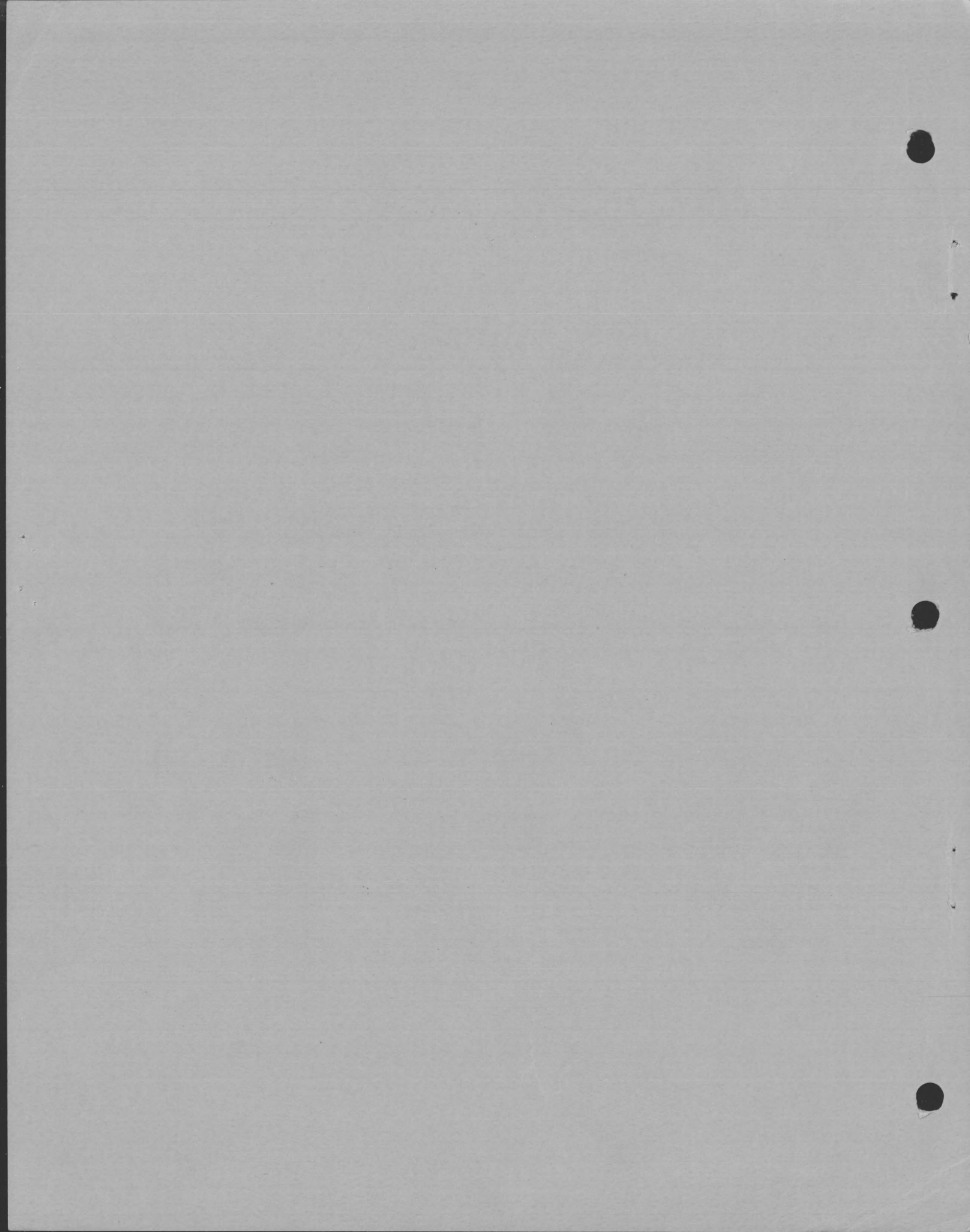

Several hand-written reminiscences of her early life were written by Sarah (Wolf) Lewis and have been contributed by her great-granddaughter, Marilyn (Lewis) Duel.

Dec 29 "1916 Reminiscences of my early life and church life born in Ohio,
Sep 30 "45 my parents migrated (1854) westward (Iowa) when I was of the age
of nine stopped in a dunker neighborhood (my people being of that persuasion)
in southern Iowa. parents died there when I was quite young we were among
the Pioneers. our grub consisted mostly corn bread and cane syrup and pumpkin
butter my earliest remembrance of S.S. was one held in a house of a Campbell-
ite with boards or benches for seats. we were required to learn chapters of
the new testament, I learned parts of the first chapters of Mathew. The
dunkards did not believe in S.S. or missions. we went to church in school
houses square plain one room buildings. They sang long doleful hymns, stretched
out to an unusual length. no organ. never saw one in the west. The preacher
would line out two stanzas then they would sing those and line two more and so
on to the end. of the hymn. in my early teens I was baptized by Trine immersion
and joined the dunkard church .. but I staid with them only 2 years -- would
not wear the net cap and plain dress which they required of young and old. Then
I came to Indiana with a Sister let down among the snakes and Swamps and
Corderoy roads. Taught (67) School in the Limberlost. boarded around from
there in 70 to Wabash Co made my home with the Ovens near Twin Lakes--taught
school. There in 1879 married a Farmer--worked hard--2 boys born--81 and 85
then in 1892 Mr Wm Lewis died--in New Waverly Ind where we moved from the farm.
Charles was graduated at 1898 N Manchester colledge We bought grocery
store my share of farm--Charles ran it and failed in one year. moved to Green-
castle '99--to Elwood 1901--to Spokane Wash 1906. Homer and I to Calif. 1915
to Bakersfield - Needles Feb 1916. S F Lewis

Miss Sarah F. Wolf Joined the German Baptist ch 1868 at South English Iowa was
baptized by Trine immersion in South English creek in Feb when the ice had to
be cut and a hold made large enough for us to reach the water. Sister Sophia
and I, 2 more girls were immersed Same time then rode a mile to where we could
change our clothes.

