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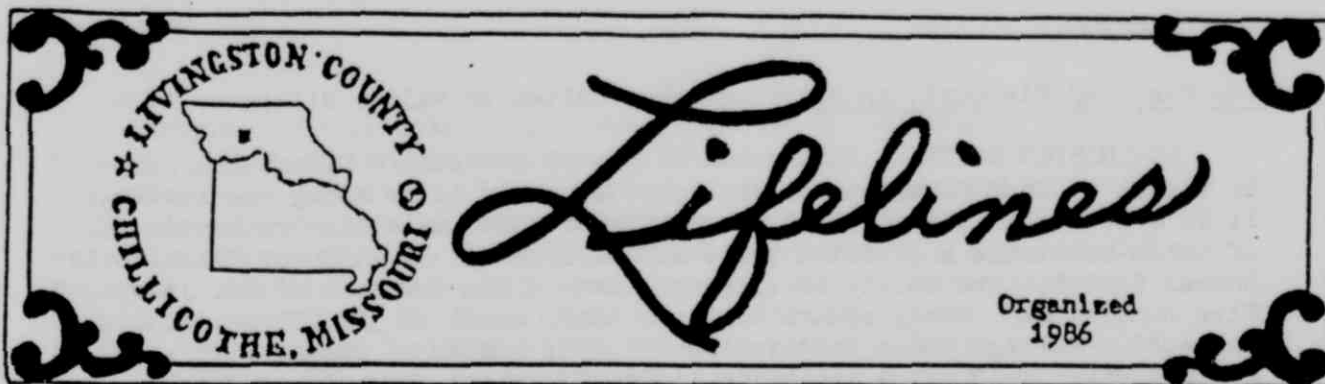

The State of Missouri, An Autobiography, Edited by Walter Williams, 1904

LIVINGSTON COUNTY - Livingston is one of Missouri's finest counties by virtue of four foremost causes: agriculturally it is among the leading; it is a center of livestock; intersection of three main line railroads one of which maintains a division point at Chillicothe; location of Chillicothe Normal School. The County is situated sixty miles due east of St. Joseph. Five hundred and twenty square miles of land, equal to 332,800 acres, are embraced. Acreage under cultivation 246,638; number of farms, 2,752; average size 116.7 acres including lands of various characters; total estimated value \$8,492,481. Hereford, Shorthorn and Calloway cattle herds are among the richest in the State. Chillicothe is one of the largest mule and horse markets in Missouri.

Population: - Fifty Welsh families near Dawn. White 21,507; colored, 795; American born, 21,463; foreign born, 839; total 22,302. Farm homes owned, 1,896; rented, 794, other homes owned, 1,289; rented, 958; total families 4,937.

Land: - Three classes of land are found: broad bottoms along Grand river and Medicine creek; high rolling prairie between east fork of Grand river and Medicine creek, running north from center of county, and across the county south of Grand river bottom; and rougher, hill land, between forks of Grand river. Grand river bottom reaches three miles in width and Medicine creek bottom averages two miles wide. Serious overflows once in seven years. Price \$25 to \$40; reaching \$60 within three miles of Chillicothe. Soil black loam, less fertile in spots in southeast. Ridge land, rolling prairies, best of the county's offerings, embracing one-third the county, \$40 to \$65. Altitude 970 feet average. Soil deep above impervious clay. Rougher, hill land, between forks of Grand River, and small strip south of Dawn, \$25 to \$45. Fine orchards and blue grass meadows are characteristic. Fine farm improvements: number of elegant country homes. Wheat adaptable to all lands. Blue grass native. Farm yields for last year are as follows: 87,790 acres in corn, crop 5,000,000 bushels; 25,891 in wheat, raised 850,000 bushels; 10,780 acres in rye; grew 275,448 bushels; 11,328 acres of oats, crop of 30 bushels to acre; 46,550 acres in timothy hay, raised 98,490 tons of hay and five to fifteen bushels seed; one-half uncultivated lands in blue grass.

Poultry and Dairying: - Poultry and eggs are large source of income. From Chillicothe alone there were shipped last year 652,372 pounds of poultry; 125 car loads of eggs gathered from Livingston and surrounding counties; 200,000 pounds of wool; one-half million pounds of hides and \$20,000 worth of raw furs gathered within radius of 100 miles; 60,000 pounds tallow and 2,000 pounds beeswax. Farmers are rapidly increasing dairying interest.

Chillicothe is a market center for buyers active over portions of Iowa, Missouri, Illinois and Nebraska.

Railroads: - Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul division-end employs 300 men at Chillicothe. Mileage within county: Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, 31.08; Burlington, 23.62; Wabash, 25.61; Chicago, Burlington & Kansas City, 3.07.

Schools: - Chillicothe High School approved by University of Missouri. Catholic church has schools for boys, for girls and a monastery; also hospital. Young Ladies' Academy is conducted by Sisters of St. Joseph; 200 pupils, seven teachers; literary, scientific, music, art and needle-work. St. Columbian Parish School has 125 boys and girls enrolled. Franciscan Monastery connected with church: three fathers. Hospital conducted by St. Mary sisters; cost \$35,000: eleven trained nurses. One hundred families in St. Joseph's parish. State Industrial Home for Girls; 110 inmates, corresponds to Training School for Boys at Boonville. Maupins Business College; 100 students. Chillicothe Normal School; private educational institution; 746 students enrolled; nineteen in faculty; established 23 years.

Water: - Chillicothe is supplied from driven wells alongside Grand river. At 350 feet is found sulpho-saline water; Mooresville Mineral Spring; Roach Lake and Dayton Lake near Chillicothe are play grounds.

Towns: - Chillicothe, county seat, railroad center; waterworks; gas, electric light; school town; live stock market; flouring mills; department stores employing fifty people; foundry; Chula, Wheeling, Utica, Mooresville, Dawn, farming centers.

Newspaper: - Chillicothe Democrat, Constitution, Tribune, Crisis; Chula news of Chula; Wheeling Democrat; Utica Herald; Avalon Aurora.

FOURTH QUARTER

The 4th Quarterly Conference of the Spring Hill Circuit of the Chillicothe District Missouri Annual Conference, M.E.C.S. was held at Pleasant Grove Church, July 7th 1872.

Conference opened with religious services conducted by Rev. W. W. Jones, Presiding Elder.

The roll being called the following members were present: viz:

D. Penny Preacher in charge, Benj S. Ashby L. P., Edward H Smith, licensed Exhorter and Wm Lewis, L. M. Faulkner, John Oxford, A. Ramsey and James Anderson stewards.--Thomas Brooks, A. Broyles, W. B. Johnson and James B. Francis, class Leaders.

Wm Lewis was elected Secretary.

1st Question, Are there any appeals?

Answer--None.

2nd Ques. Are there any complaints?

Answer. None.

3d Ques. Is there a written report of the number and State of Sunday Schools and of the pastoral instruction of children?

Answer by D. Penny P. C as follows viz:

"We have 4 Sabbath Schools in the bounds of our work, all we think, will do well. We think Sabbath Schools are receiving more general attention than in former years, but still in many sections of our work the subject is not receiving the attention its importance demands.

Our Sabbath Schools are of great importance--but like every other good thing there is always difficulties attending its establishment--our motto ought to be perseverance.

We have 4 Superintendents, 16 Teachers, 200 Scholars, 300 Vol. in library, 13 Children's Advocates" taken, and \$20.00 for School books."

Our congregations are large and attentive and we trust some good has been accomplished. Our prospects are brightening--class and prayer meetings are better attended than formerly.

We have Baptized 4 adults and 7 Infants, Dismissed none--none expelled. One Death- Sister Molly--Williams departed this life in peace.

We have collected \$10.00 for Domestic missions--\$2 for the Bishop's fund and \$24 for Sabbath School purposes.

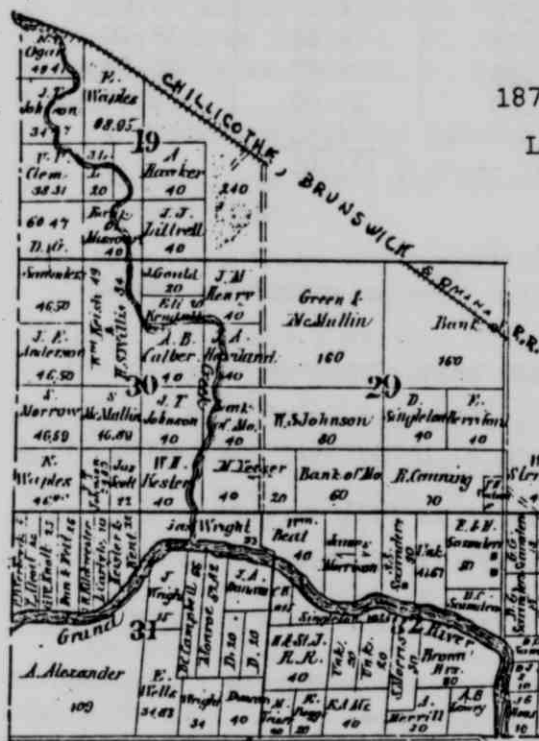

Grand River Township is the southeastern township of Livingston County. The section pictured is the portion of Congressional Township 57 N Range 22 W lying south of the center of the track of the Chillicothe, Brunswick and Omaha Railroad.

According to the History of Caldwell and Livingston County, 1886, the greater portion of the land is rolling in type, with land along the Grand River bluffy in many places. Timber, stone, and water are plentiful. Numerous stone quarries have been opened and some coal mined.

