

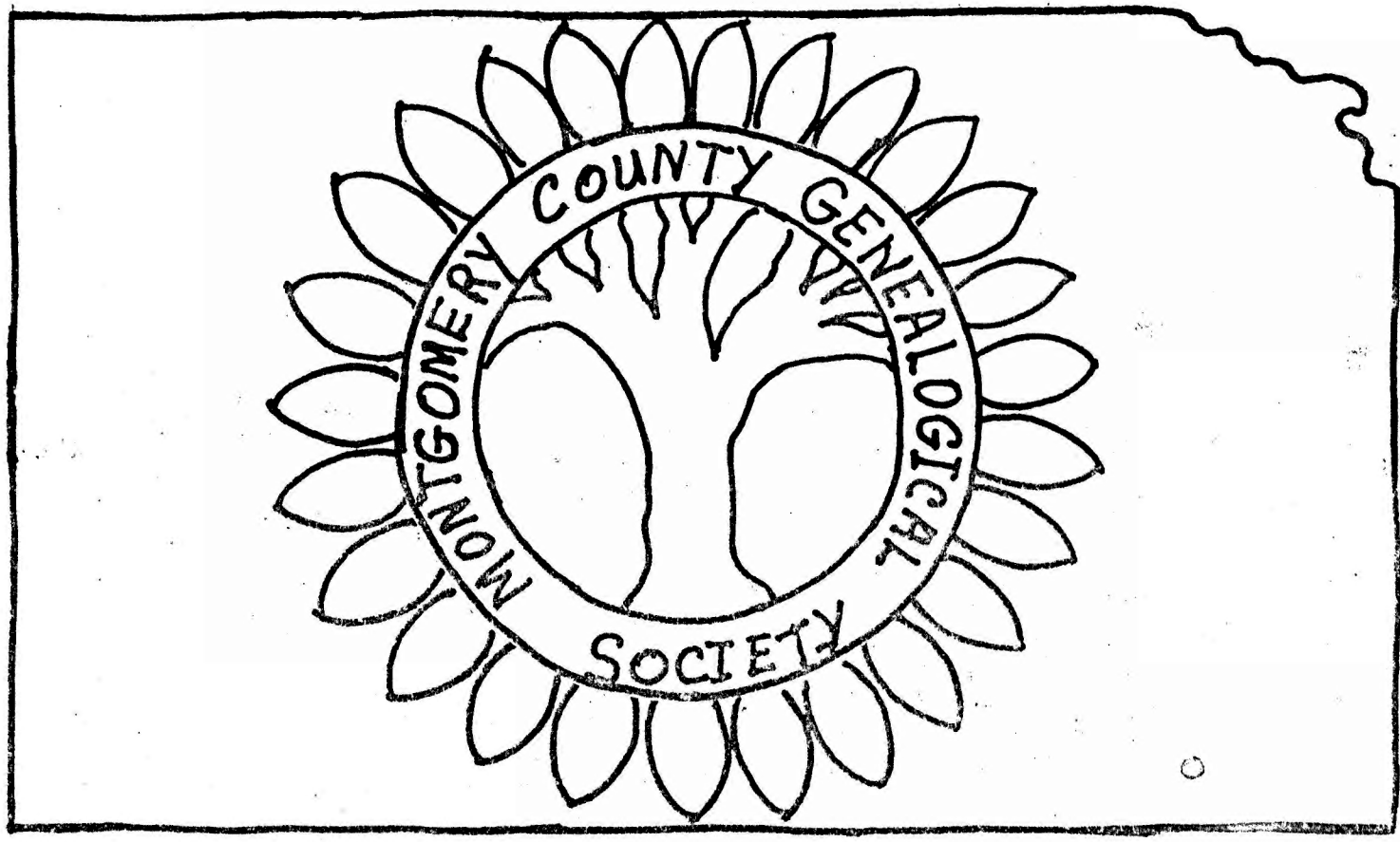

## Researching Old Newspapers

By Carl Rauch

This eleventh in a series of articles concerning information obtained from old newspapers, examines the reporting of a large fire, on Thursday 3 Jan 1895 by editor D. Stewart Elliott of The Coffeyville (KS) Daily Journal. Since many names are mentioned in newspaper stories about fires, floods, explosions and other disasters they are well worth reading for the genealogy researcher. Local history books usually supply the dates of such events. The next step is to locate the newspaper article from the given date and the rest is up to you. Many old newspapers may be found on microfilm.

