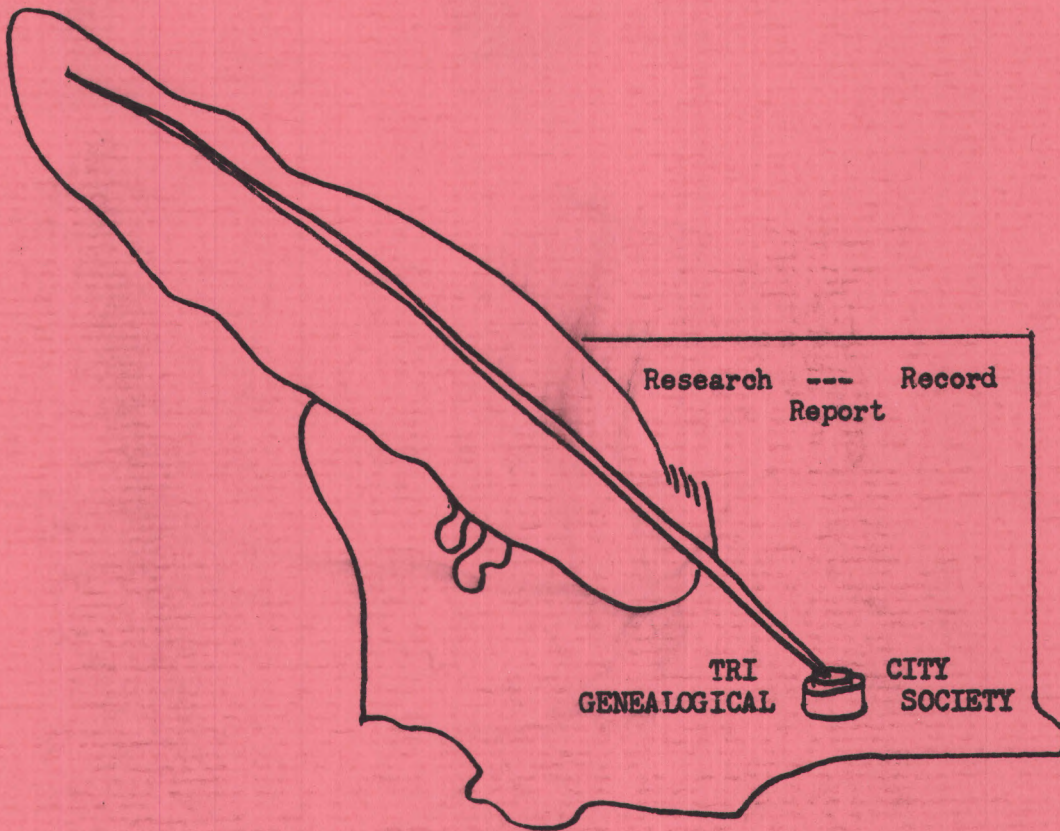

-- HISTORICAL CONCERN OF A HUNDRED YEARS AGO --

(The following article was printed 20 April 1871 in the WHITESIDE (Illinois) SENTINEL and was contributed by Katharine Woolcutt. R. M. Kennedy of Morrison, Clyde Township, Whiteside County, IL was her great-grandfather.)

Mr. R. M. Kennedy, of Clyde, handed us a number of old documents some time ago which may fittingly be termed relics of "ye olden time"; since they date back to a period marking the beginning of the present century. The material is of a coarse, heavy texture, and is quite a contrast with the smoothly finished paper of the present day.

The oldest document is a bond where in "John Kennedy of the State of Pennsylvania is held and firmly bound in the sum of seventy-eight pounds," and bears the date of August 21st, 1777. This bond was printed in Lancaster, Pa., in Old English script, and contains the word "Province" instead of State, showing its existence prior to the Revolution. It will soon be a centenarian. The next in senility is a written indenture in which John Kennedy is "Bounded an Indentured Apprentice to House Carpenter Matthew Ewing," and is dated December 17, 1794. Among other things it provided that this apprentice "the good of his master he shall not embezzle, at cards and dice, or any unlawful game he shall not play; taverns or ale houses he shall not frequent; matrimony he shall not contract; from the service of his master he shall not at any time depart or absent himself without leave, but in all things as a good and faithful apprentice shall and will demean and behave himself," etc.

The next oldest is a quit claim deed, wherein William Kennedy "for and in consideration of the sum of one dollar" releases his title of a certain piece of land to John Kennedy. This was written in September 1803.

The last is a letter written November 19, 1816, at the Baltimore Navy Yard, to friends in the southern part of Pennsylvania. The writer speaks of not having heard from his "relations since last fall," or for nearly a year. This was probably on account of the imperfect postal facilities of that period.