On a portion of sec 31 were located at one time 3 or 4 large mounds thought to be the work of ancient Indians as burial places. About 1880 one of these mounds was opened by W. H. Munro, J. R. Middleton and others. In a loosely constructed vault some artifacts were found.

Bedford Station on the Wabash RR, a little over a mile north of the town of Bedford, was laid out Dec. 1, 1870 by D. G. Saunders and others. In 1877 a horse railway connecting the town with the station was established by Ed. Austin and R. F. Davis and operated until 1882.

Original settlers in this area of Grand River Township include in 1837: George Munro, John Hall & W. P. Stone; 1838: Wm. LeBarron, Harris Shaw, Jas R Reddick; 1839: Collins Williams.

MARRIAGES AND
OBITUARIES FROM
THE CHRISTIAN PIONEER

The Christian Pioneer, a religious newspaper, was published in Chillicothe by David T. Wright, an elder in the Christian Church. Formerly called the Western Pioneer, it was first published at Trenton, Mo. in Grundy County, later moving to Lindley, Mo. and finally to Chillicothe where it was published from 1864-70. The following obituaries were extracted from micro-filmed originals at the Livingston County Library and covers the years 1869-70. This is part two, continued from page 14 of Lifelines, Vol. 1, No. 2.

The Christian Pioneer
August 17, 1869

Heriford

DIED - In Chillicothe, Missouri, on the 8th of August, 1869, MAUDE DAVIS, infant daughter of E.M. and Martha Heriford, aged 1 year, 9 months, and 3 days.

We sympathize with the bereaved and sorrowing parents on this painful occasion. It is the second time death has visited this family, leaving Mr. Heriford and Sister Heriford without a child to cheer their hearts. May the Lord bless and comfort them with the truth that their dear children, however much they loved them, are now happy and beyond the reach of sorrow and suffering.

September 9, 1869

Linn

DIED - at the residence of Mrs. Adelia Linn, near Chillicothe, Missouri, on the 4th day of September, 1869, ADELIA ENOLA, infant daughter of W.G. and Ophelia W. Linn, aged 6 months and 19 days.

Those only who have lost their first-born can fully know the deep sorrow of this painful bereavement. It is a heavy affliction on our dear sister in Christ and her dear husband to give up to the cold grave their tender babe. But they have consolation that while the grave holds its cherub body, the child itself has gone home to God. Earth and heaven now are both more sacred and precious to them than ever before; one has the body, the other the spirit of their sweet babe. By a life of faithful obedience the blessed Saviour for a few years here, he will take them home, too, to receive their child again, and live with it forever. May God bless them, and comfort them, in this painful separation.

Briefly...

June 3, 1874 was a day set apart by the Governor of Missouri for fasting and prayer for deliverance from the grasshopper plague.

October, 1843, the Grand River Chronicle was established at Chillicothe. It later became the Chillicothe Spectator in 1866, and The Tribune in 1869.

September 9, 1869

Sherman

DIED in Chillicothe, Missouri, on the 4th of September, 1869, MATTIE, infant daughter of J.D. and Sarah J. Sherman, aged 11 months.

The ruthless messenger of death has visited this family again, and by his cold and icy touch taken the tender child of their bosom in despite of their tears, entreaties and prayers. He is no respecter of persons, all ages alike he makes his prey. But thank God his power is limited, and will soon have an end forever. The day hastens when there shall be no more death, neither sorrow nor crying. Little Mattie is now beyond his reach, the blessed Savior has taken her to himself, and will graciously keep her. By and by, death will knock at the door of this house again, when Sister Sherman and her dear husband will too have to go! Faithfulness in this life to Christ, will give us the only consolation that can reconcile us and calm the troubled heart under these sad and afflicted bereavements.

Miller

DIED in Chillicothe, Missouri, September 17th, 1869, DOCKY MILLER, son of Wm B. and Margaret Miller, aged 9 years, 5 months and 9 days.

We truly sympathize with Brother and Sister Miller in their sore affliction. Of twelve children they have buried eight. DOCKY was the last son left in the family, and now he is gone. Few families are called to suffer more than this family. We have upon three of these painful occasions, tried to speak a word of consolation before the burial. Truly do we live in a land of death and sorrow. But through the loving kindness of our most gracious Heavenly Father, this state of things will have an end, and those who love God and our Lord Jesus Christ will be forever free from death, sorrow, pain and trouble. May God comfort our dear Brother and Sister, with their weeping children, in this painful bereavement.

Listed below are the records from the "German Bible" kept by John and Barbara Good. The first 64 pages of the Bible are missing. The family record is entered on pages between the Old Testament and the New Testament. The title page of the New Testament reads Das Neue Testament... New York, [American Bible Society], 1854.

John Good was born 13 Dec 1826 at Schwendi, St. Gall, Switzerland. He died 26 Jan 1904 near Hale, Carroll Co., MO. His wife, Barbara Bamberger, was born 19 Jun 1829 at Venningen, Rhineland-Pfalz, Germany. She died 11 Jul 1897 near Avalon, Livingston Co., MO. Both are buried in the Oak Grove Cemetery ("Maberry Cemetery") near Avalon. They had settled in Livingston Co., MO in 1866. A detailed study of the Good and Bamberger families can be found in Robert McAlear's Joseph Christian Good of Switzerland and His Descendants in America 1848-1979, privately printed by author, 1980.

The entries in the Bible appear to have been written at the same time.

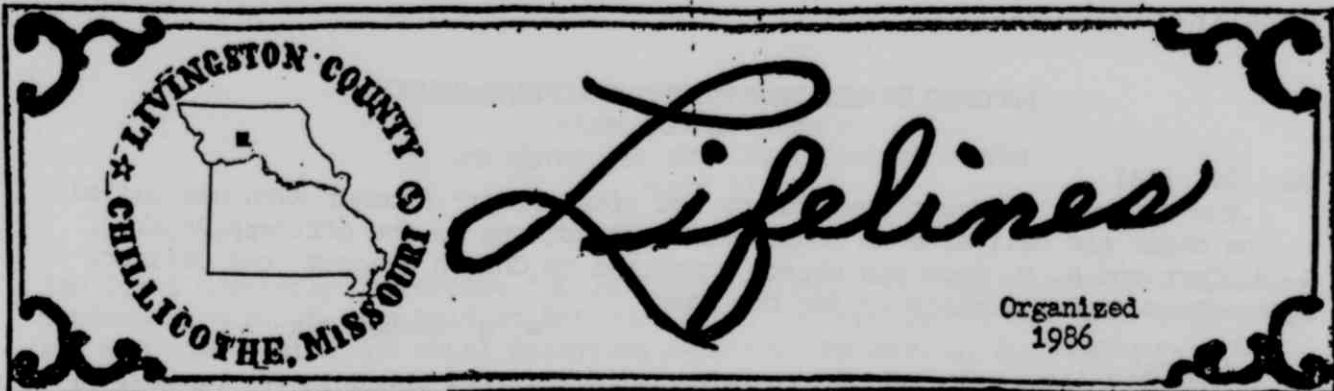

The following persons were elected Trustees for Parsonage property at Jamesport viz: Jos. Caraway, E. H. Smith, Jno McMahan, J. P. Drummonds, H. Smith, E. Keeler, W. P. Maxwell and J. Mann., also, Jno. Devorse, W. P. Maxwell and E. H. Smith were elected the Parsonage building committee.

It was ordered by this Conference, that the Preacher in charge and the Trustees for the Parsonage at Spring Hill sell the same and apply the proceeds to the Parsonage at Jamesport.

Ans. At Church near Bro. J. B. Francis'

