

## EMPHASIS FOR 1969-1970

June bulletin of the Eastern Washington Genealogical Society included the first section of an alphabetical list of all materials shelved in the Genealogical Room of the Spokane Public Library. The list covered materials from "A" to "Be". This should be very helpful to anyone from this area going up to Spokane to do research.

St. Louis Genealogical Society has completed an index to the 1850 Census for St. Louis County, Mo. It was compiled by a key-punch method, and consists of 868 pages, 99,661 names.

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#### BENTON COUNTY, WASHINGTON, BIRTH RECORDS 1905-1907

Between the organization of Benton County from Yakima and Klickitat Counties in 1905 and the establishment of the Statistics Section of the State Department of Health in 1907, 38 births were recorded in the county. The records are on file in the county court house in Prosser and are open to public view on request. Several of the registrations made originally without the child's given name were amended with the addition of the name in the 1940's, possibly when the person needed a birth certificate to take part in the Atomic Energy Commission's project at Richland. Each certificate contains somewhat more information than is given here, but at least three styles of certificate were used during the two-year period, and the information varies.

### MAPS

The Ohio Department of Highways, Columbus, Ohio, sells 17" by 22" county outline maps for 15 cents each. These show the townships within the county and even the section numbers within the townships. If you had the description of the land owned by your ancestors (from deeds, wills, etc.), it would be quite easy to pinpoint their property. Check the Ohio index film in a branch library of the Genealogical Society of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints to find out what deeds and land records are available on film from Salt Lake City.

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Land Ownership Maps: A Checklist of 19th Century U. S. County Maps in the Library of Congress, compiled by Richard W. Stephenson. Copies of these maps may be ordered from the Library of Congress, but you must write for the price of each map desired. Copies of the book may be ordered from Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., 20402 for seventy cents.

## SOME UTAH HISTORY

(Excerpt from the <u>Seymour Genealogy</u> compiled in 1940 by Miss Mary Louise Seymour of Rome, N.Y. John Adams Seymour, who wrote the letters listed here, was a brother of Leverett Eri Seymour, whose grandson, Paul S. Kingsley, lives at 94 Waldron, Richland, Wash.)

John Adams Seymour was a civil engineer and an expert mathematician. According to some old letters on hand he travelled about considerably when the mode of traveling back in the 1850's was not as convenient as today.

1857--Jan. 16 He was in Zenia, Ohio. His age then 19 years.

1863--Mar. 3 Falmouth, Camp of Detachment 50th Reg. Civil War, where he went to bring home his younger brother Leverett Eri, who was ill with typhoid fever. His brother recovered and continued in the war for three years.

1865--Aug. 2 Pithole City, Pa., surveying oil wells.

Oct. 18 Pithole City, describing the building of an oil well.

1867 -- Dec. 14 Fort Bridges, Wyo., on way west to Salt Lake City, Utah.

1868--Jan. 9 Arrived at Salt Lake City, waiting for spring work on the railroad.

Feb. 17 Expected to go to work on the railroad in about three weeks.

Apr. 5 In camp, north of Weber Kanyon on railroad contract.

Dec. 4 Belmont, Utah.

1870--June 20 Leomnt, enclosing pass on Chicago, Alton and St. Louis railroad.

1872--Jan. 5 Ticonderoga, N.Y., on road construction work.

1873--Mar. 3 Same.

1884--Dec. 27 Bradford, Pa., surveying oil wells.

1889--Feb. 5 City engineer at Bradford, Pa.

A clipping from a Salt Lake City newspaper, dated 1 Sept. 1868, has the following item, mentioning John A. Seymour's work on the railroad:

Work on Messrs. Richards and Groo's contract, in the vicinity of Weber Bridge, is going on nicely. The construction of the line through their contract was completed by Mr. Seymour and assistants yesterday, so there need be no hindrance on that score hereafter. Mr. Wheelock speaks in the highest terms of the ability, energy and accommodation displayed by Mr. Seymour, who, he says, is ever ready and anxious to do all in his

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power to facilitate the carrying forward of the work in the most expeditious and, at the same time, agreeable manner.

Another item regarding this railroad:

CENTRAL PACIFIC -- Mr. Leonard G. Rice informs us that he has taken a sub-contract of Bishop C. W. West for two miles on the Western route. He leaves tomorrow to strike in. That's right, every mile counts.

The R. R. in Weber Kanyon. C. H. Wheelock, Esqr., who reached the city this morning, on his way to Sanpete, gives us the following items relating to the progress of the railroad through Weber Kanyon.

On Messrs. Sharp & Young's contract, in the vicinity of Lost Creek, he says, the work is being cracked ahead in fine style, and blasting is in full operation at both faces of the tunnel, that is to be.

A reading room has been started by Messrs. Richards & Groo for the accommodation of the men engaged in their contract, and for a trifling sum they can luxuriate in newspapers, magazines, and periodicals every evening after the work of the day is through with.

Hon. John Taylor's contract is progressing well, and here as in other contracts in the kanyon, energy and perseverance are doing wonders.

From above Devil's Gate to the mouth of Weber Kanyon, Sharp & Young's contract, great activity is apparent, and the saying of Isaiah: "Every valley shall be exalted, and every mountain and hill shall be made low; and the crocked shall be made straight, and the rough places plain," is in a fair way of being fulfilled.

