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SPRINGHILL METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH SOUTH

One of the first churches established in the Springhill area was the First Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which was located in the town of Springhill. It was organized in April of 1843, and met in the home of Isom Ware until the church building was erected. The land for the first building was purchased from James and Lucy Nave on September 23, 1851, and the first building was made of logs. The first trustees were as follows; John Doss, A. B. D. Martin, D. R. Martin, John Leeper, James Leeper, Samuel Pepper, and Alexander Ware. The first building was burned during the Civil War, and for fifteen years afterwards, the congregation met at the Springhill schoolhouse which was located on a corner of the Moss farm at the east edge of Springhill. In about 1877-78, the new building was built on the same plot of ground as the old one. The new building was made of lumber from the saw mill, and it included a bell and bell tower.

Rev. John R. Vincil was the first pastor in 1848. He resided at the parsonage which was located next to the church on Springhill's main street.

The church flourished for several years, but slowly the membership dwindled away to a small handful who were unable to maintain the expenses of the building and land. Finally, in 1966, the church doors were closed for the last time, making a grand total of 126 years of service to the Lord's Work. Then, finally, in 1979, the 100-year-old building was torn down.

The original church book is now in the possession of Mrs. Ola Young of Springhill, Missouri.

We have had
4 Schools in operation, within the bounds of this circuit. At present they are all suspended, which I regret.

Our Schools in order to be efficient ought to be in operation all the year wherever it is practicable -- as the good accomplished during summer, is lost during the winter.

I have visited as many families as I could. We feel the importance we trust of this part of our work, and our prayer is, That God's blessing may rest on the Church."

2d Prayer meetings are kept up at some of the appointments and are largely attended. I hope these meetings may increase; both in numbers and interest.

3rdly.

During the past quarter we have had some precious meetings.

The church has been revived, and we think the prospects are brightening and with the Divine Blessing we expect to succeed in winning souls to Christ.

BAPTISMS AND CONFIRMATIONS

AT GRACE EPISCOPAL CHURCH, CHILLICOTHE

1868-1878

Transcribed by Mary Hunter Linneman, LCGS

Grace Episcopal Church in Chillicothe, Missouri, was formally organized June 1, 1858 with ten communicants and Rev. Charles S. Loop as its first resident priest. The church was to serve the Chillicothe, Utica, and Brunswick area and members met for a short time at the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and later at a social hall before the War Between the States disrupted the congregation. After the close of hostilities, the congregation re-organized on Sept. 21, 1868, now under the guidance of Rev. Francis Moore. Members purchased a site at 421 Elm Street and contracted Jacob H. Sower of St. Louis to build a church for a cost of \$4,500, with an additional \$100 allocated for four gas-burning chandeliers. The church was erected during 1867-9 and is one of the earliest architectural examples of pre-fabrication. The church is listed as a National Historical Landmark, with its original black walnut pews and interior and its original one-man, foot-pumped organ still in use today. (Information for this brief history was provided by Miss Virginia Page of Chillicothe and the Chillicothe Constitution-Tribune.)



THE CHRISTIAN PIONEER

The Christian Pioneer, a religious newspaper, was published in Chillicothe by David T. Wright, an elder in the Christian Church. The newspaper, dedicated to uplifting its readers by addressing various religious, political and social issues of the day, was only published for a short time between 1864-1870. The following marriages and obituaries were extracted from microfilmed originals at the Livingston County Memorial Library, which cover the years 1869-70.

The corpse of his brother having been removed from the old cemetery((sic)) and placed in a new grave by the side of his brother's on the same day in the new. Bro. and Sister Miller have indeed been the subjects of deep and sore afflictions in their family. Long, long has the ruthless monster death lingered in this christian family and at last has taken from them their dear son. We tender them our sincere sympathies and pray the Lord to comfort them, and restore them to health and lift them from their deep sorrow in this painful bereavement of their dutiful and affectionate son.

DEATH OF REV. JOHN C. FLOWERS

"On the 29, of April we attended the funeral of the Rev. J. C. Flowers of this city who died on the 27 of the month after a short and very painful illness. He had but recently entered upon his labor as pastor of the M. E. Church. We learned from Mr. Green who preached the funeral sermon, and was his personal friend, that Mr. Flowers was born August the 6, 1821, in Harrison Co., West Virginia.

"While we sympathized fully with the remarks of the speaker, touching the solicitude expressed by the cleproperity ((sic)) of the M. E. Church, we could but regret that so noble emotions were not lifted up beyond a sect to the Church of God, and above the Methodism to the Gospel of Christ, as it was in the beginning. We are thankful to God however for the good that is done in the name of Methodism, and fondly hope for the day when all earnest and true hearts will be one in spirit, hope and labor. The deceased has ceased from toil and anxiety. The Lord will reward him according to his works. May He bless the sorrowing family and friends.

HEARNE FAMILY MARRIAGES AND DEATHS

The marriages and deaths that follow were extracted from Marriages from the Western Citizen, Paris, Bourbon County, Kentucky, 1826-1866, by Elizabeth T. Clough, published in the National Genealogical Society Quarterly. The newspaper Western Citizen was first published in 1808 by John A. Grimes and in 1809 it was purchased by Joel R. Lyle who published the newspaper until succeeded by his son William C. Lyle in 1829. Genealogical data abstracted from marriage notices covers a wide geographical area and was found in issues of the following years: 1826, 1828, 1830, 1831, 1834, 1836, 1838, 1839, 1848-1851, 1853, 1864-66. Issues of the paper may be seen at the Mary I. King Library at the University of Kentucky, Lexington, at Transylvania University Library, Lexington, and at the Filson Club, Louisville.

