Our parents moved to the Yellowstone Valley in the early 1930s and farmed irrigated land in the Shepherd vicinity. They moved into Billings later on, where our father worked in construction.

After Dad's passing in 1972, our mother made many motor coach trips back and forth across the United States and Canada. Teresa Marston (Branaugh) passed away June 28, 2002, at

Aspen Meadows.

She was born on Skull Creek outside of Newcastle, Wvo., on June 6, 1916. She was the youngest of four surviving children born to Joseph and Mattie Jordan. She was preceded in birth by three siblings, Wyomia, John and Dan, in that order. Joe and Mattie divorced when Teresa was a very young child. As a result of this divorce, Teresa and Dan were placed in the orphanage at Alliance, Neb. The Catholic Church operated the orphanage. This event was a very important character-forming event Mom's life. Just how important this event was became quite evident during the last several years of her life whenever she spoke of those sad times. Those that knew her best believe her intense love and appreciation of family stemmed from her understanding that you can lose those you love most in a single instant without causing or deserving that loss.

As a young child, Teresa spent the school year at the orphanage with the summer months being spent with a variety of everchanging extended families. It was during this time of her life that she was able to spend time with her maternal grandparents, Grandma and Grandpa Hallisey. Some of Mom's most treasured memories are those times she

was able to spend with her Grandma and Grandpa. Mom often said that the passing of her Grandma Hallisey was an event whose sadness she felt throughout her life.

As a young teenager, Mom came to live with her older sister. Wyomia and family Powderville, Mont. It was during this time that she met handsome young cowboy by the name of Doug Marston, whose family resided nearby. Soon this friendship became a more seriously romantic relationship. However, at this time. Mom's father, Joe fordan, asked her to come to the West Coast in order to keep house for him and her brother Dan. While this move would mean a probable end of her wishes for the future with her young cowboy, Mom left for the coast in order to take care of her dad and brother. The years on the coast passed quickly. Mom was back with her family again, taking care of her dad and brother Dan. Mom's oldest brother John and his family lived nearby. These

were happy times, times Mom always looked back on with fond remembrance. The war was looming on the horizon; brothers John and Dan found work in the shipyards or in other defense industries. Often, Mom would relate stories about having to cope with rationing, about having to follow blackout procedures and all the other concerns a country in total war had to contend with. Mom often said, "We were worried about how the war was going but we grew our own vegetables and raised our own meat. We had enough, and probably more than many families; most of

all, we were together again."

Following the war, Mom met a young returning serviceman at a dance in Okanogan, Wash.. This man. Robert Terrell Jones. became the apple of Mom's eye and the young couple married soon thereafter. Robert was a heavy equipment operator and worked on a variety of post war construction projects as a dozer operator. Robert also "skinned cat" for various logging companies on the Olympic Peninsula. This marriage produced a son, Robert Michael, but was not destined to last. In 1952 the couple separated, divorcing soon after. Teresa returned to Montana with her son. Teresa arrived at Alzada. Mont, where she began to manage the Valley Inn Cafe for her sister, Wyomia Thorne. While working at the cafe, Teresa met and fall in love with Bill

Branaugh, who had a small ranch close to Alzada. As events unfolded, this meeting led to a marriage that lasted until Bill's passing at Missoula in September of 1969. While together, the family spent time in Ekalaka operating the New Life Cafe. Next, Bill and Teresa operated Albion

store/post office/bar. In 1955, Bill went to work on a gravel project with the state of Montana Highway Department. At that time, he discovered that he had a love for

work and working with heavy equipment. For the next four years, the family moved throughout Montana, South Dakota and Wyoming, working whenever Summits Construction Company had an ongoing project. Spring, summer and early fall were spent on the job with Summits. After the earth hardened in October/November. the family moved back to Alzada. where Bill would find work for the winter. During the years with Summits, Teresa operated the company cook shack. She made breakfast, sack lunches and supper for all the unmarried men who had no one to cook for them. In 1959, the family moved to Ekalaka, Bill went to work for the Carter Co. Road Department