"FIRE! BRICK BUSINESS BLOCK BURNED. A TERRIBLE LOSS.  
FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS GO UP IN SMOKE. FIERCE FLAMES.  
SEVERAL OF THE BEST PROPERTIES IN THE CITY DESTROYED.  
FOUR MEN INJURED. HEROISM OF THE BUCKET BRIGADE--THE LOSSES AND  
INSURANCE--INCIDENTS OF THE TERRIBLE CATASTROPHE--MINOR DETAILS.

"Shortly after four o'clock on the morning of the third day of the new year, our city was again visited by a most dreadful catastrophe. Splendid buildings, which represent the labor of many hands for months, and the savings of the owners for years, are in ruins. The fire fiend has again escaped from confinement, and has left a scene of chaos and terrible destruction to mark his course through the city. The Matthew-Hall block, for the second time in its history, presents a scene of disaster, which, to the lover of architecture, is awful to contemplate. The once handsome two and three story brick structures, which so gracefully reared their heads above their more inferior surroundings, are leveled to the ground, except a few bare walls which stand alone, broken, smoke-begrimmed, and resembling specters brooding over the scene of disaster. The scene which presents itself, is bewildering. The streets are lined with the contents of the burned buildings for blocks each way, while the owners are moving distractedly about



in a state of excitement which touches the hearts of all. Dr. T. F. Campbell, who with his family occupied apartments on the second floor of the Hall-Matthew building, was the first person to discover the fire. The thick, black smoke which came rolling into the room, aroused him, and caused him to quickly awaken his wife and child and make hasty preparations for working their escape from the burning building. Dr. Campbell says that the fire originated either in the Big Racket, or in the room occupied by Chas. Lowry, as an office, on the second floor of the structure. After he had conducted his family to a place of safety, he secured a gun and fired several shots, and with the aid of his voice succeeded in attracting the attention of the nightwatchman and several other citizens. The alarm soon became general, and in an incredible short space of time the streets were packed with an immense crowd of people, eager to assist in the work of saving life and property from the ravages of the hungry flames. When the people arrived in force, the flames had gained such headway that to extinguish them was an impossibility. The buildings burned fiercely and soon the noise of falling walls followed by the angry hiss of the flames, as they darted and leaped up anew, was heard on every hand. The crowd was apparently paralyzed, and with good reason, for it would have been madness to have ventured inside any of the buildings, as was demonstrated in several instances, and one in particular, which will probably result in the death of a poor fellow who in a moment of enthusiasm allowed his impulse to get the better of reason, and dashed boldly through the smoke and flames and into Briet's store in an attempt to save some of the contents of the building. Hardly had he gained the inside, when the south wall of the adjoining building fell in with a crash, and buried him completely under the mass of brick and plaster. Two other men, Joe Reynolds, of this city, and C. L. McFadden, of Parsons, followed the lead of the first man and were also struck and severely bruised by the falling brick, but they fought their way through the mass of debris to the rear of the store, where Reynolds kicked out a window sash and the two men escaped. They gave the alarm of the accident to their companion and a party of brave fellows went to the rescue and after a season of hard work succeeded in releasing the unfortunate man from his predicament. He was taken to a room over the Silver Moon restaurant and medical assistance called. Upon examination by Drs. Kuder and Campbell it was learned that he was badly hurt. The injuries consist of a compound fracture of the skull and a complete smashing up of the left leg, which will probably necessitate amputation. At this writing the man, whose name is Perry Easley, of Skiatook, I. T., was resting as easy as possible and under the influence of sedatives. Joe Reynolds and McFadden each sustained slight injuries while making the leap from the window. Other parties corroborate the statements in regard to the place where the fire originated, but none can state positively the cause of the blaze. All agree, however, that it was the result of accident or carelessness on the part of unknown persons. During the progress of the fire, blazing brands and coals were carried for blocks by the force of the strong breeze which was blowing from the south at the time, and but for the fact that the roofs of the buildings were covered with snow several other valuable buildings would have been destroyed. Some of the men labored incessantly, and as

