Lawrence County Journal, published at Mt. Vernon, Missouri, editor, H. Lick. First issue Sept. 1872, last issue, Oct. 2, 1873. Calls itself a Democratic Party paper.

Fountain and Journal, published Mt. Vernon, Missouri. Begins in 1874.

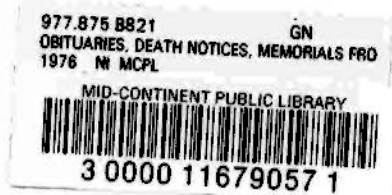

of Judge Taylor, was a Baptist.
- Jan. 30; 1868: died on 22nd, Dr. Bender of Greenfield.
- Mar. 26, 1868: died at Annapolis Park County, Indiana, Mar. 5,
Morton C. Branson, son of Isaac L. and Mary V. Branson, age
1yr. 8 mo. 20 da., pneumonia.
- June 4, 1868: killing near McMurty Spring, about 2 1/2 miles south
of Cassville, Daniel Howery and Robert Man, both of Washburn
area. Man and Daniel H. Howery got into fight and Howery's son
Henry killed Man in defence of his father. Man was a blacksmith
at Washburn and leaves wife and several small children.
Howery fatally wounded; fight was over a horse race.
- June 11, 1868: died of consumption, June 9, Gulia Elma Kelly, daughter
of Robert and Violet D. Kelly, age 16 yr. 5 mo. 7 da.
- June 18, 1868: died May 30 at home of his son Troy O., Paul Macy,
aged 88 yr. 4 mo. 20 da.
- July 30, 1868: died, 27th, congestive fever, Esq. Ramsey.
- Aug. 27, 1868: died, 20th at Mt. Vernon, Charles S. Andrews, aged
1 yr. 9 mo. 9 da., son of Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Andrews.
- Sept. 25, 1868: died of consumption on 12th, Mrs. Harriet S. Gorton,
aged 62 yr. 4 mo. 16 da.
- Oct. 8, 1868: died of serotal hernia, Oct. 6, at residence of
Robert Kelly, Hosea Pearson, aged 20 yrs., son of Moses and
Eunes Pearson of Miami County, Ohio. He had been connected with
the publication of the Spring River Fountain.
- Nov. 19, 1868: died, 17th, Iva Lantz, infant daughter of A. M. and
M. H. Lantz.
- Mar. 18, 1869: Three died on or about the 14th, (1) Frank Gaither,
pneumonia; (2) a child of Mr. Skelton's of measles; and
(3) Mrs. Moor of inflammatory rhuematism.

- Mar. 18, 1869: died of old age, Thomas Samuel, over 88 yrs.
- Mar. 25, 1869: funeral of Mary Elizabeth, wife of Judge B. L. Hendrich, was conducted Mar. 23; burial at Mt. Vernon's public burying grounds.
- June 24, 1869: killed by gun shot, either accidentally or suicide, son of J. P. Helms, age 12, of Turnback Township.
- July 22, 1869: died suddenly, rupture of heart, William Hartly. His home is believed to be on Gasconade River, maybe in Osage County, but he had been working in Marshfield as brick mason for about a month. He was a "stranger in this place."
- Aug..26, 1869: murder at Granby of William Lake, proprietor of Lake's Hippo-olympiad and Mammoth Circus, on Aug. 22, by Jacob Killyou " a desperado who lived at the big spring 10 miles southeast of town"--Lake's wife Agnes offers \$1000 reward for apprehension of murderer. (murderer's name later spelled Killian)
- Sept. 16, 1869: died on 12th, Florence May, daughter of G.R. and M. A. Lantz, age 1yr 4 mo. 28 da.
- Sept. 23, 1869: died, Judge Hendrick's twin child.
- Sept. 30, 1869: died on 26th after long illness, Mrs. Maggie Henderson, wife of Parson Henderson.
- Sept. 30, 1869: funeral of Mrs. Amelia Clark on 19th, Round Grove.
- Oct. 21, 1869: died on 18th, Elia, daughter of Jno. H. and M. E. Woods, of croup, aged 3 yrs.
- Oct. 21, 1869: died on 19th, David M. Freeman. intersusception of the intestine.
- Oct. 28, 1869: died on 26th, Enoch M., son of P.A. and M. J. Medlin, aged 4 yrs. inflamation of the bowels.
- Dec. 30, 1869: died 24th of congestion of the heart, E. M. Stanton.
- Jan. 6, 1870: died on 4th, Major Weir, an old and respected citizen of Mt. Vernon.
- Jan. 27, 1870: died of pneumonia and erysipelas on 21st at residence of her uncle in Park County, Indiana, Miss Lucretia M. Kelly, daughter of Robert and Violet D. Kelly, aged 20.
- Feb. 3, 1870: died Monday Jan. 31, at his residence in Mt. Vernon, Mr. William Strawn of derangement of the brain.
- Feb. 3, 1870: report of trial of George W. Webb for killing Philip Brogan at Marionville on Jan. 26. Witnesses included Dr. Landis, George Cornell, and Mr. Henderson.

Apr. 7, 1870: died Apr. 2 of lung fever, Annette A. Lantz, daughter of G. R. and M. A. Lantz, aged 6 yrs. 5 mo. 2 da.

died: Mar. 21, Sarajun(?) A. Atherly, wife of Henry W. Atherly, and daughter of Timothy and Elizabeth Pearson of Leroy, Kansas, aged 20 yr. 11 da.

Apr. 21; 1870: married at residence of bride's brother Wyatt Harris, Mr. Abraham Jones of Humbolt, Kan. to Miss Elizabeth Harris, city.

May 5, 1870: father of Dr. T. W. Kelton is W. P. Kelton of Trenton, Tenn.

Report of death of A. Hollingsworth, formerly marshal of "this city" (from The Patriot, probably Springfield, Mo.) as result of stabbing by Oza B. Read (Reed) who was drunk. Hollingsworth was attempting to revive him when attacked. Mr. W. H. Patterson rode up at that time and subdued Read, took Hollingsworth to Hollingsworth's home (the stabbing had occurred near his home on James River) but he died two days later, aged 74. Read is an elderly man of Swanville, Christian County, and does not recall the fight. Read was committed to jail to await trial for murder.