Miss Sarah F Wolfe joined the M E church after a week Seeking at the altar and
very bright conversion at Peru Indiana Jan 1873. have remained faithful to
this church by the help of God through all the years following. Sought and
Recd. heart purity some years back. to God be all the glory for his keeping
power. Mrs S F Lewis

Carpenter, Mrs. V. K. (Transcriber), 1850 TEXAS CENSUS, Huntsville AR, Century Enterprises, 1969 -- INDEX TO VOLUMES I - IV. 8½x11, mimeo., card covers.

This surname index is most useful for unusual names, in that it limits the amount of searching necessary to find a family with such a name in the 1850 Texas Census. But for surnames such as Johnson or Jones, with a full column of page references for each, and no given names, the search is still a long one. Key numbers following the names indicate the pages in Volumes I-IV on which the names may be found, not the pagination of the original census, so that the index cannot be used with microfilm, except as an indication in which counties to search. As an example, the entry *Rince 973* in the index sends the searcher to the key page, which shows that page 973 lists residents of Harrison County, and that a Rince family will be found there.

Gracy, Alice Duggan; Jane Sumner and Emma Seale Gentry, EARLY TEXAS BIRTH RECORDS, 1838-1878, VOLUMES I and II, privately published, Austin TX, 1969.

Purchased by the TCGS as a memorial to Gene Charlton Roberts (1929-1972), husband of Evelyn Roberts. Volume II is hardbound; Volume I, the last available copy, was purchased as loose pages, some of them Xeroxed, and bound by the TCGS. Almost all the births were recorded between 1873 and 1876 under a short-lived Texas law, and only a scattered few are from earlier or later dates. Not all the counties which had been organized at that time still retain their records. Volume I includes the counties of Austin, Bandera, Bastrop, Bell, Bexar, Brazos, Burnet, Caldwell, Colorado, Comal, Comanche, DeWitt, Fayette, Gillespie, Grimes, Hays, Kendall, Lavaca, Lee, Medina, Menard, Nacogdoches, San Saba, Travis, and Victoria. Volume II includes Anderson, Cameron, Cass, Cherokee, Dallas, Fannin, Gregg, Jasper, Kaufman, Lamar, Marion, Navarro, Nueces, Rusk, Somervell, Upshur, Washington, and Webb. Information given consists of the name of the county of residence, names of the parents, maiden name of mother when available (cross-indexed), and date of birth.

Volkel, Lowell M., AN INDEX TO THE 1800 FEDERAL CENSUS OF RHODE ISLAND, Thomson IL, Heritage House, 1970. 8½x11, mimeo., card covers, \$6.00.

Mr. Volkel has copied the entire census from the National Archives microcopy and has alphabetized it. An ingenious system of notation, clearly explained in the preface, makes it possible to identify the county and town in which each head of household lived and refers to the page and line on which the name is to be found on the microfilm. For other information about the family it is necessary to refer to the microfilm. An exchange for the INDEX TO THE 1850 CENSUS OF GALLATIN COUNTY, ILLINOIS.

Gerwick, Mrs. Verda, 1850 FEDERAL CENSUS, McLEAN COUNTY, STATE OF ILLINOIS, Thomson IL, Heritage House, 1971. 8½x11, mimeo., card covers, \$7.50.

A county map showing location of townships is a special feature of this census transcription and index. Information transcribed is dwelling number, household number, name of each person, age, sex, occupation, value of property, and place of birth. Mrs. Gerwick has been careful to indicate places where it was difficult to decipher the writing. Exchange for INDEX TO THE 1850 CENSUS OF GALLATIN COUNTY, ILLINOIS.

Smith, Marjorie, 1850 CENSUS OF EDWARDS COUNTY, ILLINOIS, Thomson IL, Heritage House, 1972. 8½x11, mimeo., card covers, \$5.00.

The same information is given in this transcription and index as in the

one for McLean County above, with the addition that an asterisk follows the name of a person married within the year. The compiler points out the fact that a notation under Real Estate Value "signals a search of the County Recorder's Office for land and mortgage documents (which) may prove profitable." Exchange for INDEX TO THE 1850 CENSUS OF GALLATIN COUNTY, ILLINOIS.

Smith, Marjorie, CARROLL COUNTY, ILLINOIS, FEDERAL CENSUS AND MORTALITY SCHEDULES FOR THE YEAR 1850, Forest Park IL, 1971. 8½x11, mimeo., card covers, \$3.00.

In addition to transcribing and indexing the census microfilm, the compiler checked names with township directories in the 1878 history of the county. She included only names, ages, sex, and place of birth. Exchange for INDEX TO THE 1850 CENSUS OF GALLATIN COUNTY, ILLINOIS.

Craddock, Dan A., 1850 CENSUS, RICHLAND COUNTY, ILLINOIS, n.p., obtained from Heritage House, n.d. 8½x11, mimeo., card covers, \$5.00.

Format of this transcription is different in that pages are stapled and bound at the top rather than at the side. Information given is name, age, sex, occupation, and birthplace. A three-letter code for the occupation is explained in a key at the end of the index. Exchange for INDEX TO THE 1850 CENSUS OF GALLATIN COUNTY, ILLINOIS.