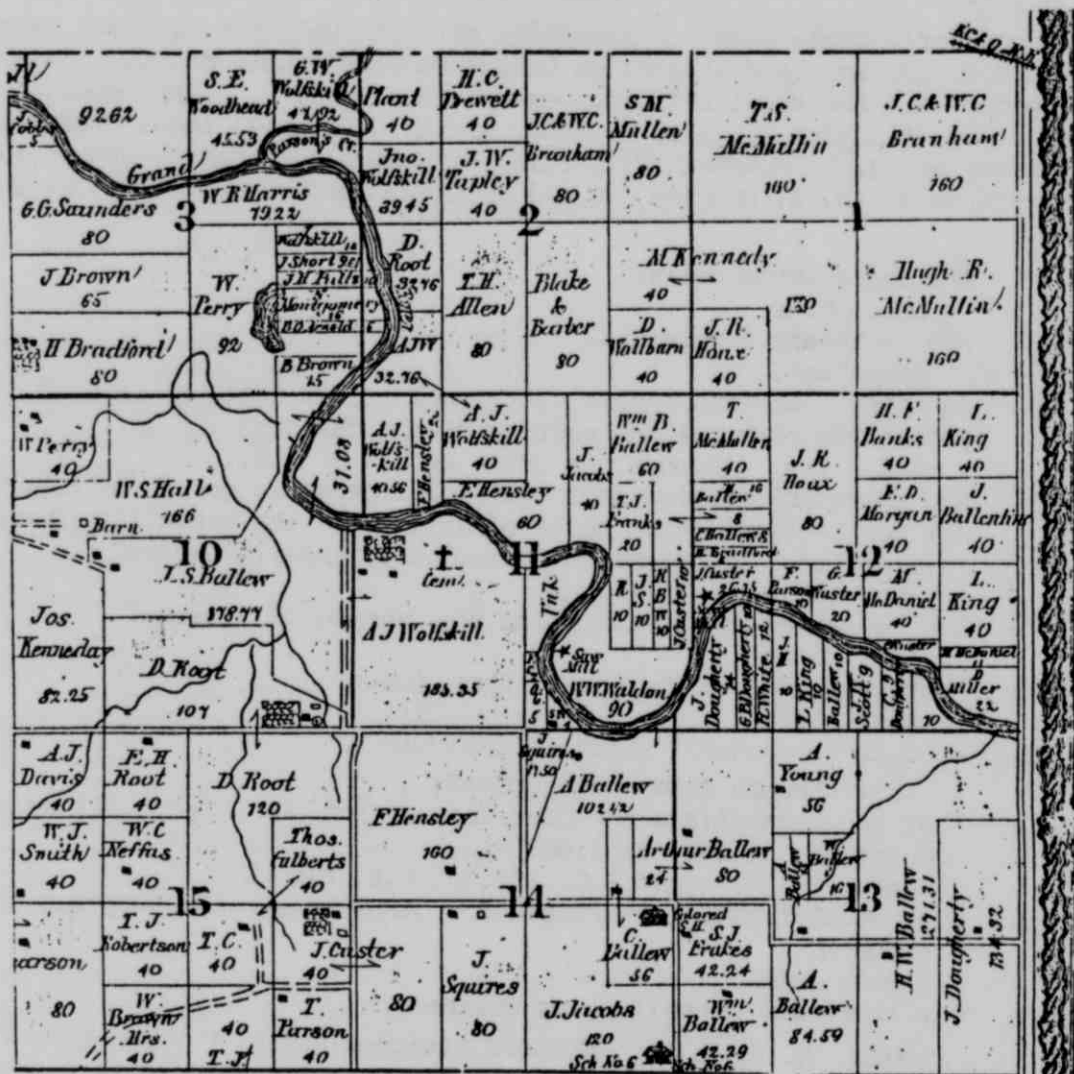

TOWNSHIP 56 NORTH RANGE 22 WEST.

OF THE 5TH PRINCIPAL MERIDIAN.



Pictured is a portion of Township 56 N, Range 22 W, Grand River Township in southeast Livingston County, Missouri.

Original settlers of this area included Dr. John Wolfskill who came about 1828, Benj. A. & Rhodias Fewell, Joseph and George Wolfskill, R. R. Mills, Anselm Rowley, Joseph and Thos. Jones, W. C. Wright, Reuben Leaton, R. T. Mance, Cyrus and John C. Ballew, Alex., John and Amassas Silvey. John Ballew did preaching as a Methodist for that area. Another minister was named Newbill or Neuble. Thomas Stanley entered the territory near what later became Bedford, where he lived in a hollow sycamore tree, and it is said that he read Shakespeare by the light of a sycamore ball floating in a saucer of 'coon grease.

John Custer operated Herriford's ferry on Grand River about six miles southeast of Chillicothe for 20 years. Later operators included Tyre Cauthorn, Phil Saunders, and J. H. Baugh, among others. The ferry was the only method of crossing the river until 1866 when a bridge was erected.

In 1878 this area of the county was an important trading center, leading in production of tobacco and oats, and a high producer of corn and wool.

The Christian Pioneer
November 14, 1869

Died near Chillicothe, Mo., November 2d, 1869, Sister Ellen Gillette, in the 31st year of her age.

She had been a member of the church for fourteen years. She leaves a little babe a few months old, that is never to know a mother's love, and a little daughter too young to appreciate her loss. An affectionate Christian husband mourns, not as those without hope, the loss for a time of his best earthly friend. There are Christian hearts that sympathise with him in his bereavement.

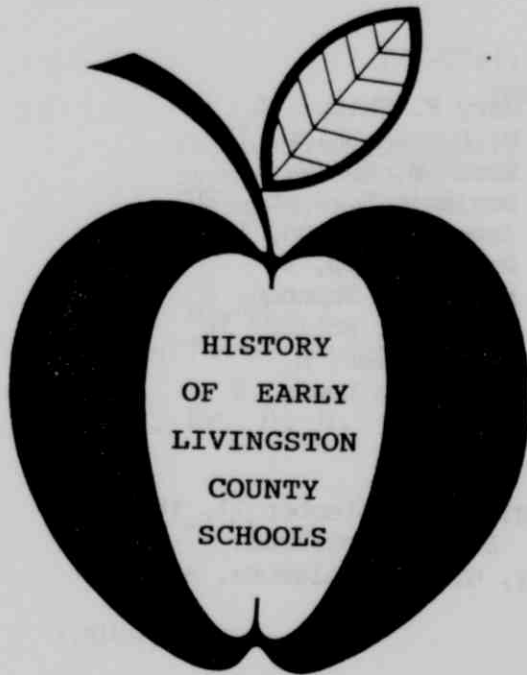


HOW NAMES CAN HELP SOLVE A RIDDLE

The eldest children were frequently named for their grandparents or other relatives. Sometimes a boy's name is a clue to his mother's maiden name. Hunter Orgain Metcalfe was named for his grandmother Sally Orgain. Benjamin Allen Phillips was named for his grandfather Benjamin Allen. Samuel Black Brelsford was named for his grandfather Samuel Black. Many families gave their children names in honor of aunts and uncles, close family friends, famous Americans, or brothers and sisters who had died.

Nicknames were often given in documents instead of full names. Most good dictionaries can help you determine the real name from a nickname. However, some children undoubtedly received the nickname form as their given name. Some common nicknames are shown here with their formal form:

Early Livingston County School History is compiled by using records from the County Clerk's Office along with excerpts from Rural and Small Town Schools in Livingston County, Missouri, compiled by Leo Hopper and friends in July of 1986. Enrollment Records list only the student's names, their ages and attendance, while the Enumeration Records show also the names of parents or guardians. Starting with the earliest available dates and continuing forward in time we will attempt to list all available records before the year 1910 at which time the birth and death records were registered with the State of Missouri.

SHANNONDALE SCHOOL

Located in the East side of Section 30, T56-R22, this school was $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles south of Avalon, Missouri. The school was named for W.L. Shannon who gave the land for the first school about 1850. The school was a log building with a rail fence around it.

The second school, a frame building, faced east. It had a platform porch, two entrance doors, three windows north and south, a painted blackboard at the west end, and sheepskin erasers. Slates and slate pencils were used for seat work. Lead pencils were rare. Water was carried in a wooden bucket from the Shannon home. Later a cistern was dug. In 1875, 80 pupils attended, including two mothers who learned to read and write.

In 1900 a new schoolhouse was built on the same site. The school closed in 1912 and the building was later sold to M.E. Burson, who moved it to his farm and used it for implement storage.

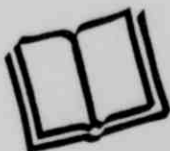
Due to the fact that several have ask for the "Surname List" in its entirety, we will no longer be putting this in the Quarterly. Look for this in the future publication list.

*** CEMETERY PRESERVATION LEGISLATION *
ENACTED INTO MISSOURI LAW

FIRST REGULAR SESSION

[TRULY AGREED TO AND FINALLY PASSED]

HOUSE BILL NO. 60

84TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

AN ACT

Relating to certain cemeteries, with penalty provisions.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section 1. Every person who shall knowingly destroy,
2 mutilate, disfigure, deface, injure or remove any tomb,
3 monument or gravestone, or other structure placed in any
4 abandoned family cemetery or private burying ground, or
5 any fence, railing, or other work for the protection or
6 ornamentation of any such cemetery or place of burial of
7 any human being, or tomb, monument or gravestone,
8 memento, or memorial, or other structure aforesaid, or of
9 any lot within such cemetery is guilty of a class A mis-
10 demeanor. For the purposes of this section and section 2 of
11 this act, an abandoned family cemetery or private burying
12 ground shall include those cemeteries or burying grounds
13 which have not been deeded to the public as provided in
14 chapter 214, RSMo, and in which no body has been interred
15 for at least twenty-five years.

Section 2. Any person who wishes to visit an aban-
2 doned family cemetery or private burying ground which is
3 completely surrounded by privately owned land, for which
4 no public ingress or egress is available, shall have the right
5 to reasonable ingress or egress for the purpose of visiting
6 such cemetery. This right of access to such cemeteries
7 extends only to visitation during reasonable hours and
8 only for purposes usually associated with cemetery visits.

Section 3. Nothing in this act shall be construed to
2 limit or modify the power or authority of a court in any
3 action of law or equity to order the disinterment and
4 removal of the remains from a cemetery and interment in a
5 suitable location.

For the past several years, legislation has been introduced in the Missouri House that was designed to preserve and protect abandoned family cemeteries and private burying grounds.

We are happy to report that on July 13, 1987, Governor John Ashcroft signed House Bill 60 into law, providing for the first time a criminal penalty for those persons who knowingly destroy or damage our abandoned cemeteries.