June 2, 1870: Report of four mules being stolen at Marionville on Monday night. In the pursuit of the thieves one of the pursuers, Isam G. Williams, was killed.

June 16, 1870: Mr. Wild, Proprietor of an Industrial Colony from Pennsylvania established 2 miles west of Peirce City on S.P. R.R. was assassinated and found dead in the woods near his home, shot through the head. Later reports seem to indicate suicide.

June 30, 1870: indictment of Mr. Baughman for murder of Holden at Verona on the 17th, apparent self-defense. July 21 the grand jury released Mr. Baughman.

July 7, 1870: died at Springfield, Mo., an old well digger David Smith while digging well for Col. Young, killed by "the damp" and body recovered by brave black Charley Wamack.

July 21, 1870: murdered, man named McDonald of Center Creek.

July 28, 1870: Patterson, who stole mules some weeks ago, captured by couple of men including King Williams, brother of man killed by Patterson in his escape the first time.

Sept. 22, 1870: killed, Isaac Falkner of Marionville, Sept. 15, by M. T. Morris; coroner's jury declared to be self-defense.

Sept. 29, 1870: accidentally shot, killed, son of Hon. John B. Kelso. Only week or so ago a little son died of lockjaw.

Oct. 13, 1870: an 8 mo. old child of John Etter killed by a horse running over John and child at fair in Springfield; John injured.

Oct. 27, 1870: died, child of Calvin Gray.

- Nov. 3, 1870: killed in Baxter Spring, Kansas, Mr. Max Samuels, a clothing merchant and his clerk Max Horn, by shotgun being knocked off shelf and discharging.
- Nov. 10, 1870: tribute of respect to D. T. J. Colley, died Aug. 23, Park Co., Texas. I.O.O.F. Lodge 157, Mt. Vernon.
- Dec. 22, 1870: died, Mrs. Helen Hocker, widow of Jno. D. Hocker of consumption.

died, G. W. West of near Bower's Mill of a rupture.

killed by a circular saw, 12 yr. old son of Nathan Hunt of Greene Township at his father's mill on Muddy. (Boy is named Benjamin)

killed by explosion of a boiler at his saw mill at Hickory Creek Furnace, Mr. William Thompson, buried at Odd Fellows Cemetery.

- Dec. 30, 1870: weather unusually cold last week, mercury from 10 to 22½ degrees below zero.

killed on 28th by J. Weaver at Bowers Mill, Anderson Starret who was drunk and threatening to kill Weaver.

- Jan. 19, 1871: eight inch snowfall preceded by a "number one sleet"

- Feb. 2, 1871: Samuel A, William P., and Jno. W. Harshbarger were brought before Esq. Davis charged by Susan Jane Kimmons of killing William Fare in Aug. 1866. Trial still in progress.

Report of the assassination of Judge Lindenbower in Greene County by William Cannifax, who was captured immediately.

- Feb. 9, 1871: funeral services today at C. P. Church for Mrs. Laura Stringer, wife of James Stringer of Peirce City.

Harshbargers (Samuel, the father and Jno. W. and Wm., sons, old settlers) were bound over to jail and admitted to bail at \$8,000 each. They are considered innocent so in the courtroom Samuel H. asked for persons who had known him the 30 yrs. to sign for the bonds and plenty did.

- Feb. 16, 1871: died from lockjaw on 15th, Martin Howard.

- Feb. 23, 1871: marriages by J.W. Ellis in certain families from a letter written by him contains some comments on deaths. In the family of John Patton these marriages: Sept. 14, 1848, Golla Hugh Moore and Artemesia Patton; Apr. 5, 1849, Newton Patton and Amanda Parks; Nov. 1, 1849, Jas. W. Patton and Incenna Lebow; Apr. 16, 1853 Oswald Hoshaw and Eliza Patton; Dec. 28, 1854, Newton Patton and Margaret Lollar; Feb. 23, 1855, Samuel Patton and Jane Henderson; June 12, 1856, Eph. Hoshaw and Adaline Patton; Dec. 10, 1857, Gola Hugh Moore and Frances Chambers. G. H. Moore's first wife had died. Newton's first wife had died; his second also fairly soon. Eliza's first husband died in 1856 and later she married to William Goodman. John Patton died a few years since.

Mar. 2, 1871: died 26th Feb. of erysipelas: Mrs. Lucinda Neal.

Apr. 27, 1871: buried on Apr. 25, Mary Margaret Hamilton at Mt. Vernon.

May 4, 1871: died of fever May 3, Isaac Miller at Mrs. Gays: died, little son of Attorney Harden of St. Louis, of croup, at home of Judge Price, Mt. Vernon.

May 11, 1871: suicide: May 10, Dr. L. B. Landis by taking morphine; cause, alcoholic.

Killed near Carthage, a son of Joseph Kelly, by log roller; family recently from Rock Island Co., Ill.

Weaver found not guilty of killing Starrett.

May 25, 1871: trial of Harshbarger, jury out 15 minutes, returned verdict of not guilty.

Paper on microfilm copy is out with July 20 number, no further obits or deaths.

LAWRENCE COUNTY JOURNAL, publ. Mt. Vernon, Mo.

Nov. 16, 1872: fatal accident when hunting: Mr. Washington Chance in Stone Co. near Galena. lived 4 m. from Mt. Vernon on old Springfield Road. died, John W. Blunt, Mt. Vernon, leaves wife and family.

Nov. 23, 1872: killed in accident at saw mill on Center Creek, I. N. Young.

Dec. 14, 1872: died at residence of James F. Hooper in Dade Co. on 10th, age 25, C. K. Hopper.

Dec. 28, 1872: died, Mr. E. N. Oldaker, proprietor of Scott House in Peirce City.

