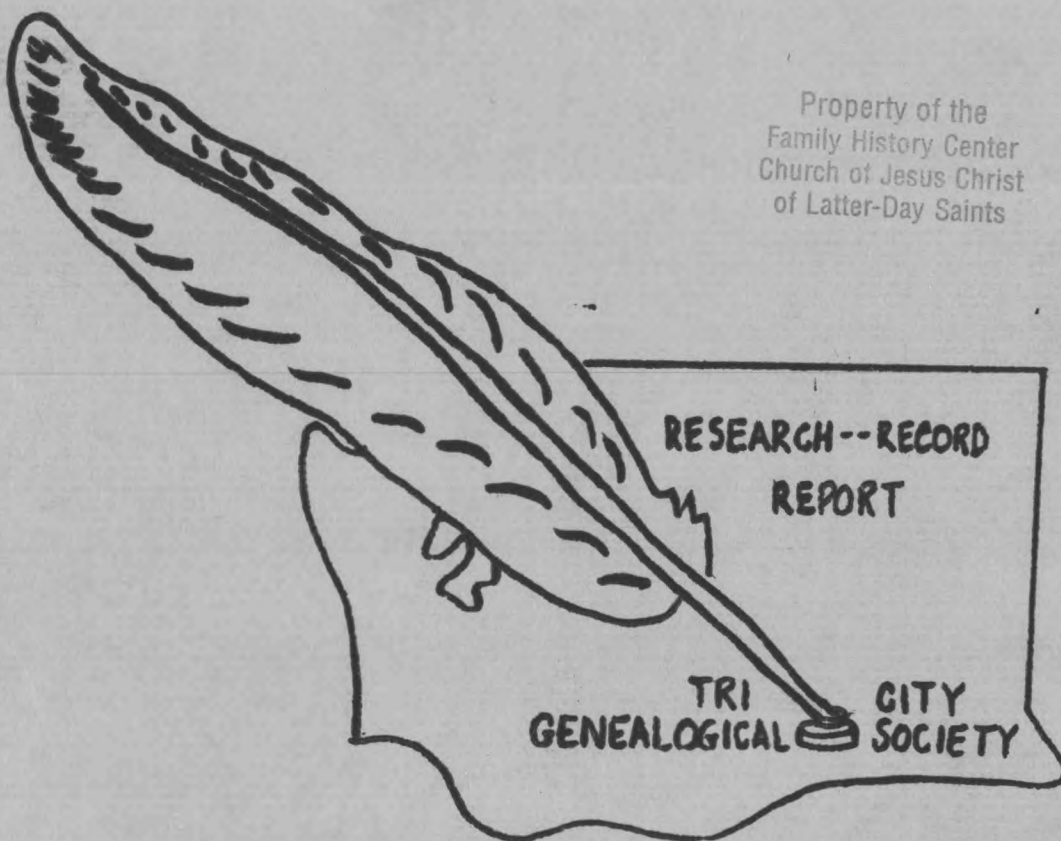

ANNUAL WORKSHOP FOR BEGINNERS IN GENEALOGY

First organization to hold a public meeting in the multi-purpose room of the new Richland Public Library was the Tri-City Genealogical Society, which has been using library facilities for workshops since 1966. The new building was dedicated Sunday, October 11, opened for business the next day, and was the scene of the annual workshop Saturday, October 17, from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Harry Wrangham welcomed the 21 non-members registering for the session and also the TCGS members assisting and attending. Evelyn Roberts explained the process of filling in a family group sheet, Nadine McClelland talked on the pedigree chart, Harry gave information on sources, and Lyle Perrigo discussed the importance of correspondence. Mary Kingsley was in charge of publicity; Dale Denham, registration forms; Evelyn Massie and Margaret Rice, registration; Frances Ehrig, displays; and Lucille Shaffstall, kits.

BOOK REVIEW

TRACING FAMILY TREES IN ELEVEN STATES, St. Louis Genealogical Society, Room 216, 1695 So. Brentwood Blvd., Brentwood, Mo. 63144, 1970. 290 pp., wrappers, \$5.50. (Purchased by TCGS)

This book will be circulated among TCGS members before being housed in the Tri-Cities Genealogical Branch Library, 1720 Thayer Drive, Richland. Contents of this workbook consist of individual papers to aid genealogical research in the eleven key states of Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Missouri, North and South Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Virginia. The authors are non-professional but experienced genealogists who are members of the St. Louis Genealogical Society. In addition, at the back is a 16-page article on the St. Louis Public Library and its large (30,000 works) genealogy collection, which should prove helpful as a source list.