Volkel, Lowell M., AN INDEX TO THE 1810 FEDERAL CENSUS OF KENTUCKY, n.p., obtained from Heritage House, n.d. 8½x11, mimeo., card covers. VOLUMES I - IV, \$6.00 per volume.

Similar in method and arrangement to Mr. Volkel's other excellent indexes, these four volumes are alphabetically arranged, not by county but by volume, with a notation system that makes it easy to identify county of residence and page and line where the name is to be found on the microfilm. In addition, for a small fee Mr. Volkel will read the microfilm for those who do not have access to a reader. Exchange for INDEX TO THE 1850 CENSUS OF GALLATIN COUNTY, ILLINOIS.

Wildman, Lorena, and Carrie Lartigue, EARLY SPOKANE COUNTY, WASHINGTON TERRITORY MARRIAGES - BOOK A - 1880-1890, Eastern Washington Genealogical Society, 1972. 8½x11, mimeo., card covers, 127 pp.,

The compilers have abstracted information from the early licenses, and for each marriage have given the page, license number, date of license and date of marriage, name of person officiating, place of marriage, name and residence of both bride and bridegroom, and names of witnesses. All names are indexed except those of clergymen and justices, and these are listed separately. Whenever the compilers were in doubt as to interpretation of a name or date, they indicated the problem with a question mark, and whenever possible, they cross-indexed alternative interpretations. Vogler, Viola Sage, FEE FEE CEMETERY, St. Louis Genealogical Society, photo-offset, 8 pp., \$1.35.

This cemetery, only 14 miles from St. Louis, is an adjunct of the oldest surviving Baptist Church west of the Mississippi. The first grave was dug in 1822, but earlier dates indicate that a number of burials were removals from other cemeteries. The cemetery has apparently been in continuous use, since death dates extend into the 1960's. Many stones give considerable information of a genealogical nature; for example, "QUICK, Mary Ann & Inf. wife of Luke & daughter of James & Anna DOUGLASS, 11-2-1826-7-22-1845." Exchanged, with vol-

Parkin, Robert E., THE REVOLUTION IN THE ENVIRONS OF ST. LOUIS, St. Louis Genealogical Society, 1972. 32 pp., photo-offset, \$2.20. Indexed.

Prepared for the Spirit of '76 Fair, this is a scholarly study of events and personalities in the St. Louis MO area during the American Revolution. There is an impressive bibliography and a complete index. Mr. Parkin, president of the St. Louis society, has also drawn heavily upon his own unpublished manuscripts and files on original settlers of St. Louis and of Missouri. It was exciting to find a biography of a man from whom my great-great-grandfather bought land in 1805.

Lines, Jack M., and Jean C. Jones, SHELHORN--SHELLHORN GENEALOGY, Yakima, WA, pub. by compilers, 1972. 608 pp., mimeo., hardbound, \$20.00. Indexed.

A comprehensive study of American Shelhorn families, of any spelling, has been prepared by Jack Lines, former president and Bulletin editor of the Yakima Valley Genealogical Society, and Mrs. Jean Jones, a New Jersey genealogist. It concerns chiefly the descendants of Lewis Shelhorn (1757-1845) -- an Indiana branch from his first wife, Phoebe Blizard, and a New Jersey branch from his second wife, Lorana Blizard. Another section treats of other Shelhorn families whose relationship to this family has not been proved, and a third concerns allied families, chiefly the ancestors of those who have married into the Shelhorn clan. Organization of the research material and putting it into final form for publication was done by Fred and Margaret Carver of Yakima, who are becoming well known for their painstaking accuracy. The numbering system is clearly explained and easy to follow, and the research is thoroughly documented. Several pages of photographs add interest to the volume. Smeltzer, Jean Allyn, 1880 CENSUS OF PACIFIC COUNTY, WASHINGTON TERRITORY, Portland OR, privately published, 1973. 8½ x 11, mimeo., card covers, \$3.00.

This is another of Mrs. Smeltzer's excellent transcriptions, following a similar index to Mason County and a combined 1860-70-80 index for Klickitat County. Lewis County is in preparation. Her preface states very clearly the problems of transcription and her solutions to them, her abbreviations are understandable, and a county map is a useful addition. INTRODUCTION

This genealogical sketch was prepared to help us better understand our heritage and know more about our ancestors. Information is presented about Hezekiah Stout Denham (better known as H. S.) and five generations of his descendants. The details in this sketch were compiled from personal visits with relatives and from searches of federal, state, and county records. The high point of data-gathering came during our family vacation trip to Louisa County, Iowa, in the spring of 1968. However, before this sketch can be expanded to a book, much additional information is needed.

Hopefully, publication and dissemination of this material will create an interest in genealogy among the family members and provide the guide for gathering further information. In this sketch the descendants through son William Jasper Denham are nearly complete, except for the family of Ella May Wilson. Details on the other four children of H. S. Denham are sketchy. A few speculative comments concerning the father of H. S. Denham are made, but otherwise there is a total lack of information about possible earlier origins. Consequently, no attempt was made to connect this family with other Denhams living in this country prior to 1800.

This sketch is organized by generation, beginning with information about H. S. and Winnie Denham, along with the names of their children. Each succeeding generation is treated the same way; i.e., a paragraph or more about the parents, followed by a listing of the children. When children are listed, they are shown in chronological order of birth, with birthdate and place only. Additional information about children is given in the succeeding generation. The children of H. S. Denham are assigned letter designations, the first letters of their given names. Each child, grandchild, etc. is assigned an arabic numeral according to the order of his birth in that family. Hence, Hugh Emmett Denham, the first child of William Jasper Denham, is W1, while Hugh's second child, William Francis Denham, is W12. That is, each person's number in order of birth in his own parent's family is placed to the right of the parent's number. The number is then read from right to left. In this article legally adopted children are numbered exactly as are blood relatives.