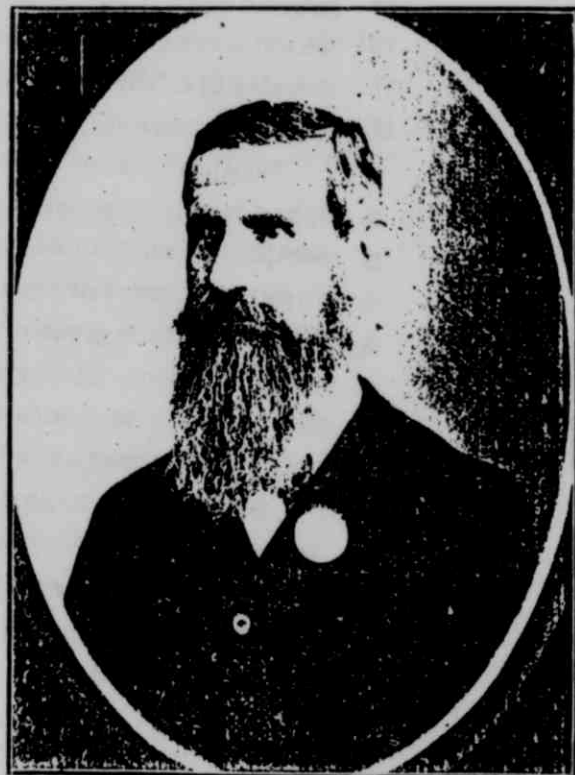

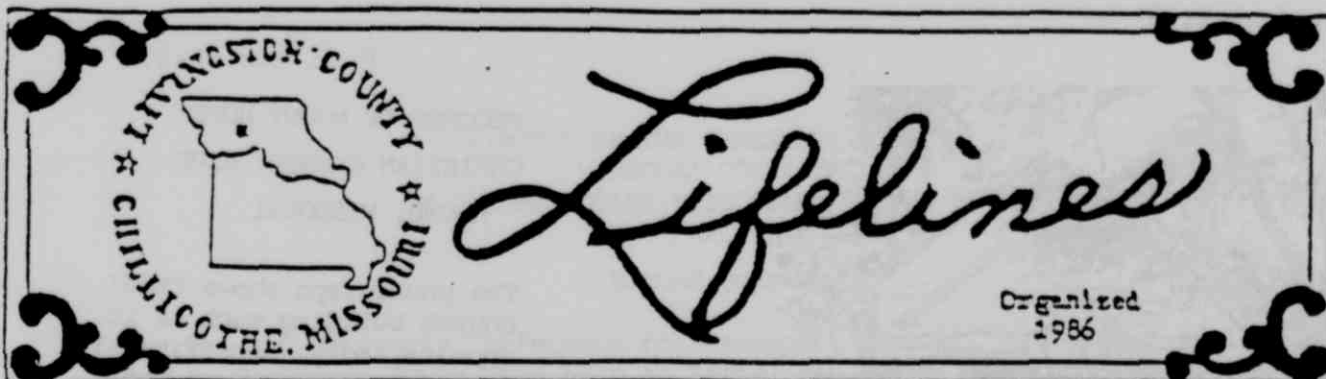

This indenture made this 8th day of May 1861 by and between William P Frith son of John Frith, of the county of Livingston and the state of Missouri of seven years of age on the 7th day of May 1861-of his, own free will and consent, and by and with the consent of the county court of said county and State, of the one part Witnesseth

That the said William Frith of his own free will and consent and of the consent of the aforesaid William Frith has bound himself to Porter Ramsey and hereby agrees to faithfully serve and perform all the duties that may be required of him untill he arrives at the age of twenty one years of age. Which will be in the AD1874. and shall and will in all cases Keep his masters secrets, work to his masters interest and benefit and perform and do all such lawful requirements of him as such apprentice by the said Porter Ramsey as his master

In consideration I the said Porter Ramsey, on my part agree and bind myself to furnish to the said William Frith at all times and seasons suitable clothing food and attention in sickness and in health, and to teach him in the morals and sints (sic) of education as far as reading writing and cyphering in the arithmetic as far as the double rule of three and at the end of the said time to give him a good horse saddle and bridle and a fine suit of clothes.

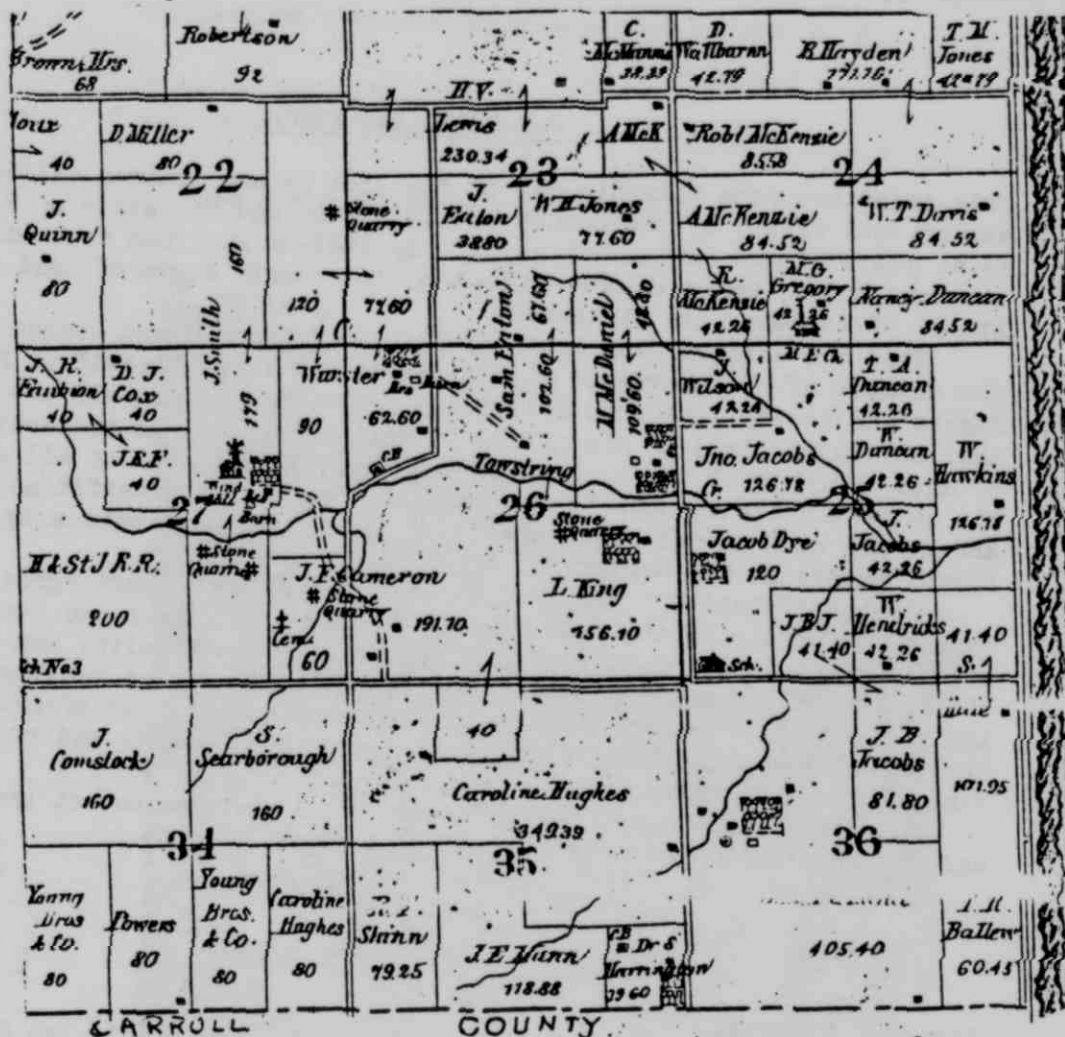

Pictured is a portion of Township 56 N, Range 22 W, Grand River Township in southeast Livingston County, Missouri.

Among the first actual settlers of this portion of the township are John Stuckey, Elijah Compton, Wesley Scott, Whitfield Dicken, Jeremiah Murray, Aquila Jones, Wm. L. Brown, and Thomas Jones, father of Fred and Joe Jones.

In early days a race track was laid out on the prairie in Section 24, and frequent "meetings" were held to test the speed of their horses. Jim Turner, Howard Silvey and Harvey Law were noted turf patrons.

Before the Wabash Railroad was established in 1871, goods were brought up the old wagon road from Brunswick, save a few consignments landed by steamboat. River travel was deemed generally hazardous and too undependable.

The tobacco industry was important in this area of the county during the 1870s and 1880s. Prominent growers and producers included Francis J. Turner of Virginia, Thomas Culbertson, who came from Ohio in 1864, and J. H. Bough, a native Missourian who started a tobacco factory at Bedford, which employed from 15 to 25 persons.

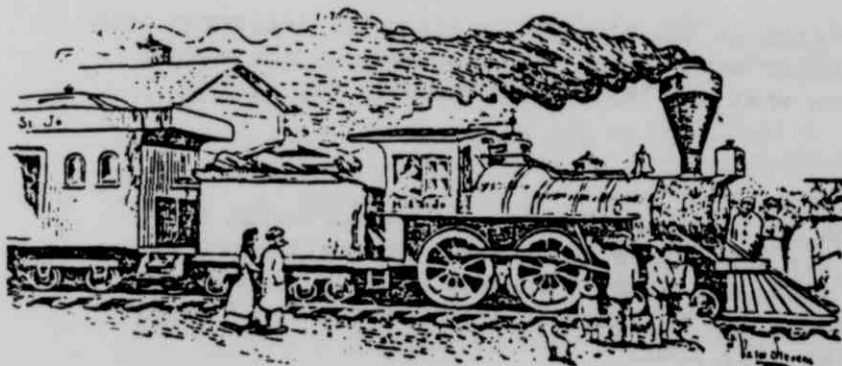

WARD SCHOOL

Compiled by using excerpts from "Proud of the Past 100 Years of Chula 1885-1985", "100 Years in Livingston County", "Rural and Small Town Schools in Livingston County, MO", Constitution-Tribune and Mrs. Elsie Pray of Chula, MO. By Cookie Mammen Northeast Reporter.