Jan. 4, 1873: "In Sept. last, a man with his rifles, two boys, two dogs, and a small wagon, passed through this place (Cassville) on his way to the swamps of White River, in North Eastern Ark., on a trapping expedition. Yesterday, he returned with 100 mink skins, 550 coon skins, and 3 deer skins, the whole valued at \$650, which is pretty good for 90 days' work. At one time he was 35 miles from any house."

Jan. 11, 1873: died: Ambrose Shaw in Cassville of small pox.

Feb. 1, 1873: suicide in Christian Co. of Mr. Lathrip, age 78.

temperature on Wed. at 6 a. m. was 22 degrees below zero.

died on Jan. 27, Mrs. Martha Tuck, wife of Benj. K. Tuck, of consumption.

- Feb. 15, 1873: died, Mrs. Ann Catherine Samuels, wife of Edmund Samuels, age 56.
- died: Mrs. Lucinda Peck, sister of Mr. Edmund Samuels.
- killed by H. C. Sides at Pinewille, John Martin.
- died in Polk Co.: Hartwell Johnson, old soldier of 1812, age 95.
- died: George Moody near Lamar.
- Mar. 8, 1873: died: Maj. Wm. C. Langston at his residence near Bowers' Mill, an old citizen.
- Mar. 23, 1873: died in Jefferson City, Mar. 5, of cerebro spinal meningitis, Hon. James M. Moore, age 63, of Marionville. He was representative of Stone Co. in legislature. Member Masonic Lodge of Marionville # 390.
- May 3, 1873: died, on the 18th, John Lick, age 44, in Bothwell, Canada West, a brother of H. Lick, editor.
- died: 6 yr. old daughter of Mr. A. York, of near Newtonia, burned to death.
- May 17, 1873: died on 10th, Levi Gibson at his home near Spring River, an old citizen.
- died in Peirce City: H. B. Lamb, former post master.
- May 24, 1873: funeral sermons of James Gibson and his son Levi will be preached at the Baptist Church.
- June 21, 1873: suicide: Nancy Perryman, daughter of Esq. Peter Perryman of Mountain Township, Barry Co.
- shooting and knifing in Pineville on 8th, Scott Painter died and his brother George Painter injured, by men named Carver and Stults. Carver a brother-in-law of Painter.
- June 28, 1873: died, Gracie Lollar, 2 yr. old daughter of Parson Lollar.
- July 19, 1873: suicide by hanging: wife of Martin Estes, a farmer living near Verona, no cause given, hanging done by a hank of linen thread.
- fatal accident: Mr. Reece Gott, at Thos. Allen place on Spring River. He was 60 yrs. odd, had come from his home in Joplin on July 4 to visit his son-in-law [and daughter] A. J. Osborn, who reside on the Allen place. He was thrown from a wagon and died 3 days later of internal injuries. Member of Methodist Church, died July 11.
- died: Mr. Mason of Verona.
- shooting in Ozark Co. over a horse trade resulted in death to Mr. Shriver, killed by Clinkenbeard.

July 26, 1873: Mr. Bynum's family of TurnBack Township lost two children from small pox and two others are very ill.

Aug. 9, 1873: In Dade Co., "a shooting and cutting affray between Thos. P. Hopper and William Hopper took place at Duday's Mill last Friday. Wm Hopper was shot once and Thos. P. badly chopped up with an ax."

"Squire Hopper, who lives near Peirce City, passed through town on Fri. to see his brother who was lately severely cut with an ax in the hands of an antagonist by the same name while in deadly conflict with him. The squire's brother, in retreating, stumbled over a snag, and after down, shot his assailant through the body, who, in return, chopped Hopper in the leg and would likely have killed him but for persons interferred. Neither party is considered mortally wounded."

Aug. 16, 1873: On July 4, desperadoes Teran Hugh Anderson and Arthur McClusky of Kansas in Indian Territory, Anderson had killed a brother of McCluskey in a dance house fracas and the fight was to be handled by seconds and the men used revolvers and bowie knives. Each died of several gun shot wounds plus final combat with knives. The place was Medicine Lodge and the seconds were a Texan named Richards and a huge Kentuckian named Job Harding.

Aug. 23, 1873: fatal accident on 18th in Ozark Township, Annanias Phillips, who went down into a well and was killed by the damps there. Leaves wife and children.

Sept. 13, 1873: suicide: a Forsythe youth, aged 22, Joseph Buck.

Oct. 2, 1873: died: on 21st of inflammation of the bowels, Mr. Samuel Forsythe, one of proprietors of Bowers' Mills and an extensive cattle dealer.

Mar. 12, 1874: died on 4th inst., Andrew L. Phariss at residence of his father, S. M. Phariss at Logan station. He was at one time a druggist in Mt. Vernon.

Apr. 30, 1874: died on 20th at Marionville, Mrs. W. P. Robinson.

died 20th, Jas. Gammill, lived near Marionville, came to Missouri from Tenn. in 1843, died sitting in his chair in apparent good health, aged 86. He settled on place where died in 1843.

May 7, 1874: dead on 4th of pneumonia: infant daughter Ann, of Dr. T. W. and C. W. Kelton, aged 19 mo. 21 da.

May 21, 1874: Eli Lutes, a merchant of Lutesville, Mo., shot and killed Wm Powell during a fight at dance.