When the name used by a person is other than his first name, it has been underlined. Maiden names of married women are shown in parentheses. All references are noted in the text by use of superscript numbers in parentheses.

This brief history of the Denhams and their westward migration across the United States is based on information collected by the author during the past decade. The data is correct to the best of my knowledge, but I realize any such undertaking is prone to errors or omissions. If I have made errors, please let me know so that the information will be correct in the book I hope to assemble within the year.

FIRST GENERATION

HEZEKIAH STOUT DENHAM was born in Knoxville, Tennessee, in 1802.^(1,2,3) His death certificate lists his age as 83 years, 6 months, making his birthdate about November 1802, while his obituary shows his birthdate as September 1802. The obelisk-shaped, five-foot-high tombstone in the Columbus City, Iowa, cemetery bears the following inscription: "H. S. Denham - Born December 17, 1802 - Died May 1, 1886 - Aged 83 years, 4 months, 14 days."⁽³⁾ Nothing is known at this time of his childhood or early years. H. S. Denham was one of the early settlers in southeastern Iowa, arriving there in 1837.^(4,5) He apparently married his first wife, Winnie, before they emigrated to Iowa. They probably travelled through Kentucky and stayed several years in Indiana.⁽⁶⁾ Upon arriving in Iowa they took up residence first in Henry County and became residents of Columbus City, Louisa County, in 1843.^(2,4)

In his obituary he was called "a man of pure Christian character, unimpeachable integrity and good business. He was foremost in every movement for the material and moral advancement of the community in which he lived. To him was accorded the honor of being the first justice of the peace and the first tailor in Columbus City and probably for Columbus City Township."⁽²⁾ In Columbus City Mr. Denham owned more than a dozen 50x150-foot lots, and he also held the deeds to several 20-acre plots in Columbus City Township. His home was a two-story building which served as a meeting place for the organization of many civic activities and probably as a storeroom for his tailoring business.⁽⁵⁾

His obituary continued, "In May 1844 the first church of the United Brethren denomination west of the Mississippi River was organized in Mr. Denham's home. . . That church of ten members, of which Mr. Denham might be called the father, grew into a large and flourishing congregation at Columbus City . . ."⁽²⁾ in the late 19th century.

His first wife, Winnie, was born in Georgia in 1803 and died in Iowa, 20 January 1863.^(3,6,8) In 1850⁽⁶⁾ the Denhams were living in Columbus City Township, Louisa County. H. S. stated his occupation as farmer and the value of his real estate as \$1160. Curiously, the 1850 census listed two persons--Jane Little, aged 21, and Ellen G. Little, aged 1--other than Denhams in the H. S. Denham household. Because H. S. and Winnie named their second son Hugh Little Denham, it seems quite possible that Jane was related as either a niece or a sister of Winnie, whose maiden name also may have been Little. Ellen is assumed to be the daughter of Jane.

As stated earlier, Mr. Denham's family origins are unknown, but his grandson⁽⁹⁾ reported that he "walked three counties" when he was 65 to visit a brother.⁽⁹⁾ Reports of early Tennessee records^(10,11) indicate a Joseph Denham (and a Joseph Denham, Jr.) living in the Knoxville area and in whose home the first Quarter Sessions and Court of Pleas for the newly organized Anderson County were held in 1801. Might this Joseph be the father of our Hezekiah Stout Denham? Indexes to Iowa census records^(12,13) list other Denhams (Dunhams) who also could be related to H.S. Denham. The most likely are J.A. Denham, living in Decatur County in 1880, born about 1829 in Indiana;⁽¹³⁾ Elijah and Samuel A. Dunham, both born between 1800 and 1810, and living in Des Moines County in 1840;⁽¹²⁾ and another Samuel Dunham, born between 1780 and 1790, and living in Louisa County in 1840.⁽¹²⁾

H. S. Denham was remarried on 26 September 1864 to Mrs. Harriet Silley

in Columbus City.⁽¹⁴⁾ She must have preceded him in death, as no mention of her was made in his obituary.⁽⁶⁾ In the 1850 census five children were listed in the H. S. Denham household:

- U Ursula Denham, born about 1831 in Indiana
- W William Jasper Denham, born about 1832 in Indiana⁽¹⁵⁾
- H Hugh Little Denham, born 31 July 1835 in Indiana
- R Reuben M. Denham, born August 1837 in Henry County, Iowa
- O Obediah E. Denham, born about 1839 in Henry County, Iowa

However, in 1840 (prior to the time when all persons were enumerated by name and age in the census) there were four males and three females under the age of 15 in the H. S. Denham household, all of whom may have been children of H. S. and Winnie.⁽¹⁶⁾ There also may have been children who died during the ten-year period between the census surveys.

