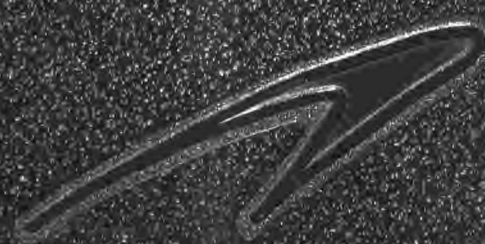


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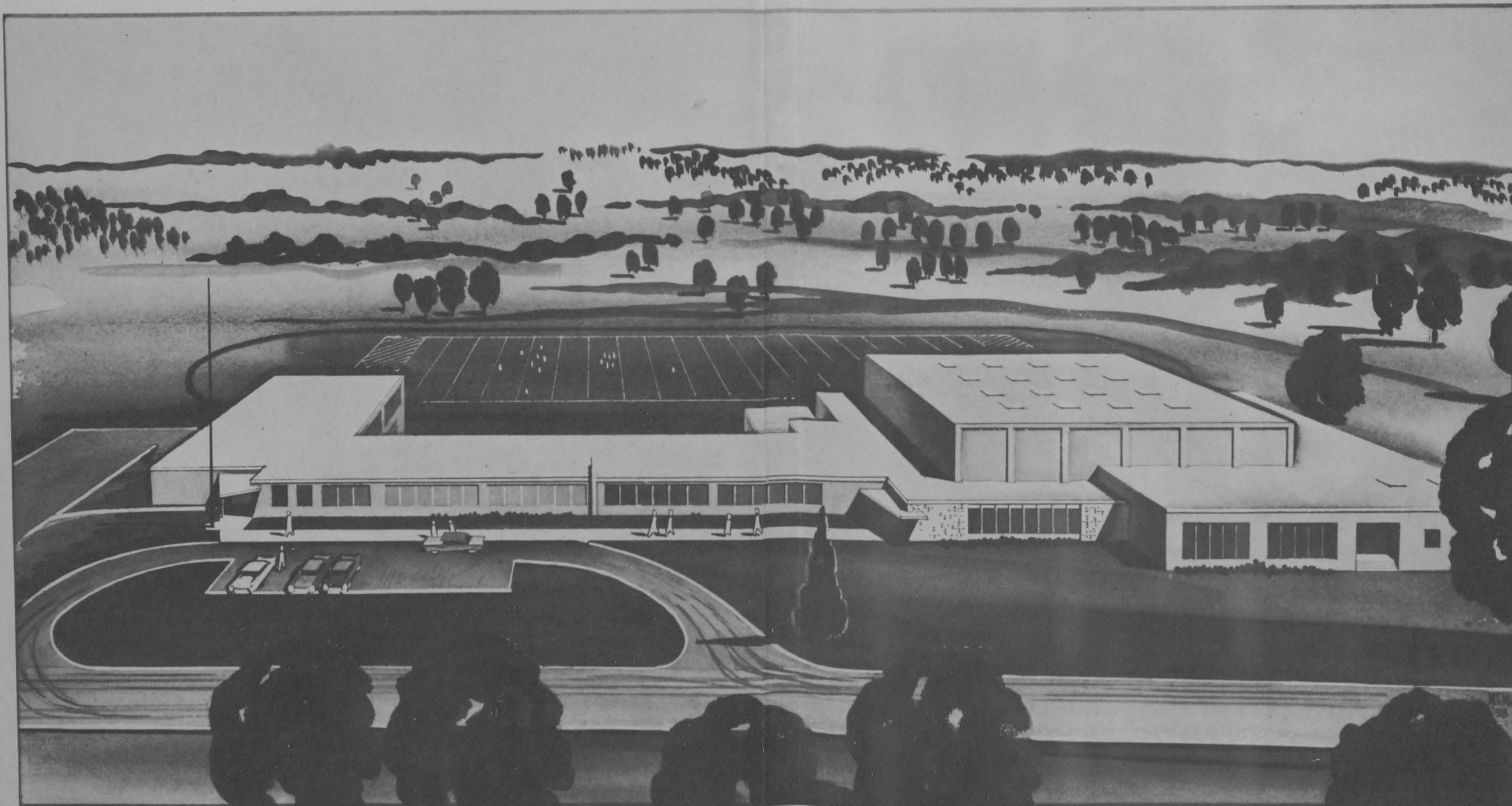