These old relics of a past generation give a person some idea of the condition of affairs, society, business, etc., when the government of the United States was yet in its infancy; when the crude material, from which a gigantic and powerful nation sprung, lay dormant and powerless, awaiting the touch of the magic wand of art, science, and invention to cause a Colossus to come forth that strides across the continent with lightning footsteps, spreading civilization and intelligence over this broad domain, causing the desert to blossom as the rose, and yield in scientific culture of man.

Will future generations improve on our boasted civilization; and smile at our lack of genius in the present century, is a query which may well absorb the attention of the liveliest imagination.

It is intended as a research tool for the many patrons of Pasco Public Library, Richland Public Library, Mid-Columbia Regional Library (Kennewick), and Tri-Cities Branch Genealogical Library (Richland). The compilation was done by four TCGS members, Patricia Ballowe, Katharine Woolcutt, Lucille Shaffstall, and Mary Kingsley. It is in four sections for the four libraries. Each is alphabetically arranged, by category. TRI-CITY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY CELEBRATES TENTH
ANNIVERSARY

By Frances H. Ehrig

While the organizational meeting of the Tri-City Genealogical Society took place 4 May 1961, several months of preparation had already taken place. I had been working on my own lines for some time and had discovered that Raymond Baalman Jr., then a high school senior, was also interested in genealogy. We checked out the Richland Public Library's few resource books so often that the librarians began calling us whenever someone else asked a question on genealogy. Ray made up several printed slips and inserted them in the library's copies of Doane, Kirkham and Reed, suggesting that if the person finding them should be interested in forming a genealogical society, he telephone one of us. We began keeping a record of the names and addresses of those we heard from.

Meanwhile we wrote to the Seattle Genealogical Society about the possibility of forming a branch of that organization, and each of us had a meeting at the Seattle Public Library with Mrs. Carol Lind, genealogical reference librarian, and various officers of the Seattle group. While they were interested in our project, they felt it would be of more value to us to form our own society.

When the list of those replying to the slips in the library books reached twenty-five or so, we set a date for a meeting in the North Hall of the Richland Library, and sent postcards of invitation to all those who had phoned us. Twenty-three people came to the meeting! It was all very informal, and we had a couple of display tables of books, scrapbooks, pedigrees, and photographs in case the conversation lagged, which it never did. There was general agreement that we would form an independent society, and five people volunteered to serve as a nominating committee. A week later there was another meeting and an election of officers: James V. Hoke, president; Frances Ehrig, vice-president; Mrs. Richard Bean, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. John Davis and Lon Rigby, board members. Mrs. Bean declined the office; in fact, the Beans were never heard from again. Evelyn Roberts was elected secretary-treasurer at the next meeting, and these officers served for two years.

Charter members of the TCGS (those who joined during the first year) were Mrs. John Davis, Mr. and Mrs. James V. Hoke, Harry H. Wrangham, Mrs. Lillian Hopkins, Mrs. M. M. Moulton, Mrs. Ivanilla Grimshaw, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Bromley, Mrs. Voria B. Shreve, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Ehrig, Mr. and Mrs. Norman Burke, Mrs. L. A. Lambard, Mrs. G. C. Roberts, Mrs. Wayne Wilson, Mrs. Gayle Reel, Mrs. Mary Frances Wylie, and Eldon Parrish. Of these, Harry Wrangham, Mrs. Moulton, Clyde and Edith Bromley, Jack and Frances Ehrig, and Evelyn Roberts are still members.

The BULLETIN was founded as a quarterly in October 1961 with Harry H. Wrangham as editor. He continued in that position (except for one month when Elenor Burke served as guest editor) through April 1963, when I took on the task, and I'm still at it. Through 1967 the BULLETIN was printed

in now-fading ditto ink. For a year and a half it was mimeographed, but it became increasingly difficult to find machines and volunteer help for this process. The TCGS bought an offset press in October 1968, and it was used until this issue, which is being printed on Jack Ehrig's newer Multilith.

Five presidents served the TCGS during the first ten years. I succeeded Jim Hoke, and then came Edith Bromley, Harry Wrangham, and Lyle Perrigo. The first four served two-year terms. From June 1970 to May 1971 we tried the dangerous but successful experiment of working without a president. Chiefly because of a determined and devoted board of directors, each one willingly accepting responsibility beyond his own assignment, the society not only weathered the interim period; it prospered and grew.

