As a commissioned officer in the USAF, Jidue's military assignments took him to all parts of the world, including India, France, the Pentagon, and East Base in Great Falls.

It was in Great Falls that he met a bright and pretty young country girl named Patricia Jane Tuel. She served as his secretary when he came to town with a military team commissioned to investigate a plane crash at the State Fair in the 1940's, Patsy Tuel strongly resisted the overtures of the handsome young Major Abdallah, She was heard to remark: "If I had a name like that I'd change it..." It was in November of 1946, that Major and Mrs. Abdallah began their journey as military husband and wife. Their daughter lanet Lynn was born to them while stationed in Paris, France, Twins Steven Peter and Julie Patricia joined them while stationed at Wright-Patterson AFB in Ohio. Their military years were good years. Dad retired in 1963, a "full-bird" Colonel. We were all very proud of his USAF achievements. Veteran public defender John L. Adams died on Tuesday, Oct. 22, 2002, at St. Vincent's Healthcare, at the age of 78.

John was born on April 3. 1924, in Red Oak, Iowa, a son of John and Lora Adams, When he was 2, the family moved to the Billings area, where he was raised and educated, graduating from Billings Senior High School. He then served his country for 2-1/2 years by enlisting in the Army in 1943. Following his honorable discharge, he continued his education at Eastern Montana College and graduated with a law degree from the University of Montana Law School in 1954. John married Alice L. Conrad in Billings on July 30, 1960.

John began work as a deputy attorney county Yellowstone County in 1956. He was appointed Yellowstone County attorney in 1965 and elected to a four-year term to the office in 1966. In 1970, he began work as a part-time public defender and in 1992, he became first-ever part of the Yellowstone County Public Defenders Office with administrator and office space. Dealing almost exclusively in criminal law, John tried over 200 felony cases with several capital cases. Mr. Adams retired in 1995.

John truly believed that he was a public servant.

A strong advocate of the Sixth Amendment, he served as a public defender for 23 years. He believed helping the poor with out charge was an obligation o all legal professionals and he maintained this line of thought in his private life as well.

John enjoyed being around people, helping them with whatever was needed, whenever it was needed. He liked to read and it was not uncommon for him to

He was assigned to Gen. Eisenhower's general staff to teach mountain warfare in Africa in preparation for the invasion of Italy. As the company commander of Company "L," 142nd Inf. Rgt., he participated in the first landing of U.S. forces in Europe, the amphibious landing at Salerno, Italy. The Rapido River crossing, the battle for Monte Cassino, the Anzio invasion, the attack on Velletri and the liberation of Rome followed.

On Nov. 22, 1944, Eric led Company G, 143rd Inf. Rgt. in a morning assault on a fortified German position in the Vosges Mountains near St. Leonard. France. There were four attacks on his position. He captured two enemy machine gun emplacements and called in artillery fire upon his own position because "there were more Germans than Americans" there. When he ran out of ammunition, he held the position with ammunition and rifles abandoned by the Germans. In the end, his 81-man company was reduced to eight survivors. A graves registration officer would later tell him that 486 German dead were taken from the area. For his actions that day, he and his executive officer. Lt. Richard Grousset, were awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, the Army's second highest award for valor. He then fought battles at St. Marie and Selestadt, Eric also received the Silver Star. Bronze

star and live Purple Heart citations. He was fond of retelling the story that, after his fifth Purple Heart, his commanding general told him, "I'm sending you back to the States. You've done enough."

After the war, he returned to his beloved Gallatin Valley where he raised cattle on his ranch southwest of Bozeman, After a detour to attend medical school in Buffalo, N.Y., he received a master's degree in animal science from MSU in 1965, and later worked toward a Ph.D. in biochemistry at the University of Wyoming. He worked for the USDA at Beltsville, Md., then the U.S. Biological Warfare Center at Pine Bluff, Ark, He would develop a patented cattle mineral supplement known as Silent Herder.

He was a member of the Baghdad Temple of the Shrine, the American Legion and the Disabled American Veterans. He became the National Commander of the Legion of Valor in 1996. His faith was battletested, and he enjoyed the company of his fellow combat veterans. He loved his family and their achievements, including the special accomplishments of his Down's Syndrome son, Richard.