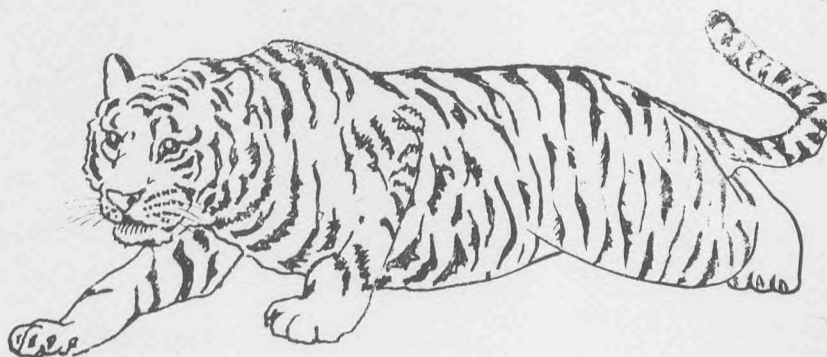

This is Tuesday evening, February 25. The time is 8:30 p.m. I have just talked long distance from Iberia to the high school office in Central Building in Waynesville and Mr. Claude Morgan, Secy. of the Board of Education, answered. My question to him, "How did the Bond Issue go?" A thrilling answer in an excited voice: "The voters have this day turned in an almost 8 to 1 victory---roughly about 1140 for, to about 159 against! Waynesville is going to have a new and spectacular school system climaxed by the erection of a wonderfully fine new high school plant!!!"

About two months ago when we wrote a preceding page in this fine 1958 Annual dedicating it to the School and Community---that means all of you and your school children, we could not imagine the thrill that could be experienced at the announcement of the news that you had done it---that you would rise to the challenge of the time, that you would show to the world that you would put in a new high school system. Right now as I am writing these lines that news is crackling off every radio broadcasting antenna in this territory and into our living rooms comes the picture of an announcer over TV saying it is so---Waynesville school patrons have gone to the polls this day, voted in a wonderful \$250,000.00 bond issue, will match it with \$281,000.00 from the federal government, will make available some \$531,000.00, will completely re-create a new school system to meet the needs of the times.

Mr. Morgan agreed over the telephone, and certainly voices the opinion of the rest of the Board of Education and Mr. Parker, the Supt., that this is without doubt the biggest and most important piece of work to come before the administrative officers of the school this year, or in many previous years or years to come.

