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#### (MEMPHIS CONTINUED)

The town of Memphis was first incorporated on the 22dd ay of June, 1853, under an act of the General Assembly of the State entitled "An act for the incorporation of towns, and to prevent the circulation of town and city scrip," approved March 2, 1843. A petition of two-thirds of the taxable inhabitants of the town was presented to the county court, whereupon the following order was made "That the said town of Memphis be and the same is hereby declared incorporated, the metes and bounds thereof as follows: Beginning onefourth of one mile west of the center of the public square of said town; thence north one fourth of one mile; thence east one-half of one mile; thence south one-half of one mile; thence west one-half of one mile; thence north one-fourth of one mile to the place of beginning; thus making the corporate limits a halfmile square, and that henceforth the inhabitants within said boundary shall be a body politic and corporate, by the name and style of "The Inhabitants of the town of Memphis," and by that name they and their successors shall be known in

law—have perpetual succession, with power to sue and be sued" and that Jacob Gray, William G. Downing, Elbridge G. Richardson, Walter P. Ellis and Jacob Elliot be and they are hereby appointed trustees of said town, to continue in office until their successors are elected and qualified." This incorporation did not last until the town was again incorporated, but was discontinued some time before the late war.

Memphis was incorporated by the county court at its February term, 1864, at which time a petition signed by two-thirds of the citizens and tax-payers of the town was presented, praying the court to incorporate the said town with metes and bounds as follows: Extending one-half mile in each direction from the center of the public square of said town under the provision of an act of the General Assembly of the State, entitled " An act for the incorporation of towns, and to prevent the circulation of town and city scrip," approved November 23, 1855. In compliance with this petition the court ordered "That said town of Memphis be and is hereby incorporated under the provisions of said act, with metes and bounds as aforesaid, and it is further ordered that James S. Best, Charles Mety, James M. Scott, James F. Harle and Mitchell McCandless be and are hereby appointed trustees of said town, to serve as such until the first regular election on the first Monday in April next, and until their successors are elected and qualified." It was intended to incorporated the town a half mile square, but the language used in the description of the boundary could only be construed to mean a circular tract one-half mile in diameter. By common consent, however, the corporate limits were considered to take in a tract onehalf mile square.

Again at the June term, 1870, of the county court, Maj. R.D. Cramer presented a petition, signed by two-thirds of the tax payers of the town, praying the court to incorporate it with metes and bounds as follows: "Commencing one-half mile due south of the center of the public square of

said town of Memphis, running thence west one-half mile; then north one mile; thence east one mile; thence south one mile; thence west one-half mile to the place of beginning, under the general statutes of the state "An entitled act for incorporation of towns and the election of officers and powers of trustees revised and amended and passed March 20, 1866." In answer to the prayer of this petition the court ordered "That said town of Memphis be and is hereby incorporated under the provisions of said act with metes and bounds as aforesaid; and it is further ordered that Harrison H. Byrne, Geo. W. Stine, Philip Payne, Henry D. Wellington and Loami Mott be and they are hereby appointed trustees of said town, to serve as such until the first regular election on the first Tuesday in April, next, and until their successors are duly elected and qualified." Under this order the town remained incorporated until 1882, when the people concluded it was time to assume "city airs." The question of incorporating as a fourth class city, under the general statutes of the state, was submitted to the electors of Memphis at an election held in said month of April, and when the votes were canvassed the question was found to be decided in favor of such incorporation. At the same election S.C. Knott was elected mayor and C.R. Combs, W.D. Hudson, Philip Payne and J.M. Penny were elected aldermen of the city. The revised ordinances of the city, consisting of forty-two in all, were passed and adopted July 25,1885. The officers at that time were N.A. Thompson, mayor; A.H. Pitkin, George H. Lawton, J.J. Townsend and C.W. Cole, aldermen and Thomas A. Rees, clerk. The corporate limits remain as they have been ever since the year 1870-one mile square.

The present officers of Memphis are C.F. Sanders, mayor; J.R. Bullard, clerk; W.T. Reddish, collector; A.P. Patterson, treasurer; W.L. Scott, assessor; L.E. Byrne, marshall; H.H. Saling, street commissioner; aldermen, first ward—Jacob Arnold and P.H. Bennett; second ward—J.C. Kinney and D. Secord.

