

THE SEPTEMBER MEETING OF THE TCGS was held at the home of Evelyn Massie and featured an unusual report of an unusual vacation trip.

When Harry Wrangham, past president of the Tri-City Genealogical Society, took his wife Norma and their son Bruce to England in June 1969, he was retracing a journey he had made with his parents when he was only nine years old. Much of it, though, extended over additional territory, especially the first part in London, where the Wranghams visited many of the famous tourist sights and brought back lasting memories in the form of bone china tableware and tape recordings of the chimes of Big Ben, the London traffic, and the voice of a cockney guide on a Thames River sight-seeing boat.

Harry sampled the possibilities of Somerset House by applying for an ancestor's death certificate, and found the red tape of the British Museum too time-consuming for the average tourist hoping to study records. The Wranghams' real research took place in country churches and cemeteries. They went "cemetery-hunting and slab-dusting" for Norma's Woolfreys at Poole, and for Marshalls at Patrington and Winestead in Yorkshire.

Wrangham country began at Middleton-Pickering. In Sunderland they found Harry's researcher-by-correspondence and were taken to visit many small churches, including the one where the Wrangham grandparents were married and where they also found a great-great-grandfather's tombstone. A cousin at Darlington helped bring the family up to date. Just before returning to America, the Wranghams visited a probable relative, the Hon. Sir Geoffrey Wrangham, and Harry recorded his delightful comments on mountain-climbing -- "something like ballet dancing, you know," and the

story of the Neswick Hall Ghost.

Harry's chief goal, confirming the existence of a place called Wrangham in Northumberland County, was finally achieved, much to his satisfaction. While he has no firm evidence that says the Wrangham family in England originated in that community, there are several factors supporting the theory which he hopes to verify.

EDITH BROMLEY PRESENTED THE OCTOBER PROGRAM for the society at a meeting in the auditorium of the Pasco Public Utilities District. Her topic was "Genealogical Helps and Sources Available from the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution." Members also saw a color film, "My Island Home," portraying the history of Prince Edward Island, Canada.

### THE PALATINATE

The Palatinate (in German, Pfalz) is the name of two German states, distinguished as the Upper Palatinate and the Lower, or Rhenish, Palatinate. The former was founded mainly by Bohemia and Bavaria, and its capital was Amberg. The Lower Palatinate proper lay on both sides of the Rhine and included the towns of Heidelberg and Mapnheim. The Counts Palatine were in possession of the Palatinate and the districts belonging to it as early as the eleventh century.

During the 16th century, a large proportion of the inhabitants of the Palatinate on the Rhine joined the Reformed Church. During the Thirty Years War (1618-48) the Palatinate was repeatedly devastated by the contending armies. The pathetic Frederick the Fifth, the Winter King, took over the leadership of the Protestant cause but was badly defeated in Bohemia. General Tilly, the Catholic commander, carried the war into his own country and laid it waste. The ruined land did not fare much better when its supposed friends, the Swedes under Gustavus Adolphus, came along. The final blow came with the Spaniards under Gallas, who exceeded all their predecessors in cruelty and brutality.

The next invaders were the French and the Bavarians in 1639. Their depredations in 1644 were so thorough that they left the land practically a desert. The successor of the Winter King, the Elector Karl Ludwig, was just beginning to make some progress in restoring the land to prosperity when it was invaded by the troops of Louis XIV. The beautiful castle of Heidelberg and the city of Mannheim were burned during the winter of 1688 and 1689. The greed and cruelty of the invaders reduced the population to complete poverty.

Although Karl Ludwig had been a Catholic, he had treated the Protestants with tolerance. His fanatical successors ruled the land with an iron hand and mercilessly persecuted the Lutherans and the Reformed. It was no wonder, then, that the impoverished and wretched population should look to emigration as their only salvation. Their thoughts were turned toward America through the words of William Penn and through what seemed like an invitation from Queen Anne of England to settle in her trans-Atlantic colonies. This was due to the bond of a common Protestant faith and to the fact that the royal families were related. Elizabeth, the daughter of James I, had married Frederick V, Elector of the Palatinate, and had lived with him in Heidelberg Castle.

### SOME EASTERN WASHINGTON PIONEERS

(Your editor has received a letter from Buford E. Myers, Rt. 5, Box 235, Dell Avenue, Walla Walla, Wash. 99362, so interesting that it is being published here, with Mr. Myers's permission. The BULLETIN welcomes all such accounts of early Eastern Washington families.)