a result of their efforts, a considerable amount of goods and fixtures of the various establishments farthest away from the starting point of the fire, were saved. The losses of the merchants and owners of the burned buildings are variously estimated at from \$50,000 to \$75,000. Following are the estimated losses and the amounts of insurance, as far as we have been able to get them: J. R. Hall, Loss \$11,000, Insurance \$7,000; Tower Jewelry Co., Loss \$2,000, Insurance \$1,000; Dr. Doering, Loss \$1,200, Insurance \$300; The Blackman, Loss \$200, Insurance None; Richards & Lewis, Loss \$800, Insurance \$300; Bonanza Shoe Store, Loss \$6,000, Insurance \$3,000; Big Racket, Loss \$6,000, Insurance \$4,400; Jos. Savage, Loss \$3,000, Insurance \$2,500; Wm. Breit, Loss \$3,500, Insurance \$1,900; Henry Schockman, Loss \$150, Insurance None; Henry Vermehren, Loss \$300, Insurance None; J. H. Matthew, Loss \$6,500, Insurance \$3,000; C. R. Scoville, Loss \$350, Insurance None; E. M. Kane, Loss \$6,000, Insurance \$4,000; Dr. T. F. Campbell, Loss \$250, Insurance None; M. W. A. Lodge, Loss \$450, Insurance \$300; A. O. U. W. Lodge, Loss \$150, Insurance None; Select Friends Lodge, Loss, \$150, Insurance None; R. N. of A Lodge, Loss \$100, Insurance None; K. and L. of S. Lodge, Loss \$100, Insurance None; T. C. Harbourt, Loss \$200, Insurance None; C. H. Lowry, Loss \$300, Insurance \$150; N. M. Jansen, Loss \$300, Insurance None; P. Of A. Lodge, Loss, \$150, Insurance None; J. Zeller, Loss \$100, Insurance None.

"In addition to the above, are the losses of several others which we have not been able to get at the time of going to press. During the progress of the blaze, the old Barricklow building, across the street, caught on fire several times and but for the prompt arrival of the bucket brigade, would now undoubtedly be a heap of smoldering embeis. Those of the merchants who possessed fire proof safes, found upon opening them that their valuables were not injured. Six secret societies used the top story of the Hall building as a lodge room, and each one suffered the loss of their records and paraphernalia. The loss of their goods is to the sufferers from the fire, by no means the greatest catastrophe. The length of time they must necessarily remain out of business and the dropping off in trade on that account must also be taken into consideration. The unfortunate ones have the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community, in their hour of affliction, and any aid which can be rendered will be gladly bestowed upon them.

"The fire originated in the building occupied by the Big Racket and extended both ways. The one story brick structure owned by Wm. Breit on the south was entirely destroyed and the next one owned by Henry Vermehren was damaged considerably. On the north, the double three story brick owned by J. R. Hall and J. H. Matthew was the next to make food for the hungry flames, and from thence the work of destruction extended west and entirely consumed the two buildings owned by J. R. Hall and occupied by the Tower Jewelry Co., and Chas. R. Scoville's barber shop. The basements of the last two named buildings were occupied by Jas. Hayden's gun shop, and the Blackman printing office, respectively, while the top stories of the buildings were occupied by Dr. L. L. Landon as a dental office and family apartments. When the fiery element reached the building occupied by Manson's grocery store, it encountered a strong fire wall, and further progress was rendered impossible.



"The material and fixtures of THE JOURNAL office were considerably shaken up during the fire. We made preparations to save some things, and at one time it looked as though we had but a few moments in which to do the saving. The result was what might be expected when an inexperienced hand takes hold of a galley of loose type. The mixture was not very serious in its effects, but it was enough to cause some delay and confusion. Nevertheless, the DAILY JOURNAL is out at the usual hour and with an unusual amount of news.

