His daughter Pamela (Butcher) was born in 1944 while he was flying a mission over the "Hump" on which day the hydraulic system on his B25 failed as he struggled to clear the Himalayas, forcing an emergency landing in China — both events unknown at the time to each other. Following his Asian tour of duty, he spent the remainder of WWII training pilots in Texas.

After the war, Doug attended law school at the University of Utah at the top of his class, but elected not to take the bar exam because of the large number of law school graduates following WWII, and instead switched to studying engineering, which had better career opportunities.

He entered the steel industry, where he was employed by U.S. Steel (Orem, Utah), Hammond Iron (Provo, Utah, and Casper, Wyo.), Eaton Metal Company (Rapid City, Billings, Salt Lake, Denver), the Southern California Water District as senior production supervisor on the Northern California Water Pipeline Project, May Steel Corporation

(Wisconsin) and the Stelite Corporation (Indiana). He built a reputation as one of the top production managers in the steel industry.

Often during his career, he was hired by corporations in financial trouble to restructure their production systems to remain solvent. (He could operate a slide rule as fast as most people today use a calculator and loved to solve math and engineering problems.) One of his memorable projects, while with Eaton Metal Corporation, was to bid, supervise the construction and deliver to their South Dakota sites the massive Titan missile tunnel junctions (underground structures which trains could be driven through).

In 1976, Doug retired from the steel industry "rat race" and purchased the interest in the Lewistown health food store the Pantry from the partner of his daughter Pam that he and Gayle operated until finally retiring and selling it to his grandson Ross Butcher in 1993.

A high-energy person, he immersed himself in photography, rock hounding, woodworking, decorative welding and golf, in addition to being a prolific reader. He was a 27-year friend of Bill W. and was instrumental in founding Lewistown's Triangle Club. He also enjoyed his friends in the Outlook Club and the intellectual stimulation

of their monthly meetings. His motto for encouragement of his wife Gayle during difficult times was "illegitimi non-carborundum," which was very characteristic of Doug, who had a great sense of humor, and was a superb storyteller, which he developed during his years of high school and college, debating and later in Toastmasters.

Stella Amelia Larson Waters was born to Norwegian immigrant parents, Lars and Bertha, Christmas Day. 1903. Cottonwood, Minn. She joined sister Minnie, Lars' daughter from his first marriage. Sister Anna and brother LeRoy were born later in Cottonwood. In 1907, the Larsons moved to a homestead near Medicine Lake, where brother Norman and sister Thelma were born. The Larson children were all baptized into the Lutheran faith.

Stella was a leader who played on Medicine Lake's firs girls basketball team. She gradu ated salutatorian of her class and went on to college at the Montana Normal School ir Dillon. She became a teacher and took her first teaching position in Plentywood. She later moved to Fallon, Nev., where she taught commercial subjects at the high school level. During the Great Depression, she sent the lion's share of her paycheck home to her parents who struggled on the dry land farm.

Her passion for travel was cultivated in the late 1920s when she traveled solo to China to visit teacher friends and explore. Years later, found among her few earthly possessions were silk tapestries and snapshots of temples and rickshaws, memories of

her China trip.

In the early 1930s, Stella moved to California, living in Los Angeles and eventually moving to the San Francisco Bay Area, where she stayed for many years. She taught high school typing and shorthand at Hayward High. Her sparse apartment was evidence of her frugal ways. She played tennis and hiked to stay fit

In the late 1940s, Stella took a teaching sabbatical and lived in South America for one year. Souvenirs of her travels included llama bedspreads and colorful wool vests shared with her siblings, nieces and nephews.

Stella was devoted to her nieces and nephews and their children. Over the years, she was the aunt who passionately gave undivided attention and unconditional love to the children and grandchildren of her brothers and sisters. Whether Stella took kids on nature walks and swimming or to art museums and theatrical productions she relished in the event just as much as the kids. She provided travel experiences and college financial assistance to many of the young relatives always stressing the value of education and travel.

In the 1960s, Stella pursued her interest in family history by taking another sabbatical, this time to Norway. She spent a year

scouring churches and contacting distant relatives piecing together her genealogy. Feeling that it was never too late to learn, she decided in her mid-sixties to learn the language, taking Norwegian speaking and writing lessons. Upon Aunt Stella's return, the nieces and nephews once again received wonderful and curious gifts. The hand knit Norwegian sweaters and keepsakes to this day.

