

Ann Taylor was born in Glendive on July 7, 1913, to Jack and Eva (Martin) Schloss. They had both immigrated to the U.S. from the area of Odessa, Russia. Ann had three brothers and four sisters.

She began her schooling in Glendive. Ann's father died when she was 12 years old and she had to start working to help support the family. As her first job, she lived and worked for the Hagen family while going to school. Many jobs and experiences followed, such as work at Carey's Sweet Shop and in the diet kitchen of the hospital.

Ann was united in marriage to Erwin Atwood in 1931. They had two children, a son who died as a baby and a daughter. The Atwood family had a dairy southeast of town, so she kept busy working with the family. She worked at the J.C. Penney Store in the men's department. They worked on a commission or bonus and she usually topped the other employees in sales.

In 1944, after having been divorced, she married Cecil Taylor of Richey. In March of 1945, they moved to Richey, where Cecil farmed. Four children were born of this union, two daughters and two sons. Shortly after moving to Richey, she ran the cafe for Merl and Lena Long for a short time.

Ann always loved to play cards and with her "card smarts," she usually had very good luck. She worked at the Reynolds Store in Richey when Kenneth McGovern was the manager. After that, she was asked by the banker to reopen the cafe. She had Taylor's Cafe for 14 years. Her delicious food was well-known in the area; her doughnuts and pies were in demand. Some would come in and order certain types of pie when they had company coming.

The family moved to Billings for one year, but decided small-town living and the farm were calling them back. Shortly after returning, Elmer Schmasow asked her if she would run the Stockman Bar while he and Viola took a trip to California. She ended up with the ownership of the bar for 11 years. Many tales could be told about those years, but enough said when I say she ruled it with a heavy hand. She

wanted the customers to enjoy themselves, but no foul language or rough-housing was allowed. They were soon shown the door and some never allowed to enter again. They knew she meant business when she said to behave or get out. When there was time, you could see her playing cribbage or pinochle with whomever was available.







Loretta Brown, in a double wedding ceremony on June 13, 1950, along with Lloyd Brown to Rosemarie Tescher in Sentinel Butte.



He won most of the major rodeos from Madison Square Garden to Pendleton, Calgary to Fort Worth to Miami. In 1959 and 1963, he won the Saddle Bronc riding at the National Finals and qualified for the steer wrestling in 1959 also. He was runner up in the Saddle Brone Championship of the world in 1964 and third in the All-Around, In 1965 he only competed in 13 rodeos and placed at all of them, which qualified him for the National Finals. He qualified on every horse and threw every steer in the four times he competed at the National Finals. In 1975, in his last year of rodeo competition. Jim entered seven rodeos and placed at all of them. Jim was among the first group of inductees into the North Dakota Cowboy Hall of Fame in 1998.

Jim enjoyed hard work, but also enjoyed having fun which included fishing, card playing, softball, storytelling and tickling the grand-kids on the living room carpet. Jim was an avid Minnesota Twins fan. He enjoyed raising good horses and good cattle and insisted things





Pam finished two years at BYU and returned home to complete her bachelor's degree at North Carolina State University in 1975.

After a three-year letter-writing courtship, Pam and Kevin got married in Washington, D.C., on the 28th of June, 1975. Pam skipped her own college graduation to attend her wedding.

Both Pam and Kevin chose to become teachers, and their family lived in Provo. Utah; Eugene, Ore.; and Eagle River, Wis., before eventually returning to Worland (where Kevin grew up). Pam's career as a preschool teacher began in Eugene and continued in Eagle River and Worland Her classroom was a humane place, where children were welcomed with open arms despite their "disabilities" and weaknesses. Pam also worked as a receptionist for Frontier Archaeology during its years of operation, where she welcomed various archaeologists despite their disabilities and weaknesses.

Most recently, Pam was employed by The Children's Resource Center and was a teacher and case manager in Thermopolis. She was instrumental in helping to build a strong program there.

Pam and Kevin had a curlyheaded daughter born in each of the locations they lived. Katie and her husband Britt, Megan and Annie, all currently reside in Salt Lake City. Emily lives with her