The amount of information in the book makes this a truly valuable research tool. Following an introductory history of each state noted are extensive bibliographies, state maps, addresses for the state societies, histories of individual counties, and location of records available. Of the eleven states, I find I am working in all but two at the present time. This workbook would be not only a must for every genealogical library, but also a handy reference at home for the armchair genealogist.

A public library located where one's ancestors lived is so often the best source of historical material about that area that it seems appropriate to check facilities of that sort available in the Tri-Cities, Washington. This issue presents material shelved at the new Richland Public Library. Subsequent issues will deal with Mid-Columbia Regional Library and Pasco Public Library.

Although the Richland library indicates books about the Pacific Northwest with the letters "NW" as part of the call number, and while it now has a glassed-off room for these volumes, they are not yet in a separate catalog. As a result, it was not possible to determine everything available about Benton and Franklin Counties, except in the reference section. If other important books appear on the shelves from time to time, their titles will be included in later articles.

ELTOPIA, WASH., CEMETERY

Genealogy is a fascinating study, but it can become very frustrating if you cannot locate or visit the graves of your own ancestors, but finding ancestors for others is almost as exciting. This kind of thinking led Mrs. Charles (Marion Behrends) Higley and Mrs. Homer (Myra Ackley) Gessel to explore the closest old cemetery near the little town of Eltopia.

Waiting until the snakes were hibernating, we picked a cold November day and then armed with a hoe and wearing boots and warm coats we began copying the names and dates on the 112 graves.

After this was done we visited with Eltopia early-day residents, Mrs. Joe (Millie Gesner) Stredwick and Mr. and Mrs. Larry Robinson of Connell. Mrs. Robinson, née Alta Phend, was born and raised around Eltopia. They gave some interesting sidelights on early days in Eltopia. The town of Eltopia was platted 26 February 1902 by Joseph and Ella L. McCabe. The cemetery is located on the Eltopia West Road slightly west of the town and across the road from the Bureau of Reclamation Headquarters.

The Pasco Public Library was most helpful in letting us research old copies of the Tri-City Herald, and according to the following article, the cemetery was begun in 1900:

A young wife, daughter of a pioneer homesteader, near the Columbia River (perhaps Ringold) passed away. Roads were trails, travel was slow and doctors and undertakers were scarce, as was money, among the pioneers.

On a little flat covered with bunch grass and sagebrush west of Eltopia, the first mound was made for Mrs. Pearl Eslick Wardswell. The next was the two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Darby.

Harley Tuttle homesteaded this land in 1906 and wanted the cemetery moved. A strong organization called the Modern Woodmen of America, Camp No. 9836, organized 24 April 1905. They had owned a hall which had burned down in April of 1907. When the insurance was collected, they purchased the cemetery plot. J. E. Druen of Kiona and G. D. Whitney of Yakima were at the head of the M.W.A. at that time.

A stock fence was placed around the cemetery, and later Otto Emmer and other local men staked out the lots. In 1938 Otto Emmer and Lawrence Stredwick drew a blueprint of the cemetery plot. In 1940 the Eltopia Ladies Club cleared off the brush and with the help of their menfolks replaced the fence with strong wire netting and made cement markers for the graves.

The earliest marked grave is 1903. The most recent burial at this writing is that of Olon P. Hailey, who was born in Arkansas in 1876 and died 1 December 1969.

SWEDISH EMIGRANT RECORDS COLLECTED

The House of Emigrants, a new institution in V&#xj8, Sweden, is now the repository for records of the million Swedes who emigrated to America between 1850 and 1930. It was founded in 1965 in the province of Smaland, source of so much of the emigration that at times parts of it were threatened by total depopulation. Ruth Mitchell, TCGS member, has contributed to our library a brochure which describes the contents of the building:

"The House of Emigrants has the largest collection of letters, diaries and photographs related to the emigration to America. About ten researchers are engaged in tracing the emigration through newspapers, church registers and passenger lists of ships. . . All this source material is at your disposal in the House of Emigrants, where it is catalogued and filed, making it readily available to professionals as well as laymen."

American tourists are welcomed, particularly on the annual Minnesota Day in August, a one-day bus tour of the area is available, and there is even an annual Music Week.

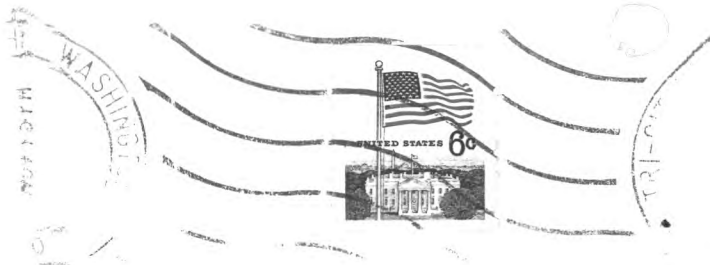
