

Fulton, Mo. Looking North




Store and blacksmith shop at Cote Sans Dessein (Hill Without Design), first settlement in Callaway County, later destroyed by flood. Front doors of this building now in Calwood store.



Robert M. Craighead home, built 1819-21 of bricks burnt on grounds by slaves. First Methodist Sunday school and church in the county were organized here. Three and one-half miles southeast of Fulton.



Taylor Arnold residence, first frame dwelling in the county, built 1822. North of Williamsburg.



George King residence. One mile north of New Bloomfield on Highway 54.



Wilson Hunt house, said to be among the first brick houses built in the county. Two and one-half miles southwest of Millersburg.



John Board house, built 1830-35. On gravel road between Bachelor and Shamrock.



St. Aubert's Hotel, St. Aubert's (town renamed Mokane July 6, 1896) When picture was taken (about 1905), it was the James F. Bradley home. Building torn down 1934.



Log cabin known as the Sieckman place, built many years before Civil War. Owned and occupied 1917-51 by Emanuel Klick; unoccupied since then. Only twostory log cabin still standing in Callaway County. Northeast of Bellamy Springs.



Bennett residence northwest of Hatton. Birthplace of Mrs. Champ Clark.



St. Mark's Episcopal School for Boys, overlooking Missouri River at Portland, 1890-1910.



Bella Vista, residence and office of Dr. George F. Rootes at Tebbetts. Picture taken about 1900.

Old Auxvasse Presbyterian Church, oldest Presbyterian church in county. Organized 1828; this building erected 1871. Four miles northeast of Calwood.




First Presbyterian Church, Fulton. Organized 1832; present building erected 1885.



Richland Baptist Church. Organized 1840; this building erected 1872. Seven miles north of Fulton.



New Richland Baptist Church (Negro). Present building erected 1883. Eight miles northwest of Fulton.



Court Street Methodist Church, organized 1821 in Robert M. Craighead home. This building (1859– 1901) stood on the site of the present church.



Prairie Chapel Methodist Church. Organized 1854; present building erected 1889. Nine miles northwest of Fulton.



Paris Fork Methodist Church. Organized about 1850; present building erected 1878. Said to be the oldest Negro church in county. Twelve miles west of Fulton.



First Baptist Church, Fulton. Organized 1854 in Mrs. Sally A. McCredie's home, now 832 Court St. Until 1883 congregation met in a stone building at Fifth and Ravine Streets, lower section of which was used for a girls' academy.



First Baptist Church, Fulton. The congregation's second building (1883-1909), it stood on the site of the present church.



Ebenezer Baptist Church, organized 1878. This picture taken 1911. Five miles northeast of Fulton.



First Christian Church, Fulton, organized 1833. This building (1883-1911) occupied site of present church.



German Evangelical Lutheran Church (now United Church of Christ), Fulton. Organized 1890; present building erected 1900.



Trinity Episcopal Church, 1009 West Avenue, Fulton. Organized and built 1908. "Deorganized and dormant 1928." Torn down 1935.



St. Peter's Catholic Church (1875-1900), 830 Nichols Street, Fulton. Moved to new building on Highway Z, 1956.



Calvary Baptist Church (Negro), Fulton. Organized 1866; present building erected 1917.



Second Christian Church (Negro), Fulton. Organized 1876; present building erected 1912.




Mrs. Viola Paschall, who taught 44 years in Fulton public schools, retiring in 1966.


Hockaday house, overlooking Fulton, built about 1863. Jefferson Davis stayed here during his visit in 1875.

Ante-bellum Fulton residence at 815 Court Street. Rear portion built of logs 1840; brick front added 1860.




Dr. George M. Willing home, built 1849-50. Now 211 Jefferson Street, Fulton.



Elkanah Smith residence, built 1840 in northeast Fulton. Now Country Club.




Residence of General M. Fred Bell, prominent architect, builder, and organizer of first telephone exchange in Fulton. 308 E. 5th St., Fulton.



Yantis elevator, Tenth and Walnut Streets, Fulton, 1903.




Overall factory at 206 East Fifth Street, Fulton. Closed 1913.












Dr. Martin Yates, who practiced medicine in Fulton for 53 years. He retired in 1932, died 1935.

The Kingdom's "Queen", largest mule raised in Missouri. Weighing 2,600 pounds and standing 18 hands (6 feet), she took first prize at 1904 World's Fair in St. Louis.

Daniel M. Tucker (1819-1910). Gave 2 1/2 acres of land to Synodical Female College when it was founded and 6 acres to William Woods College. Was in general mercantile business from 1848 throughout his lifetime.

These photos, believed to have been taken in the 1890's, show the intersection of Market and Fifth streets; one showing the Palace Hotel in a northeasterly view, and the other west Fifth St. between Market and Gourt St. and beyond. In front of the hotel, pulled by a team of white horses, is a hack, which was operated by Jameson Brothers. Behind it is one of the Jameson transfer Wagons. In the foreground is a group of saddle horses hitched adjacent to the Callaway Gounty courthouse.

The other street scene, and at right in picture, shows a group of buildings on the north side of Fifth St, where now is located Saults Drug Store, the Callaway Bank and the former Gamble's store. The former Gamble's building, is shown as the "New York Store" in the picture, and has been torn down. At this location will be the Callaway Bank's new addition.