SECOND GENERATION

U URSULA DENHAM married Richard Wells of Ohio,^(2,17) in 1880 they were residents of Ward 1, Mount Pleasant, Iowa. He was a blacksmith, aged 58, and she was "keeping house," aged 48. Richard gave the birthplace of his father as Virginia and of his mother as Pennsylvania. Also reported in the Wells's household were Alice M. Bemis, aged 23, a daughter, and Laura Smith, aged 18, a boarder. Both young women attended school during the year. At this writing it is not clear whether Alice was listed under a married name or was an adopted daughter. A Martha Wells, aged 82, was living in the adjacent house, according to the 1880 census. She is assumed to be the mother of Richard, since her birthplace was the same as that shown for his mother.⁽¹⁷⁾

W WILLIAM JASPER DENHAM was the eldest known son of H. S. and Winnie Denham. According to the 1850 census he had attended school within the year and was listed as a farmer.⁽⁶⁾ He later took up the trade of his father, tailoring, and also ran a transfer business,⁽⁹⁾ presumably in Columbus City,⁽¹⁸⁾ Iowa. He married Esther Matilda Jeffries on 25 April 1855 in Columbus City. She was born in 1833 in Pennsylvania, the daughter of Mifflin and Jane (Mullen) Jeffries, Pennsylvania Quakers.^(19,20) William died prior to August 1869⁽²¹⁾ when his estate was appraised. Marjorie Reagan (Wlll) recalls her grandfather's stating that William was killed by an icicle falling on him when he went out to the barn.⁽²²⁾ If this story is correct, William must have died early in 1869. Esther died 30 October 1871.⁽²³⁾ Both presumably were buried in Louisa County, but no records of such have been found. William and Esther were the parents of at least six children, only two of whom lived to adulthood:^(20,24)

H HUGH LITTLE DENHAM married Carolin M. Blosser 4 December 1859⁽²⁵⁾ Carolin's age is uncertain, but she was probably born in 1841 or 1842^(26,27) rather than in 1840 as implied by her father.⁽²⁵⁾ Carolin was born in Pennsylvania, the daughter of William and Clara Blosser, both of whom were born in

Prussia, (27) Hugh enlisted in Company F of the 25th Iowa Infantry in August 1862 (28) and served therein as a commissioned officer. (5) During the Civil War he was wounded at Arkansas Post, Arkansas, 11 January 1863 by a musket ball which fractured his left big toe. He was hospitalized in Memphis, Tennessee, for eight months. Thereafter, he continued to serve and was discharged at Washington, D. C., 6 June 1865. (28) Hugh devoted his life (27) to clerical work, first as a revenue assessor, (26) then as a grain shipper, (15) and finally as a clerk for the Trader's Lumber Company in Minden, Nebraska. (15) Hugh died in Minden 11 May 1889 and was buried there. Carolin died 30 April 1906, (28) but the location of her death and burial place are unknown at this time. (15,26,27,29) Hugh and Carolin were the parents of six children:

- H1 Norman B. Denham, born about 1861 in Missouri
- H2 Ewing C. Denham, born about 1866 in Iowa
- H3 James O. Denham, born about 1868 in Iowa
- H4 Irene Denham, born November 1869 in Columbus City, Iowa
- H5 Claude O. Denham, born 13 May 1877 in Iowa
- H6 Effie Anna Denham, born 27 May 1883 in Iowa

R REUBEN M. DENHAM was the fourth child of H. S. and Winnie Denham, according to the 1850 census. (6) He enlisted for service in the 25th Iowa Regiment on 23 February 1864 but was rejected as blind in the right eye. (30) At the time of his enlistment he was a farmer and gave his description as follows: grey eyes, light hair, fair complexion, and five feet, eight inches tall. Whether Reuben ever married or was a parent is not known at this time.

(0) OBEDIAH E. DENHAM was the last recorded child of H. S. and Winnie Denham. (6) He was a private in Company F of the 25th Iowa Infantry, mustered into service on 27 September 1862 at Mount Pleasant, Iowa. He was discharged on surgeon's certificate because of chronic rheumatism of both knees (probably from rheumatic fever), on 23 March 1865. He married Lucy Lucretia Orman on 17 October 1867 at Christ Church, Red Wing, Minnesota. They apparently had no children, and he died in 1905. At the time of his enlistment he gave the following particulars: five feet, ten inches tall, light complexion, hazel eyes, and dark hair. (31) Hugh E. Denham (W1) remembered (9) that Obed's mustache was so long that he tied it behind his head when he ate.

THIRD GENERATION

W1 HUGH EMMETT DENHAM was the eldest of several children and the only boy to survive to adulthood. He grew up in Columbus City, Iowa, but his childhood was filled with hardships, especially after he and his sisters were orphaned before they reached their teens. After Hugh's father died, Ellis Hyatt ran the transfer business (William Jasper Denham's trade) for the family. Mr. Hyatt had made his home with the Denhams in Columbus City. Grandfather Denham (Hezekiah Stout Denham) (11,21,24) also stayed with them for a while. Hugh's mother kept house for others.

Hugh learned the harness trade -- which became his lifelong profession -- at an early age, from F. E. Goble, a brother-in-law of Hugh Little Denham, Hugh's uncle. Quoting from the notes of Mrs. Trindle gives an idea of Hugh's ability and earning power: "He stitched a trace six feet long in an hour and fifteen minutes. For this, 900 stitches without a thimble, he was paid 30¢. In his late teens he was paid one dollar per week in the harness trade. At age 20 (11) he only weighed 95 pounds, probably indicative of the hard life he led."

