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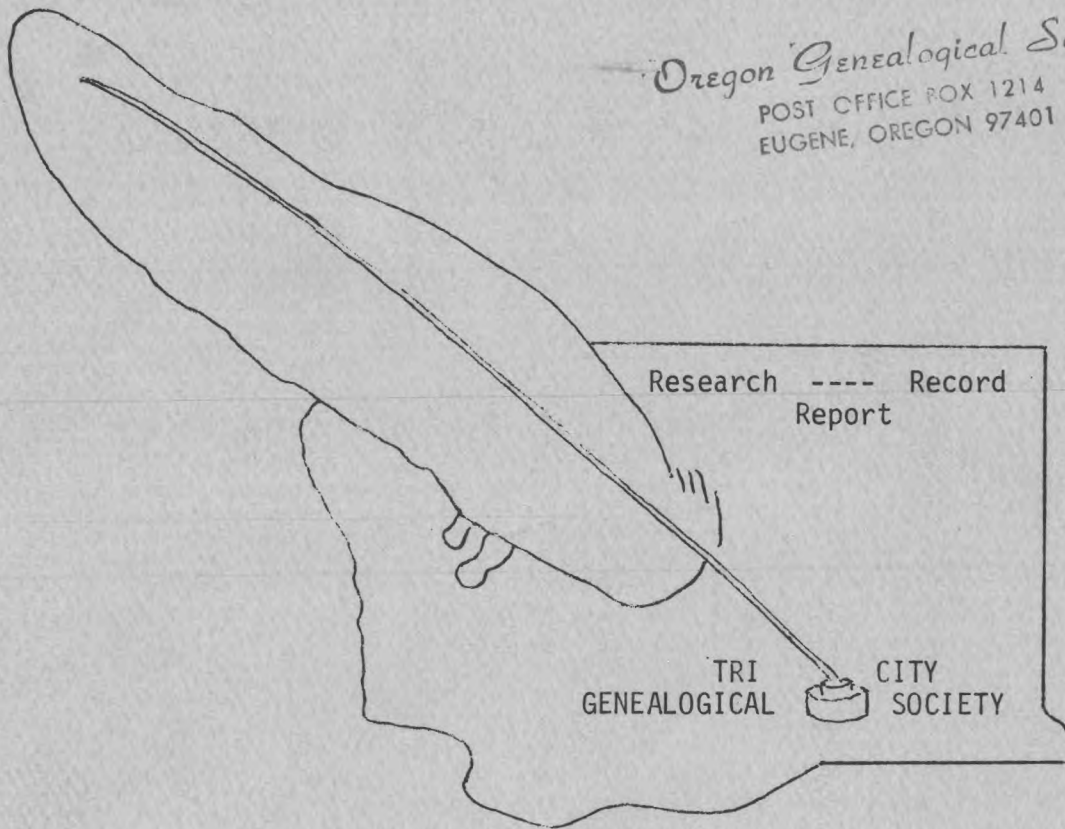

President's Message

It was a busy summer for the Tri-City Genealogical Society, with the completion of the 1850 GALLATIN COUNTY, ILLINOIS, U. S. CENSUS INDEX. The Index was published and collated in June, with publisher Jack Ehrig finishing and binding the 285 copies ready for distribution. Mailing chairman Carol Lundgren sent notices to libraries and societies throughout the United States, and many orders have been received. Two more 1850 Illinois Censuses are now being indexed, Saline and Johnson Counties. They will be ready for publication in 1973.

The August 9, 1972, meeting was held at Nadine McClelland's home, and the program was a sharing of genealogical materials by the members. Dale Denham's photocopies of original court house records from Tennessee were most informative.

The September 13, 1972, meeting was held at our new meeting place, the National Bank of Commerce in Kennewick. Mr. Charles Conway demonstrated the "Jiffy Printer," an inexpensive way of making mimeograph copies of records by a silk-screen-type process.

## HISTORY OF THE MARMON FAMILY OF HISTORIC AND BEAUTIFUL MARMON VALLEY

(Dale H. Denham, 1107 Perkins, Richland WA, who has a manuscript copy of this document, would like to hear from anyone who can identify the author or provide more information on this family.)