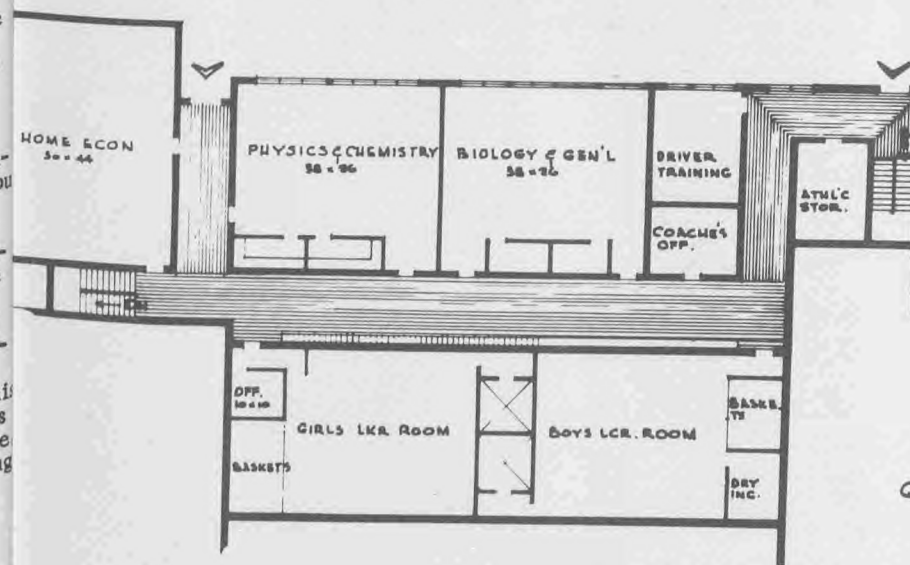

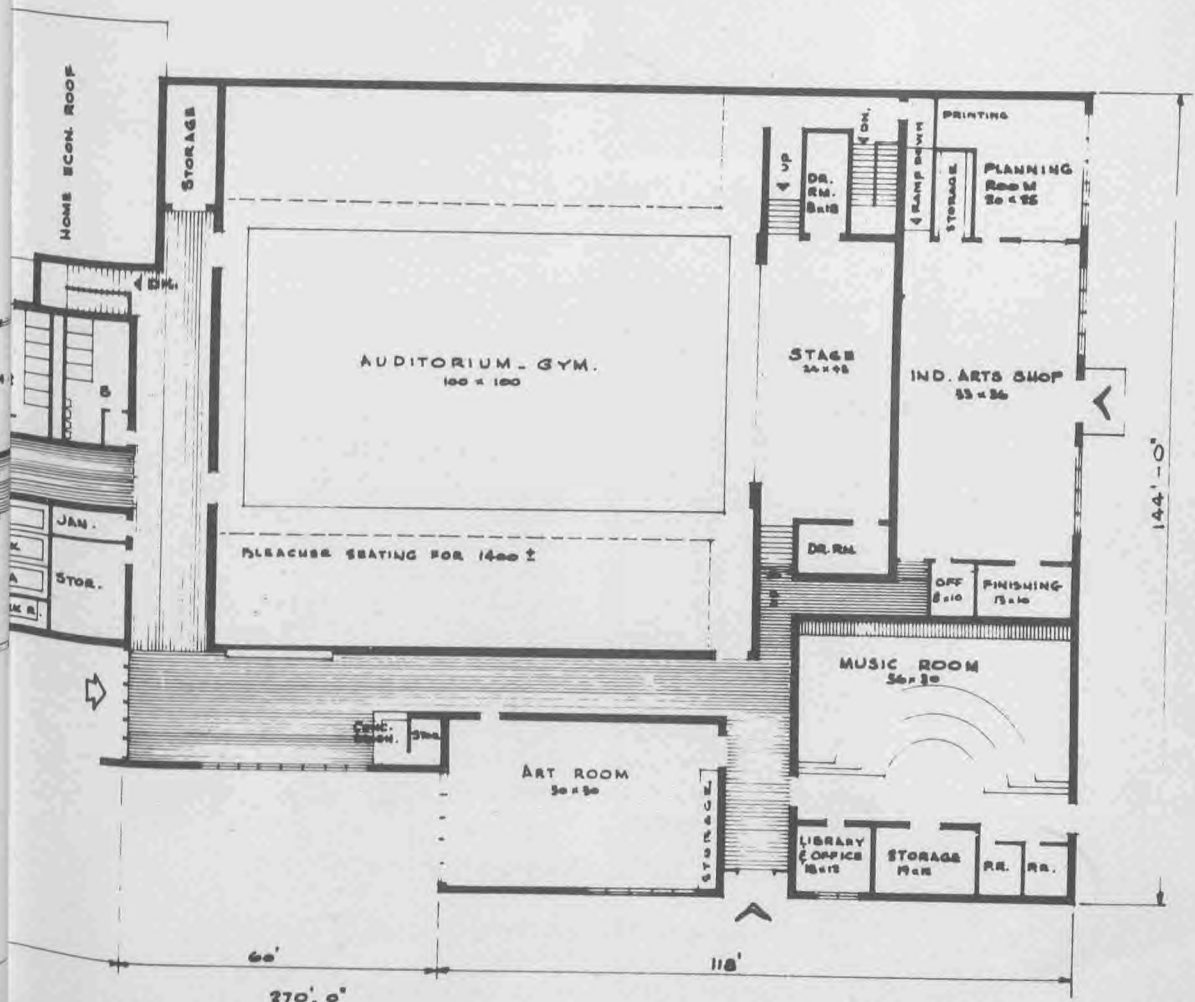