Hugh is reported to have made three trips in the 1870's from Missouri to Oregon as a buffalo hunter for wagon, trains before he moved out west. (22) He married Margaret Gooding in 1884. (32) According to family tradition they were married in Missouri before moving west. (22) However, their obituaries imply they were married in Baker, Oregon. Margaret (she was better known as Maggie) was born 30 March 1866 in New London, Quebec, Canada. (33) Hugh and Maggie settled in eastern Oregon in the 1880's and, except for a couple of years in Colorado, they remained in eastern Oregon the rest of their lives. In 1888 Hugh joined with Bob Palmer to form the Palmer-Denham Harness Company, (32) specializing in harnesses, whips, and saddles. Saddles can still be found in eastern Oregon today bearing the Palmer-Denham name. After the advent of the automobile, they expanded the business to include auto-tops. Maggie died on 27 January 1939, and Hugh died 10 May 1941 in Baker. (32,33) Both are buried there at Mt. Hope cemetery. They were the parents of six children: (32,34,35)

- W11 Margaret May Denham, born 11 June 1885 in Pueblo, Colorado
- W12 William Francis Denham, born 14 April 1887 in La Grande, Oregon
- W13 Roy Archibald Denham, born 29 July 1890 in La Grande

- W15 Earle Oliver Denham, born 11 September 1897 in Baker
- W16 Lloyd Emmet Denham, born 5 September 1901 in Baker

ELLA MAY DENHAM (W5) and her younger sister, MARY ELSIE DENHAM (W6), were taken to Charles City, Iowa, after the deaths of their parents. The court first appointed Uncle Hugh L. Denham as guardian, (21) but he took the girls to another uncle, Obediah Denham. They soon returned to Columbus City, because Obed's wife was unable to care for them. Mary was adopted by a Mrs. Albright, daughter of the Lauterbachs who had been guardians for Hugh Emmett Denham. (9) Ella made her home with an elderly couple, the Ericksons, at Fairfield, Iowa. (9) Mary died about 1878, (9,24) but no record of her death or burial location, or those of the other children of William and Esther Denham has been found. A search of published Louisa County grave records (8) and a personal visit to two cemeteries near Columbus City (3) failed to uncover any clues about these children or their parents. Most probably the family was too poor to purchase headstones, or they used wood which has deteriorated over the years.

In 1880 (27) Ella lived on Second Street at the home of John and Matilda Gabriel in Columbus Junction, Iowa; she was doing housework. By 1885 (36) she was in another dwelling, apparently alone, but still residing on Second Street. In the late 1880's she moved to Jewell County, Kansas, where she married Irwin Edwin Wilson, the son of Shephard E. and Jane (Jeffries) Wilson. Jane was a sister of William Jasper Denham's wife, Esther Matilda (Jeffries) Denham. Irwin was born 1 September 1862, in Columbus City, Iowa. (20) In 1896 Ella and Irwin had five children: (9,37)

- W51 Jennie Wilson
- W52 Elizabeth Wilson
- W53 Ora Wilson
- W54 Lois Wilson (Lois is believed to have been the famous star of the silent movies) (9,22)
- W55 Hugh Wilson

Apparently Ella and her children were talented entertainers. The family travelled throughout Kansas and parts of Nebraska, entertaining. Ella died on 17 November 1901 while the family was enroute to Wichita, (37) but exactly where she died or was buried is not known at this time. After Ella's death

the family had very trying times. In fact, Irwin was jailed, and the children (who stayed with relatives and friends) tried unsuccessfully to move out west with their uncle, Hugh Emmett Denham. (37)

H4 IRENE DENHAM was married to Jessee J. Denson (age 23) on 15 September 1887 in Plattsmouth, Nebraska, by C. Russell, Cass County Judge. (38)

In the "Application for Letters of Administration" of the estate of Hugh L. Denham, (39) the children (H1 to H6) are listed by age and residence at the time of his death. All were in Minden, Nebraska, except EWING C. DENHAM (H2), in California or possibly Colorado, and IRENE DENHAM (H4), in Plattsmouth, Nebraska. Nothing further is known about the children of Hugh L. Denham or their respective families.

FOURTH GENERATION

W11 MARGARET MAY DENHAM attended Baker, Oregon, schools and graduated from Baker High. She taught in the rural districts of the county before being appointed principal of South Baker. (40) As the eldest child, she taught in and was principal of the South Baker School during the period when her younger brothers were in attendance. On 22 September 1915 she married Dr. Albert William Tiedeman, (41) for whom the first South Baker school was named. Dr. Tiedeman was born 20 March 1884 in Roy, Washington, the son of Richard and Julia Tiedeman. (42) He attended Willamette University in Salem, Oregon, and graduated from the University of Oregon Medical School in Portland. Dr. Tiedeman was an eminent physician and surgeon in Baker, where he died 3 January 1938. (42) May died there of a heart attack and pneumonia 11 November 1960. (40) Both are buried in Mt. Hope Cemetery, Baker. They had two children: (22)

W111 Marjorie May Tiedeman, born 17 June 1918 in Baker

W112 Albert William Tiedeman, Jr., born 5 September 1921 in Baker.

W12 WILLIAM FRANCIS DENHAM attended the Baker public schools and lived in Baker, all of his life. He married Mrs. Elizabeth Irene Richardson 29 March 1912. (41) She was born 16 September 1887 in Medical Springs, Oregon, the daughter of Arthur and Emma (Briggs) Nelson. (43) Bill was a fine craftsman, very methodical in his work. He was employed in the Palmer-Denham harness shop for 25 years. He also served 35 years as a volunteer fireman, joining the department in 1907. At the time of his death, 5 April 1942, (35) he had more years of service as a fireman than any other member in Baker. The hearse for his funeral was, most fittingly, a fire truck. Bill is buried in Mt. Hope cemetery, Baker. After Bill's death Elizabeth married Earl Thompson. She died in Vale, Oregon, and was buried there 3 March 1953. (43) Bill and Elizabeth were the parents of two daughters: (34, 43, 44)