operating a road grader. Teresa went to work at the hospital cooking for the patients and staff. In 1960, the family moved from Ekalaka to Broadus, where Bill went to work with Powder River Co. road department. Teresa worked at the I.G.A. store, Christiansen's V-Store, as well as the school cafeteria. In 1966, we moved again to Missoula, where Bill found work with the Missoula street department. In February 1968, Bill was diagnosed with stomach cancer. He fought off the inevitable until September of 1969, when he passed away. Teresa continued to reside in Missoula until 1971, when she sold the family home and moved back to Broadus, so as to be near her family. Teresa often compared living in Missoula to living on the far side of the moon. "It's so far from everyone and I feel too closed in by the mountains." After arriving back in Broadus, Teresa worked at the high school before starting to work at the Big Sky Bar. Teresa worked for Bill Trusler at the Big Sky from 1972 until 1979. She then worked at the courthouse until her retirement in 1981.

In 1980, while Teresa and her sister Wyomia were passing through Hardin, following a weekend visit with her son, Mike, in Billings, they stopped off for a bite to eat at the Stockman's Cafe

in Hardin. While entering the cafe, Teresa literally ran into Doug Marston, the not so young but still handsome cowboy from those many years ago Powderville. They sat down for a visit and soon were exchanging telephone numbers and addresses. One thing led to another and the result was their marriage in early 1981 at the Congregational Church on South 36th Street in Billings. What a happy day for them and everyone else who loved them so. The Marstons lived at their home in Broadus with both of them being retired. There was plenty of time for the garden, the yard, fishing, camping and visiting. With her marriage to Doug at long last, Teresa gained a brand new family as she came to know and dearly love: Doug's three children, Bim, Doug Jr., Sherry and their families. Doug and Teresa resided at their home in Broadus until November 1991. when they moved to Billings in order to live with Teresa's son Mike, just up the street from the church on 36th Street where they were married.

Chief among Teresa's reasons for moving were the concerns she felt for Doug's health. True enough, in early 1992, Doug had a heart attack, which he most likely would not have survived had he been still living in Broadus. However, with immediate care, which was available in Billings, Doug not only survived but was able to return home to Broadus, where they spent their last summer at their home. In early 1993, Doug experienced a second heart attack, which was even more of a close call than the first one. Once again, the prompt medical care available in Billings made the difference between life and death. Later that year, he underwent open-heart surgery at Deaconess Hospital in Billings. His stay at the hospital was very lengthy with numerous complications. Teresa spent nearly every waking hour with him from August through November when he could be discharged to Aspen Meadows T.L.C. unit. Teresa later said how glad she was for the care Doug was given at Aspen. Doug's health remained very delicate from then. on. He experienced a stroke in the summer of 1994. Teresa was never more than a step away from him, from his discharge at Aspen in 1993 until his eventual passing at home in Billings in March of 1996. Teresa continued to reside with her son at the home on South 36th. They were able to take several trips together to Casner, Wvo., lackson Hole,

Wyo., and Missouia. They spend nearly every weekend during the summer of 1997 fixing up her rental property in Broadus.

In 1998, Teresa's son underwent an open-heart procedure at Deaconess; Teresa once again became a 24/7 care provider until her son could return to work. Never once did she complain or falter in her efforts to provide the care which was needed.

Beginning in June 2001, it became evident that somehow. for some reason, Teresa was beginning to lose ground. A subsequent visit to Dr. Coon confirmed that something was indeed wrong. Further tests indicated that Teresa had a large advanced malignant ovarian tumor in the lower right part of her body. The prognosis was deemed fatal. Doctors recommended chemotherapy, surgery and then more chemo. Perhaps they said, she might have two years, if all went well. All did not go well as Teresa suffered a stroke four days after her first chemo session. After leaving the hospital in late August, Teresa moved to the same Aspen T.L.C. unit, which Doug had used for his convalescence in 1993. Teresa later transferred to the nursing home side of Aspen where she remained until her passing on June 28, 2002.