---

"Kane's Drug store was one of the finest establishments of the kind in this section of the State. Nothing was saved from it, comparatively speaking. We sincerely sympathize with our neighbor over his great loss. He has the advantage of youth and vigor on his side, and will continue the fight for a high place in the mercantile world.

---

"The Modern Woodmen Camp Lost its Entire Outfit.

Six fraternal organizations were the victims of the disastrous fire of Thursday morning. The principal sufferer was Coffeyville Camp No. 665, M. W. A. This organization was the lessee of the third floor of the Matthew-Hall building, and owned the furniture therein. They had a well furnished reception room and chairs and elegant rooms for their purposes. Not a thing was saved from the hall. The records were in one of the desks, and were consumed along with the other stuff. Two organs and all of the secret work fixtures and paraphernalia were burned. Portraits of C. T. Connelly and G. B. Cubine, deceased members of the Camp, were among the valuable things destroyed. A fine crayon portrait of the present presiding officer also went up in the smoke. The individual members will not suffer on account of the loss of the records. A new roster will be secured, but the minutes and other valuable papers cannot be replaced. The actual loss to the Camp will be about four hundred and fifty dollars, on which there was an insurance of three hundred dollars. The Woodmen are a nifty set, and they will get together and start in fresh just as soon as a room can be obtained. The membership numbers one hundred and fifty good fellows, who will not let their organization lag for a moment.

"Royal Neighbors of America

The officers of C. T. Connelly Camp No. 77, R. N. A., were formally installed on Wednesday evening, by Mrs. C. J. Elliott, Grand Oracle, assisted by Mrs. May Kauffman as Grand Marshal. The following were duly installed for the present year: Oracle--Mrs. Nona V. Glass; Vice Oracle--Mrs. Ella Hine; Recorder--Miss Josie Hine; Receiver--Mrs. Sarah Connelly; Chancellor--Mrs. J. K. Gamble; Marshal--Mrs. E. C. Weaver; Inside Sentinel--Mrs. Carrie Young; Outside Sentinel--Miss Floy Buckles; Managers--Mrs. C. J. Elliott, Mrs. E. C. Case and Mrs. J. W. Cubine.

"The camp closed with the members in excellent spirits, but the following morning's sun found the organization without a home. They lost their supplies and furniture, but the plucky women have not lost courage. The Royal Neighbors will live for years to come.

"A Girl Shot.

The fourteen year old daughter of L. Warner, living in the north part of the city, was accidentally shot Thursday morning by her little brother who was playing with a revolver that he "didn't know was loaded." The ball entered the left shoulder and produced a painful though not dangerous wound. Dr. Wood rendered medical aid.

"A. O. U. W. Notice

We will meet Friday evening, Jan. 4th in Davis & Co's Grain office, over the First National Bank. A full attendance is requested. Business of importance. W. J. Baber, J. W. Cubine, M. W. Recorder.

---

"We sympathize with Editor Driver, of the Blackman, over the loss of his printing outfit. He was just beginning to get his paper fairly before the people in a highly creditable manner. With characteristic Kansas pluck, he has already commenced to pull himself together, and by the first of next month we expect to read the Blackman again.

---

"John Waggoner, the proprietor of the 12 o'clock Lunch Room, on South Walnut street, was in Winfield when the fire occurred and on his return Thursday afternoon was considerably surprised to find his place of business in a state of confusion and the adjoining buildings in ruins.

---

"In the multiplicity of losses we almost overlooked the destruction of the new fruit stand of Comrade Zeller, on the North side of Kane's store. He lost everything that he had in stock amounting to over one hundred dollars. The crippled veteran is a good subject for sympathy.

---

"The owner of THE JOURNAL desires to express a deep sense of gratitude to the brave men who so efficiently worked to stay the flames at the eastern fire wall of the block. Their efforts were successful, and to them we owe much for the fact that we have a roof over us at this writing.

---

"The Royal Neighbors of America lost their entire paraphernalia, with the possible exception of the rituals of the order, which had been taken out to be bound. They will secure new supplies and keep up their organization.

---

"Several very narrow escapes were made by a number of persons during the fire. The falling walls came very near catching some of the more venturesome ones who were trying to stay the flames.