Located in the Southwest corner Section 5 59-23 four miles Northwest of Chula, MO.

Archibald Ward (Sept. 7, 1790 - Aug. 11, 1842), a Ketuckian by birth, of Irish origin came to Livingston Co., MO. in 1837 from Sangamon Co., Ill. He married Caroline Matilda Grayson Webber (March 26, 1800 - Aug. 1, 1862) who too was a Kentuckian by birth.

They brought with them their nine children and located near Chillicothe, Mo. The Wards were prominent members of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. Archibald was a lover of music and often instructed young people in vocal music. Three of their sons, namely, Fayette Dandridge, Charles William, and Joseph, settled in what is now Cream Ridge Township. A son, Orpheus, lived in the home with his parents. Another son, James Allen, settled in Californis for a number of years but later returned to Cream Ridge Township, Livingston Co., Mo.

Caroline Ward was interested in education and was a leader in the establishment of the Ward School and helped to make it one of the best schools of her generation.

The first building was frame and faced the west with a door in the end and three windows in the north and south sides. Painted black boards were on the east end. There were two rows of seats made of wood with shelf beneath which were recitation benches. Homemade candles in metal holders with reflectors furnished light for the room.

School terms were divided in to winter and spring terms. Saleries for the teachers were \$25.00 and \$30.00 per month. Slates and pencils were used for seat work. McGuffy Spellers and Readers were used.

In 1880 with 10 to 12 enrolled Onie Jarvis started building a new school. There was a library started, building painted, a wood shed built, new seats and a well dug.

Ward School was closed from 1932 to 1936 because there was not enough pupils.

Through old records, it was possible to obtain an almost complete list of teachers from 1890 on to the close of the 1956-57 term, with the exception of a four year period from 1911 to 1915. The list follows.

Some early taxpayers living in the district were those by the name of Alexander, Austin, Anderson, two Baker families, Bell, Breedlove, Burns, Elmore, Eubanks, Carr, Minor, Rockey, Ryan, three Scarlot families, Steen, two Stuart families, two Tredway families, Terry, Watson, Windsor and ten families by the name of Ward.

The school closed 1957 and the following year the building and grounds were sold to Bob Sherrow for \$295.00. A large door was installed in the south side and the building was used for farm storage. It was razed in 1984.

EARLY POST OFFICES AROUND CHULA, MISSOURI

Taken from the "Proud of the Past 100 years of Chula, Missouri 1885-1985" and compiled by Cookie Mammen Northeast Reporter.

On August 22, 1851 a Post Office called Crazy Creek, Livingston Co., Missouri, was established. It was located on the Ray Casebeer farm in a house where the stagecoach line stopped. Solomon R. Hooker was the first postmaster, being appointed August 22, 1851. The Post Office was discontinued on November 21, 1861 and reestablished on March 28, 1863. It was discontinued again on October 4, 1873. Other postmasters were, Jackson B. Woodgate, appointed March 28, 1862; John W. Hyde appointed April 16, 1866; Josiah T. Selby appointed October 11, 1866; and Frederick E. Helf appointed April 13, 1869.

The Historical Atlas, Livingston County, Missouri 1878 shows a Cream Ridge Post Office located approximately 1 1/2 miles south of the present Chula on the east side of the road at the Cottonwood Grove settlement.

A Farmersville Post Office was located just south of the Grundy County line. It was established on January 23, 1867 and discontinued on March 31, 1908. Early postmasters were; John W. Hyde, appointed January 23, 1867; George Fernald, appointed March 30, 1870; James A. Woodgate appointed July 8, 1870; J.S. Hyde appointed August 11, 1871; Mrs. Ellen Rodgers appointed December 13, 1871; Larance Urton, appointed October 10, 1895; and James M. Brown appointed March 31, 1900.

A Gordenville Post Office was located in Medicine Township southeast of Chula.

A Muddy Lane Post Office was located in Jackson Township west of the river.

When the Government Survey was made of the county of Livingston, in the years 1823, 1824 and 1834, the following settlements were found:

William Smith had a field and cabin on the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of Section 29, Township 59, of Range 24, part of the land of which John H. Mathews now resides.

Spencer and Gregory had a field on the southeast quarter of Sections 23, Township 58, of Range 23, about where Johanna Slattery now owns.

Solomon Cox had a field on the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter of Section 22, Township 58, of Range 24, where the George Schmidt residence now stands.

Brannick Wilkinson had a field on the northwest quarter of the southwest quarter of Section 1, Township 58, of Range 24, on land now owned by Susan Lile.

William Linville had a dwelling on the southeast quarter of the southeast quarter of Section 11, Township 58, of Range 24, and a field in the northeast quarter of the northeast quarter of Section 14, Township 58, of Range 24, where William A. Brant now owns.

Ashby's Ferry was on the East fork of Grand River, where the Graham Mill Bridge is now located.

Stephen Cox had a field in the southwest quarter of the southwest quarter of Section 22, Township 58, of Range 24, on the land where Dan McCarthy now resides on the Springhill road.

A. Breeze had a field on the West half of the southwest quarter of Section 4, Township 58, of Range 24, land now owned by Martin V. Piper.

Jesse Newlin had a field on the southwest quarter of the southwest quarter of Section 36, Township 59, of Range 24, where William Fisher now lives.

A man by the name of Goben had a field on the southwest quarter of Section 4, Township 57, of Range 25, and a ferry across the West fork of Grand River.

There was a field on the East half of Section 6, Township 58, of Range 25, and another field on the northwest quarter of Section 36, Township 59, of Range 25; northeast quarter of Section 26, Township 59, of Range 25; northwest quarter of Section 32, Township 59, of Range 25; northwest quarter of the southwest quarter of Section 30, Township 59, of Range 25. William Black was living on the northwest quarter of Section 23, Township, of Range 25, and there were two fields on the southwest quarter of Section 11, Township 59, of Range 25, and one on the southeast quarter of Section 36, Township 59, of Range 25.

The road from the lower settlement of Grand River to the upper settlement passed through where the city of Chillicothe is now located, out on the Chillicothe and Springhill road, on up to Springhill, then on to the Christison farm north of Springhill: thence westward to the Daviess county line, passing through what is known as the Hiram Poe land in Section 30, 59-25. The engineers made note of finding a path extending from the northwest quarter, Section 6, 58-25, westward to Daviess county.

There were remains of an Indian village on the southwest quarter of Section 2, Township 59, of Range 24, on the land owned by Charles S. and James Mack.

On the hill (known as Indian Hill), being part of the farm now owned by Chris Boehner, was an Indian village. The Indians that inhabited it were known as the Iowa Sioux.

On the 1st day of February, 1837, Henry H. Mitchell laid out a town consisting of forty-two blocks, public square, a block for a church and a park, on that part of the northeast quarter of Section 20, Township 56, of Range 21, in the bend and on the banks of Grand River, and called the name of the town "Astoria". A great many lots were sold to people in the East. Great predictions were made for the future City of Astoria.

At that time, and prior thereto, the Astors as the American Fur Company's owners, had been doing a thriving business in the fur trade up along the banks of Grand River, and that is how the town came by its name. The land on which the town was located is now owned by Robert R. Leaton.

This was a common tradition for naming children but of course not used by all or necessarily carried out throughout the naming of all the children. It often does give us a clue as to the name of the grandparents whose identities are often so elusive.

TWO FRENCH CHILDREN ARE BURIED ON BLUFF OF GRAND RIVER FARM

Lulled to their everlasting sleep by the murmuring breezes of the forest primeval, their tiny graves caressed by the warm beams of a kindly sun and blanketed by winter's fleecy coverlet, two small French children lay buried on the bluff of Grand River about a quarter of a mile south of what is known to the country-side as "Rocky Ford".

The late John Cox used to relate a legend concerning them: There was a trading post near this site conducted, in the days before the white settlers came to Livingston County, by the French. A Frenchman with his family lived at the post. What became of him and the other members of his family is not known but after the post had been abandoned this family stayed on.

The graves were on the land when the late Hiram Darr purchased it from the government in 1851. The story goes that the name of the Frenchman was "Chouteau", a name famous in Missouri in connection with French traders. Mr. Darr respected the sanctity of the dead and during his life-time kept a paling fence around the spot holding the tiny graves.

Birch trees now mark the location of the graves that have been disturbed and lost to sight since Mr. Darr sold the ground. W. L. Cox and his father, John Cox marked the birch trees that are growing near the site of the graves so that the last resting place of the little French children who lived on Livingston County soil when it was still, perhaps, a part of their mother-country, may have a monument to their memory.

It is said that a grave of a Frenchman named "Gibeaut" was found in the early days of the county on land now owned by Homer Kesler in Jackson township. Mr. Kesler, himself, has never heard the legend.