- May 28, 1874: died May 24, Mrs. S. E. Downing, wife of Robt. R. Downing, at residence of her mother on Rock Prairie. She was daughter of late William H. Gaither and Elizabeth Gaither, died of heart disease and consumption, aged 33 yrs. 8 mo. 23 da.
- June 11, 1874: died near Mt. Vernon, June 10, in 69th year, Judge James Cherry, one of first settlers.
died near Chabybeate Springs, June 11, of belious colic, Jerry L. Gaither, teacher. (see addendum, June 18)
- July 23, 1874: "Hot!
Just 90° in the shade.
The comet has ceased to be seen.
The traffic in little apples continues unabated.
The work on the jail goes on-so does the fighting."
- Aug. 13, 1874: 103° in the shade on Sunday.
died, at Mt. Vernon, Aug. 9, Olive May, infant daughter of J.S. and A.F. Drake, aged 1 yr. 2mo. 21 da.
- Aug. 20, 1874: died Aug. 12, Mrs. Elizabeth Orr, wife of George Orr, Senior, born Feb. 12, 1812, Londondery, Ireland.
- Aug. 27, 1874: died, Aug. 17, Mt. Vernon, Rebecca A., wife of Wm. E. King, born Rebecca A. Newman, July 26, 1837, Madison Co. Ill, father was Zadock Newman. She married Wm E King Feb. 28, 1861.
- Oct. 15, 1874: President Grant passed through Verona Sunday on 10:00 train on way to Indian Territory.
- Oct. 22, 1874: died at Verona, Oct. 20, J. N. Trollinger in his 50th year, came to Lawrence County 30 years ago. Buried in Mt. Vernon cemetery.
- Nov. 5, 1874: died 3rd at home off son C. D. Lanier, Mrs. Sarah Ann Lanier, born in Buckingham Co., Virginia, May 16, 1803, parents emigrated to Warren Co., Ky., in 1808, lived there until 1853, then to Lawrence Co. (Mo)
- Nov. 12, 1874: died: Judge B. L. Hendrick in 47th year, of paralysis. died Nov. 10, near Mt. Vernon, native of Missouri.
- Nov. 26, 1874: died in Joplin City, Mo., Nov. 12 of pneumonia, Frankie B., only son of T. B. and M. E. Samuels, aged 3 yr. 3 mo.
- Dec. 21, 1874: died 28th, Charlie, only son of Wm H. and Annie Johnson, Mt. Vernon.
- Jan. 21, 1875: died, 15th, Mr. Chandler of Petty Prairie, leaving wife and 9 children.
- Jan. 28, 1875: died Jan. 15, Nancy Ann, wife of J.P. Atkerson, at residence of mother and step-father, Isaac and Polly Moody, aged about 48. Born Allen Co., Ky., married there husband and she emigrated to Texas, lived there 2 yrs., came to Lawrence Co., Mo., in 1862, went to Ill, after war came back to Lawrence Co. Leaves husband and 4 children. Protracted illness.

Feb. 4, 1875: died suddenly: Mrs. Fullerton of Peirce City.

Mar. 4, 1875: died Feb. 25 of pneumonia, Louisa Jane, wife of James Neal, aged 48 yr. 21 da. Native of Tenn. Was left widow of James Stewart Warren, with 4 children, in 1863.

died Feb. 12, Mrs. Martha E. Robertson, aged 35. Born Cleveland Co., N.C., lived there with parents until 1856, to Ark. in 1860, married there age 20, husband died the following year; she moved to Newton Co. Mo. 1867. Member of M. E. Church South. Leaves one child, daughter age 14.

Mar. 11, 1875: died: Samuel Williams, one of first settlers of Lawrence County.
died, (before Feb. 9), Daniel Biddlecome, Mt. Vernon Lodge 90, A. F. & A. M.

Apr. 1, 1875: died: Minnie, daughter of E. H. and M. Hinshaw, on Mar. 27.

in memoria: died 23 Mar. Isabell H., wife of William Thomas, aged 28 yr. 3 mo. member of Christ's Church. Leaves husband and three children. (Neosho papers please copy.)

Apr. 8, 1875: died, Mar. 31, Frankie, youngest son of Mrs. S. P. George, pneumonia, aged 13 yrs. 13 da.

died. Mrs. Walker (has son named Orley) (See addendum, Apr 8)

died: Louella, infant daughter of G. W. and Fannie Ernest, aged 1 mo. 20 da.

Apr. 15, 1875: died Apr. 10, Eugenia Josephine Boyd, daughter of T. S. and C. J. Boyd, born Jan. 11, 1859, aged 16.

May 6, 1875: died at Springfield, Mo., Apr. 7, Mrs. Malessa J. Howard, widow of Martin L. Howard of Mt. Vernon, age 25. Pneumonia. A son 4 years old to be cared for by grandfather Thomas D. Fain. Buried at family ground on Grand Prairie, 9 mi. from Springfield. Baptist.

May 27, 1875: died 24th, Henry Jones, of typhoid fever, lived 8 miles from Mt. Vernon.

funeral of Mrs. Nancy Ann Atkerson to be preached on third Sabbath in July at Mt. Olivet church on Center Creek by Rev. J. Sartain. (see July 15)

July 1, 1875: 4.1 inches of rain on Friday night "and a lively fall it was. The streets were flooded and the creeks got on a bender."

July 15, 1875: "Rev. Sartain will preach the funeral of Mrs. Atkerson at Mt. Olivet church on Center Creek Sunday, July the 18th, at 11 o'clock; and Rev. Pennell will preach that of Mr. Chandler in the afternoon at the same place. Everybody requestad to bring their lunches."

died on 12th: Mrs. Columbia Boyd of consumption, wife of Thomas Boyd, born Cannon Co., Tenn., Nov. 28, 1833, and came with parents Job and Elizabeth Stephens to near Mt. Vernon, 1851, married 1857, leaves 5 children, oldest is 15 years. Leaves 1 sister, 2 brothers, also in Missouri.

- July 15, 1875: died July 10, Robert Kemmons, resided on Turnback 12 miles from Mt. Vernon, lived there 40 years. Aged over 80, one of first settlers. "Then his nearest neighbor was 10 miles away. The next one was Mr. Colley, 16 miles west. Springfield contained one store and a few houses."
- Aug. 5, 1875: Floods: Thousands of bushels of wheat destroyed. Enough rain on Thursday night, Friday morning, to raise Honey Creek, Clear Creek, Spring River, Center Creek, Stahl's Creek, and Williams Creek out of banks and devastating the bottoms. Atlantic and Pacific R.R. bridge below Verona washed away and track washed out in many places. The injury to corn not as bad as to wheat. In Carthage on July 31 one man drowned and a family was washed away. From Baxter Springs, Kansas, "Spring River rushing in a torrent half a mile wide...All travel by stage stopped. No communication between Joplin and Carthage."

