The attendance record was broken at the homecoming game, and over all, the attendance at all home football

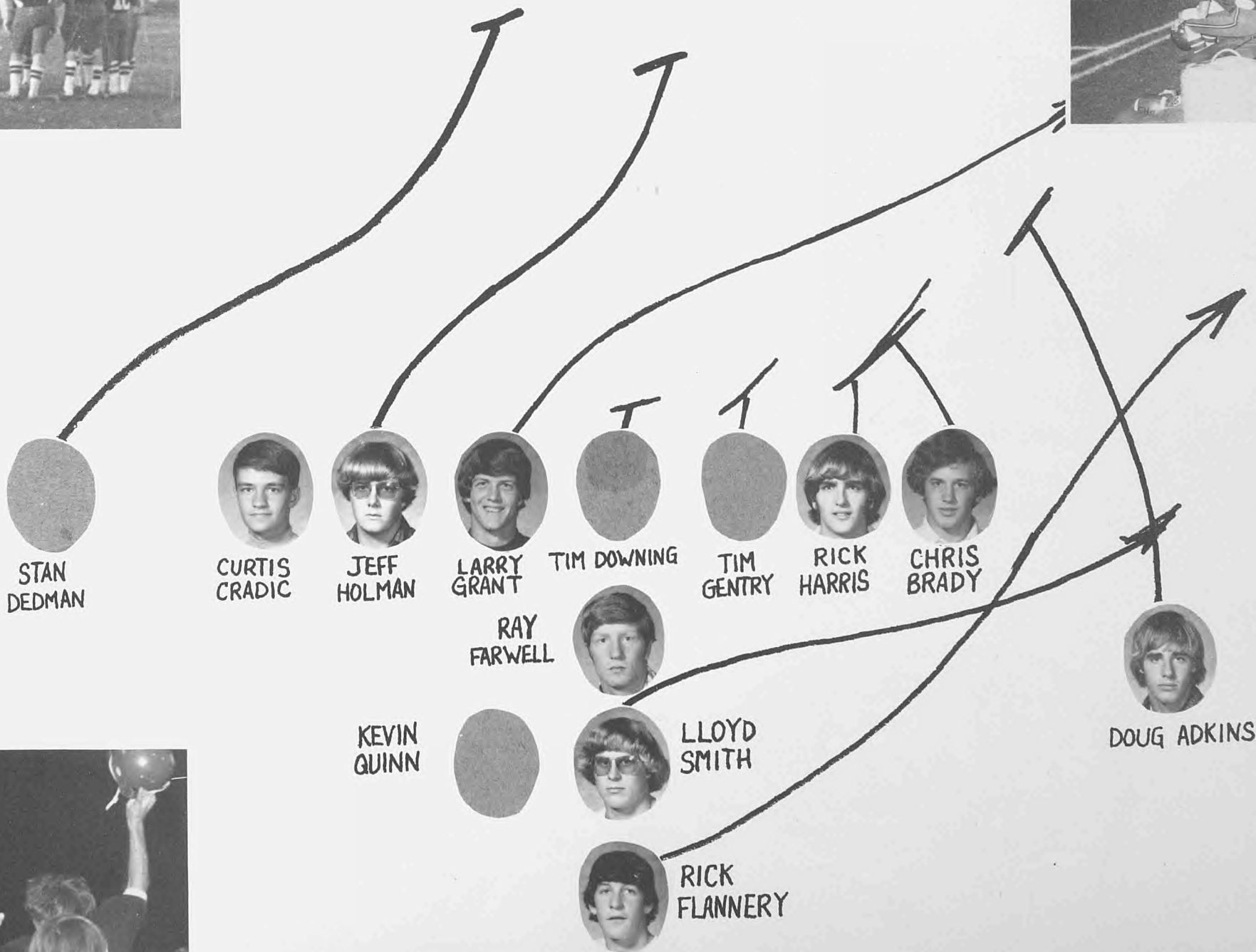
games has never been higher.