After a teaching career that spanned 45 years, Stella retired in 1969. She staved on at her apartment in Hayward, frequently visiting sister Anna in San Francisco. Stella was a member of the Sons of Norway and the Sierra Club. She continued to travel the United States visiting relatives. While in Richey visiting sister Thelma Jensen, she met family friend Otis Waters. Otis had been widowed in 1972 and by 1975, the two were discovering a special friendship. Otis visited his brother in California and also visited Stella in Hayward. Over several years a sweet romance blossomed and the two were married in 1977. They honeymooned in Palm Springs for a month before returning to live in Richev.

Stella's first marriage at 73 years old was a delight to all. She surprised the family and herself. She loved belonging to Otis' large extended family: Dale (Mickey), Stanley (Erda), Keith (Joyce), Verna Kemmis (Eldon), Lynn (Iackie), and Delbert (Patsy) and was proud of the six children, their children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. She enjoyed Otis' church, Richey United Methodist Church, She enjoyed the fellowship of the Richey Senior Citizens Center, Meals on Wheels provided many a noontime visitor to their home. She paid special attention to Otis' children and grandchildren. The small town welcomed her and watched over her, especially after the symptoms disease became Alzheimer's apparent. Her long walks were carefully and lovingly monitored by the caring souls of Richey.

The Waters shared 14 years before Otis died in 1991 at the age of 101. Jordan J. Webber III was the last of nine children born to immigrant parents, German-French Jordan J. Webber II and Hungarian Rosalia Pospisil Webber on Aug. 24, 1925, in the family farmhouse near Elysian School outside Billings. In 1928, the family purchased their farm

south of Bridger. Jordan attended New Prospect Grade School, walking every day, three miles, uphill, in deep snow, both ways, and graduated from Bridger High School in 1943.

That summer, he joined the U.S. Army Air Force, and completed an extensive two-year training program as a photo reconnaissance pilot in highly modified Lockheed Lightning fighter planes. With all armament removed to make room for cameras, the plane's only defense was speed. Casualty rates for reconnaissance pilots, already very high in Europe, were expected to be much worse when invading Allies faced the fierce defenses of Japanese home islands. Jordan was ready to ship out for service over Japan in August 1945 when the atomic bombs ended the war. Jordan's wife and offspring owe a debt of gratitude to Col. Paul Tibbets and his B-29 bomber, the Enola Gay. Thanks to them, Jordan survived the war to marry and raise a family, though because he had not left U.S. soil as a serviceman. he could never join the Veterans of Foreign Wars, a lifelong regret.

Along with thousands of other pilots, Jordan was mustered out of the Army Air Force in December 1945 with an honorable discharge, but he continued to fly for a while in B-24 bombers as a member of the Air Force Reserve, receiving his honorable

discharge in 1956. Except for his family, his flying days were the

highlight of his life.

fordan worked at various jobs in Billings for a couple of years before he got up the courage to ask Edward DeRudder, Sr., father of his high school sweetheart Bertha Marie, for her hand in marriage. The gruff, tacitum old Belgian thought about it for a bit, chewed his snoose, spit, and agreed. On a sunny day in January 1947 with a warm chinook wind blowing, they were united in the old Sacred Heart Church, Bridger. Next day the temperature dropped to 30 below. Their timing was good ... they could keep each other warm.

Jordan and Bertha lived in Billings for a couple of years before moving to their first farm near Silesia in 1950. In 1952, they moved to the Webber clan's farm south of Bridger. While they raised five kids, he farmed in the summer and worked winter jobs at the rock quarry near Frannie, Wyo., and at the sugar factory in Billings. The family at one time or another had large numbers of cattle, or sheep, or hogs, or the last enterprise, egg-laying chick ens. He worked full-time for the USDA Soil Conservation Service for several years, but in 1966 went back to farming full time. Then in 1971, Jordan made a

major career change: he gave up farming and became an electrician and instrument repairman at the Billings Exxon Refinery. In the early 70s, he and Bertha built their lovely log home on land next to the family farm now owned and operated by his son, Roger, the third generation of Webbers to do so. He worked at Exxon until a heart attack in 1987 persuaded him to take medical retirement in 1988.

After recovery, he spent a lot of time working with Roger on the farm and loved to help out, though the family sometimes joked that he drove farm equipment like he was flying fighter planes again, throttle to the wall. He cared for a large lawn and tended a vegetable garden, usually boasting 48 heads of cabbage. Most of those went to the Billings Rescue Mission each autumn, for which fact the family was grateful.

Jordan donated considerable time to the construction of the new Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Bridger in 1956, and was active in church affairs throughout his life. It was he who built the mud grate still in use at the church's front door with the words "Sacred Heart" woven into the steel. He served on the Bridger School Board as a member, and as its chairman when the grade school building was replaced in 1966. He served as board member or president of

Many of his engineering efforts at land leveling and water control while working for SCS are still in use today around Carbon County. 