- in memmorium: Maggie, daughter of E. and L. Hagler, of Gray's Point, Sept. 16, age 5.
- death Sept. 21, of David P. Stansell, at his home on Ozark Prairie, 6 miles east of Mt. Vernon. Came from Illinois just little over a year ago. Died of remittent fever, age 54. Member of Masonic Lodge of Carbondale, Jackson Co. Ill.
- Oct. 7, 1875: died Oct. 4 of conjestive chills, Miss Mattie Marley of near Chesapeake, age 17.
- Oct. 14, 1875: died, Miss Martha Rickman, from western part of county
- died: Mr. John Wormington, of western part of county.
- died: Mr. Clark Montgomery of Turnback Township of fever, Oct. 11; one of oldest settlers.

Oct. 14, 1875; died, Sept. 23, Ellen Allen, wife of Thomas Allen, ill 23 days; born in Virginia in 1799, moved to Tennessee with her parents when young, married John Tipet in 1818, left a widow, married T. Allen in 1838, emigrated to Missouri in 1840 to what is now Lawrence County.

Oct. 21, 1875: died, an old man who gave his name as Oliver James. Picked up on road on Oliver's Prairie, taken to home of Charles Killgor where he died on 10th, no papers of identification, about 45-50 years old. (Neosho paper)

Oct. 28, 1875: died on 18th, Miss Betsey Moore, sister of Henderson Moore of Chesapeake.

Funeral procession on Tuesday evening in Mt. Vernon for Henry George is largest seen in years. He died on Monday the 26th, lived near Phelps during last year. Member of Mt. Vernon Lodge of Masons.

Died, 20th, in Rich Valley, 8 years old son of John L. Morris, kicked by horse.

Nov. 11, 1875: died near Peirce City, Mr. N. B. Jones (Be Jones), a brother to T. H. Jones. Was run over by wagon and kicked by frightened horses while loading lumber. Buried about four miles from Mt. Vernon at family graveyard near S. E. Roberts.

Nov. 25, 1875: died, Sept. 26, F. M. Duncan in Greene County, Mo. Member of Rock Prairie Lodge 269 A. F. and A. M., Lawrence County.

Dec. 2, 1875: died on 24th, wife of Thomas Foster. The family had moved from Illinois about first of October, located 5 miles east of Mt. Vernon.

Dec. 9, 1875: in memorium, for Elizabeth G. Paxton by the Lawrence County Home Circle Grange.

Died, Nov. 27, Mrs. Clark Montgomery of near Chesapeake.

Died, Henry Shriver, son of John Shriver who lives near Spencer

Dec. 16, 1875: report of probable suicide of Miss Blackwell of Levenworth, Kansas, death by drowning in Missouri River; her brother Ellis Blackwell lives in Carthage, Mo., and her mother also lives there. She was born in Maine, 1841, her father died when she was 7, family moved to Harvey County, Illinois. She worked as seamstress and housekeeper in various places. Family has relatives in Pottawattomie County, Kansas, and in Maine. Buried at Carthage, Mo.

- Dec. 30, 1875: in memorium by Zion Grange for Rebecca A. Allen, wife of L. P. Allen.
- Jan. 6, 1876: died, Dec. 31, Willard Hocker, infant son of Isaac and Martha M. Drake, aged 2 yr. 7 mo. 26 da.
- Died at Carthage on Dec. 28, pneumonia, Charles D. Pemberton, a native of Wheeling, West Va., where his mother and sister now reside.

May 14 paper: Mrs. George Hutton, alias Thomas Turley, has been captured, was wife of Hutton, present at time of his marriage to Mrs. Fullerton's daughter, disguised as the boy. She is graduate of Oxford College, Ohio, and met Hutton in Texas.

Mr. William Inke at Boliver shot and killed his son, mistaken for horse thief.

Apr. 30, 1868: at Lamar, James Patterson, aged about 15, killed by Sheriff W. A. Norris. Patterson and Norris were cousins. Patterson's sister is Mrs. Albert.

From Warsaw, little daughter of Mr. Wm Groshen, living near Cole Camp, died of burns when clothing caught fire.

May 7, 1868: Cassville; about 7 miles down Flat Creek below Cassville, William C. Wade shot and killed Alexander Jackson, late of Green County, over right to tract of land.

May 14, 1868: Marshfield: body of woman found about 12 miles southeast of Marshfield appears to be Polly Wood, daughter of Geo. W. Smith of Ozark County, aged 25, leaves 2 children, left Ozark County about first of Jan. 1867 and went to her uncle's in Laclede County, John Simmons; she left there but was not heard of after that.

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Sept. 10, 1868: Murder of Dr. A. S. Jones, Oct. 20, at Lamar, Mo. Jasper N. McLain and his brother Lewis involved with Jones in a fight. Jasper stabbed Jones with large bowie knife, blade about 6 inches long. Jasper McLain formerly lived in Laclede County.

Jan. 21, 1869: Trial of Thos. Allen for shooting at Jas. H. Gibson last Oct. (Jas. H. Gibson not said to have died) Held before Justice J. W. Davis; attorneys were Hon. Judge Price for defendant and N. Gibbs and A. G. McCune for state. Allen given citation to Circuit Court.

Feb. 11, 1869: report of shooting in Huntsville, Ark., Jan. 8. A young man named Cox killed Samuel Drake, cousin of J. D. Drake, editor of Cassville newspaper. Drake part of group who had gone to arrest Cox and some other rebels who had been threatening citizens of Madison County, Ark.

Mar. 25, 1869: from the Southwest Journal (name of town not given): Joshua Black who lives east of town was killed when horse fell into a miner's shaft near road. The night was dark and horse was blind. A neighbor Thomas Davis and Mr. Black's wife found him after he did not return from a trip to town.

July 22, 1869: report on a man named Chester Thomas who had been living in Mt. Vernon, and was insane. He recovered his senses last week; his home is in Surcy County, Ark., near Boroville (sic): he had enlisted in rebel service early part of the War, was taken prisoner at Helena, July 3, 1863, taken to Fort Delaware, redeemed at end of war, went home, found that his father had died, stayed home one year, attacked by bouts of insanity, had these for 4 years, now appears cured, going home.