The date in parentheses after each entry is the newspaper date, not the date of the event, and all locations are in Kentucky, unless otherwise noted.

EARLY HISTORY OF MT. OLIVE METHODIST CHURCH

The class, which in early times were religious services, was organized in 1865 by Joseph Delvin and, when well enough organized, it was admitted and transferred to the Springhill Circuit of the Methodist Church by the Missouri Annual Conference held in Richmond, Mo., in 1865.

Early history of Livingston County states the first Methodist religious services in that part of the county were held at the home of Isham Ware. There in the Springhill circuit, with the parsonage in Springhill until early in this century, did the congregation continue to meet. In 1871, the meeting place was changed to the Brown school, which was northeast of the present church.

From John Redmond Dryden's records come the specifications for building a new church:

"December 1875, This is to certify that we the undersigned citizens promise to pay the following amounts, at the time specified to the Leeper class--Mt. Olive--Jamesport Circuit, Missouri Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church South, The same to be used in erecting a church for public worship, to be situated on the land of W. J. Gibbens, said church to be built near the N. line and on the first ridge N. of the corner of the N. E. of the N. E. of section 25, township 58, range 25, Livingston County, Missouri. Provided said W. J. Gibbens binds himself to give said church (M. E. C. S.) a 'Warrenty Deed' to one or more acres of land situated as above described, as soon as said building is weatherboard covered and furnished with windows and doors. Church is to be 30 x 40 feet and to be known as the Mt. Olive Church."

The list of subscribers gave mention whether payment would be cash, lumber, nails, rocks, trees, labor or team. One notation had one day of work with two yoke of cattle. The deed was recorded July 8, 1876.

The charter members include the family names of Beal, Brown, Brieze, Gibbens, Dryden, Dunn, Hale, Williams, Gann, Allnutt, McWilliams, Simmons, Walker, Elrich, Frazier, Munsy, Wilson, Robinson, Dawkins, Sanson, Mathis, Cooper, Rider, England and Boyle.

According to old records, the following were Presiding Elders: Rev. Willis E. Dockery, 1867-1869; Rev. William Penn, 1870; Rev. W. W. Jones, 1871; Rev. S. W. Allerberry, 1874; and Rev. William Wood, 1878. Early trustees were James L. Allnutt, David N. Dryden, John M. Wilson, John R. Brown and David B. Steninger.

Former pastors included Rev. S. W. Cope from 1867-69, Rev. G. Y. Beakely from 1870-73, Rev. J. A. Hyder from 1875-5, Rev. J. W. Perry from 1876-7, Rev. A. L. Gribble from 1878-9, Rev. Willis E. Dockery from 1880-85, Rev. Fox from 1886-7, Rev. Kindred from 1888-9, Rev. Shackelford from 1890-1, Rev. Rice from 1892-5, Rev. Whitworth from 1896-8, and Rev. Campbell from 1899-1900.

In 1892, members began making plans to buy land for Mt. Olive Cemetery. They again pledged what each member would give for the purchase of two acres of ground from J. R. Brown. The land cost \$104; recording the deed cost 85 cents; and \$8.50 was paid to J. Y. Powell for surveying. The committee had the plot made and the fencing done.

In 1901, the church caught fire from the flue after services and was completely destroyed. While the church was being rebuilt, meetings were again held in the Brown schoolhouse. The new church was dedicated in 1904.



A FEW TIPS ON RECORDING TOMBSTONE RECORDS

These tips are condensed from an article by Gertrude W. Lundberg which appeared in Where The Trails Cross, the quarterly of the South Suburban Genealogical and Historical Society, South Holland, Illinois.

1. Wear low-heeled shoes or boots and wear slacks which may be bound off around the ankle after spraying with insect repellant.
2. Do not work alone in a remote and isolated spot.
3. In "snake country," keep your hands away from the base of stones--use a stick to push grass or weeds out of the way. ((Note: It may also be wise to record a cemetery in this kind of country while snakes are hibernating.))
4. Lock your money in your car trunk and pin your keys to the inside of a pocket.
5. Do not touch the fancy marble stones. Old carved marble tombstones may have crystallized with age and the slightest touch will cause a piece to snap off.
6. If the stone is covered with lichen and moss, use a small bristle brush or vegetable brush to clear it, sometimes with the help of plain soap and water. Do not use phosphate detergents--they only encourage rapid regrowth of moss and lichen.
7. Carry (in your car) a large inflexible knife for cutting away the overgrowth of grass and soil on flat stones. Also carry along a stiff rod or pole to poke at the ground where your suspect a buried stone may have sunk.
8. If the stone is illegible, try splashing the stone with clear water, rubbing lightly with light chalk for dark stones or native earth for light stones. NEVER use paint of any sort. Some researchers make rubbings of hard-to-read stones.

THE SPRINGHILL CEMETERY

The Springhill Cemetery, located on the edge of the prairie about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile northwest of Springhill, is probably one of the oldest cemeteries in that part of Jackson township. Many of the pioneers to the area are buried there. Some of the tombstones have either been destroyed or covered over with prairie grass, leaving many graves unmarked. In the following pages is a list of the remaining stones, and also a list of names of those known to be buried there, though no markers are left to indicate the graves.

TYPICAL HOME

The log cabin was the first home, as with most developing areas. As soon as materials became available this became the typical home. The T-shaped house, often had a living room, a diningroom, a kitchen and a bedroom downstairs, with other bedrooms upstairs. The one downstairs bedroom was often used for births and taking care of the sick, or the elderly. All bath and laundry functions were usually done in what were called outbuildings. No electricity was available until after 1885, and for rural areas it was much longer than that.
