Charles "Chuckie" was born Feb. 19, 1947, in Forsyth, the firstborn son of Nelson Tallbuil, Sr. and the late Aliwitchie Fisher, He is the maternal grandson of the late Eugene Fisher, who served as president of the Northern Chevenne Tribe for numerous years and was a member of the Chiefs Society and the paternal grandson of Charles Tallbull and Albert Tallbull, who served numerous years as the selected Northern Cheyenne medicine man and was a member of the Dog Soldier Society.

Chuckie was raised and educated in Lame Deer and attended school in Lame Deer and Busby High School. After he graduated, he enlisted in the Army on Oct. 5, 1966, and did his basic training in Fort Ord, Calif., and served in the Army AUS Infantry as a E-4, until Oct. 4, 1968. He took great pride in serving as a sniper for the Army for one year in Vietnam. Chuckie received a honorable discharge after he received a bullet wound to his head. The remainder of his life was deeply

affected by this experience. He suffered from side effects of Agent Orange and suffered from arthritis, back and neck surgery. and post-traumatic stress, all related to his experiences in the war. Charles is one of the most decorated Northern Chevenne veterans. He earned the Purple Heart, National Defense Service Metal. Vietnam Service Metal. Campaign Vietnam Medal. Infantry Marksman Combat Badge, among other military honors.

Upon returning from the war, Chuckie made his home in Ashland, and worked for the Northern Cheyenne Tribe in various positions, namely in the wood construction business. If there was to be one word to describe Chuckie it would be "generous." He had a heart as big as this world and would do anvthing for anybody at any time. He was especially close to his family and many dear friends. Prior to entering the Shoulder Blade Center two weeks ago, his dad, Nelson, lived and cared for Chuckie in his home in Ashland.