July 29, 1869: murder reported from newspaper called Patriot, no place given: Murder occurred 9 miles northeast of this place in vicinity of Gray's Mill; victim a young man named Willis Wynn, son of R. M. Wynn, Justice of Peace of Jackson Township., killed by young man William Brit, recently from Arkansas, both about 18. Had been swimming in Sac River and quarreled, fight occurred, Wynn was knifed.

Killed, accidental discharge of rifle being handed him by his eldest child, 8 yr. old daughter, Mr. West of Harrison County, Ky. Leaves wife and 4 small children. They had gone to Kansas but were on way back to Ky. Accident occurred at camp near Fair Play, Mo.

Nov. 11, 1869: state of Missouri vs. Wm. C. Johnson, indictment for murder of Alexander Jackson in Barry Co. Apr. 1869. Verdict of jury- not guilty.

Dec. 9, 1869: murder in Barry County, Jack Carney and wife on the Cassville and Berryville Road, 20 miles southeast of Cassville; George Moore arrested, motive appears to be robbery.

Jan. 27, 1870: William Lake buried on 13 Jan. (article from Cincinnati, Ohio paper), conducted by Odd Fellows of Ohio Lodge 1. He had been a showman for 43 yrs., born Burlington, Maine, Sept. 25, 1817, murdered in Barry County, Mo.

Aug. 4, 1870: arrested, Benjamin Jones of Taney County, charged with murder of Lt. Hildebran, a discharged Federal soldier in Cole County, fall of 1865, killed by four men in presence of his wife and children; Jones accused of firing the shots and the others of stabbing the lieutenant. The men were arrested and jailed in Jefferson City but all but one escaped. Jones is said to be one of them. He has wife and children in Taney County.

Emery Wright has returned from Illinois where he buried his wife. Her mother lives in Illinois.

Sept. 15, 1870: died, 6 Sept., David Franklin Landrum, aged 3 yrs. 18 mo. 12 da., son of Susan E. and R. H. Landrum.

Nov. 10, 1870: strange murder: Nov. 15, man found dead on road from Sarcoxie to Mt. Vernon, shot at a camping place. Had letter with name of Albert Nutter of Jasper Co. Mo.

Jim Ingram of Ark. shot and killed by young man named Stone. Ingram had killed Stone, Sr. in 1864 during war, as part of a band of desperadoes who murdered Union men. Young Stone was 13 then. Ingram had moved to Texas but returned to Ark. and Stone killed him.

Dec. 1, 1870: Thomas Allen of Washington Co., Ark., formerly of Lawrence Co. Mo., appeared before Judge Hendricks and was discharged from all accusations against him.

Dec. 8, 1870: trial of Lee and Wm Callison of Ozark Township in murder of Dr. Hyl in 1866. Jury found not guilty.

Jan. 19, 1871: Death of General Lyman Beeman, representative from Newton Co., Mo., pneumonia, age 86 yrs., died at boarding house of Cap Price. Lived in Neosho.

Jan. 26, 1871: Springfield, Mo., Jan. 24, Judge Lindenbower was shot, killed, in the afternoon by William Cannefax.

Apr. 20, 1871: trial of Oza B. Reed who was indicted for murder of E. Hollingsworth, held at Ozark; Reed given 2 yrs. in prison.

Brown, J. W. Mills. Witnesses: Mr. Gilmore, Jane Kimmons, Fanny Fare, Eletha Reed, Joseph Dryden, James Weatherspoons, Ellen Fare, Jas. Pike, Jerry Ryker, J. H. Hastings, Jas. Small, T. J. Ingram, Jno. Wicker, W. Grammer, I. J. West, Thos. Nickel, and Samuel Moore. (genealogical data from testimony: Jonathan Fare was killed in 1864; Susan Kimmons is sister of W. May 10, 1873: Miss Mollie J. Zeverly has become editor of newspaper at Linn, Osage Co., on death of her father.

Died, young child of Thomas family near Aurora, small pox.

May 24, 1873: funeral of H. B. Lamb, late postmaster of Peirce City.

June 14, 1873: Henry Williams, young half Indian living near Pomme de Terre bridge in Polk Co., shot and killed Mr. Saunderson because he couldn't marry Saunderson's daughter.

Aug. 2, 1873: B. F. Brown of North Springfield, brakeman on A. & P. R.R., killed in crossing bridge near Ritchie. Leaves wife and children.

William German, charged with murdering his father-in-law, convicted at Carthage.

Aug. 30, 1873: suicide, Miss Brannaugh who lived with step-father and mother 8 miles southeast of Lebanon, on 18th, believed to have been raped by two young men who have been arrested.

Feb. 26, 1874: died, Peirce City, wife of White Frost. Body sent to Kentucky for burial.

Mar. 12, 1874: killed in Chariton County by explosion of steam boiler at mill on Grand River owned by Thos. Dobbins--Elisha Smith, Jesse Thatcher, and Richard Worthington, all employees at mill.

Died, Capt. John S. McCune of St. Louis.

Apr. 23, 1874: died, Springfield, young man, son of Dr. Thompson, heart.

Apr. 30, 1874: Springfield news: killed by train near Lebanon, young brakeman named Stephen Hamilton. Train from the East.

June 18, 1874: Jerry L. Gaither, son of William H. and Elizabeth Gaither, aged 24 yrs. 3 mo. 6 da., died at residence of his mother 11 miles east of Mt. Vernon on June 11. His sister died short time earlier. Leaves mother and two sisters.

July 2, 1874: lightning killed old man named Eubanks and his granddaughter, wife of James Garrison of Douglas County, on Dry Creek, east of Bryants' Fork. They were standing near door of home of Mr. Garrison.

July 9, 1874: died, Audrian County, Wm Flinn, who owned a farm near Benton City.