EXISTING BUILDING



## Important Dates of Yesteryear

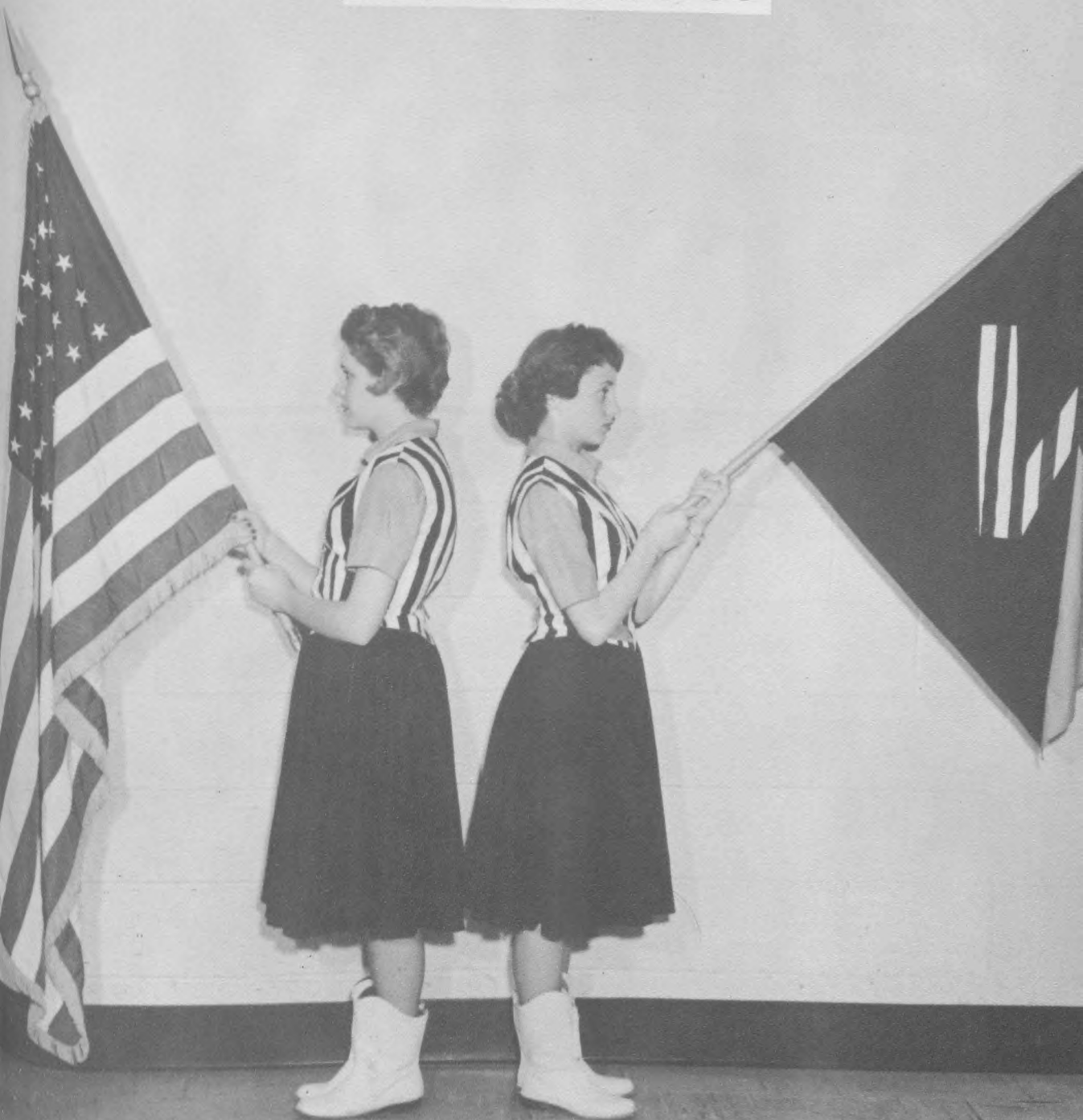

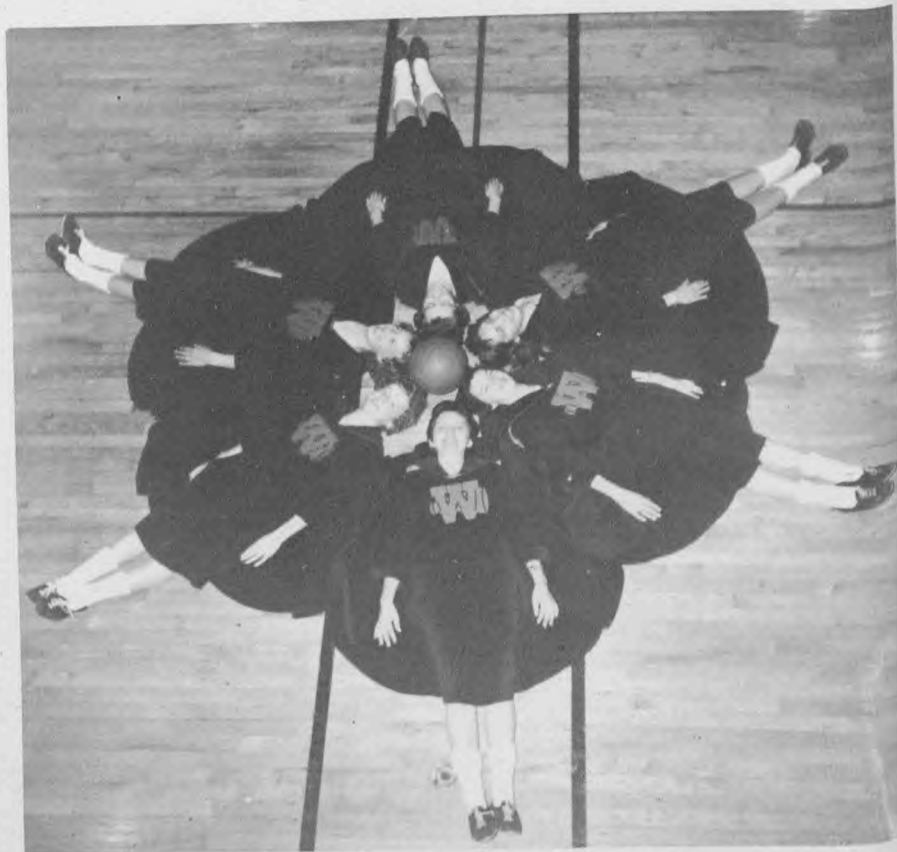

