shop and by Mr. Bradford's jewelry store, the other by Mr. Ullom as a confectionery shop. The second story is divided into office apartments and Mr. Ullom has one of the basement rooms and Mr. Hypes, the barber, occupies the other. The building cost about

\$3000 and was constructed by J. O. Pierce. It has an iron columns and a plate glass front.

W. H. Clark, the second-hand store man has just moved into his new building on 8th st, west of the McCoy building. It is 25x65, one story in height and is of stone with a brick and iron front. J. O. Pierce was the contractor and the building is worth about \$4000.

George Slosson has one of the handsomest and costliest residences in the city. It was completed during the summer at a cost of about \$10,000, Mr. Gault having charge of its construction. It is located on the corner of 9th and Willow, is two stories high, with and attic and basement, and contains about twelve rooms. The first floor rooms are finished in cherry and oak, the second in yellow pine and the entire building is oil finished. In this respect it is probably the finest structure in this part of the country. It is heated by steam throughout.

Elmer Gano has just finished a very handsome one story cottage on Spruce street, near the Missouri Pacific depot. It contains four rooms and cost in the neighborhood of \$1,000.

The colored Baptist have erected a frame church in the north part of the city--cost about \$500.

J. O. Pierce built, for his own occupancy, a twelve hundred dollar, two story house on Spruce st. It contains eight rooms and is neat and comfortable.

W. A. Stuckey has a new house in Upham's addition, put up during the past year.

Mrs. Annie Keller has a very neat residence in the same part of the city.

John Stuckey has had built for him a new house on Willow street.

George Barndollar has had two cosy tenant houses erected in Upham's South Park addition, on Willow street. One was put up by Hess and is about 20x44 in size and cost about \$500. The other is similar in size and value and was build by Mr. Orb.

'Squire Lander's house, on the same street, was completed about the first of last January and is a neat one story structure.

Charlie Glass has a very pretty house next to Lander's and of about the same dimensions.

Chas. Beers, formerly of this city, completed a very neat house on the same street about the same date when ____Lander's was finished.

_____Overman has built a \$500 house on Spruce street.

J. C. Crouch is just having finished, for his occupancy, a pretty little three room cottage on 12th street.

A. J. Sullivan has greatly improved his place south of town by the construction of a 24x40 barn, costing \$400. Mr. Black supervised the building of it.

Cooper & Gibson during the past year built a neat residence for B. Williams, on Spruce street.

- J. N. Sandafer built a residence on Spruce street during the summer. It is now owned by Anthony Voge.
- C. C. Levan has built a very pretty \$600 residence, on Walnut st. He has also improved his property by the construction of a good barn.

Mrs. Walter has built a six room house on Beech st.

J. N. Sandafer has completed a very good house on Beech street.

George Cameron is having a good building erected on Beech street. C. M. Wilson is the contractor.

Mr. Closson, of the Farmers' store has built himself a very nice residence on the same street.

J. W. Hawkins, who has lately come in from the country, has a new residence, It is a two story structure, containing seven rooms and was built by C. M. Wilson. It is a pleasant and commodious residence and cost about \$2000.

Mr. Zubar has a fine new house, in the south part of the city. It was constructed by Sandafer Bros.

D. W. Stevenson is the present owner of a house built by A. J. Sullivan, on 7th and Pine streets. It is 22x22 and cost about \$500%

Mrs. Bennett is now occupying a \$500 home on 8th street, completed about the first of last January.

Wm. Graham has a new house on 10th st. It cost about \$500.

C. S. Pellett has an \$800 residence on 10th st, in the same block as Mr. Graham's. It, too, was completed last winter.

Elmer E. Wilson has a new residence in Osborne's last addition. It is 28x28, one story, and cost about \$1000. C. M. Wilson is the contractor.

'Squire Perkins is having a large barn, built on his property, on 9th st. It is 16x24 with a 14x16 wing. C. M. Wilson is constructing it

B. F. Black built a one story, four room residence on 1st st, costing \$800.

Rufus Miller has a new house on 2nd st. It is one story, has three rooms and was built by Black; cost about \$400.

Mr. Black built for Lewark & Kloehr a similar house, in same vicinity; cost about \$400.

Mr. Eastman has a neat little house on Willow street, built this year.

Mr. Black constructed, for Dr. Tallman, a two room addition to his residence on 8th st, at a cost of about \$400. It was finished up in good style and adds to the appearance of the Doctor's property.