July 16, 1874: died July 3, John M. Querry, of Lawrence County. Born Barron County, Ky. 1811, married Sarah Colley in Russell Co. Va. very young age, moved to Ray Co. Mo. 1830. Had 4 daughters and 5 sons. All daughters married and all sons-in-law joined Union Army, 3 died, 1 wounded. His five boys also Union soldiers and he served in E.M.M. In 1867 moved from Ray Co. to Lawrence Co. Member of Regular Baptist Church. One son is William Querry of Phelps.

July 16, 1874: killed by lightning, Mrs. Willy B. Walker of Licking, Texas County.

Joseph Sayers was found guilty of murder of Charles Wilson at Joplin last June.

July 23, 1874: died. Squire Meeks of Granby at home of relative in Joplin.

Killed by lightning, Pleasant Landers of near Fair Play, at home of Joseph Hobbs.

R. K. Hart of Greene County, arrested for murder of G. W. Davis of Christian County, charged along with Sam. Oers. Hart and Davis were brothers-in-law.

July 30, 1874: killed by Oliver Langly in Dade County, man named Cowley who lived on Langley's farm.

Aug. 6, 1874: tribute of respect by Hall Decatur Lodge 400, A. F. & A. M., Peirce City, for A. B. Charles.

Aug. 27, 1874: killed, Horace Metcalf of Springfield, by man named Wynn. Metcalf and nephew W. L. Metcalf had gone to Wright County to arrest Wynn for illicit distilling.

Killed while chasing horsethieves near Prairie City on state line between Missouri and Indian Territory, men named Kime and White of Lawrence County, Mo. White is brother of Sanford White "of this city" and Kime has brother "in this city" (Patriot paper)

Sept. 24, 1874: killed, A. J. Russell, deputy constable of Greene County while attempting to arrest two men.

Oct. 15, 1874: died, 10th ult., aged wife of John Hopkins of LeGrange. Married 60 years. He died less than week later. Buried in city cemetery.

Little 8 or 9 year old son of Joseph Barrett, an Irish citizen of Clinton, fatally shot by 10 or 12 yr. old boy Tol. Whittaker, hunting accident.

Aurora got its origin from John C. McNatt, Esq., an old, wealthy, and estimable citizen of the county. Now has 200-300 people. A company of 8 men formed Lawrence County Mining Company--lead mine on land of Chas A Reed, 1 mile north of town. (5-10-73)

Old settler B. K. Turk recalls early settlers of Lawrence County. M. B. Phillips emigrated from Penn. to Van Buren, Ark., in 1839, and in 1846 to Lawrence Co. He supported Lincoln in Civil War and went to Illinois for a time. The heads of families in Mt. Vernon in 1846 were William Matthews, Dr. Kelley, P. M. Wear, T. R. Whaley, J. M. Kellogg, E. I continued blacksmithing three or four years, shoeing horses all around for 75 cents, paying 10 cents for the iron to make the shoes out of and 12 1/2 to 15 cents for nail iron. While I was following this business I paid 75 cents to \$1 per barrel for corn, and for

corn and flour \$1 to \$1.50 per 100 lbs. Among the prominent men and largest tax-payers of the county then were James Guthrie and William Orr, traders and stock buyers. These were both old line Whigs. Judge Williams and Alpherd Moore were the only slave holders I remember at that time. About the first of September [Orr and Guthrie] would enter our quiet city. Guthrie would seat himself upon old Kaleb's horse block and buy mules, paying \$8 to \$10 per head; while Orr would drive in his wagon and pick up the calves, paying from 50 cents to \$1 per head." (7-12-73)

Items of Interest from SPRING RIVER FOUNTAIN:

Feb. 23, 1867: A settlement of the Society of Friends is being made in the northwestern part of Jasper County, according to Mr. Cunningham of Carthage.

Mt. Vernon has two public schools and one subscription school. One public school is under Mr. Woods, principal, with 85 students; another is taught by Mrs. Wilson in her residence, with 30 pupils. The subscription school, number of students not reported, is taught by Mrs. Stringer at her home.

May 2, 1867: Biddlecome sells his interest in Spring River Fountain to J. H. Carter.

May 30, 1867: T. H. Henderson purchased Joe H. Carter's interest in newspaper.

A short article on Oregon, a town in Lawrence County on banks of Spring River about 12 miles west of Mt. Vernon; it was hard hit during Civil War by lawless plundering bands. Now Bowers Mill is being rebuilt; it was burned by southern guerillas. A dry goods store and blacksmithshop have been built in Oregon.

Report on churches of Lawrence County gives Old School Presbyterians, Cumberland Presbyterians, Old Baptists, United (called Missionary) Baptists, Methodists, and Christian denominations. Since meeting house of Cumberland Presbyterians in Mt. Vernon cannot hold all who attend, they are building in the vicinity of G. M. Moore's on Honey Creek about 6 miles from Mt. Vernon, a neat, frame meeting house. Also a new Cumberland Pres. house is being started in vicinity of John W. Moore's, 5 miles from Mt. Vernon, west. The Missionary Baptist house about 3 miles north of Mt. Vernon is also becoming crowded.

July 18, 1867: Teachers' Institute, convened its third session in the C. P. Church, Mt. Vernon, July 4, 9 a. m. Addresses by John H. Wood, Rev. Joseph W. Ellis "a long tried and successful teacher", J. F. Ward, and P. A. Medlin. Lunch spread in the grove near Mr. L. Lebow's and J. W. Black led the procession there.

Friday, 9 a. m., 30 teachers present, instrumental music by Miss Rena Gaither and Mrs. Leathers. Lectures by P. A. Medlin; J. W. Black "a teacher highly qualified," Mr. Drake read a poem; D. N. Woods, and Levi Downing of Greene County.

Saturday, original poetry by J. F. wood, address by D. E. Woods, address by A. McCune, essays by Mrs. L. F. Willson and Miss Fannie Caldwell. The institute subscribed \$100 for a teachers' library to be established in Mt. Vernon.

July 25, 1867: notice of organization of Agriculture and Mechanical Society of Lawrence County, open to males and females, fee \$2.50. Officers of the Society are John D. Allen, President; J. M. Fuller, Vice President; J. H. Woods, Secretary; with directors: R. Henson, T. D. J. Colley, T. R. Whaley, A. J. Durnell. Judge Cherry will deed the group the land formerly used as Fair Grounds.

