





Young Norman helped his father finish breaking out the other needed 20 acres using a one bottom walking plow and a threehorse team. This was hard work for an II year old, but was only a forerunner of the many other hardships that Norman would encounter. However, he learned young that by hard work, he could achieve his goals.

them and they moved to Jordan and later to Havre. The land had almost been lost due to unpaid taxes. But when Norman was given a quitclaim deed by his father, he worked at various jobs in order to pay the taxes and redeed the property.

In 1935, Norman married Lucille Edwards and within a few years, five children joined the family: Sonny, Skip and Mardrie (Baker) all live within the county. Betty and Norma both married and both live within a day's drive

from the ranch.

The Olson family spent many hours entertaining themselves with their musical talent. Norman played the fiddle, and his two sons, Sonny and Skip, play several instruments. Their musical abilities have made them one of the most desired dance bands in Garfield County and several surrounding counties.

Norman was always ready to help a neighbor when needed and was a jack-of-all-trades. When the Lutheran Church needed carpentry work done, he joined the crew. He worked at the Farmers Union to help pay the grocery bill while still running the ranch. Later he bought a threshing machine and for many years threshed grain for the neighbors and for himself. In the '50s, he put the threshing machine to rest and bought a combine.