Robert Hendon build a 16x18, story and a half house at the corner of 6th and Cedar streets, Black being the architect.

Mr. Black also built, for rental purposes, two four hundred dollar houses, on 2nd street.

C. I. Moon is having his house just east of the city reconstructed in such a manner that it will be virtually a new building. It is being re-sided, re-roofed and is to have new doors and windows. In addition an ell, 16x18 is being constructed. When completed it will be a first class house. The improvements amount to about \$1000.

Isaac Reynolds has built himself a home on 7th street. It is 16x28, one and a half stories, and contains four rooms.

C. M. Wilson has built a shop for his own use, on the corner of 7th and main. It is 18x40 feet and contains ample space for all his indoor work.

Albert Hollingsworth's house, in the Northeast part of town has been improved by a kitchen addition to the main building.

The Long-Bell Lumber Co's office has been refitted and rearranged, by M. N. Anderson at a cost of about \$75.

J. R. Jordan, the harness maker, has built a \$1000 dwelling, on 9th st. It is a two story structure containing eight good rooms, with several closets and is substantially built.
M. L. Miller was the contractor.

Mrs. L. Jordan is having a house built for her near the Missouri Pacific depot at a cost of about \$800. It contains six rooms and is a commodious structure, Sandafer Bros. being the contractors.

The Kansas City Pressed Brick and Terra Cotta Co. brought their plant to this city last spring and buildings, sheds etc were erected for them at an expense of about \$2,000. The entire plant is worth about \$15,000. Cooper & Gibson did the wood work.

A school house has been erected a short distance southwest of the city, near the cemetery, at an expense of about \$550.

W. S. Upham moved from up town an old business house, the interior of which he had partitioned off into apartments, for tenement purposes. It is located on Main street and accommodates five families.

This is a partial list, but besides those enumerated there are, doubtless, others which will be given next week if the owners, or contractors who built them, will notify us of the omission. Many thousands of dollars have, as we have shown, been put into substantial residence or business buildings; and, better than all, there is not a carpenter or contractor in the city but has a better prospect for 1889 than he had for 1888. They have already been asked to make estimates on a large number of buildings, either in the city or surrounding country, and believe that a greater number and more valuable buildings will be erected during the coming season than during any other in the history of Coffeyville.

Compiler's Note--The above article details some of the construction that occurred just prior to an era of increased commerce that prevailed during the 1890's and early 1900's.

This article appeared about the same time as the first Oklahoma Land Run. This event brought in an influx of new settlers to the adjacent area, and with them an increased demand for merchandise to supply their needs. Thus many of these citizens are merchants which were located in early-day Coffeyville. Along with the owners of these new structures may also be found the names of the following carpenters and contractors.

COYLE, John A. Born September 13th, 1872, at Petersburg, Pennsylvania. Entered service of The Prairie Oil & Gas Company July 1st, 1911, as Scout and continued until January 1st, 1916, when he entered service of The Prairie Pipe Line Company as Gauger. October 1st, 1918, promoted to Chief Gauger at Tulsa, Oklahoma. June 30th, 1921, appointed District Foreman at Nowata, Oklahoma. Continuous service date July 1st, 1911.

CRANE, Fred A. Born February 22nd, 1896, at Sapulpa, Oklahoma. Entered service of The Prairie Oil & Gas Company May 13th, 1914, as Clerk in General Office at Independence, Kansas. February 1st, 1915, transferred to The Prairie Pipe Line Company, in the same capacity. August 1st, 1917, to April 1st, 1919, had service with United States Army. Re-entered service of the Company April 1st, 1919, as Gauger in F.D. No. 19. November 15th, 1920, transferred to General Office at Independence, Kansas, as Clerk, and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date May 3rd, 1914.

CRAWFORD, William F. Born July 18th, 1855, at Tilden, Illinoios. Entered service of the Company June 25th, 1916, as Assistant Engineer in F.D. No. 1. September 25th, 1916, promoted to Operator and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date June 25th, 1916.

CRIMMEL, Henry W. Born June 14th, 1898, at Lima, Ohio. Entered service of the Company July 1st, 1916, as Clerk in General Office, at Independence, Kansas. July 1st, 1917, to March 1st, 1918, had service with United States Army. Reentered service of the Company March 1st, 1918, as Telegrapher in General Office. May 27th, 1920, at his own request, transferred to F.D. No. 1, as Telegrapher, and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date July 1st, 1916.