# ENTRIES FROM MINUTE BOOK OF SCOTLAND CO. COURT 1902-1909

Among the books in the SCGS Library is the Minute Book of the Scotland County Court, 1902-1909, with entries from Sept. 1, 1902 to Jan. 5, 1909. The entries in the book provide many names and descriptions of the business conducted by the County Court during those years. The following entries were recorded during 1902. Names are spelled as they appeared in the book.

In September 1902, the Judges of the County Court were John H. Barker, Presiding Judge; Martin Miller and W.S. Hickerson, District Judges. The Sheriff was Ed L. Clark, and William L. James B. Smith gave a Bond of \$300 to the County School Fund, secured by a School Fund Mortgage, with Roy Smith, J.K. Shacklett and W.L. Ratherford as securities.

Andrew Wiley gave a Bond of \$600 to the County School Fund, secured by a School Fund Mortgage, with F.A. Chambers and J.H. Wiley as securities.

A telephone franchise was granted to C. Danenhauer, J.S. Racey and others, from Arbela north to the State line.

Roy Smith presented a petition for renewal of his Dramshop License in So. Gorin, Mo. for 6 months. Bond \$2500, securities J.B. Smith, R.W. Miller, Jos. Hicks, and Sam J. Leslie.

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
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
Relating to certain cemeteries, with penalty provisions.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

SECTION 1. Every person who shall knowingly destroy, mutilate, disfigure, deface, injure or remove any tomb, monument or gravestone, or other structure placed in any abandoned family cemetery or private burying ground, or any fence, railing, or other work for the protection or ornamentation of any such cemetery or place of burial of any human being, or tomb, monument or gravestone, memento, or memorial, or other structure aforesaid, or of any lot within such cemetery is guilty of a class A misdemeanor. For the purposes of this section and section 2 of this act, an abandoned family cemetery or private burying ground shall include those cemeteries or burying grounds which have not been deeded to the public as provided in chapter 214, RSMo, and in which no body has been interred for at least twenty-five years.

SECTION 2. Any person who wishes to visit an abandoned family cemetery or private burying ground which is completely surrounded by privately owned land, for which no public ingress or egress is available, shall have the right to reasonable ingress or egress for the purpose of visiting such cemetery. This right of access to such cemeteries extends only to visitation during reasonable hours and only for purposes usually associated with cemetery visits.

SECTION 3. Nothing in this act shall be construed to limit or modify the power or authority of a court in any action of law or equity to order the disinterment and removal of the remains form a cemetery and interment in a suitable location.



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#### AN OLD SAND HILLER INTERVIEWED

Our Correspondent Talks with a Scotland County Justice of the Peace of 34 Years Standing

#### PERSONAL REMINISCENCES

In an interview with Esq. Ferryman, of Sand Hill, we glean the following:

"I was born in Hampshire county, Virginia in 1810, and I am now 70 years old. Moved to Missouri and settled near Sand Hill on the 21<sup>st</sup> of November, 1841, and have lived in a mile and a half of the place ever since. When I came to this place there were three families living in Sand Hill and living near Sand Hill the following named persons: Reuben Cornelius, James Hicks, John Hendrix, William Myers, Major Smith, Geo. Forrester, James Davis, and old [not legible] and some few others. I do not remember the names of them now. There was a settlement north-west of where Memphis now stands, called the Hairy nation. The land where Memphis stands was covered with timber at this time.

"The first store of any note in Sand Hill was owned by James L. Benson. I have voted for the following named persons for president: William H. Harrison, James K. Polk, Zachary Taylor, Franklin Pierce, James Buchanan, John C. Breckinridge, Abraham Lincoln (in 1864), Horatio Seymour, Samuel J. Tilden and Winfield Scott Hancock. Saved seven votes and lost five.