In the early history of Logan county the name of Marmon was associated with some of the most prominent and progressive citizens of the times. Their popularity and ability were shown by the many public offices and positions of responsibility intrusted to them. The ancestors of the Marmons were North Carolinians and are direct descendants of August Frederic Louis Viesse, De Marmont, duke of Raguse, of France. The North Carolina Marmons were the families of David, John, Frank Jr., Peter, Peggy, Sarah and another daughter whose history is not recorded.

These were the sons and daughters of Frank Marmont, or Marmon, in English. David's children were Benjamin, Jessie, John, Peter and Edmund; John had no children; Frank was father of Thomas, David, Joseph and Morna; Peter's children were Robert, Samuel, Martin, Bettie, Kesiah, Rhoda, Rachel and Hannah. Sara married a Mr. Lee; Peggy married William Reames. A large per cent of the Reames of Logan county are descendants from this union.

With the conclusion of hostilities between the whites and Indians and the treaty of Greenville in 1795, the tide of emigration turned westward.

Among the very earliest of these settlers were the Marmon brothers, sons of Peter, Robert, Samuel and Martin. They came from Northampton county, North Carolina, in the year 1806, settled in the eastern part of Logan county, now Jefferson township, in the valley which bears their name. The Marmons were Quakers and were the advance guards of that splendid gathering of Quakers that settled the headwaters of the Mad river.

The settlement of the Marmon brothers was soon followed by other families and relatives from their old home state, drawn hither by the opportunities offered. Among these families we find the name of Josiah Outland. He had married Kesiah Marmon, sister of the Marmon brothers. They came in 1807, bringing all their worldly effects over the mountains in a one-horse cart. Six weeks were required to make the trip. Jeremiah Reames, a lad of 15 years, came with Josiah Outland. He was the first Reames to emigrate West. David Marmon and family came in 1807.

William Reames Jr., son of William and Peggy Marmon Reames, and father of Jeremiah Reames, came in 1811, bringing with him eight more sons and one daughter, namely, Caleb, Aaron, Silas, Moses, Jesse, William, Vincent, John and Margaret. It was Margaret who afterwards married Thomas Stanfield.

The records of the election in Zane township, then Champaign county, in 1811, show that there were at least seven Marmons here above the election age. We cannot tell how these early pioneers gathered up their effects on the Roanoke, or where they scaled the mountains, or how they succeeded in penetrating the wilderness, or what were the incidents of their journey. These would have been interesting facts that a few years ago might have been gathered up, but then their value was not appreciated. It would be interesting to know why they selected this location and made improvements as squatters on lands already in

private ownership. The eastern part of Logan county lies in the Virginia military survey. All lands in this survey were held by the State of Virginia to pay her soldiers who had served in the Revolutionary War. These lands were parceled out in land warrants, not sold. The holders of these land warrants were permitted to locate their claims on any unoccupied land in this district.

The lands occupied by these pioneers had been surveyed in the names of Samuel Davis and J. McNut, No. 3216 and No. 4195, and patented to Duncan McArthur and Survey 3718 to James Galloway in the early part of 1807. Robert Marmon located on the farm now owned by E. H. Thompson; Samuel were Herman Downing lives; Martin on the James Van Hyning farm; Peter, the father, on the Samuel Taylor farm; William Reames where John Marmon lives. William lived here as a squatter until 1824, when he moved to the northern part of the township. There he continued to live until his death in 1845.

Josiah Outland settled in the extreme northwest part of what is now Zane Township. In 1811 he purchased from Joshua Ballinger for \$300 his first permanent home. He and his wife reared a family of 11 sons and five daughters, all the former settling around their father in such proximity that it is said they were all able to hear him call his stock. Most, if not all, of the Outlands in Logan county are descendants of this Outland and Marmon union. His children were Jerry, Robert, John, William, Edward, Thomas, Peter, James Joseph, Samuel Ezra, Posie, Rachel, Polly, Malida and Dolly.

For ten years the Marmons lived as squatters. In 1816 Robert Marmon purchased from Duncan McArthur the Samuel Stevens and part of the McNut survey, consisting of 600 acres, for the consideration of \$1,950.

The same year James Galloway sold to Samuel Marmon for the consideration of \$220, 100 acres, and to Peter Marmon for \$250, 100 acres, which included their individual improvement, being a part of Survey No. 3718.