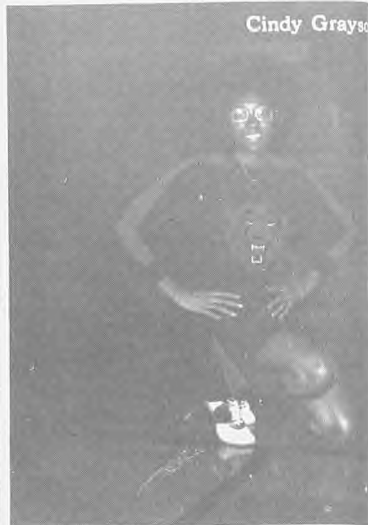

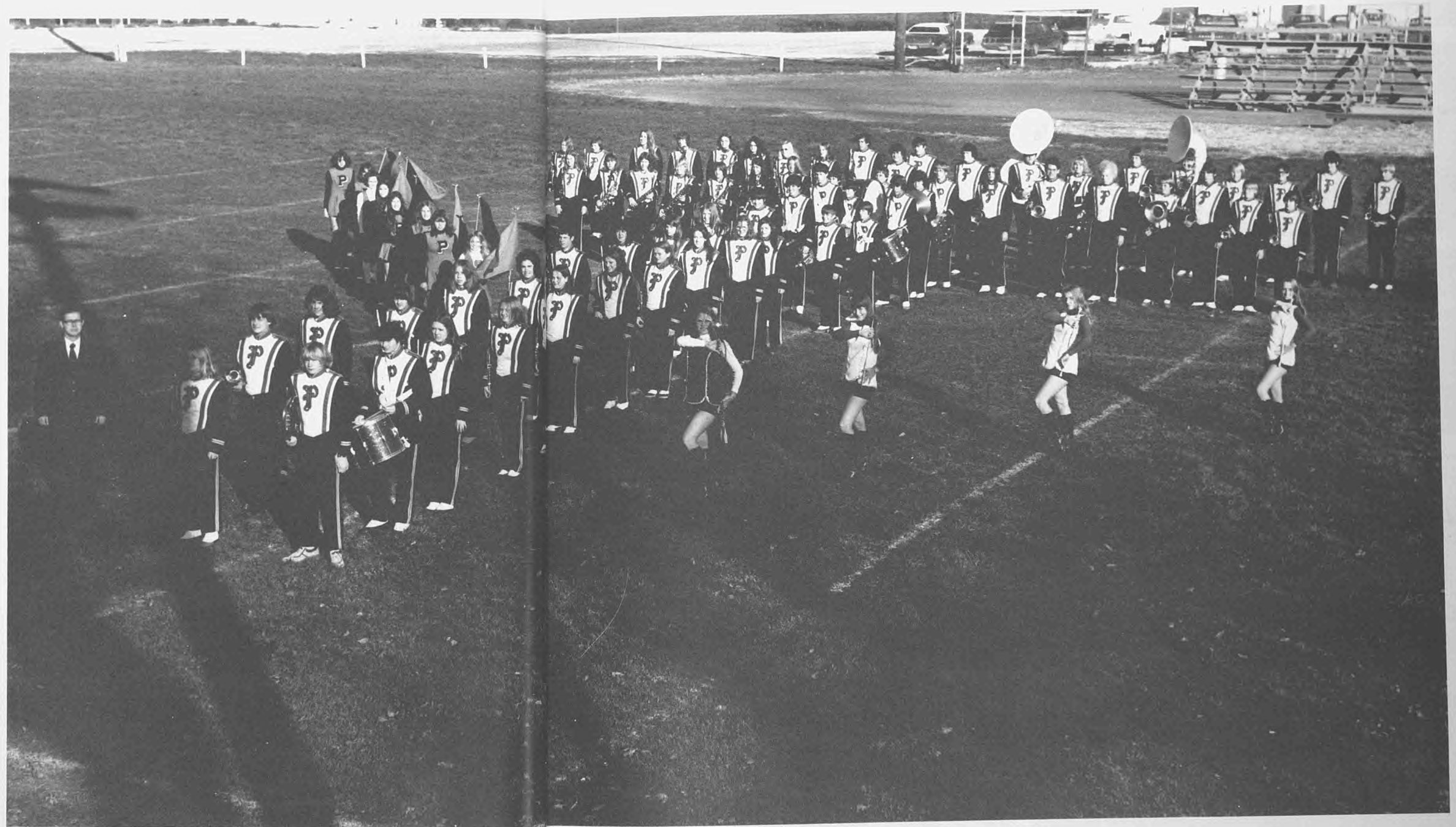
Each band member felt very honored to be a part of such events. We felt that we were important to the community.

