Creek. He was the son of Montana pioneer parents; his father, C.W. "Bill" Kamhoot came to Montana in 1895 from Minnesota and his mother, Marion McIntosh, was the first white child born on Rosebud Creek in 1882.

His early life was spent ranching to be followed by construction work as a welder on the Kerr Hydro-Electric Dam Project near Polson.

He then returned to ranching and in 1946 purchased the International Harvester implement dealership in Forsyth. He spent the rest of his years in many different business ventures to nelude the Kaiser-Frazer and Pontiac car dealerships, selling irplanes, a John Deere dealer-

ship, establishing the first auto parts wholesale store in Forsyth, and later on, a grocery store. He also learned to fly and used small airplanes in the machinery business doing sales and service work in the large service area that spanned from the Fort Peck Lake to the Wyoming border.

His involvement in public life and politics started in 1938 as secretary/treasurer for the local AFL Pipe Fitters Union during the Kerr Dam period.

Later, he served as a director on the Powder River Farm Loan Association in Miles City and as president of the Hi-way Six Association which was formed to complete Highway 12 into an all weather road. Art was very active in local organizations. He was a member and past master of the Hiram Masonic Lodge #52 in Forsyth, member of the York Rite Masons of Forsyth, member of the Al Bedoo Shrine Temple in Billings, and member and past patron of the Bethlehem Chapter #27 of Eastern Star in Forsyth. He was also Chamber of Commerce president several times, golf club president and Lions Club president. He also served as district

overnor of District 3/A or Lions nternational and received the restigious Melvin Jones award. He served on the school board, tospital board, city council, board of county commissioners and was a delegate to the 1972 Concon which rewrote the Montana Constitution. In addition, he was also a director of the First Bank of Forsyth for Il years.