CRITCHFIELD, Charles E. Born August 28th, 1869, at Philsons, Pennsylvania. Entered service of Southern Pipe Line Company July 2nd, 1890, continuing with that Company as Laborer, Fireman and Engineer until March 2nd, 1905, when he entered the service of The Prairie Oil & Gas Company, as Chief Engineer on Northern Division. February 1st, 1915, transferred to The Prairie Pipe Line Company, in the same capacity, and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date July 2nd, 1890.

CRITZ, Fred M. Born January 29th, 1879, at Memphis, Missouri. Entered service of The Prairie Oil & Gas Company January 1st, 1905, as Laborer on Northern Division. November 20th, 1906, promoted to Fireman. February 1st, 1914, promoted to Tour Engineer and February 1st, 1915, transferred to The Prairie Pipe Line Company, in the same capacity, having been in continuous service up to present time. Continuous service date January 1st, 1905.

CROLL, Emmett V. Born August 7th, 1897, at Clinton, Arkansas. Entered service of the Company August 1st, 1918, as Laborer in F.D. No. 1, and is acting in that capacity at present time. Continuous service date August 1st, 1918.

CRONIN, Frank Born August 23rd, 1882, at Portville, New York. Entered service of The Prairie Oil & Gas Company June 1st, 1914, as Laborer in F.D. No. 3. February 1st, 1915, transferred to The Prairie Pipe Line Company, in the same capacity. June 1st, 1915, promoted to Assistant Gauger, continuing as such, in various districts, until September 1st, 1918, since which time he has been employed as Gauger, Laborer and at present is Gauger in F.D. No. 22. Continuous service date June 1st, 1914.

<u>DAINES</u>, John M. Born June 13th, 1887, at Shefferton on Thamed, England. Had broken service with The Prairie Oil & Gas Company and The Prairie Pipe Line Company from February, 1912 to 1915. Entered service of The Prairie Pipe Line Company June 1st, 1916, as Fireman on Northern Division. September 20th, 1917, to April 18th, 1919, had service with United States Army.

Reentered service of the Company April 18th, 1919, as Fireman on Northern Divison and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date June 1st, 1916.

DANCY, John W. Born July 23rd, 1866, at Saybrook, Illinois. Entered service of The Prairie Oil & Gas Company April 25th, 1910, as Operator on Northern Division, continuing with that Company until February 1st, 1915, when he was transferred to The Prairie Pipe Line Company, in the same capacity, and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date April 25th, 1910.

DARBY, Henry S. Born July 15th, 1894, at Conneautiville, Pennsylvania. Entered serivce of the Prairie Oil & Gas Company May 1st, 1914, as Clerk at Argo Station. July 10th, 1914, transferred to Eastland, Texas, Office in the same capacity. February 1st, 1915, transferred to The Prairie Pipe Line Company, as Accountant of Field Offices and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date May 1st, 1914.

<u>DAUB</u>, John A. Born December 15th, 1875, at Washburn, Illinois. Entered service of The Prairie Oil & Gas Company February 2nd, 1905, as Laborer, but not considered a regular employee until October 1st, 1907, when he was classed as Linewalker. February 1st, 1915, transferred to The Prairie Pipe Line Company, in the same capacity, and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date October 1st, 1907.

DAUGHERTY, David Hugh Born January 6th, 1869, at Lowry City, Missouri. Had service with The Prairie Oil & Gas Company and National Transit Company, in various capacities, from August 1st, 1905, to September 1st, 1911, when he severed his connection with these companies and entered the service of Wichita Pipe Line Company (Wyoming). Entered service of The Prairie Oil & Gas Company August 1st, 1913, as Tank Builder. February 1st, 1915, transferred to The Prairie Pipe Line Company had has since been employed in various districts as Laborer, Fireman, Engineer, Assistant Engineer and at present is Laborer in F.D. No. 3. Continuous service date August 1st, 1913.

DAUGHTREY, John R. Born November 20th, 1878, at Marion, Kentucky. Entered service of the Company July 1st, 1915, as Operator on Northern Division. December 1st, 1920 promoted to Ditch Inspector, continuing as such until May 1st, 1921, when he was classed as Operator. June 9th, 1924, promoted to Chief Deliveryman on Northern Division and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date July 1st, 1915.