In 1818 Robert Marmon sold to Martin Marmon the farm of 185 acres, formerly known as the Springates farm, where he had made improvements for the consideration of \$545. The same year Robert Marmon sold to Aaron Brown 150 acres, now owned by the writer, for the consideration of \$450. The Marmons being Quakers, one of their first acts after locating here was to establish a church. In 1807 they built a small log structure on the spot now occupied by the Goshen Friends church, one mile east of Zanesfield. This was the first religious society organized in the township and the second in the county.

The land on which the church and cemetery were located was not owned by the society until 1836. The land, 2 3/4 acres, was owned by Martin and Joshua Marmon. On Sept. 30, 1836, they deeded it to Trustees Benjamin Watkins and Thomas Stanfield for the consideration of \$50.

Shortly after building the church a school house was erected. This was the first school house built in the county. In 1822 it was replaced by one of brick. These school houses were built by public donation.

Robert Marmon was a man of influence as were his sons, Richmond, Peter and Joshua. Richmond and Peter moved to Cass county, Michigan, about 1830. Joshua was intimately connected with the political history of the township, having served as Trustee, probably oftener than anyone that ever lived on the home farm, taking care of his father until 1871 when he and his father removed to Iowa.

Mrs. Jarvis Daugherty, mother of William and Zaccheus, was the only

daughter of Robert. Samuel was a man of marked influence in the early settlement and improvement of the county. The old home place in Marmon Valley was his home as long as he lived. He had one son, Colonel Martin Marmon Jr., and one daughter, Matilda. Colonel Martin Marmon was a Colonel of Militia and had command of the contingent in the eastern part of the county. He was a fine officer and a man of influence. He was Sheriff of Logan County from 1834 to 1838. He removed to Hardin County, where a large number of descendants still live.

The daughter, Matilda, married Jeremiah Reames in 1815. He was a soldier in the War of 1812. In 1826 he and his wife located on top of the hill overlooking the valley where they raised a family of ten sons and one daughter, Hezekiah, Samuel, Josiah, Martin, Joshua, Hartwell, Lihu, Jerry, Moses, Caleb and Pheriba. The daughter, Pheriba, married Jonathan Reames, who are the grandparents of the writer. Jonathan Reames is the son of Jordan Reames, who emigrated with the Spains and Crowders from Culpeper county, Virginia, in 1805, locating in Rush township, Champaign county. The names are spelled the same but relationship could not be traced.

Martin Marmon was much more intimately connected with the organization and growth of both the township and county than either of his brothers. Being a man of good business qualifications, his services were ever in demand. When the county was organized in 1818, he was elected the first County Treasurer, serving until 1821. In addition to serving in this capacity when the township was organized, he was elected Township Treasurer, serving 25 years in succession. He was of a kind and sympathizing nature, that ever prompted him to relieve the wants of others.

During the early settlement of the northern part of the county, breadstuff became so scarce as to cause absolute suffering, bordering on starvation. Many families were not only without grain, but destitute of any means to secure it. Fortunately he had a large supply of corn. When called on for breadstuff the first question he asked was: "Have you any money?" If answered in the affirmative, he was kindly informed of other places where he could be supplied. But if in the negative, he was promptly furnished with a grist of corn, and sent on his way rejoicing.

The year 1842 saw the passing of Martin Marmon. He raised a family of four sons, Dr. James, Samuel, Robert and Henry, and four daughters, Hannah, who married Zaccheus Brown, the father of the late Ira Brown, and Mrs. George Adams; Susan, who married Harry Cowgill, whose son was Speaker Cowgill of the Ohio House of Representatives; Polly and Susan. Henry located on the south side of the valley where his grandson John Marmon now lives. He was a staunch Quaker and it is probable that it was in this sphere that he was most influential. His home was always open to his Quaker friends, and during big gatherings of the society his house was filled to its capacity.

He had two sons and two daughters, Joseph, Milton, Louisa and Nancy. Louisa married a Mr. Bishop and they in turn had one son, Charles, who died in his youth, and a daughter, Belle, who married Joseph Ratliff, and their only child, Mary, married Brad Hiatt, of Bellefontaine. Nancy married a Mr. Miller; Milton died in the Army; Joseph lived at the old homestead and took care of his father in his last days. Joseph's children were John, James and Nathaniel, Mary, Anna and Bessie. Mary married Joshua Peelle; Anna married Ezra Pearson; Bessie died in her youth; James and Nathaniel located in the West. John, who lives on the old homestead, and his boys, are the only Marmons of the Peter Marmon branch bearing the Marmon name living in the valley, and to our best knowledge, in the county.