My half-sister, Lena Knight Randolph, and I are working on several family connections, namely Knight, Goodwin, Alexander, Cummings, Weaver, Whetstone, Phillis, Randolph, Myers, Turners, Forneys or Fourneys, all Walla Walla County pioneers except Myers, which is one of the three Myers families (not related to each other) that were in Summerville, Ore, She is also working on the Larue, Dameron, and Coppage-Coppedge families. I think your Index to the 1880 Census of Walla Walla County, Washington Territory, will be a lot of help to us.

William C. and John Benjamin Knight were brothers. W. C. Knight and G. D. Goodwin built the log cabins at Lamar, Wash., between Prescott and Burbank near the Harshaw exchange. W. C.'s wife, Didame, died there in 1869, and he died in 1873. Their tombstone is the one you can see as you travel west from Prescott towards Harshaw intersection, out in a wheat field. John B. Knight was appointed guardian of W. C.'s children.

We have just discovered that W. C. Knight had married a second time and had a child named Peter. The second wife was born Nancy Jane Braden. John B. Knight was guardian of Peter also. There were two children by the first wife. We had not known of them until they were discovered in the deed and probate records at Walla Walla. They are not mentioned in the Knight line.

Clarence Braden, who came to Walla Walla in 1900, has told me that Nancy Jane Braden, Joseph Braden and Jonathan Braden, sister and brothers, crossed the plains in 1863. He says that Peter Knight, son of W. C. Knight and Nancy Jane Braden, had two sons and moved to Portland, Ore. After the death of W. C. Knight, Nancy Jane married a Mr. Mattoon. Clarence Braden says that the Bradens settled at Lamar "because there were too many people in Walla Walla."

Would any of your members know anything more of the history of Nancy Jane or Peter Knight? Nancy was only 28 in the 1880 census. Also by our records there should have been a John Benjamin and a Phebe Knight listed in the 1880 Walla Walla County census, as they had not moved to Columbia County until 1881. The Joseph Knight must have been my sister's father, as the date and age check out.

My sister's grandmother, Phebe Knight (her name by her second marriage was Bullington), told her in 1916 that practically all the Knights there, and in Palouse and northeastern Oregon, were related. We know that "young" Bill Knight, now 104 and living in La Grande, Ore., is her fourth cousin. He came over the plains in 1865. He was born in Missouri in February 1865. My sister's grandparents came in 1864. Bill does have this mixed up, as

he says they all came in 1865. But Clarence Cummings told me that there was more than one wagon train of Knights and their relatives in different years -- 1861 (?), '62, '64 and '65.

Joseph Dameron Knight, buried in Palouse cemetery, was captain of the 1865 train. He had been to California in gold rush days; we guess that is why he was captain. A man known to us only as Jack was captain of the 1864 train of 164 wagons.

We both should have had a lot more information from the old people. But when you are adopted, it is difficult. Mother's first husband died in 1900 when my sister was two. Mother and the four grandparents could not agree about the children, so she put them out for adoption. She married my father in 1904 and died in 1911. Although my maternal grandparents lived in the town I was raised in, Mother gave me to people by the name of West to raise. After this kind of experience we had very little incentive along family lines. I was raised near Seattle, and the rest of the children at Dayton and Addy, Wash. Not until about 1966 did we care about family lines and had not written down very much of what we had been told.

We have traced the Knight line and can prove by deeds, probate, marriage bonds, etc. to 1811, and then by Judith Dameron's marriage to Joseph Knight on back to about 1570. My half-sister is Mrs. Lena Knight (Messer, by adoption) Randolph. Her father was Joseph Michael Knight, her grandfather John Benjamin Knight; her great-grandfather Joseph Dameron Knight; and her great-great-grandparents Joseph Knight and Judith Dameron.



Her maiden name was Didame (pronounced Did-AME -- she was called Ame) Jane Ward (or Wood). Their children were Elizabeth Knight, born 1 July 1865 as the wagon train was coming west, and Andrew Knight, born 21 Feb. 1867 in a cottonwood log cabin at Lamar, Wash.

Lyle, president of the TCGS, is collaborating with his mother in writing the book.

A WILLIAMS CHRONICLE includes pioneer families of Horton, Morris, Hickox, Foster, Elwood, Rice, Zum Brunnen, Nolph, Crissman, Hastings, Edelblute, McKnight, and many others. It traces all known descendants of Thomas Williams Jr. and his wife Maria Quick, who emigrated from the lumbering region of southeastern New York State to a similar area in Jefferson County, Pa., before 1830. Birth, marriage, and death dates and places are included wherever they are known, as well as the person's education, occupation, religion, and military service. Some branches of the family moved on to Green County, Wis., Montgomery County, Iowa, and Converse and Niobrara Counties, Wyo.

The book was printed on the TCGS's offset press, and consists of 198 pages, ten maps, ten photographs and many incidental illustrations. All surnames are indexed. 