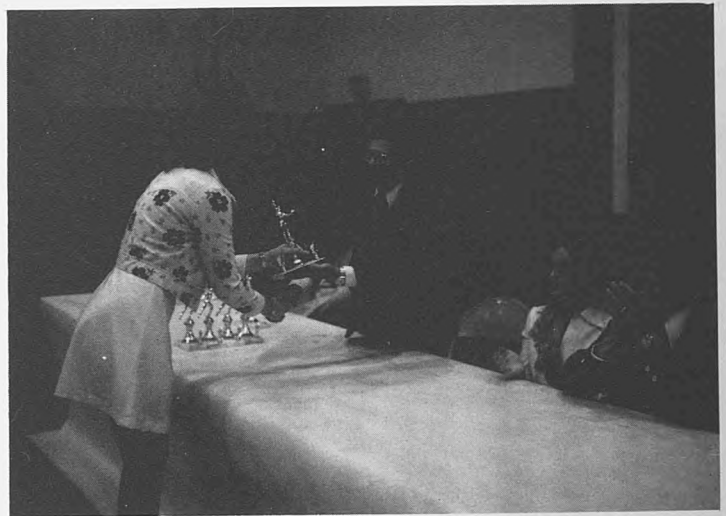

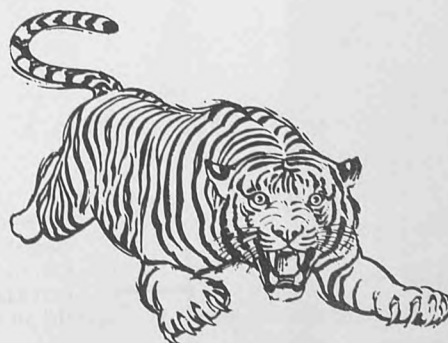


Robbin Ogle- Most Rebounds and Best Field Goal Percentage

New Courses Provide For Career Experiences.

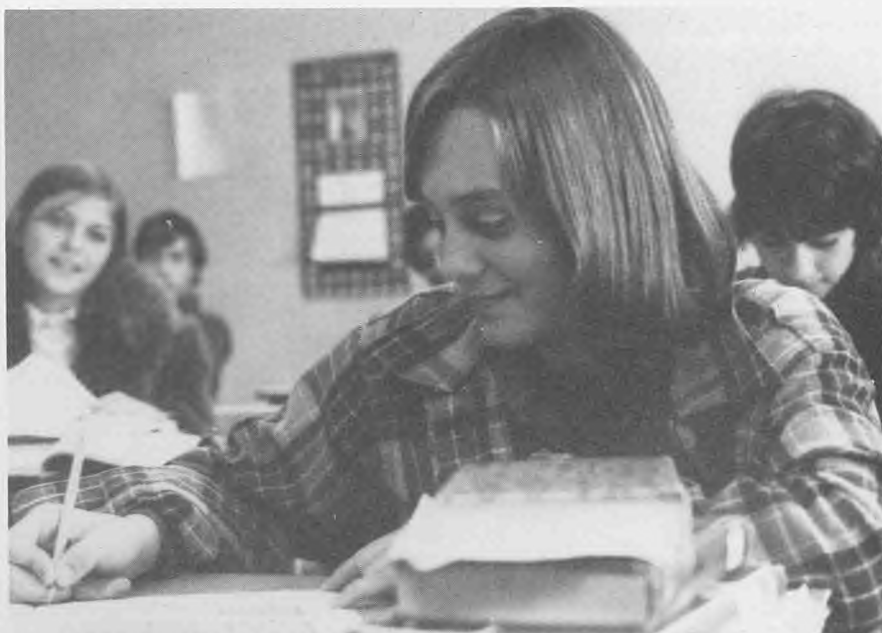

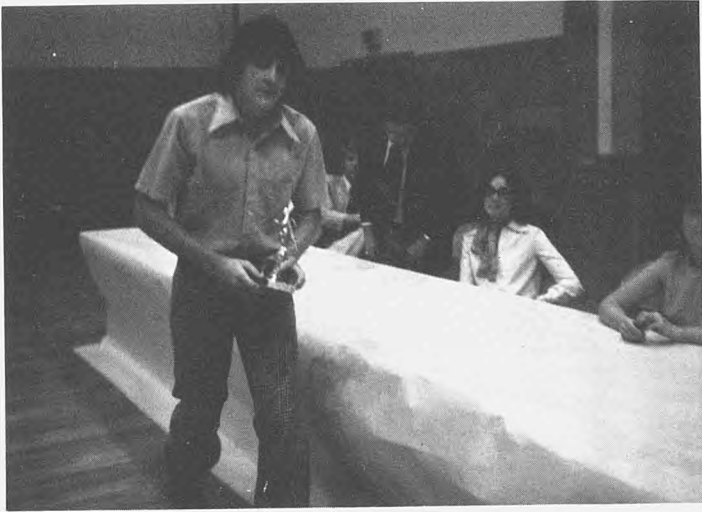