---

"The ruined walls of the buildings in the burned district were leveled to the ground after the fire, to prevent accidents in case of the r falling.

---

"Orville Scurr is carrying one eye in a sling. He ran afoul of a cinder at the fire.

---

"The people who occupied the burned buildings deserved a better fate. They are entitled to sympathy.

---

"Perry Easley, the man injured at the fire, is resting somewhat at this writing. He is badly, and it is feared, seriously injured.

---

"Uncle" Joe Hayden, the gunsmith suffered the loss of most of his tools and also a number of guns which were in various stages of repairs.

---

"The fire was the result of throwing a large number of deserving, and in some instances, dependent people, out of a job. We sincerely sympathize with all such.

---

"Thursday, January 3d, 1895, will be remembered by many of the citizens of Coffeyville, for years to come, as one of the most disastrous days in the history of the city.

---

"Dr. Hall made the closing address at the installation of the Royal Neighbors camp on Wednesday evening. His speech did not fire the building, but it was the last to be heard within the walls of the Woodmen Hall.

---

"From perils by fire" THE JOURNAL has escaped for a fourth time in less than three years. For all of which we are grateful to a very kind Providence. Buildings have burned all around us, and Masonic Block now numbers only four structures.

---

"Perry Easley showed a courage equal to rashness in his efforts to save property from the burning building. He performed the whole duty of a brave and sympathetic man, and deserves the best care and treatment that can be given to him by our citizens.

---

"THE JOURNAL escaped again, as it by miracle, but it is a looser, nevertheless. A half dozen of our best advertisers and a score of our patrons in other departments are "out of business." so to speak, and our columns will be short of advertising matter to that extent.

---

"Mr. and Mrs. N. M. Janssen had a very narrow escape from death during the fire Thursday morning. They occupied a room over the Big Racket and barely had time to dress themselves and escape from a window to roof of the adjoining building, on the south, when the flames burst through the partition and into their room.

---

"H. H. Mathonet returned Wednesday evening from Edgerton, Kas. He informs us that the rumor in regard to his marriage with Miss Cordia Garrison, is true and that the event occurred on Christmas eve, at the residence of the bride's parents in Edgerton. The young groom is apparently quite happy over the successful termination of his love affair, and says he will return to the home of his bride in a few days.

---

"An example of the peculiar dispensations of Providence may be seen in the fact that five beautiful brick buildings, one of which was three stories high, lie in a mass of ruins on one corner, while just across the street an old ramshackle affair that is an eyesore to many persons, stands intact. We are glad, however, that it did not burn. Had the flames seized it, the buildings on the east side of the Plaza would have been in great peril.

---

"Fides Lodge No. 70, Order of Select Friends, lost their regalia and furniture. The records were in the possession of Dr. Wood, the secretary, and were saved. This is the fourth time that this lodge has been subject to the fire fiend. The first time the lodge suffered a total loss. The second and third times the room was only scorched. The fourth time was nearly as bad as the first. The lodge will hold its meetings regularly just as soon as a place can be secured.

---

"When matters looked the most dangerous for THE JOURNAL office, one of the attaches asked a young man who was in the office at the time, and who seemed very anxious to do something, to take an armful of the unbound files of the paper to a place of safety. Looking at the pile for a moment, he replied, "D---d if I'm going to carry out a lot of old papers, and be laughed at." Whereupon he took hold of one end of a heavy desk and lifted like a Trojan until he and his companion got it out of the building and half a block away.

"Attention, M. W. A.

"A Victim of the Big Fire.

Perry L. Easley died Saturday morning at 7:30 o'clock in a room over the Silver Moon restaurant, as a result of injuries

received from a falling brick wall, while so bravely endeavoring to save the contents of a burning building on the fateful occasion of the big fire on the morning of Jan. 24. The injured man never fully regained consciousness, and died in a comatose condition. He was delirious a short time before death, but at the approach of the dread messenger, he became calm and passed away peacefully. Drs. Campbell and Kuder were in constant attendance at his bedside and everything which medical skill could devise was done for him without avail. The deceased was even more badly injured than was at first supposed, as he sustained a concussion of the brain and an injury to the spine in connection with the other wounds previously reported. Easley was about thirty-five years of age and a widower. He was united in marriage to a Shawnee Indian woman about ten years ago. One daughter was the only issue of the union. The mother, died shortly after the birth of her daughter, at Skiatook, I. T. The relatives of the deceased were notified Friday but have not been heard from. The funeral occurred at four o'clock this afternoon from the Episcopal church. The services were conducted by Rev. L. L. Swan, rector of the church. The unfortunate man was given decent interment by the city council, the funeral being in charge of Lang & Lape, the undertakers.