"When I first came to Sand Hill, Scotland was not organized, and at a public gathering you would not see more than fifteen or twenty men and some of them would have to come ten miles. I was captain of a militia company and had twenty-three men on the muster roll. John Darby was our colonel. There was one term of court held at Millport and then court was moved to Sand Hill. Judge McBride held three terms of court at this place. When Scotland county was struck off, Selden Grout was our first circuit clerk, Major Smith, treasurer, and James L. Jones, sheriff. Grout died during the time the courts were held here and Major Gorin was appointed to fill the vacancy. Sheriff Jones was very popular with the people. The grand jury held their sessions out of doors and their seat was an old white oak log. When the sheriff would call around to see if anything was needed he would pass the bottle.

"Beginning with Foreman, I heard Judge McBride say that Major Gorin was the best clerk on his circuit. The members of the bar at Sand Hill was composed of several men who have held important offices since. James Green, United States senator from Missouri; Thos. L. Anderson, an ex-member of congress; Counselor Pratt, of Palmyra; James Abernathy, of Paris. These were all young men at this time. I was commissioned a Justice of the Peace in 1848, and have held the office ever since. At one time I was the only Justice in the county. I have married about fifty couples; I had the best business in that line during the war; I have had some important cases come up for trial before me. I committed a man for robbing Mort. Cole's store; he went to Jefferson. I have had two murder trials. The first was Brooks for killing LincoInfetter; both minors. The law was different in those days from now, and the accused was acquitted of willful murder. The second case was Austin Spencer for the killing of John Beele. This trial lasted one week. Col. Gantt, of Edina, conducted the prosecution, and McKee and Randolph, of Memphis, appeared for the defendant. Defendant was acquitted. I have had numerous cases of misdemeanor come before me. I have attended circuit court at Memphis when we used to meet under a large oak tree that stood just south of where the jail now stands.

"Our first circuit rider was a boy by the name of Turner. He used to come along once in six or eight weeks and would preach at some house. Our congregations usually numbered from three to six persons. The promise "where two or three are gathered together in My name," was especially adapted to us at that time, for it was just about as big a crowd as we could get together.

"From 1854 to 1860 there was a great deal of horse-racing at Sand Hill. Charlie Mety and I unloaded the first load of goods ever brought to the town of Memphis. Teams crossed the Mississippi river on the ice on the 12<sup>th</sup> day of April, 36 years ago."

From the Memphis Reveille, 23 February 1888:

DIED – FERRYMAN—Henry Ferryman died of old age at the poor farm last Saturday [February 18]. Deceased is an old resident of the county, and was honored and respected for his honesty and purity of character. When we first knew him fortune had not withdrawn its beneficent smiles. He was serving the people of Sand Hill township as justice of the peace. This office he held for many years, and for aught we know, he served the people faithfully and well. In the afternoon of life, what little property he had took wings, and he became a county charge. He has now gone to a realm where worth counts for more than wealth, and every one of his fellows will follow sooner or later, just as poor as he so far as money is concerned.

History note: Page 390 of the Minute Book, 28 March 1907, Walter B. Scott, Scotland Co. Clerk, certified the results of the March 26<sup>th</sup> Special Election on whether to build a new Court House. Vote was 1437 Yes and 605 No. The building known as the College Block was being used as the temporary Court House.

Scotland Co. Historical Notes Newspaper files, Memphis Democrat, 1922

The old building on the east side of the square which was moved here from Sand Hill and which was the building in which the first court was held in the county, was being moved by H. H. Schenk, the owner, to the lots back of the Hoover building at the northwest corner of the square. It was moved to Memphis about 1843 and was used by Judge Levi J. Wagner as an law office.

The bell in the Christian church which was razed in 1916, was brought from the streamer, "Andy Johnson" according to George M. Woodruff, Sr. The streamer which sunk in the Mississippi and bought by Wm. G. Downing, a charter member of the Memphis Christian church. (1925 files.)

The present winter has been the coldest known in America.

The Adams School house near Lawn Ridge burned last Friday night. Origin unknown.

Six more boys in the Selective draft left on Monday, March 4, 1918 for Camp Funston. The boys assembled in County clerks, I. M. Horn's office and were given their passes by Sheriff J. F. Casteen. A large crowd went to the depot with them, headed by a drum corps, composed by Dr. L. D. Hudson, Frank Hudson and Joe Tinney, followed by John Peterson, flag bearer. The boys were Geo. A. Grinstead, Harley Ross Evans, John Martin Goff, John Ellis Phelps, Nova N. Arehart and Charleys Shults. (1981 files).