August 8, 1867: Incorporation of Mt. Vernon: "Mt. Vernon was incorporated as a town on Tuesday of this week by order of the County Clerk, who appointed as Trustees, J. L. Holt, J. M. Leathers, Nathan Bray, H. Waller, and H. B. Overton." The machinery of the corporation will soon be in order; then let rogues beware! The new board is composed of men who have the public good at heart!"

Items of Interest from Spring River region.
Oct. 2, 1867: Mr. Black, teacher at the head of Spring River, brought editor a pippin apple raised by Elizabeth Browning, near Mundy's mill that weighs 27 oz. and measured 16 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches around one way and 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches the other.

Nov. 7, 1867: Letter from Benjamin Grundy that Verona surveyed and laid off January 1867, had at that time two stores and several residences, now one new store and several dwelling, two carpenters have set up shop. \$2500 has been subscribed for a college. The River at this point (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles from its source) is about 30 ft. wide, flows at all times, affording sufficient water to turn a mill the year round. Farming productivity shown by farm of I.M. Estes of 100 acres (60 in cultivation) which has this year grown 980 bu. of small grain, 1000 bu. of corn, apples, potatoes, turnips, cabbages and such produce.

July 9, 1868: Carthage: report of an Indian trader's trip to Carthage, Mo.: Major Langley who conducted Jeff Davis to Monroe after his capture owns 700 acres in upper edge of Newton County. Granby is great lead region; lead hauled 165 miles to Sedalia by teams every week. Neosho, Newtonia, Sarcxie named. Sarcxie is a small place about 150 inhabitants. The country across from Sarcxie to Avilla, crossing Center Creek, Spring River, and White Oak, is heavily timbered. Avilla, 80 or 100 inhabitants, on edge of a prairie which is settled about four miles. Then 16 miles without a house. In the middle of the prairie, on one of head branches of the Dry Fork is a fish pond about one-half mile long and 30-50 feet wide. On the prairie in northeast corner of Jasper and southeast corner of Barry County the Quaker killed his first rattlesnake and saw his first herd of wild deer. Land around Golden Grove in Barton County is fine, can be bought for 3-5 dollars per acre. About 4 miles southwest of Carthage is a settlement of Quakers, 15 families there. Lumber can be had at \$3 per hundred and most people get one or two thousand feet and with hand saw and hatchet, throw up a box house in 24 hours; then when they get time to build a good house, the box becomes a kitchen or smoke house.

Sept. 10, 1868: Meeting house being built by the Old Baptists on Spring River between Lemuel Allen's and David E. Gibson's. Will be open to other denominations when not in use by Baptists.

Jan. 21, 1869: Joseph Berry of Northeast Lawrence County, killed large gray eagle, 8 feet from tip to tip of wings.

Feb. 11, 1869: Report from Marionville on second anniversary meeting of Marionville Sabbath School on 31 Jan. 180 students present. Officers chosen: Maj. P. S. Sinclair, supt.; Dr. I. M. Slaughter, corresponding sec.; Miss Fannie Logan, treasurer; George Woolley, librarian; Frank Moore, Misses Amelia Phariss, Fannie Logan and Susan Stacy, music directors.

Ozark Townwhip: sabbath school formed at Lone School-house: Officers and teachers: J. B. Hill, superintendent; A. L. Buch, ass't sup't.; John A. Cockran, secretary; Teachers: Cyrus Poage Sr., Miss M. F. Poage, Geo. N. Cochran, E. Wheeler, Miss M. L. Cochran. Over 50 members.

Feb. 26, 1869: Fire! Learned from Dr. Batesell that schoolhouse near Verona burned Sunday night the 14th, supposed to have taken fire from the stove flue, loss \$350.

July 29, 1869: a town of 71 lots lately laid off at Bowers Mill by the Shermans who have purchased the mill property. Town not yet named.

Aug. 12, 1869: Verona--good district school taught by Mr. P. M. Bruffet, 50 pupils, in new schoolhouse. White and Marbet will soon have a shingle machine in operation.

Sept. 9, 1869: Verona: 22 dwellings, 2 stores, 2 blacksmith shops, 1 cooper shop, 1 hotel, 1 livery stable, 1 butcher shop, 2 shingle mills, 2 flour mills (1 run by water, other by steam), 1 wagon maker, 1 shoemaker, 1 sash and door maker, 1 brick yard, 1 lime burner, a new schoolhouse with an O. F. Hall about it and 60 students, 3 carpenters in town. The Missionary Baptists have organized a society of 12-15 members. The M. E. Church has 12 members under pastoral care of Rev. A. McClintock of Mt. Vernon. The C. P. Church has not organized in town although they could form a society of 20 or more. No saloon.

Sept. 1, 1870: discovery of copper or silver by G. W. Gorsuch, 14 miles north of Springfield in Cass Township, 3 miles east of Cave Spring, where an old miner Henry Grant is prospecting.

Oct. 20, 1870: Verona: Pyland has just completed a new business house, lumber trade. Dave White has completed fine Gothic residence. Caraday has repaired his hotel. Clements is building a business house 20 X 20, 2 stories high. Mr. Shuttell has wall of his new brick finished. New hotel ready to be opened by Mr. Pratt.

Nov. 24, 1870: Verona: Gregory and Miller's new commission house finished. Mr. Mundy has new residence enclosed. Capt. Purdy is going to add to his railroad land office. Work going on on J.M. Grammer's new store house. Mr. Gregory going to build new house. Shattelle's brick enclosed. Mrs. Jones opened new millinery store.

Peirce City: 1869 H. Lick began Peirce City Star which soon merged into Jacksonian and then the Herald and finally was sold to E. Skews. Finally sold and merged into the Southwest Immigrant, only survived few months. Lawrence County Democrat which moved from Mt. Vernon ran 3 years under Gabe C. Jones, Washington Cloud, and M.S. Beck. Finally ended. Peirce City Democrat came out in its stead.

Marionville has had three papers and Verona one.