<u>DAVASHER</u>, Theodore Born May 19th, 1869, at Scottville, Kentucky. Entered service of the Company October 19th, 1916, as Laborer in F.D. No. 3 and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date October 19th, 1916.

<u>DAVIDSON</u>, Otis E. Born February 17th, 1899, at Minco, Oklahoma. Entered service of the Company January 27th, 1917, and has since been employed as Laborer, Truck Driver and at present is Gauger in F.D. No. 29. Continuous service date January 27th, 1917.

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
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
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

Trip to Germany Gives Local Woman, Cousin Sense of Roots

Mildred Smith's genealogical research was given a boost last August when she and her husband, Robert K. "Bob" Smith, and her cousin, Bob Clements of Coffeyville, Kan., spent several days in Germany.

They visited the small farming community of Enniger, about 125 miles north of Frankfurt. It was from this area that Bernhard Heinrich Schockmann, greatgrandfather of Clements and Mrs. Smith, emigrated with his family to the United States in 1882

the United States in 1882.

Schockmann's wife had died in 1878. Four years later he and five of his children, some of them married and starting their own families, left their home in what was then Prussia and journeyed to America on the steamship Elbe. They came to Kansas and settled in the Coffeyville vicinity.

One of the children was Mrs. Smith's grandfather. Henry Schockmann was 21 years old at the time. The family had farmed in the Old Country, and most of them engaged in farming around Coffeyville.

Mrs. Smith, however, was born at Sapulpa, Okla., where her father, Herman Schockmann, was employed in the Sapulpa oil refinery. That refinery was purchased

early 1930s, apparently by (then Continental Oil Co.). Smith's father was one of abc employees transferred to Pc. City in 1932 to work for Conoco. retired in the late 1960s.

Last summer's trip marked th. Smiths' first visit to the land of her ancestors, but she was prepared for it by her research on the family tree since 1975. Contact with relatives in Germany, however, had been lost for about 50 years after members of the older generation died.

But Mrs. Smith knew the area the family had come from, and she wrote letters hoping to find out if any relatives were still around. One letter went to the Catholic Church, and one of the two responses came from the priest there, Father Hamburger.

The Americans were warmly welcomed and were treated almost like celebrities, according to Mrs. Smith. Among the people they met was Franz Holtrup, grandson of a sister of Henry Schockmann, Mrs. Smith's grandfather. The sister, Elizabeth, had already married when the others left for America and decided not to accompany them.

Moltrup, who lived in another small community down the road from Enniger, cannot speak English and his American cousin doesn't know the German language. But they enjoyed their visit, thanks to Gertrude Woerst, who served as their interpreter.

Gertrude is the daughter of the present owner of the farm sold by Bernhard Heinrich Schockmann when he left for America. She is employed by the West German government in Bonn, and speaks both En-

glish and German.

The Americans visited the original home and barn built in 1864 by Mrs. Smith's great-grandfather. The two-story, red brick house, has a wine cellar and a red tile roof. But it has been used for storage since a new house was constructed in 1979.

Unfortunately, the furniture that Great-Grandfather Schockmann left behind when he went to America is too large to fit into the new home. The huge barn sheltered 200 pigs when the Smiths were there.

The Americans were shown around the premises by a granddaughter of the man who bought the home and farmland from Schockmann. His name was Woerst, and the property has remained in his

family since that time.

Mrs. Smith found records showing that the Schockmanns had been in and around the small farm community of Enniger since the middle 1600s. She was assisted in getting other family information by Father Hamburger, a local Catholic priest

who took them into his home where births, deaths, marriages and other family records of the parishioners

are kept.

Five daughters of Anna and Aloys Schockmann, distant relatives of Mrs. Smith, took the visitors on several side trips so they could see property and people involved in the

family history.

A reporter, Egon Stutenkemper, interviewed them for a story that appeared in the newspaper there. The reporter also seemed to be the historian for the area, and had written a book covering 750 years of its history. He presented Mrs. Smith with a copy of the book - published, unfortunately, in German. She was able to provide some information that Stutenkemper plans to use in a second book he is writing.

A cousin had some old documents and legal papers dating back 150 years which the Ponca City woman copied for her own use. They showed that her great-grandfather had to get permission of the government, and to have sold his property, before being permitted to leave the

country.

The old Schockmann family lived for many years in the southeast part of Cherokee Township.