Grading throughout the Kanyon is making good progress and no difficulty is apprehended in completing all the grading contracts within the specified time.

The best of feeling prevails throughout the several camps, and all seem actuated with a spirit to push things and hasten the coming of the "Iron Horse" to Utah.

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#### BOOK REVIEW

Cloud, Roger (Auditor of Ohio), <u>A Short History of Ohio Land Grants</u>, Columbus, O., Columbus Blank Book Co., 1967, 44 pp.

This small book contains two excellent maps. One is of the counties as they were when Ohio was admitted as a state in 1803. The other is a modern county map with the land grants and purchases of 1794 to 1836 superimposed on it. There is a good description of each of these grants and purchases and information as to where and whether the pertinent records are available.

Some of the subdivisions are: Congress Lands 1820-21, Connecticut Western Reserve, U.S. Military District 1797-8, Virginia Military District, Ohio Company Purchases, many other Congress Lands, The Donation Tract. There is also a short history of the state and a list of the counties and how each got its name. The booklet is free from the Auditor of State, Columbus, Ohio 43216.

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## NOTES ON THE SHAFFSTALL (IMSCHAFFSTALL) FAMILY

The date was October 21st 1754, and Johann Shofestal had arrived in America with his family. From the Palatinate area of Germany the people had traveled down the Rhine River to Rotterdam, Holland, and sailed on the good ship <u>Friendship</u>, commanded by Captain Charles Ross. There were people from Franconia and Hesse, including seven Roman Catholics.

Some of Johann's children were Peter, Susannah, Elizabeth and George; there were probably others, but their names are not known at present.

There were many ways of spelling the name Schaffstall, such as the original Imschaffstall, Imschoffstall, Shafstall, Schofestal, Schafstall, Shefestall, Shoafstahl, and others too numerous to put down here. The name Shaffstall was adopted by the group that gradually migrated to the West.

The Imschaffstalls apparently settled in Strasburg Township, Lancaster County, Pa., after coming inland from the Philadelphia area. The early burials of the family are in Hoffman's Church cemetery, also in the Juniata County, Pa., cemetery.

Peter, the son of Johann, is the ancestor we are concerned with. He was married to Anna Elizabeth Kornman, and they had twelve children. Some of these children founded the town of Gratz in upper Dauphin County, Pa. Solomon was one of Peter's children, and it is uncertain about the actual name of his wife. It is believed to be Catherine Haag.

We do not know if Solomon moved to Ohio; at any rate his two sons Abraham and Christian did. Abraham met and married his wife Susannah Coverly in Crawford County, Ohio. He had previously been married to Louisa and had four children. He and Susannah had six children.

The next change of scenery is in Steuben County, Ind., where we find David Frank Shaffstall married to Lucy Austin. David, or as he was called, Frank, was the son of Abraham and Susannah. He had one son, Leo, before moving to Lincoln, Kans. There they had ten more children. His third son, William, left Kansas to take up a homestead in Washington state. He and his wife Almira had three children, and after their deaths they were buried in Pasco, Wash. Their son Marion Shaffstall now resides in Pasco with his family.

# ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ON THE STONES OF KITTERY AND BERWICK, MAINE

(The following information became available after publication of "Some Descendants of Daniel Stone of Kettery and Berwick, Maine" in the April 1969 issue of the TCGS BULLETIN.)

Jonathan Stone was the eldest son of Daniel and Patience (Goodwin) Stone. He is frequently mentioned in <u>Berwick Town Records</u> as are other members of the family. His wife was Sarah \_\_\_\_\_\_. I have not yet learned their marriage date. Their eldest child, Jonathan, is the only one of their children whose birth is recorded in the <u>Kittery Vital Records</u>. The order of their other children's births is not yet known. Paul's birthdate is from family records. His wife and all children named below are named in his will which was dated 3 April 1742 and entered for probate 26 May 1742.

### -- PEDIGREE CHARTS ---

A new department appears in this issue of the TCGS BULLETIN, the inclusion of pedigree charts for members and their spouses. The form is actually that of an <u>Ahnentafel</u> or table of ancestors, and the numbering is that used on most commercial pedigree charts. The person submitting the chart is No. 1, his father is No. 2, his mother No. 3, his paternal grandfather No. 4 etc. A person's father always has double his own number, and his mother's number is his own, doubled, plus 1. Thus in the first chart below, the father of No. 6, Sylvanus Wilcox, is No. 12, and his mother is No. 13. The father of No. 12 is No. 24, David Wilcox, and his mother is No. 25, Betsey Kelsey.

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BOOK REVIEW -- Holben, Richard E., <u>Researching the Family History for Be-</u> <u>ginners</u>, Albuquerque, N. M., Family History, 1968, 24 pp., \$1.00 from the author. P.O. Box 8572, Albuquerque, N. M. 87108.

The title of this pamphlet sets its tone; it is specifically for beginners. In 24 pages it attempts to cover 14 different topics, each of which takes an entire chapter in a more standard textbook. Fortunately, the brief bibliography refers readers to some of the best-known texts -but one of those has been out of print for several years. The author suggests its use at workshops and beginners' classes and as a money-maker.