Circuit Clerk Mety last year issued 123 marriage licenses. They were distributed through the year as follows: January 10; February 17; March, 13; April, 12; May, 5; June ,6; July, 5; August, 1; September, 19; October, 8; November, 18; December, 14. These figures are hardly up to the records of two or three years previous and the one license in August marks it as the dullest month in the matrimonial market in many a year. Twelve of the young men and fifteen of the young ladies to whom licenses were issued had not attained their majority and had to get the consent of their parents before the clerk would issue the license. In all but half a dozen cases one of the contracting parties was a resident of Scotland but the record shows that out of the 123 licenses eleven of the prospective brides did not reside here and that twenty-seven young men who were not residents of Scotland

County came here to secure a legal permission to wed.

Regular meeting of Best Camp, Sons of Veterans, at Odd Fellows Hall, Friday evening, January 5, (1899). All members are requested to be present.

There will be no ice famine in Memphis next season. All the dealers have filled their ice houses and quite a number of parties have put up a supply for their individual use, so that altogether there is probably twice as much ice put up in Memphis this year as there was last. All of it is good clear ice nine or ten inches thick and of better quality that is usually secured here.

We understand that F. M. Aylward has sold his farm and will locate at Brock as soon as he can build a new house. We wish him success in his new home.

Henry Hyde has opened a first class livery stable on the left corner of Slab street.

Walter and Frank Hyde are visiting their brother, Fletcher, of Wapello County, Iowa, this week.

Jacob Boyer's son, Ezra, who had the misfortune to get his leg broken five weeks ago, is not getting along very well. Instead of it being broken in the thigh it was in the hip. A specialist from Chicago was summoned and by the Xray discovered it to be in the hip joint. The bones had commenced to grow together and they were obliged to break the limb again and set it over.

The idea of making a highway was begun in Missouri about 1909 by a group of women who formed a committee to locate the Old Santa Fe Trail in Missouri. This committee was influential in securing an appropriation from the State of Missouri to mark the trail with suitable boulders or monuments.

This idea further developed into plans for a highway to be designated as the National Old Trails Road, by Act of Congress, and the work of marking was carried on in conjunction with the National Old Trails Road Association.

In 1911, the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution established a national committee, known as the National Old Trails Road Committee, whose work was, primarily, to definitely establish the Old Trails Road as a great National Memorial Highway.

In 1912, the National Old Trails Road Association came into being and stated in its bylaws that "the object of the association shall be to assist the Daughters of the American Revolution in marking Old Trails and to promote the construction of an Ocean-to -Ocean Highway of modern type worthy of its memorial character." The Association, under the presidency of Harry S. Truman, guaranteed the expense of the erection of the monuments.

In 1924, the plan was changed from a proposed small cast iron marker on the trails to that of erecting 12 large markers. In 1927, the Daughters of the American Revolution Continental Congress accepted the design--The Madonna of the Trail.

The Madonna of the Trail is a pioneer woman clasping her baby with her young son clinging to her skirts. The face of the mother, strong in character, beauty and gentleness, is the face of a mother who realizes her responsibilities and trusts in God. It has a feeling of solidarity—a monument which will stand through the ages.

The figure of the mother is of heroic proportions--10 feet high, with a

weight of 5 tons. The base upon which the figure stands is 6 feet high and weighs 12 tons. This in turn rests upon a foundation that is placed on the ground, standing two feet above the level which makes the monument 18 feet above the ground.

The figure and the base are made of algonite stone (a poured mass) of which the Missouri granite is used as the main aggregate, thus giving the monument a warm pink shade which is the color of the Missouri native granite. It was thought and expected that this stone has admirable aging qualities, and with time, would improve in color and solidarity.

On the two sides of the base are to be found words of historical data or local commemoration. These inscriptions are of the Revolutionary period or early history in respective localities. Among the inscriptions on the Indiana statue is an inscription indicating the nearby site of Indiana's first tollgate on the National Road (US 40).

These monuments were erected in each of the 12 states through which the National Old Trails Road passes. The design of the monument was that of the sculptor August Leimbach of St. Louis and was offered by Mrs. John Trigg Moss, Chairman of the National DAR Committee.