DAVIS, Lewis T Born June 8th, 1861, in Scotland County, Missouri. Entered service of the Company March 28th, 1918, as Operator on Northern Division and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date March 28th, 1918.

DAVIS, Lloyd E. Born April 13th, 1886, at Warren, Wisconsin. Entered service of the Company September 10th, 1917, as Civil Engineer at General Office, Independence, Kansas, and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date September 10th, 1917.

DAVIS, Lon Born December 3rd, 1886, in the Indian Territory. Entered service of the Company August 15th, 1918, as Laborer, and has been in continuous service as such, in various districts, up to present time, now being in F.D. No. 31. Continuous service date August 15th, 1918.

DAVIS, Louis N. Born April 26th, 1893, at Grenola, Kansas. Entered service of the Company August 1st, 1917, as Laborer in F.D. No. 1, and has since been employed as Assistant Engineer, Warehouseman and at present is Laborer. Continuous service date August 1st, 1917.

DAWSON, Charles W. Born January 7th, 1880, at Elmwood, Illinois. Entered service of The Prairie Oil & Gas Company September 10th, 1906, as Laborer on Northern Division but not considered a regular employee until March 1st, 1908. October 1st, 1909, promoted to Fireman. February 1st, 1915, transferred to The Prairie Pipe Line Company, in the same capacity. April 1st, 1918, promoted to Tour Engineer on Northern Division and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date March 1st, 1908.

DAWSON, Thomas M. Born October 27th, 1879, in Persifer Township, Illinois. Entered service of The Prairie Oil & Gas Company March 1st, 1907, as Laborer, but not considered a regular employee until July 1st, 1907. February 2nd, 1908, promoted to Fireman. February 1st, 1915, transferred to The Prairie Pipe Line Company in the same capacity. June 1st, 1916, promoted to Tour Engineer on Northern Division and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date July 1st, 1907.

DECANNIERE, Albert F. Born November 8th, 1884, at Greeley, Kansas. Entered service of The Prairie Oil & Gas Company July 27th, 1907, as Laborer on Northern Division. July 1st, 1909, promoted to Fireman. February 1st, 1915, transferred to The Prairie Pipe Line Company, in the same capacity. Since November 14th, 1916, has been Tour Engineer and Painter, at present classed as Painter on Northern Division. Continuous service date July 27th, 1907.

DEDMAN, FLOYD E. Born August 18th, 1893, at Gregory, Missouri. Entered service of the Company December 15th, 1915, as Operator on Northern Division and has been in service up to present time. Continuous service date December 15th, 1915.

DEMOTT, Lawrence E. Born August 2nd, 1890, at Elk City, Kansas. Had broken service with The Prairie Oil & Gas Company, Kansas Natural Gas Company and The Prairie Pipe Line Company from March 11th, 1912, to July 8th, 1916. Entered service of The Prairie Pipe Line Company July 12, 1916, as Laborer in F.D. No. 15. 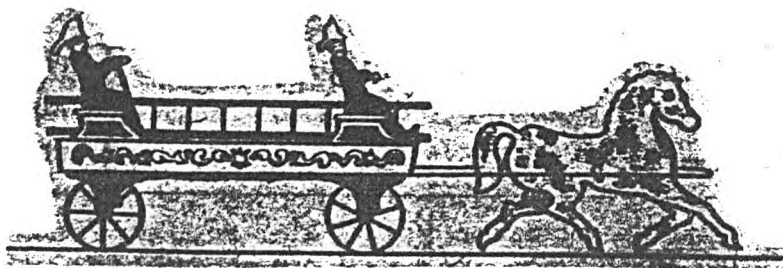
