BOOK REVIEW --

THE SLAGLE FAMILY IN AMERICA, descended from THE SCHLEGEL von GOTTLIEBEN FAMILY OF GERMANY. Co-authored and published by A. Russell Slagle, 312-A Wyndhurst Ave., Baltimore, Maryland 21210. \$7.50.

This book on the Slagle/Schlegel family is beautifully bound and printed, with many illustrations and family photographs. It contains 392 pages but is not indexed. However, if you have a Slagle/Schlegel among your ancestors, it may be the bonanza you are looking for.

The book is divided into three parts. Part I is a translation of the genealogy of the Schlegel von Gottleben family in Germany by Karl Friedrich von Frank and was printed in a genealogy and heraldry publication there in 1965. It begins in the late 1400's with Ernst von Schlegel of Saxony and carries through eight generations to the early 1800's.

Part II is the genealogy of the Slagle family in America descended from Christopher Slagle of the sixth generation, who was born in 1676 in Germany and immigrated to Pennsylvania about 1700. He died in 1772. His descendants are carried down to the present day from the sixth to the fourteenth generations.

Part III is in German and consists of the material in Parts I and II. The book is written in narrative form and gives many direct references of wills, deeds, etc. almost verbatim. All sources are listed in footnotes. The direct line is quite complete down to the author and siblings, with many names of the great and near-great in evidence, but without an index you must dig. Bedinger, Washington, Lee, and Clay are some of the collateral lines that are mentioned.

SOME DESCENDANTS OF DANIEL STONE OF KITTERY AND BERWICK, MAINE  
A Preliminary Sketch of my Earliest Known Stone Ancestors

First Generation

Daniel Stone b. about 1643 married Patience Goodwin, daughter of Daniel and Margaret (Spencer) Goodwin, 19 Sept. 1670 at Kittery, Maine. Daniel Stone's will is dated 28 Mar. 1713 and was entered for probate 23 Apr. 1713. Patience Stone's will is dated 18 Feb. 1715/16 and was entered for probate 11 Apr. 1716. They both name all of their children in their wills. They lived and apparently their children were born in that portion of Kittery which became Berwick. The births of all but Mary are listed in the Kittery Vital Records. She is named and called a daughter in both wills.

Second Generation

Jonathan Stone was the eldest son of Daniel and Patience (Goodwin) Stone. He is frequently mentioned in Berwick Town Records, as are other members of the family. His wife was Sarah \_\_\_\_\_, and I have not yet learned their marriage date. Only one child is named in the Kittery Vital Records, Jonathan. Another son was my ancestor, and I have his name and birth date from family records. There were probably other children.

Third Generation

I know very little about Paul Stone. He is mentioned twice in Berwick Town Records. My only other information is from family records. There were probably other children.

Fourth Generation

John Stone was born at Berwick, Maine, 3 Feb. 1741. He married Abigail Libby, daughter of Daniel and Abigail (\_\_\_\_\_) Libby, 14 June 1762. She was born 2 June 1745. John Stone died 22 Dec. 1795, and Abigail (Libby) Stone died 29 July 1820. The data about them and their children is recorded in the Berwick Town Records.

#### Fifth Generation

Levi Stone, son of John and Abigail (Libby) Stone, was born at Berwick 24 May 1774. He married Polly Gray there 15 Feb. 1798. Her parents' names have not yet been determined. They were residents of Cornish, Maine, in the 1800 Census, so all except possibly the eldest were probably born at Cornish. Information about their family is from family sources.

Levi Stone, son of Levi and Polly (Gray) Stone, was born 9 Aug. 1804 and married Elizabeth Hazeltine, daughter of David and Elizabeth (Johnson) Hazeltine. She was born at Limerick, Maine, 12 Apr. 1805. Levi died in May 1881 and Elizabeth in Feb. 1877.

#### Seventh Generation

Martha Frances Stone, daughter of Levi and Polly (Gray) Stone, married Winburn Adams McKenney, son of Joshua Jr. and Ann M. (Bradeen) McKenney of Limington, Maine. Their marriage intentions were published 31 May 1864, so they were probably married shortly after that date. They became the parents of my great-grandmother, Georgia Ellen (McKenney) McCourt, and seven other children. They moved to Minneapolis, Minn., in 1868 and to St. Croix Falls, Wisc., in the 1890's where Martha (Stone) McKenney died 21 May 1895. Winburn Adams McKenney died there 15 July 1898. Other members of the family also moved west.

I would be glad to correspond with anyone descended from or doing research on this family or allied lines.

From STIRPES, December 1968 -- Speech by Walter Muir Whitehill, president of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, at the annual meeting of the Texas State Genealogical Convention:

When the New Jersey Historical Society was being founded in 1845, the Rev. Samuel Miller offered the new organization a piece of advice, based on experience with the New York Historical Society, which he had helped John Pintard to found 41 years earlier. "I have observed," he wrote, "in regard to all the literary and scientific societies with which I have ever been connected, that, however numerous the members, some dozen or two of them performed all the work."

Walla Walla County was organized as part of Oregon Territory in 1854 and was one of the original counties when Washington Territory was formed. Called The Cradle of Northwest History, it was the site of the Whitman Mission, where the massacre of 1847 took place; Old Fort Walla Walla, outpost of the Hudson's Bay Company; and a frequent stopping place for pioneers following the Oregon Trail.
