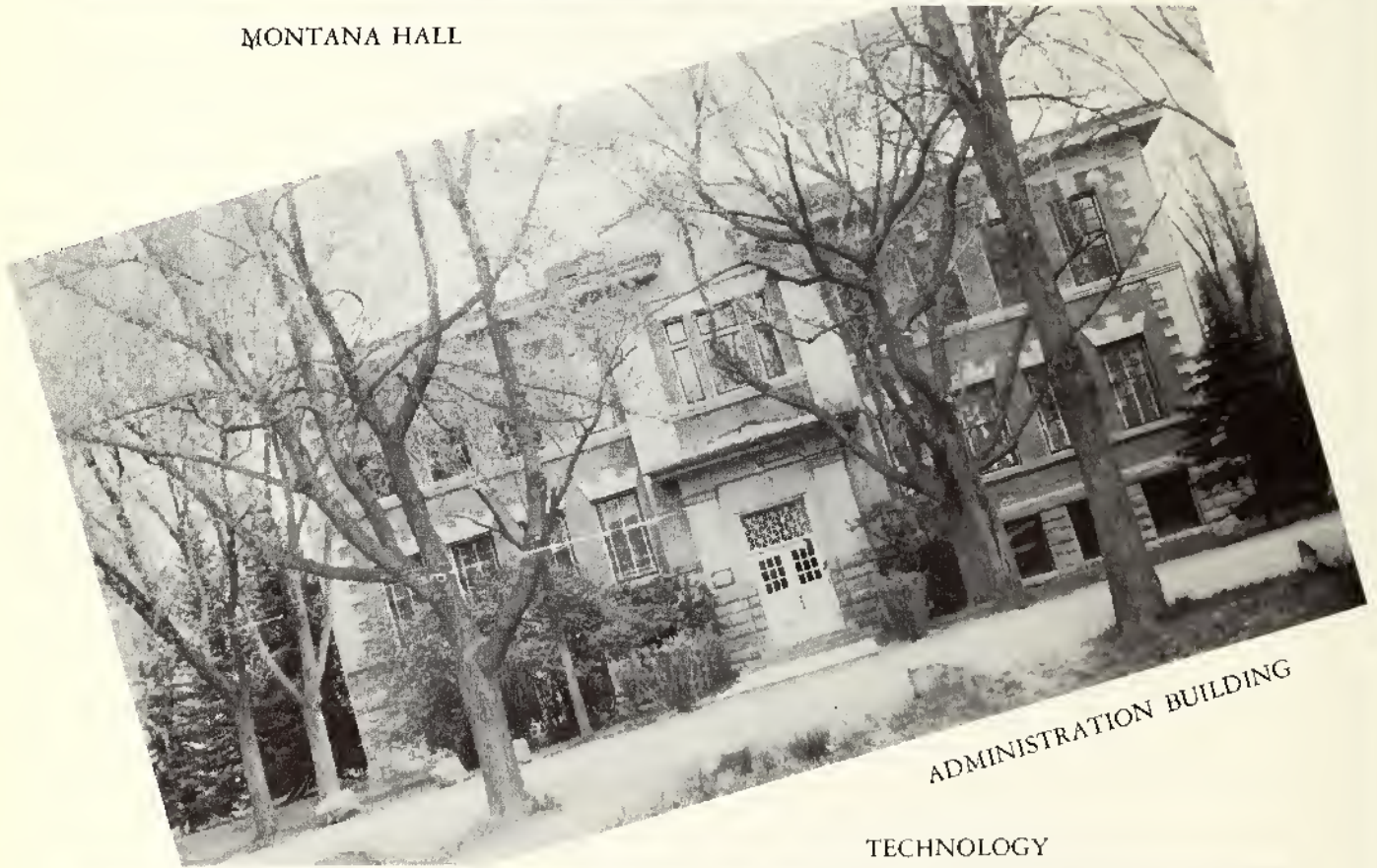


DR. CLOYD H. CONNER

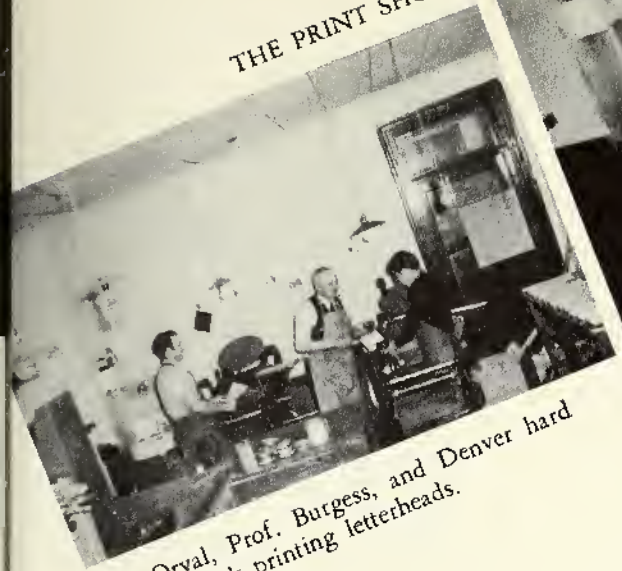
