## Summer oftetivities

Four seniors, Marilyn Schleicher, Steve Grimm, Carol Everett, and Bill Sellars, share summer experiences.


The summer of '65 found Stewartsville students busy with many things. Their varied activities ranged all the way from a preparatory program for pre-school children to workshops and study programs at colleges and universities.

Marilyn Schleicher and Bill Sellars attended Girls' State and Boys' State; Carol Everett represented Stewartsville High at the Freedom Forum; and Steve Grimm participated in the National Science Foundation program at the University of Missouri.

The publications class met several times during June to start plans for the 1966 yearbook. From June 13 to 18 the varsity cheerleaders attended a clinic at the Northwest Missouri State College.

Linda Kay Heimbaugh was crowned Queen of the DeKalb County Fair and Horse Show August 11. Mid-August found the football squad practicing and getting ready for the 1965 season.

Some students found summer employment and gained valuable work experience; others used the summer to travel and rest, gaining nev energy and new ideas for the busy school days ahead.

## Neighborhood Youth Corpo

The Neighborhood Youth Corps, a govern-ment-sponsored program formed under provisions of the Economic Opportunities Act, lasted from June 14 to August 20 and employed thirteen high school students from Stewartsville.

During this ten-week period, halls and classrooms of the school were repainted; library books were mended, reclassified, and shelved; new date, catalog, and index cards were typed for the books; and many other minor jobs around the school were completed.

In addition to providing summer employment for youth of the community, this program provided counseling in health, grooming, job placement, job orientation, school problems, future plans, and citizenship.

Project Headstart was initiated at the Stewartsville School June 1, 1965. This kindergarten program was designed to prepare children of pre-school age for the First Grade.

Thirty-four children from Stewartsville and Osborn were enrolled. Teachers were Mrs. Ardelle Clouse of Stewartsville and Mrs. Sue Pennington of Osborn. The students were given physical and dental examinations, smallpox vaccinations, diphtheria and tetanus injections, and tuberculin patch tests.

Among other things, they completed a reading readiness program and took several field trips. They visited a post office, a fire station, a bakery, and a police station. One of the highlights of the season was their visit to the St. Joseph Museum.

The Stewartsville School, one of many Missouri schools to participate in this program, was used as a control center, and was asked to give more tests and to submit more reports than other schools in order to help the Office of Economic Opportunities evaluate the program.

## ofdministration Board of Education

The Board of Education has many duties. It defines the rules and guidelines of student conduct and school operation. It has the final authority concerning the school budget. Most important, its members represent the people of the school district in forming school policy.

Several programs were initiated this year: Project Headstart, a preparatory program for pre-school children; the Neighborhood Youth Corps, which in co-operation with the school provided summer jobs for high school students; and the Vocational Business Education Department, the purpose of which is to train high school students for business and office jobs.

Other progressive steps taken this year by the Board were the purchase of machines for the business education department with money granted the school under the Vocational Act, and the purchase of machines for the improvement of reading under the ElementarySecondary Act. An oil-emersion microscope and other technical materials were awarded to the science department. This new equipment and science texts for the grade school libraries were all funded by the National Defense Education Act. The school had to meet certain requirements and educational standards before it was considered for this special aid.


## Superintendent and $P_{\text {rincipal }}$

Eldon Haskell, superintendent, serves Stewartsville School in numerous ways. He works with the Board of Education planning, studying, and searching for new ways and methods to improve the school. He works with the teaching staff in the selection of textbooks, equipment, and supplies. He assists them in solving classroom problems. As sponsor of the Student Council he takes a keen interest in all extracurricular activities.

Mr. Haskell is also active in community affairs as a member of the Lions Club and the American Legion. He is President of the Dekalb County Economic Opportunities Corporation, and a member of the Executive Board of the Economic Opportunities Corporation of
 Greater St. Joseph.

Mrs. Carolyn Pickett, secretary and bookkeeper, has a busy schedule. She handles correspondence, keeps school records, records receipts and expenditures, and prepares reports.

George Bishop, principal, assists the superintendent in administrative and supervisional duties. He keeps a close check on attendance. When the superintendent has to be away from school, he is responsible for its operation. He, like the superintendent, has classroom responsibilities to meet.

Last summer he received a grant from the National Science Foundation to study at the Kansas State Teachers College, Emporia, Kansas.