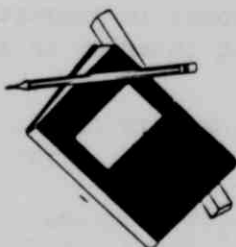

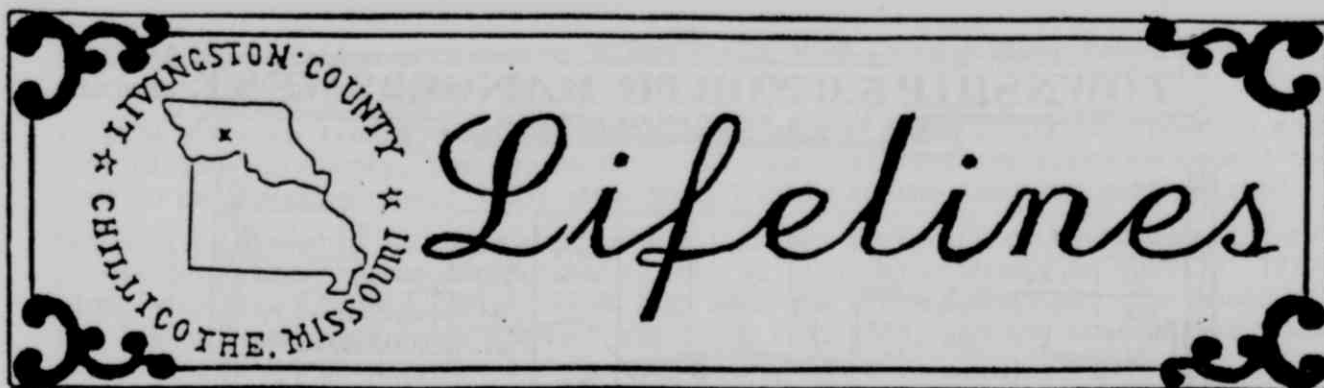
MEETINGS

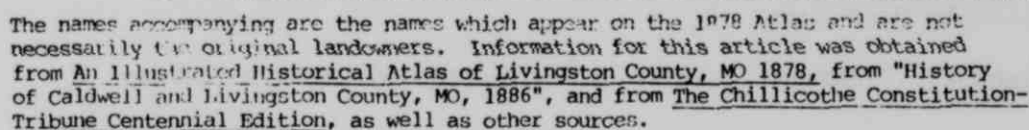

Pictured is a portion of Township 56 N., Range 22 W., Grand River Township in Southeast Livingston County, MO, as shown in 1878.

In 1828 a French trading post was established at the mouth of Locust Creek in southeast Livingston County, but roving bands of Iowa, Sac, Fox and Kickapoo caused the post to be abandoned until 1833, when Indian title to the land was extinguished.

Grand River Township is the oldest of the thirteen townships of Livingston County. It was designated by the first County Court of Livingston County on April 6, 1837, along with Shoal Creek, Indian Creek, and Medicine Creek Townships. The names of the latter three were later changed and lands redivided, leaving Grand River Township in the Southeast corner, the oldest original township.

In 1838 a Frenchman named Wm. LeBarron planned to establish a water mill near Bedford, but his idea failed upon his death in St. Louis while on a trip to purchase machinery. Spencer A. Alexander and Zante McKinney were early area settlers. Alexander donated land for Fairland School site, and later the schoolhouse served as a post office for the stagecoach delivery between Brunswick and Chillicothe. Henry Duncan settled west of Bedford in 1839. First schoolboard members were G. W. Wolfskill, S. A. Alexander, J. A. Duncan, S. Meyers, W. Sterling, W. Coen, D. A. Creason, D. A. Singleton, John Anderson, J. K. Sweeney and William Santer. Mr. O. K. Smith of New York, was thought to be the first schoolteacher in southeast Grand River Township in 1843. His schoolhouse was a small log cabin with slab seats. He was later a merchant at Grandville.

Land for Independence School site was given by Martin Geiser. The building served for school on weekdays, Bible Class every Sunday, and church services one Sunday each month. John S. Bowles conducted a school at Bedford in 1840. Sessions were held in various buildings before land was purchased from Frank Turner for the Bedford grade school. N. B. Utt was contractor, assisted by A. L. Utt.

A steamboat called "Bedford" ascended Grand River soon after settlements were in place, about 1839 or 40, but she stranded and broke up about 12 miles southeast of Chillicothe, near the site of a settlement. Bedford supposedly derived the name from the unfortunate ship. The town was platted in April 1840. In 1878 Bedford was a good trading center with a population of about 300. Local businesses included 2 stores, a steam saw mill, two tobacco factories, an implement store, two hotels and a chair factory.

Henry H. Huffman may have been the first merchant at Bedford, another was Daniel G. Saunders. A saw mill was built by Alex. Davis. Later a Mr. Hicks owned it and he attached a grist mill.

In the fall of 1864 a man identified as "Jim Jackson" and about a dozen bushwackers entered Bedford from Chariton Co. They robbed the store belonging to Daniel G. Saunders, took horses belonging to Union sympathizers, and threatened to kill Judge S. B. DeLand "on sight." The invaders forced W. H. Vincent, the village blacksmith, to shoe their horses and left a worn-out horse in payment. Grand River Township suffered at the hands of both the Federal jayhawkers and rebel bushwackers during those troubled times.

The "cyclone" of 1880 was devastating at Bedford. It destroyed the mill, tore down or damaged about fifteen other buildings, and swept out the center span of the river bridge.

Ques. 2d Are there any complaints? Ans. none.

Ques. 3d Is. there a written report of the no. and state of Sunday Schools and of the pastoral instruction of the children? Answer There is.
"Report No. 3, Sunday Schools, 5 in number. Our Sunday School work opened very favorably for the Summer at Antioch, Mt Pleasant, Spring Hill and perhaps at the Knight, School-house.
We have heard from some of these places and the reports are very flattering. No reports from Superintendents yet. We have appointments to preach to the Schools on our next round.
Our pastoral visiting and instruction of the children are not what they ought to be.
We desire to make improvement very much.--running appointments in the way--Some other obstacles may be removed.
We give some Scripture lessons and hear them--Some questions on lesson is our method if we have any.
We desire all members of this body to work diligently in the Sunday Schools

"REBECCA DEUPREE"

"Rebecca Deupree, the young wife of Edwin P. Deupree, lost her battle for life over 140 years ago. Her body was laid to rest on top of a hill close to the Livingston/ Grundy County line. A young lady of just 22 years, her name was engraved on a marble slab which was placed at the head of her grave as a memorial to her young life.

Marking the solitary grave located on a lonely hilltop in what is now part of the Pookey State Forest in the Northwest corner of Livingston County, Rebecca's tombstone is a reminder of the legacy left by the pioneers to Livingston County. The peaceful countryside surrounding Rebecca's gravesite leaves no indication of what may have been the young lady's plight. If the hills could talk, they maybe would tell of a disease, an accident, childbirth or some misfortune which took her life. As was often the case, pioneers suffered in solitude, and the solitude remains yet today with single graves dotting the countryside. Rebecca's grave, located within the bounds of the State Forest will remain on the crest of the hill, surrounded by Hackberry trees, prairie grass and winding deer trails." Southern Sympathizers a Thorn to Northern Troops in County

Mar. 9, 1950

Many Farmers Gave Out Nothing But Wrong Information.

The Federals found their capture and early occupation of this county easy. But it wasn't for long. Returning Confederates, banding together in the hills and aided by sympathetic residents plagued the forces of the United States.

After their capture of Lexington, General Price and Governor Jackson planned to throw their State Guard forces to the north and capture Chillicothe to use the city as a base of operations against the Federals. But the action of the Federals at their rear forced them to give up the plan and they moved their forces to the southwestern quarter of the state.

After the fall of Lexington, and the abandonment of plans to invade the north, some Livingston County men obtained leave of absence and made stealthy and brief visits to their homes. Their presence was known to but a few, and they soon returned to safety. A few remained, and engaged in irregular warfare against the Federal cause.

Trouble between the forces began in the autumn of 1861. At that time the 3rd Iowa was stationed at the Grand river bridge. The 50th Illinois and the 39th Ohio, with some detachments of the cavalry at Chillicothe were sent into Jackson Township to disperse the bands of Confederate recruits and bushwhackers.

Among the leaders of these bands were Joe Kirk, David Martin, Jim Ryder, Lewis Best. These men were causing the Federals a great amount of consternation.

They made it impossible for lone, or small groups, of Federals or Northern sympathizers to pass through the region. Troops had been fired upon several times and the blood of Federal soldiers spilled.

And the Confederates always made good their escapes. They

knew the country and almost every farmer in the region was a friend of the South and not the North. While they gave directions, the movements of Federal troops, food and protection to Southerners, they gave nothing but possibly misleading information to the enemy.

The Federal expedition consisted of two columns: one, composed of a detachment of the 39th Ohio, crossed Grand river at Graham's Mill and went west into what is now Sampsel Township. At Hale's branch (sec. 12-58-25), four miles west of Graham's Mill, the detachment was fired upon by Joe Kirk's men, who were in ambush near the road. One Federal was killed and a half-dozen wounded before the Federals were forced to retreat.

The other column, a detachment of the 50th Illinois, and some of the cavalry, went northwest of Graham's Mill and into the northwestern portion of the township. The day was Sunday and a number of the residents were at Lily Grove Church at services. The troops searched the church—to the great disturbance to some with Southern leanings—but harmed no one.

Up on the Blackburn prairie they were not so pacific. They burned John Blackburn's house and a number of Mr. Hutchinson's haystacks, and did considerable foraging.

The Federals alleged that Blackburn was "in the brush," that he was a guerrilla and a bushwhacker, and had fired into trains, etc. After his house was burned, while gazing upon its ashes, Blackburn swore that he would fight the Federals as long as he lived.