Robert married, settled and died in Zanesfield. He was one of Zanesfield's progressive merchants. Dr. James W. Marmon was another outstanding figure of the early times. He studied medicine with Dr. Crew, Zanesfield's first doctor, graduating in 1834 from the Ohio Medical College. He was elected County Surveyor in 1821, serving until 1830. In the year 1836 he was elected County Commissioner for two terms. In 1836 he bought the lot on the southeast corner of Sandusky and Columbus streets in Zanesfield and built the large brick store building known as the Daugherty block. At the completion of the same he and his brother Robert opened up a general store in the same. In November of the same year, 1836, he bought from Horton Brown the lot just east of the store building. On this lot stood an elaborate and historical log house built by Brown with the logs of the old Isaac Zane block house. A few feet back of this house were the graves of Isaac Zane and his wife, the Indian princess, Myeerah. In 1840 Dr. Marmon married Hannah, the daughter of Charles and Elizabeth Moffitt of Wayne county, near Richmond, Indiana. After their marriage they located at Zanesfield where he followed his profession. In the historical log house, whose walls had many a time protected the women and children from the Indians, was born to Dr. James W. Marmon and his wife, Hannah, on Oct. 10, 1844, their only child, a son, whom they christened Daniel W. Marmon. This son later became one of the Nordyke & Marmon Company and the founder of the Marmon Motor Car Company. In 1844 Dr. Marmon sold his brick block to Elliott McCollock.

In 1848 Ephram Means bought from Dr. Marmon the lot containing the historical block house residence, razed the same, and built in its stead the present residence building. In 1846 he left Zanesfield and located at Richmond, Indiana. Probably no man in the early days is held in higher esteem than Dr. Marmon. During the great epidemic of cholera that swept the country in the late '40's, this man was the only physician in his community who would attend the victims. Day and night for many weeks he was continually in contact with cholera patients, until finally he contracted the disease which caused his death in 1849. One month after the death of Dr. Marmon the wife and mother passed away, leaving their one child, Daniel, bereft of both his parents at the age of five.

Daniel Marmon was reared by his uncle, Eli Stubbs. After concluding his studies in the common school of Richmond, he entered Earlham College, from which he graduated in 1865. Soon after his graduation he was invited to join E. and A. H. Nordyke as an equal partner and the Nordyke-Marmon Company of Richmond, Indiana, was established.

Some of the first roller mills manufactured in the United States were turned out from the Nordyke and Marmon Company. The small factory at Richmond becoming inadequate to take care of the increased business, the company was compelled to look for larger quarters. In 1876 the factory was moved to Indianapolis. Today they design great mills, manufacture milling machinery and install the equipment in the largest flour mills in the world.

Their entrance into the motor car business was not begun until 1892, when their first car was built. Howard Marmon is responsible in a large measure for the success of the Marmon automobile. A genius of great ability, pioneering in the development of motor cars, he has become one of the greatest of all automotive engineers. By his own engineering ability and the backing of one of the largest companies in the United States, he has produced one of the best automobiles in the world today. In 1926 announcement was made that the Nordyke & Marmon Company would be known as the Marmon Motor Car Company.

From a little one room factory they have grown until today the factory



buildings include a million and a half square feet of floor space, and occupy over 67 acres of ground. The development and success of this great company can be attributed directly to the foresight and executive ability of Daniel W. Marmon, who was born in the Historical village of Zanesfield.

At the death of his father, which occurred in May, 1909, Waller C. Marmon, who is now Chairman of the Board of Directors, succeeded him as President of the Company. The position, held since his father's death, requires great executive ability. Howard, the other son, is Vice-President, in charge of engineering.

One hundred and twenty-two years have elapsed since the coming of the first Marmon families. While the Marmons in name are almost extinct in Jefferson township, the Marmon blood flows in the veins of many families of different names. The families which bear the Marmon name and the families of other names are proud to be named as descendants of the historical Marmont, or Marmon, family.

Massie, Evelyn Hepworth, A MASSIE FAMILY HISTORY, Richland WA, Locust Grove Press, 1972. 272 pages, \$6.00 and \$8.50 (plus 50¢ for postage). Order from TCGS book list in this issue.

