He was united in marriage to Eva Marian Jerbic on July 5, 1932. They celebrated 69 years of marriage together. Eva preceded him in death on Aug. 7, 2001.

In 1925, Art became a special deputy sheriff for Fergus County, and he was frequently called upon to assist the office force until he was appointed a regular deputy in 1928. He remained in this service for two years. He then returned to the Half Moon Ranch; however, he still continued to retain the duties of a special deputy.

For several years, he and his family resided in Lavina, where his children graduated from high school. Art continued his ranching in Fergus County and Golden Valley County all this time.