W121 Maye Eileen Denham, born 23 August 1913 in Baker

W122 Ethel Marjorie Denham, born 13 February 1917 in Baker

W13 ROY ARCHIBALD DENHAM was a star athlete while at Baker High School, where he specialized in football and track, 100- and 440-yard dashes. He graduated from Baker High in 1910 and married Mignon Ina Miller 20 May 1911 in Weiser, Idaho. (34, 45) Roy loved animals, especially the bird dog who was his constant companion during hunting season. He was a bookkeeper for the Ellis Transfer Company in Baker and for the Standard Oil Company in Baker and La Grande. In 1917 he took employment with the Sumpter Valley Railway Company, and he was transferred to Prairie City, Oregon, in 1919. He was a member of

the Presbyterian Church and Baker Lodge #25, IOOF. He died at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Baker, on 14 March 1932 of peritonitis following an appendectomy (45) Mignon was born 12 March 1892 in Utah. (46) They had three daughters: (34,46)

W15 EARLE OLIVER DENHAM served several months in the U. S. Navy during World War I. He was graduated from Baker High School in 1918. Following a number of years of studying music, he joined KOIN radio in Portland as staff tenor and announcer in 1929. Within a couple of years he switched to the technical side of the staff (radio and later, television) where he remained until his retirement in July 1972. Earle married Mary Louise Herfurth, daughter of Jess J. and Mary (Brett) Herfurth, on 17 July 1930 in Portland. She was born 10 May 1910 in Boise, Idaho. Earle and Mary Lou have been active in Eastern Star, serving as Matron and Patron of Sellwood Chapter in 1950. Mary Lou also served seven years as grand treasurer for the Order of Eastern Star in Oregon. She completed more than 16 years with the Neighbors of Woodcraft, a fraternal insurance company in Portland, prior to her retirement in November 1972. They continue to reside at their long-time residence, 7514 S.E. 17th Avenue, Portland. They are the parents of:

W16 LLOYD EMMET DENHAM spent much of his life in Baker, but travelled throughout the state of Oregon, working in the heavy construction field. He was living at the family home at the corner of Third and Estes Streets in Baker in 1940 when his father died. (34) Lloyd was married possibly three times. Names of only two of his wives are known at this time. He married his first wife, the former Alma Voetburg, in 1921. (34) She is now presumed deceased. His second wife was Irene; she died in 1967. (47) Lloyd died 4 April 1968 in Molalla, Oregon. (34) Lloyd and Alma were the parents of three children, all born in Baker: (22,34,47)

- W163 Frank Hugh Denham, born 29 July 1927

FIFTH GENERATION

W111 MARJORIE MAY TIEDEMAN was married to Orville A. Reagan in Payette, Idaho, 30 June 1947. Orville is the son of Louis and Selma (Stenberg) Reagan and was born in Baker 21 September 1919. He is employed by the Poe Motor Company (American Motors) in Baker. They reside at 1505 Fourth Street. They are the parents of: (22)

W1112 ALBERT WILLIAM TIEDEMANN, JR., was educated in the Baker public schools and was graduated with a B.A. degree in science from Oregon State Uni-

versity while serving in the U. S. Marine Corps. In 1944 he transferred to the U. S. Navy as a tropical medical technologist. Following the war, he was graduated with a D.M.D. degree from the University of Oregon in 1952.⁽⁴⁸⁾ Al married Florine De Groot 29 October 1947 in Baker.⁽²²⁾ They spell their last name with two n's, while the elder Tiedemans used only one. Dr. Tiedemann is a dentist in Baker.⁽⁴⁸⁾ They live at 3145 Grandview Drive, Baker, with their two children:

Maye (she prefers Eileen) was married twice more (to Charles Marion Boswell on 13 June 1939 and to Clarence A. Farmer on 30 May 1945) before she married Loyd R. Lee 29 May 1968. They live in a mobile home at 16131 S. E. McLaughlin Boulevard, Portland.⁽⁴³⁾ She had only the one child.

W122 ETHEL MARJORIE DENHAM was married 23 April 1938 in Baker, Oregon, to Alfred Lee Tebault. Al was born 19 April 1917 in Roseburg, Oregon. He received a law degree from Northwestern School of Law, Lewis and Clark College, in Portland. Except for several years in New Jersey, they have resided in or near Portland for the past 20 years. Al is employed by Safeco Insurance Company. Ethel is very interested and talented in art and specializes in ceramics, painting, and antique productions. They reside at 6217 S.W. Ericson in Beaverton, Oregon.⁽⁴⁴⁾ They are the parents of three children:

W131 INA MARGARET DENHAM married Kenneth Ray Blanchard on her 21st birthday, 29 March 1934, in Baker, Oregon. He was born 21 June 1910 in Mountain Home, Idaho, the son of Ray and Martha W. Blanchard. Kenneth was a supply officer for the University of Oregon prior to World War II and has been a Greyhound bus driver since the war. They recently purchased and have moved into a new home in Portland.⁽⁴⁶⁾ They are the parents of two girls and a boy:

Response to an appeal for others to join your editor in purchase of the 1840 Census of the Republic of Texas has been less than overwhelming, but I shall try once more. About \$7.00 has been promised toward the purchase price of \$15.00. Get in touch with your editor if you are interested.

Cledia Bass is inspired to try something similar with the 1850 Census for Tennessee, which is now being compiled and is complete through the F's. Leave a note for her at the Branch Library in Richland if you want to take part in a cooperative purchase.

Something funny can turn up even during such drudgery as typing an index, as Pat Ballowe discovered on page 110 of the Saline County, Illinois, 1850 Census: The surname SUMMONS is followed by the surname SUPPOENA! And back among the B's, Berry Bush, 43, and his wife, Rebecca Bush, 42, had a son named Furrinbush Bush.