A wealth of information on the Massie family and certain allied lines has been compiled and published for the use of the family and interested genealogists. Early Massie members in France, England and Virginia are discussed. The candor of the author in critically examining the potential connections between Peter Massie, immigrant, and various Massie families located in Virginia several generations later, shows the care that went into this study. An index of over 2800 names as well as use of a genealogical numbering system aid the reader in quickly locating various members of the family. Maps, photographs and photocopies of various documents with chapter bibliographies further strengthen this research effort. Family migrations and the historical setting are also treated. Information on over 850 descendants of James R. Massie, the earliest known ancestor of this line, is presented so that modern members of the family may be able to share a common heritage.

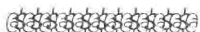


-- I N M E M O R I A M --

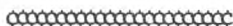

## -- FROM OUR EXCHANGES --

CONNECTICUT NUTMEGGER, Sept. 1972 - p. 166: "The *Mayflower* Five Generation Project," a transcript of a talk given by Dr. Claude Barlow to the Connecticut Genealogical Society. He reports that the General Society of *Mayflower* Descendants is compiling and preparing to publish complete data on all known descendants of *Mayflower* passengers, through the great-great-grandchildren, in both male and female lines. In most cases, the five generations bring the lines down to the time of the American Revolution. The article, while quite long, is completely fascinating and well worth reading.

FOOTPRINTS, Aug. 1972 - p. 125: In "Biblioprints - News from the Library" Patricia Chadwell of the Fort Worth Genealogical Society presents a concise, clear, and welcome distinction between the illegal photocopying and unauthorized sale of genealogical material and the copying by an individual, for private use, of similar material.

LIFELINER, Riverside (CA) Genealogical Society, Sept. 1972, p. 39: from HISTORY OF NEWTON COUNTY, ARKANSAS, by Walter F. Lackey, 1950, pp. 417-18:

In 1900 I was selected census enumerator for Low Gap and Van Buren Townships. I was well acquainted with all the people in the townships, and where they lived; but the trouble started when I began to ask names and ages. Each family usually kept a family Bible with all the names and ages listed in it. This would simplify my work to some extent. But some families did not keep records. Another obstacle in my work was that I was not sure where I could find the family when I arrived at their cabin. Often times I would have to search many clearings and briar patches before I found them. Sometimes I would find the mother and children at home but the father would be gone. The mother would not be able to figure out the names and ages of her children without the help of her husband. This made it necessary for me to go to the woods after him, or wait until he came home. When he came in, the battle of names and dates was on, each trying to link the date of birth of their children with some special happening or event. And too, each boy or girl had some pet name or nickname and they would give me this name. I usually planned my travel so as to make it to a certain farm home about meal time, and to a home noted for serving good food.

YAKIMA VALLEY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY BULLETIN, Oct. 1972 - p. 89: Index to burials in Mountain View Cemetery, Farmington, Whitman County, Washington, from 1882 to the present. A comparison of this index with the TCGS INDEX TO THE 1880 CENSUS OF WHITMAN COUNTY, WASHINGTON TERRITORY, shows surprisingly few of the same names. The first complete agreement of name and date is for Sherman Balthis. He was listed on the census index as aged 12, but the name had been crossed out, with the notation "Died Feb." The cemetery index gives his dates as 1868-1880.

KALAMAZOO VALLEY FAMILY NEWSLETTER, June 1972 - p. 38: Boundaries of the United States and the Several States, Geological Survey Bulletin 1212, published in 1966 and available from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington DC 20402. Price: \$1.75. This book describes in detail the history of the boundaries of the United States and of each of the states and territories. Special consideration is given to those areas where conflicts occurred over state boundary lines. The material covered in this book is especially important to genealogists who had ancestors living in one of these disputed areas.

Also on p. 38: A new feature, "Source of the Quarter," suggests checking

employment records of an ancestor with the company for which he worked, or with the company's successor. Address the letter to "Chief Personnel Clerk." Records may include the full name, date and place of birth, physical description, date of hiring, dates of wage increases, leaves of absence, date of death if person died while still employed, or date of retirement or resignation.

His connection with the family which emigrated from North Carolina to Logan County OH is not known.