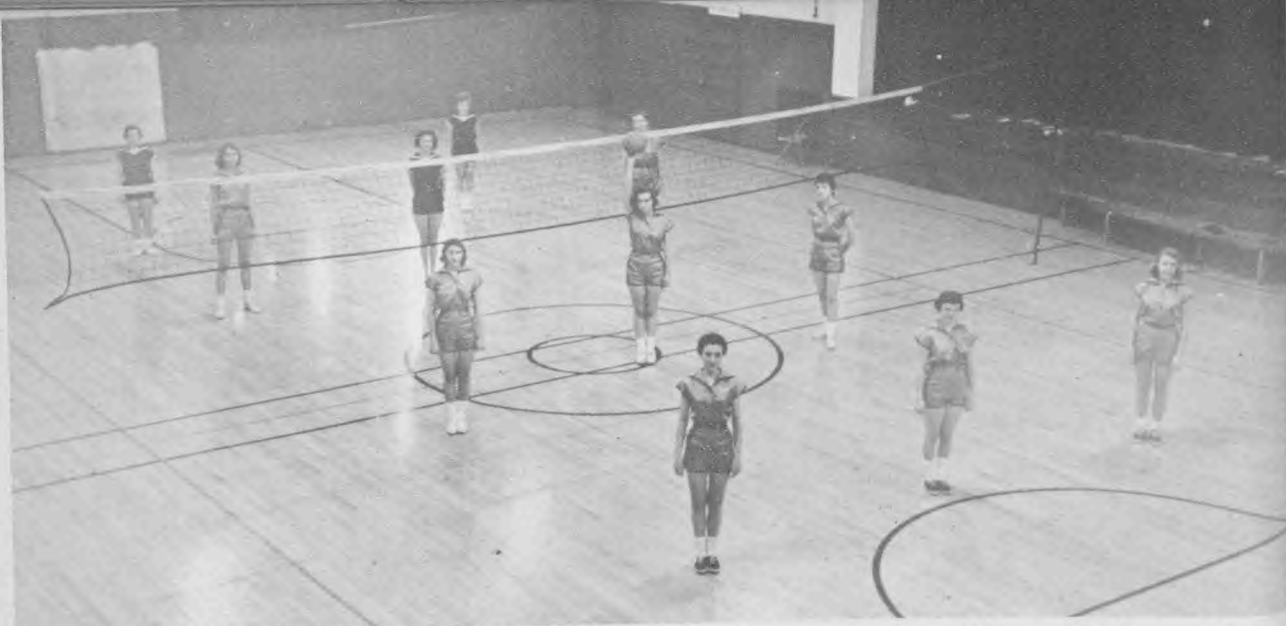

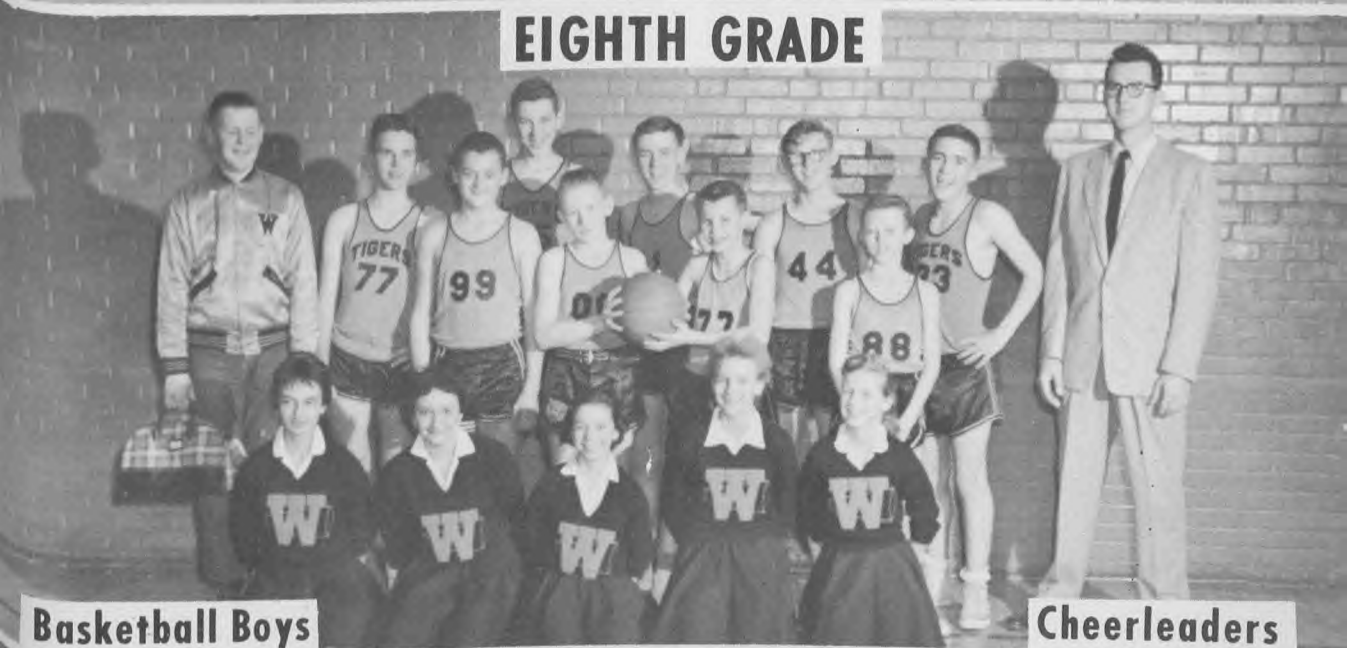
