
Though we may not at times be conscious of her presence, always our protecting angel is nearby and ready to aid us whenever she can.

DR. E. M. HIGHSMITH Dean of Faculty

The high standard of Hardin College Normal Training Department was greatly increased this year by the addition of Dr. E. M. Highsmith as Head of the Department of Education and Dean of the Faculty.

He possesses a firm foundation in an excellent college training, having received his Ph. B., A. M., and Ph. D. from the University of North Carolina and his A. M. from Peabody College. This work he supplemented with graduate work in both Columbia University and Peabody College. In his entire college career he won for himself honors of the highest degree in all lines of activity. Among these was his membership in the honor societies, Tau Kappa Alpha and Phi Delta Kappa.

He received his first teaching experience when he held, for seven years high school principalships in North Carolina and Florida. From there he went to San Marcos, Texas where, for three years, he was Instructor in Education. At the outbreak of the Great War he enlisted in the "Y" service and served as an Educational Director at Kelly Field No. 2, San Antonio, Texas, and later

was transferred to overseas service in the Army Educational Corps. At the close of the War he was made Professor of Education at Meredith College and remained there until this year, when he came to Hardin.

Dr. Highsmith has an idealism that gives him a lofty, comprehending viewpoint but which is so tempered with materialism as to guide it into practical channels. He has that quality of "common sense" that we seldom see in one so visionary. He not only reasons and thinks out projects but he has inexhaustible energy

and initiative to carry them to a successful conclusion. He maintains a broad tolerance in his thinking and always works open-mindedly and without prejudice. In spite of his remarkable abilities he is quite unassuming. On all occasions

he maintains his sunny optimistic disposition.

As a teacher he is entirely "up-to-date" and alive. He is continually gathering the new material that is being brought to light by discovery and experimentation and using his deep insight to secure from it the good, thus keeping his teaching abreast with the times. He is not content with thrusting the subject matter on his pupils but makes it so interesting and vital to them that they cannot resist giving their best to their work. He realizes intrinsic values and does not force his pupils to learn facts entirely for their own sake but emphasizes the big and vital principles involved.



As an executive he has remarkable ability. Both his wisdom and experience gives him a sound background for his work in administration. He puts his heart

and soul into his duties and literally eats up work.






### STUDENT ACTIVITY COMMITTEE






# HARDIN COLLEGE CONSERVATORY

Many years ago Hardin College was given the slogan: "Vassar of the West." This had been achieved through the constant efforts of the faculty, who had raised the standards of the school until it had been recognized by all the universities and colleges thus giving credit for work done in Hardin. But, during all this time Hardin has always been noted in the musical world for its splendid Conservatory of Music, which has helped the growth and progress of the school so much.

The achievements of the former students have kept the Conservatory's name prominently before music lovers from coast to coast. Its good foundation is evidenced by the fact that one of our former students has important roles in the Metropolitan Opera Company and has had, for a number of years. Another student is the soloist in one of New York City's largest churches and still another has gained prominence in light Opera roles on the Western Coast.


Two years ago when a limited number of pupils were selected for enrollment at the Conservatoire Americaine, Fontainebleau, France, Rudolph Ganz selected and recommended for entrance two members of the faculty and a student of Hardin Conservatory. This school is open three months during the summer for American students exclusively through the courtesy of the French government and is a wonderful opportunity for Americans to study with the French masters. In comparison the three chosen members from Hardin appreciated much more the advantages Hardin offers.

In many of the Western and Southern states our former students and graduates have been instrumental in organizing and serving as state and national officers of the Federated Music Clubs. We are very proud of the work of one of our former students who gained much prominence as national president of this organization, and also of another who by efficient work will soon follow in her steps. Again we find some of our graduates occupying big positions as instructors in various cities and colleges.

A number of our student each year come from former graduates of our conservatory to receive the finishing touches of their musical career under the guidance of Arnold E. Guerne, who has been almost continuously at the head of the Hardin College Conservatory of Music for the past twenty-five years. The accomplishments of his pupils have gained for him a just recognition among the great American Masters.

The instructors in the different departments of the conservatory have splendid methods for training the pupils. Throughout the entire year class recitals are given in which every member of the conservatory must participate and this insures much confidence in the students. At the end of each school year general, graduate and post graduate recitals are given and this not only helps the students, but also enables the town people, who attend in large numbers, to enjoy and appreciate all work being done in each music department.

With the growth of Hardin College and the larger enrollment of music students, the Board of Directors are discussing plans for the erection of a new conservatory with a concert hall, studios, living rooms with annexed practice rooms, on Hardin Campus. With this wonderful improvement there is no reason why future students cannot attain more than students in the past.








Art Exhibit showing application of designs on opposite page.