And he did.

The rebel partisans in the forks sunk the ferryboats in Grand river to prevent the Federals from crossing, but Col. Wilson, of the Illinois 16th, sent a force to Darr's ferry—now Graham's Mill—in time to protect it.

History describes Joe Kirk, David Martin, Lewis Best, Charles Cooper and Jim Ryder—the rebel leaders—

as follows:

All knew the county thoroughly, all were desperate fighters, and for some time they held Jackson Township as completely as the Federals held the rest of the county. Joe Kirk posted written notices on the trees and elsewhere, warning the Federals to keep out of the township "until invited." Said one notice: "We were here first, and we will be here last. Look out!"

Joe Kirk's exploits in this county during the war would make a full story itself. And one was printed in The Constitution-Tribune more than a year ago.

The above article was published in the Constitution-Tribune on Mar. 9, 1950 and copied from the files in the Summerville Room of the Livingston County Library. The Cemetery article was submitted by Carolyn Leffler

GIBBONS/BLACKWELL Cemetery
Located 1/2 mile outside present-day city limits of Chillicothe, Mo., on Hwy 65 North, a lone cedar tree stands on a hill to indicate this small cemetery.

The Christian Pioneer, a religious newspaper, was published in Chillicothe by David T. Wright, an elder in the Christian Church. Formerly called the Western Pioneer, it was first published at Trenton, Mo., in Grundy County, later moving to Lindley, Mo., and finally to Chillicothe where it was published from 1864-1870. The following obituaries and marriage notices were extracted from microfilmed originals at the Livingston County Library and covers the years 1869-70.

Dear Elder D.T. Wright,

I have the painful task to write to you that your beloved brother and friend, George W. Nave, departed this life on last Saturday night, February 26th. For 2 years his health was good indeed, better than he was in the West. He was engaged in the mercantile business and doing well. But last fall he took a severe cold which settled upon his lungs, and which finally brought him to his grave. He was a faithful member of the Christian Church of this place, and died as he lived--a Christian. Though the day was disagreeable, yet his funeral was attended by one of the largest processions I ever witnessed in this country. He was held in high esteem by all who knew him. He leaves a widow and 4 children with his many friends to mourn his death.

Marcus A. Thaxton

Died: April 13, 1870 of cancer of the throat, Marcus A. Thaxton. He was born in Prince William County, Virginia, April the 8th, 1820, and was consequently forty-one years and 5 days old at the time of his death. He leaves an afflicted wife and son to mourn his absence.

Seldom is any community called upon to part with a man to whom the loss is greater. In all his relations to the family, the church and society he was strictly honest and honorable. His father removed to Mercer County, Missouri in 1838. He remained on the farm with his father until he was sixteen years of age, when he went to Trenton, Missouri to attend school. After attending school for a short time he entered a dry goods store as clerk. His promptness and intelligence secured for him a partnership in the firm of Alf. Blue and Co. In 1856 he was married to his surviving widow, then Miss Harriett Jane, daughter of Judge Merrill of Grundy County. In 1855 he purchased the Western Pioneer, a secular paper, started in Trenton in 1851 by D.T. Wright, now of the Christian Pioneer, of this city, and B.H. Smith, now of the Christian University. He edited and published that paper for a time and then went to a farm near Middlebury, in Mercer County, whence he came to Chillicothe in 1858. Here he engaged as clerk with the firm of Johnson, Pace & Bell. After the close of this firm in 1861, he entered into partnership with Crouch & Swain in the grocery business. After a time that firm removed to St. Louis continuing the same business. From St. Louis Mr. Thaxton returned to Chillicothe and entered into partnership with Broadus and Swain with whom he continued until the dissolution of that firm in the fall of 1868, since then he has been a partner in the firm of J.A. Abshire & Co. in pork packing, and also in the firm of Edgerton & Broadus as real estate dealers.

His correctness and readiness as an accountant, together with the strictest fidelity and a sound judgement made him a desirable business partner. His quiet, unassuming and gentlemanly deportment secured for him the regard and friendship of those who transacted business with him. As a friend he was warm and earnest in his attachments; as a neighbor, obliging, as a husband, one of the most tender and affectionate; as a father, kind and indulgent; as a Christian, faithful in Christ to the last. About seventeen years ago he obeyed the Gospel of Christ, and was

baptized by Elder T.P. Haley. To please the Savior and be ready to meet him has been the purpose and aim of his life since he embraced the Gospel of the Son of God. Delight in the worship of God with his brethern on earth is exchanged for the fuller joy of those who die in the Lord and are blessed by Him.

For ten weeks he was confined, and though suffering excruciating pain, no murmur escaped him. He had arranged his temporal affairs in prospect of his decease and waited anxiously for the change.

For several weeks previous to his death at his request the brethern met with him on the Lord's Day to commemorate the Lord's death. This was continued as long as he was able to swallow. He often expressed the desire to depart and be with Christ. He spoke of his death with a composure which none but a Christian can feel. He desired that his brethern should sign the 928th hymn in Christian Hymn book and think it as true of him. A short time before his death he remarked as a matter of regret, "I am on this side yet." On Friday, before his death he wrote, "I feel unusually well. I am not afraid to die. My idea is my work is over." A few minutes before his death he clapped his hands as if rejoicing that his end had come. His end was triumphant through Christ. Farewell dear brother, till we meet on the other side.

He leaves a christian and sorely afflicted companion, one son and an aged and widowed mother, besides sisters and other relatives in the flesh, together with many friends to mourn his death. I deeply sympathize with these, especially in the irreparable loss they have sustained in the death of this good man. May the Lord be merciful to each of these, and deal gently with them in this sad and dark hour of their trouble.

Biography
of
Catherine Easton Wright

Catharine Easton Wright was born near Jonesboro, Washington County, Tennessee, August 26, 1824. When she had grown to womanhood she was united in marriage to David Taylor Wright, a pioneer preacher of the Christian church and founder of the Christian Pioneer, on the 26th day of January 1842. To this union was born thirteen children, four of whom are now living. Mrs. Wright came with her husband to Missouri in 1846 settling first in Mercer Co. later moved to Grundy county and from there to Chillicothe in 1864. Mrs. Wright and her husband traveled in a flat boat from Tennessee to Paducah, Kentucky, and from there by steamboat to Brunswick, Missouri, by way of St. Louis and thence overland by ox team to destination. Mrs. Wright and her husband left their Tennessee home on the 3rd of March, 1846, and reached their Missouri home June 1st, 1846. The subject of this sketch makes her home with her daughter, Mrs. Clark Wells, of Chillicothe.

DAVID TAYLOR WRIGHT FAMILY

Perhaps the largest family in the Christian Church was that of Brother David Wright and his remarkable wife, Catherine. Twelve children were born to them, but one daughter, Julia, died while the family lived in Trenton. Two other girls, Sallie and Decimund, died young. Ellen became the wife of Professor James Long, and taught in the Primary Department of the Chillicothe Seminary. Mary was the beauty of the family and became Mrs. Clark Wells, after teaching school for a few years at Breckenridge, Missouri. She lived to a greater age than any of the other children of the family--being considerably past 90 at the time of her death in Oakland, California. Analyza was one of my mother's closest friends, not only during their Trenton days, but even more so in Chillicothe. She became the second wife of Samuel Sweetland, Sr. after she had worked in my mother's millinery shop for several years. Kittie Wright, who became the wife of J.D. Watson, was my most intimate friend until her death in 1945, although she was four years older than I. She also taught school before her marriage, mainly in the Avalon neighborhood of Livingston County. John Wright was a farmer in Sullivan County, Mo, David, Jr. and Joe X. were printers and died many years ago; Allen was drowned in Grand River while a student at the Seminary; and William was a banker at Lebanon, Missouri for several years before his death.

She was born in Lincoln County, Kentucky, near Hustonville July 13, 1838. Her parents, William and Mary Hutchison moved to this country when she was about 3 years old and she had since been a resident of the neighborhood in which she died. She was married to George B. Nave November 14, 1867, who with her aged mother, 4 sisters and 2 brothers survive her.

She was a devoted christian lady having been a member of the Baptist church in Chillicothe about 45 years. She was a friend to the poor and needy and was always ready to help those who were less fortunate in life than herself. She was bedfast about 9 months and bore her sufferings with Christ-like endurance. She was willing and ready to go but expressed a desire that if it was the Lord's will she would like to live to care for her mother but if not she would rather be at rest than suffering here. Those that are left to mourn may find comfort in the thought that she is now at rest and has gone to join her loved ones who have gone before she was laid to rest in the Hutchison cemetery. S.E.H.

Society seeks help to restore 'forgotten' cemeteries

Efforts are under way to help restore small, oftentimes forgotten, cemeteries throughout the county.

Leonard Nibarger, cemetery committee chairman for the Livingston County Genealogical Society, said, "We are aware that Memorial Day is just a few days away. Several cemeteries are cared for on a perpetual basis and, consequently, are a credit to their communities. But there are many older cemeteries that are shamefully neglected and in disgraceful condition."

Nibarger, who said he has personally examined 50 cemeteries west of Grand River and north of U.S. 36 alone, said there are probably 100 cemeteries in the county while only 15 to 20 existing cemetery associations.

"Several graves have sunk and never been filled after settling. Many stones are down; brush has overgrown some, and fences are needed in some places," said Nibarger.