WASHINGTON HERITAGE COUNCIL MOVING ALONG

One outcome of the highly successful Illinois Research Workshop hold by the Yakima Valley Genealogical Society in March will be another step toward the formation of a Washington Heritage Council. A letter from Harlow Adams, president of the Yakima group, to interested organizations outlines some of the essentials:

"The purpose of the council being to inventory work done, published and unpublished, which provides source material of historical interest, especially that of interest to genealogists; to disseminate the resulting inventory; and to provide contact between those pursuing further work in this field so that there will be less duplication of effort."

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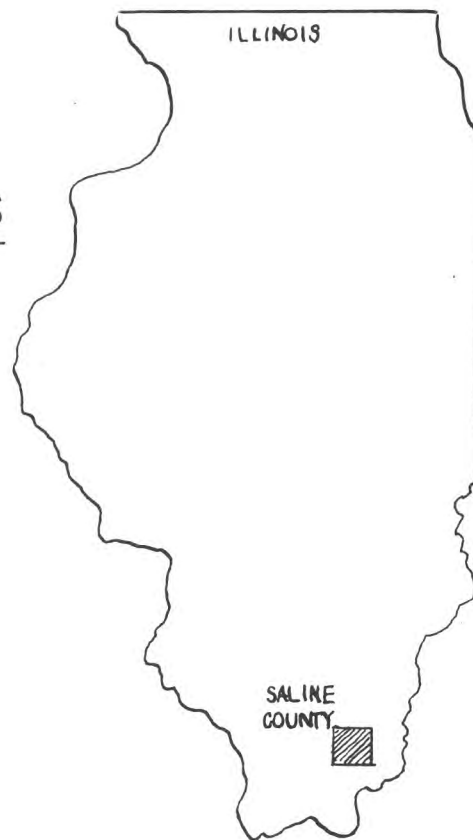
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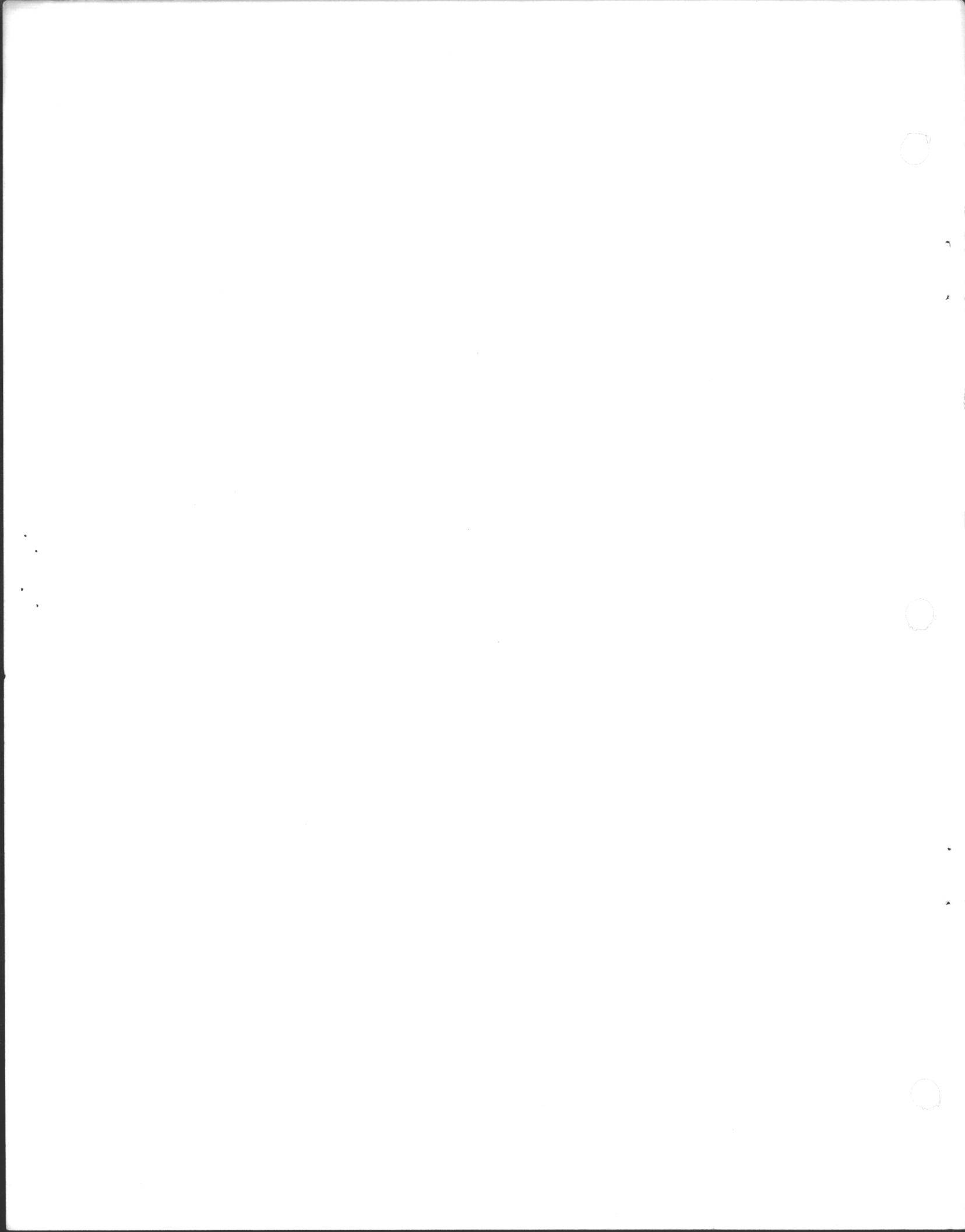