At Bethesda, Maryland during the week of April 19, 1929, the twelfth of the monuments erected by state societies of the Daughters of the American Revolution was dedicated to mark the Ocean-to-Ocean Highway in honor of the pioneer mothers of covered wagon days.

HOAXES AND SCAMS IN GENEALOGY


If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Investigate before sending money for anything.

- 1. The Phony Inheritance Scam: you've been notified you are the sole heir to this recently discovered unclaimed inheritance. Sole heir? Have you no relatives anywhere? This Scam proceeds with asking you to pay the legal fees to receive information on how to get your rightful inheritance. Or the Scam will ask you to be part of a greater group who is financing the settling of the estate through estate lawyers. This Scam sounds so truthful it is easy to see why some people will fall for it. Again if sounds too good to be true, it probably is not true. Save your money.
- 2. Family History Scam: you receive a letter in the mail from a surname research company telling you they have researched your surname and have the book for sale. They have researched back as far as 1325 and have discovered your family Coat of Arms, too. The book and the coat of arms certificate are for sale for a limited period of time. You are even given the choice of purchasing both at a discount price or purchasing just one of the items. What you receive is a book with old telephone numbers from various places in the

country. The Coat of Arms certificate is a generic symbol with a short definition of what the symbols represent. There was a company "Halberts" of Bath, OH that was shut down for this type of fraud.

- 3. Coat of Arms misconception: There are a very few individual exceptions in Eastern Europe, a Coat of Arms belongs to an individual not a family or a surname. The person holding a Coat of Arms is a direct descendent in the male line from the person who was originally granted the knighthood. Ask yourself how a company would know you have the right to display a specific Coat of Arms. To purchase a surname Coat of Arms is harmless as long as you the truth.
- 4. Old Photo's From Afar: This cam starts innocently enough: you receive a note from someone in a far distant place telling you they have found an old photo of someone with your last name. The photo was taken in your city or town and has writing on the back. Then the scammer asks if you want the photo, they will gladly send it if you will cover their costs, which includes mailing. You are then told the photo was purchased for \$10. They are never really that expensive. This cam is also used to bilk Genealogical Societies across the country. The person sends a note to the Genealogical Society telling them of the box of photo's they purchased at an antique shop all from a local photographer. They then ask for what they purchased the photo's for and shipping. The thing is you don't know the condition of the photo's and you don't know who the photo's are of. It's a good idea to steer clear of this scam.

THE GRAND INDIAN COUNCIL - FOURTEEN TRIBES SIGN THE TREATY OF PEACE

FORT SMITH, ARK., Sept. 18.

The rebel Creeks this morning came promptly forward and signed the treaty of peace. The best of feeling prevails among all parties in this tribe, as well as among Seminoles, and they seem to have entered in earnest upon the work of reconstruction among themselves, and of restoring their former relations to the government. They exhibit a good spirit in their willingness to the policy of accede to Government in relation to selling a portion of their lands, to be devoted to internal improvements in their Territory.

The southern Osages also signed the treaty. It is now signed by all the

delegates of all the tribes. Fourteen were represented, both loyal and disloyal.

As I wrote you last Friday, the proceedings of that day were not given to the public for reasons deemed prudent by the Commission. Circumstances since rendering it nowise improper that they should be known, I will state that the Commissioners on that day refused to recognize Mr. John Ross as the Chief of the Cherokees, for the reason as the Commissioners allege, that he has acted in bad faith with Government; has attempted while here to retard the work of the Commission; has endeavored to influence other tribes not to sign the treaty; has sown dissensions among his own tribe, and is not, as the Commission believed, the choice of the Cherokees for Chief.

These allegations are all denied by Mr. Ross. Mr. W.H. Ross has made a lengthy and elaborated defense, going to prove that the position of John Ross was one of strict neutrality until through force and compulsion he signed the rebel treaty; and that as soon as he could do so, and was afforded Federal protection, repudiated those obligations and joined the Federal cause. Mr. Ross also presented a protest signed by the loyal delegation of Cherokees, against this action of the commissioners.