While it feels as if workshops have always been an important part of our program, this is not quite true. During the first few years we exchanged ideas and information as part of our meetings. The interest in genealogy was increasing everywhere, to the point that the Washington Library Association had to recognize it and scheduled a workshop in May 1965 at the Richland Library. Nearly half of those attending were TCGS members or soon became members. In November that year we held our first Society workshop with Mr. and Mrs. George B. Everton Sr. of the GENEALOGICAL HELPER of Logan, Utah, as guest speakers. The next fall we scheduled our own workshop for beginners, and our sixth annual is set for October 16 of this year. A more ambitious project was the scheduling of a workshop in advanced genealogy, which we sponsored in March 1968. Norman E. Wright of Brigham Young University presented it, and genealogists came from all over the Pacific Northwest.

With the acquisition of an offset press, it became possible to publish indexes and other books. (See list on page 58) An on-going project has been the indexing of the 1880 Territorial Census for this southeastern part of Washington.

Down through the years we have exchanged our BULLETIN with those of other genealogical societies. We soon found ourselves with the nucleus of a library. Housing it in the homes of members was cumbersome and awkward. With the construction of the new building in Kennewick for the Mid-Columbia Regional Library, we finally had a home for our collection. It remained there in the reference department until 1970, when it became more practical to house it in the Tri-Cities Branch Genealogical Library in connection with the holdings of the L. D. S. Church. It is now possible to refer to our books and periodicals and to the branch library's microfilm under the same roof.

What do the next ten years hold for the Tri-City Genealogical Society? More publishing, especially of family histories by members; more research in the history of this area; more training of beginning genealogists; and above all -- more members!

NATIONAL ARCHIVES HELPFUL

A heart-warming interest in the needs of genealogists has begun to emanate from the marble corridors of the National Archives in Washington in the form of frequent communications, re-photographing of microfilm, and printing of guides to available material. Two recent announcements are of interest to TCGS members. The first, in March, was for national release:

The National Archives and Records Service has launched a program to improve services to genealogists seeking information about family histories, according to Archivist James B. Rhoads.

Rhoads, who heads the National Archives, a division of the General Services Administration, says two measures are being taken to make old census data more readily available to the researchers.

"A drawback in using the census data is that it was compiled by area rather than alphabetically. Researchers must turn to privately published indexes to the census schedules in order to pin down names, localities and time periods," Rhoads said.

"To help researchers who ask the National Archives for genealogical information," he said, "our staff is preparing a master list of published indexes.

"Additionally, we are appealing to publishers of indexes to the census schedules to notify the National Archives of existing indexes and those that are being reprinted or newly published."

Rhoads asked that they send a copy of each index to the National Archives and Records Service.

The other announcement arrived in June:

The National Archives and Records Service is microfilming the Revolutionary War Pension and Bounty Land Warrant Application Files. Microfilm Publication M804 contains the complete record. Microfilm Publication M805 reproduces selected documents from the file that are more significant for genealogical purposes. In the latter publication only the pertinent page or part of a page may have been microfilmed.

The records in both microfilm publications are arranged alphabetically by the name of the veteran on whose military service the application was based.

The announcement was accompanied by an order form and the two pamphlets mentioned above, M804 for surnames beginning with D through G, and M805 for surnames beginning with G through L. Prices for the rolls range from \$6.00 to \$8.00. The pamphlets will be shelved with TCGS books at the Tri-Cities Branch Genealogical Library.

With them will be a book of 89 pages: FEDERAL POPULATION AND MORTALITY CENSUS SCHEDULES, 1790-1890, IN THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES AND THE STATES: OUTLINE OF A LECTURE ON THEIR AVAILABILITY, CONTENT, AND USE. This is by far the biggest and most comprehensive listing yet, and will repay really thorough study.

-- LIBRARY GROWS THROUGH EXCHANGE OF BOOKS --

Several more books of genealogical interest have been acquired in an exchange with other societies in return for our Indexes to the 1880 Washington Territorial Census for Walla Walla, Whitman, and Yakima Counties. These books will be previewed at the August TCGS meeting and will be shelved at the Tri-Cities Branch Genealogical Library.

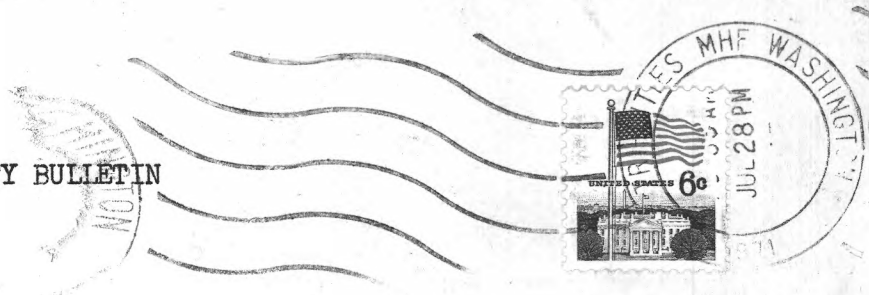