The Chillicothean added that volunteer help is necessary to repair these cemeteries — many of which are in wooded areas or near where roads once existed but are now gone. "We've already had some offers for help, which is essential. But some costs are inevitable. I've had complete support from the people whose land these cemeteries are located as well."

People should not be surprised if in the future they are called on to help, but we would only call on a non-farming day."

He explained it will take time to complete this type of restorative work and much of the work will probably be done during the winter months.

As a beginning effort for this program, plans are under way to organize a cemetery care organization for cemeteries without associations to look after them.

Nibarger added that fund-raising is necessary to complete the work on these cemeteries, for expenses such as purchasing fence and other necessary items, to complete restoration efforts at sites such as those where the newest grave may be from the early 1900s. "We are hopeful that people who have moved away from here would be happy to help with the finances,"

said Nibarger. "Senior citizens may want to contribute, or possibly gifts could be left in wills to help restore these cemeteries or money could be invested and the interest used to defray upkeep costs on a particular cemetery."

Anyone interested in contributing to such a fund or to the cemetery of choice may contact the Genealogical Society at 450 Locust, Chillicothe, Mo. 64601 or Leonard Nibarger, 1600 Jennings Place, Chillicothe.

"I feel we owe the pioneers and ancestors of Livingston County this courtesy, and, hopefully we can restore to them a dignified place to rest," added Nibarger.

SPOILING WOMEN'S NAMES

Columbia Missouri Herald, December 9, 1880

Many, if not a majority, of the names of 800 or 900 girls from the public schools examined for admission to the normal college, give us the impression that they belong to mere household pets rather than to young women who are approaching maturity, and who are engaged in serious work. These girls apparently prefer the nicknames by which they are known in the family circle and to intimate friends, and therefore take pains to adopt them in their signatures...

We find, for instance, among these 800 names scores of Minnies or Mamies, and only here and there a Mary, a much more euphonious and dignified name. Jane is transformed usually into Janny, Caroline into Carrie, Ellen to Ella, Elizabeth into Lizzie and Bessie, Katherine into Katie, Martha into Mattie, Margaret into Maggie, Anne and Anna into Annie, and Harriet into Hattie. Such absurd names as these appear quite frequently: Chattie, Lillie, Millie, Tillie, Kittie, Rosie, Nettie, Bibbie, Aggie, and Maggie.....

No, not all, for memory lviies and the heritage of affection and good deeds of a useful life which he bequeathed 'ere the sun of his earthly existance had been superseded by the pall of infinitude will live beyond the grave. Only one short week, but what is not embodied in these for words. Through life's horoscope from the cradle to the grave when all was growing dim, "as in a glass darkly" what did he see? A long expanse of years unmarred by an unworthy act--sixty-five years of unspotted recititude, to end in the reward given all such in a world where sin is unknown, the transplanting from a field of clay to one of unbounded fertility a gem worthy of a crown.

Deceased was born in Switzerland, Jan. 23, 1825 and came to the United States upon obtaining his majority. He removed to Chillicothe in 1866 and shortly afterward engaged in the grocery business, which he has followed every since.

He leaves a wife, a daughter, Miss Hattie, and six sons, William, Flora, John, Mark, Louis and Harry. Mark resides in Colorado.

PIONEER HELPER ON COURT HOUSE

Martin Yeiser Assisted As Carpenter On
Building Erected In Livingston County in 1840

"Martin Yeiser, who settled on a farm near what is now Bedford...was born in Carroll County, Maryland, on June 26, 1815. He died near Bedford January 31, 1898 at the home of his daughter Mattie.

Mr. Yeiser was one of Grand River township's most respected and venerable citizens, having been a resident of the township for nearly 45 years. He came of a family of pioneers, those people who hewed out the track of civilization, and made its comforts and luxuries oissubke for those who followed them.

He was of Swiss decent, his great grandfather having come to this country in the 17th century, locating in what was then known as the "far west", the wilds of Pennsylvania.

Mr. Yeiser was born on a farm and lived upon it until he was of age, when he learned the carpenter trade. He came west at the age of 21 and settled in Preble County, Ohio, where he remained three years. About 1840 he came to Missouri, landing in St. Louis where he remained but a short time. Concluding that place, which was but a small town, was not far enough west for him, he pushed on to Brunswick where he found employment at his trade.

The years from 1840 to 1850 were spent mainly at Brunswick with trips to other towns. Among these were Chillicothe and Gallatin. He was employed in the erection of court houses at each place. In the spring of 1840 he contracted to build the Gallatin court house which he built in the summer of 1841. He helped to erect the court house in Chillicothe near that date.

During the gold excitement of '49 and '50 he, too, became infected with the California craze, and with three companions made the trip overland. After staying there a year he decided that he was a better carpenter than miner and Missouri was a better state than California for him, so he returned to Brunswick and again went to work at his trade.

In a few years he saved enough money to buy some land. He bought 200 acres from Daniel Saunders. He afterwards sold part of it which became the Wisehaupt farm, reserving the remainder for his own home. He was married to Miss Bettie Blankenship of Kirksville, MO on September 4, 1856. She died in 1867 and he married Mrs. Mary A. Graham in 1868.

When Mr. Yeiser came to Bedford there was but one log house there. Everything was brought by steam boats from St. Louis.

His daughter, Mattie, married A. Utt on March 16, 1887."

She was sixty-two years and five months old. The oldest daughter and youngest son are the ones dead. The names of her sons are Thornton, William, Scott, James, Ed., Zibe, S. P., Lee, and Andrew.

The stricken family have the unlimited sympathy of the entire community, in which she was universally beloved in the death of a wife and mother.

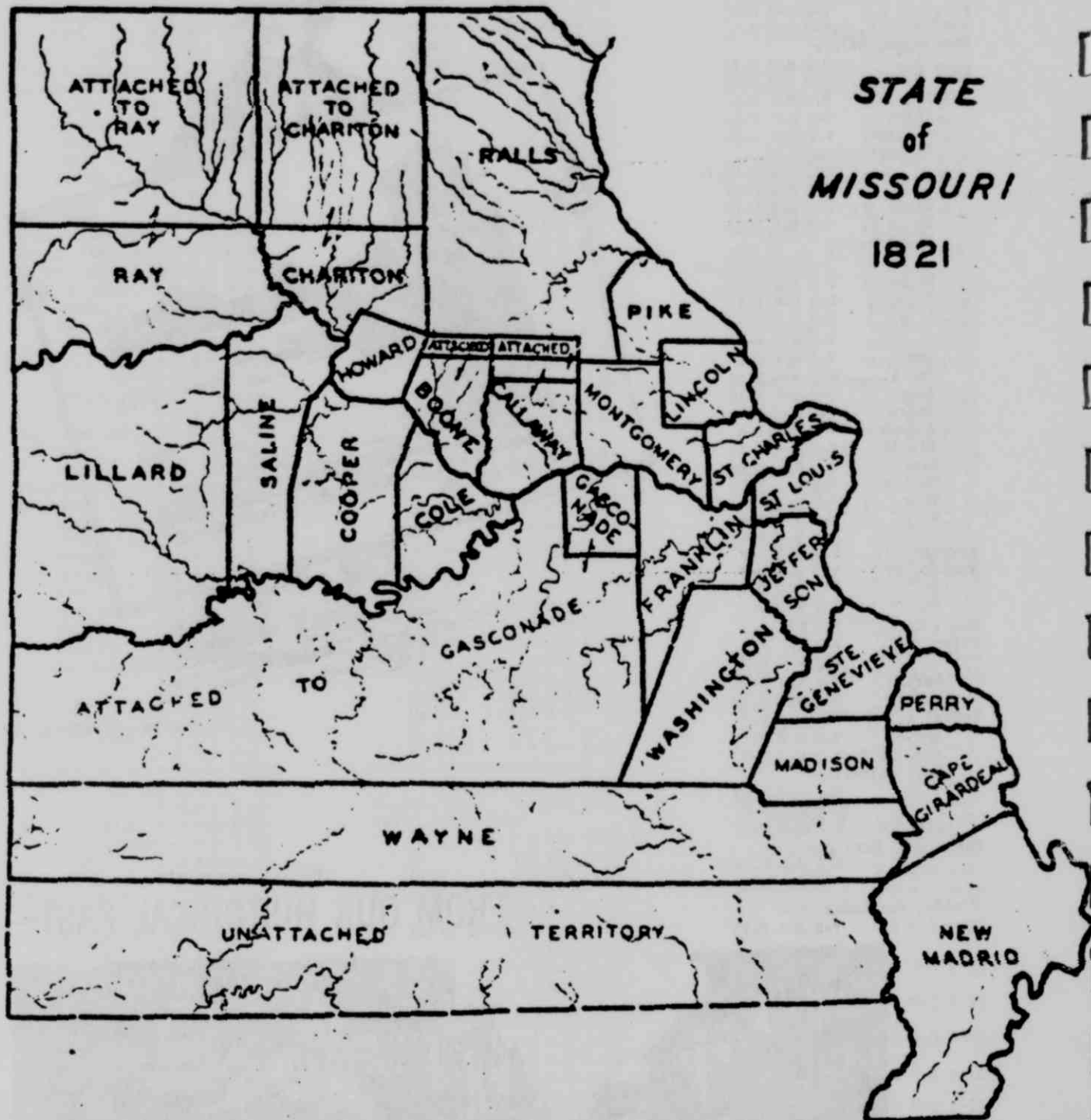