HOAXES AND SCAMS IN GENEALOGY Source: Internet Article by Kimberly Powell

If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Investigate before sending money for anything.

1. The Phony Inheritance Scam: you've been notified you are the sole heir to this recently discovered unclaimed inheritance. Sole heir? Have you no relatives anywhere? This Scam proceeds with asking you to pay the legal fees to receive information on how to get your rightful inheritance. Or the Scam will ask you to be part

of a greater group who is financing the settling of the estate through estate lawyers. This Scam sounds so truthful it is easy to see why some people will fall for it. Again if sounds too good to be true, it probably is not true. Save your money.

- 2. Family History Scam: you receive a letter in the mail from a surname research company telling you they have researched your surname and have the book for sale. They have researched back as far as 1325 and have discovered your family Coat of Arms, too. The book and the coat of arms certificate are for sale for a limited period of time. You are even given the choice of purchasing both at a discount price or purchasing just one of the items. What you receive is a book with old telephone numbers from various places in the country. The Coat of Arms certificate is a generic symbol with a short definition of what the symbols represent. There was a company "Halberts" of Bath, OH that was shut represent. down for this type of fraud.
- 3. Coat of Arms misconception: There are a very few individual exceptions in Eastern Europe, a Coat of Arms belongs to an individual not a family or a surname. The person holding a Coat of Arms is a direct descendent in the male line from the person who was originally granted the knighthood. Ask yourself how a company would know you have the right to display a specific Coat of Arms. To purchase a surname Coat of Arms is harmless as long as you the truth.
- 4. Old Photo's From Afar: This cam starts innocently enough: you receive a note from someone in a far distant place telling you they have found an old photo of someone with your last name. The photo was taken in your city or town and has writing on the back. Then the scammer asks if you want the photo, they will gladly send it if you will cover their costs, which includes mailing. You are then told the photo was purchased for \$10. They are never really that expensive. This cam is also used to bilk Genealogical Societies across the country. The person sends a note to the Genealogical Society telling them

of the box of photo's they purchased at an antique shop all from a local photographer. They then ask for what they purchased the photo's for and shipping. The thing is you don't know the condition of the photo's and you don't know who the photo's are of. It's a good idea to steer clear of this scam.

#### MIDDLE FABIUS

Middle Fabius being one of the oldest churches in Scotland County is located in township 65, range 13 west, and is about 9 miles west of Memphis. It derives its name from the stream, Middle Fabius, which is very near.

Even before its organization it was noted as a site for camp meetings. It is also noted as having one of the most beautiful locations for a church in this county, it having a large natural park in front of the church with a drive from either side back to the church.

In the year of 1838 Rev. S.G. Briggs came to Scotland county and found the following members living near: George D. Slavin, Ann Slavin, Jno. W. Barnett, Margret Barnett, Catherine Givins, Elizabeth Isaacs and Marthy North. After meeting and worshiping at each others houses they built a small cabin house in which to worship and proceeded to organize a church with Rev. S.G. Briggs as pastor.

In the early fall of 1840 the members built a number of neat little cabins in which to lodge during the camp meetings and the writer has been told that they brought their cows along in order to have milk during their stay which was for a week or two at a time.

The writer was told by F.M. Hope, now deceased how the present cemetery was started.

He said that a peddler traveling through the country stopped at a home west of the church (now owned by M.L. Bondurant), where he spent the night and he took ill very suddenly and

died. And being a complete stranger the party living there sent his slaves to the present cemetery to dig the grave and they dug the grave north and south, instead of east and west as is the custom.

During the fall of 1841 members and neighbors built a hewn log church in the square of cabins which was used for 15 or 16 years when it was sold and the cabins abandoned and in 1857 a new church was built.

The present building was erected in 1877, the lumber being hauled from the river near Alexandria.

The first Sunday school was organized February 15, 1847 with Rev. S.G. Briggs as superintendent.

In the early day the old Pulltight store and post office (which was located 1½ miles east where the present road intersects the state highway No. 4), served the community.

Dr. J.D. Skidmore was the physician for the community and was known to be a friend to the poor. His home and office was located ¼ west of Pulltight.

Middle Fabius school (commonly called Pulltight), is located ½ mile west of what was known as Pulltight.


