

HISTORY OF TEN GENERATIONS OF AMERICAN WOOLSEY FAMILY

The name Woolsey-Wolsey-Woosey-Wulcy-and-Wulsie is all of the same general family. There was a William Wulsi in 1166--a William Wulsy in 1219--a Richard Wolsey in 1313--a Robert Wulcy in 1524--all in the British Isles. The personal name was common in Suffolk, where it gave rise to the surname of Cardinal Wolsey. Robert and Joan Dudly Wolsey were the parents of Cardinal Thomas Wolsey (b. 17 Mar. 1471) at Ipswich, Suffolk Co., England. Ipswich is on the Gripping River. Robert and Joan were farmers, raisers of stock for table meat. Before moving to Ipswich, they lived at Combs near Stowmarket. This is only ten miles from Ipswich. Robert and Joan had two other sons, William (b. 1463) and Andrew (b. 1467). The Woolsey name is Teutonic.

It is believed by this author that the American Woolseys are kin to the Cardinal Wolsey family. We have the same coat of arms, but with a different crest. If this is so, we are also kin to the House of Lancaster, because there is a red rose on our coat of arms. Cardinal Thomas Wolsey was secretly married to Joan Larke. This fact is in a book on file in the Library of Congress at Washington, D.C. Their issue THOMAS WYNTER WOLSEY and DOROTHY WOLSEY. It is my belief that the American branch of Wolseys came from THOMAS WYNTER WOLSEY. But as I do not have any ironclad proof of this as yet, I can only surmise this to be a fact. But I do know that our first ancestor to come to America was Rev. BENJAMIN WOLSEY (b. 15?? in Suffolk Co., England). He became a clergyman of Yarmouth, a town between Suffolk and Norfolk Counties, England. In the later part of 1500 there was a purge of religious freedom in all of the British Isles. Shortly after 1600, Rev. Benjamin and family fled to Holland, for their very lives were at stake. As near as I have been able to determine, the date of this flight to Holland may have been in 1618 or '19.

#1 Generation:

Here in Holland, Rev. Benjamin and a Rev. John Livingston became close friends. (These facts are to be found in the Genealogical and Biographical Record, Vol. 4, page 14, published in 1874 in New York City.) They came to America in 1623 and landed at Plymouth, Mass. but the Record is not clear whether Rev. Benjamin had a wife or not. It tells of one son, GEORGE WOLSEY (b. in 1610 at Yarmouth, England). From here on the details are not too clear about Rev. Benjamin. Some seem to believe he died in Massachusetts. Others believe he died at his son's plantation on Long Island in New Netherlands. It is not resolved as yet by this author.

#2 Generation:

We pick up GEORGE WOLSEY in many records of the English Colony of New Netherlands. This George Wolsey (b. 27 Oct. 1610 in Yarmouth, England). He worked for an English merchant, Isaac Allerton, for a number of years in the province of New Netherlands. Because George understood and could speak the Dutch language, he made great progress for his benefactor. He purchased a plantation, was married in a Dutch church, of which he was a member, to RE-BECCA CORNELL on 9 Dec. 1647. To this union were born six children; some say seven, but I only know of six: SARAH, GEORGE Jr., THOMAS, REBECCA, JOHN and MARY. (The Dutch records show when they were baptized.) George died 17 Aug. 1698 in what is now Queens County, N.Y. I have a certified copy of his will.

#3 Generation:

My ancestor is George's second son, THOMAS WOLSEY (b. 10 Apr. 1655 near Flushing, Long Island). He lived near Flushing till about 1664, at which time his father and family moved to Jamaica in Queens Co., New York. About 1679 Thomas married RUTH BAYLESS. To this union were born six children: THOMAS Jr., ABIGAIL, WILLIAM, JOHN, JONATHAN and RICHARD. In 1721 Thomas purchased a farm in Westchester Co., New York. Here he died in 1730.

#4 Generation:

Thomas's youngest son, RICHARD WOLSEY (b. 1697 at Jamaica, Long Island), is my next ancestor. Richard grew up on Long Island. Here he married SARAH FOWLER on 24 Jan. 1718. To this union were born twelve children: THOMAS, DAN-IEL, BENJAMIN, RICHARD Jr., JOHN, HENRY, SARAH, JOSIAH, MARY, JOSEPH, HANNAH and RUTH. Richard and Sarah moved to near Bedford in Westchester County just prior to the birth of their first child, about 1719. Richard's father followed in 1721. I have a copy of Richard's will, which was processed through the courts of Dutchess Co., New York. Richard died in December 1782, but it is supposed his grave was moved to Bedford, where from I'm not sure, nor when. It is found today in the Old Presbyterian Cemetery at Bedford, N. Y. The history of Westchester County records most of the above facts. A copy of Richard's will may be had at Queens College, New York City. His signature on the will looks like *Wooley*, but he names five of his children and wife in this will.

#5 Generation:

My next ancestor is JOSIAH WOOLSEY, Richard's #8 child (b. 1738 near Bedford, N.Y.). He grew up in Westchester Co., N. Y. He married MARY OWEN in 1757. To this union six children were born: STEPHEN, THOMAS, WILLIAM, SARAH, JOSIAH Jr. and MARY M. Josiah was a farmer. He joined the Revolutionary Army in Westchester County, was captured by the British and placed in the Sugar House Prison in New York City. He was permitted to make a will, of which I have a certified copy. It can be had from the court in New York County, N. Y. He died in November 1779 and was buried in the Trinity Church yard cemetery in New York City. But sometime in 1860-something-or-other his grave was moved to the Old Presbyterian Cemetery at Bedford, N. Y. It may be seen there today, but the dates on it are wrong. I also have a copy of his Revolutionary Army record. In his will he names all of his children.

#6 Generation:

My next ancestor is WILLIAM WOOLSEY, #3 child of Josiah's family. He was born in 1767 near Bedford, Westchester Co., N. Y. He grew up a farm boy and was married to JERUSHA LYON in 1797 at Bedford, N. Y. To this union six children were born, all at Bedford: CHARLES, HIRAM, ANNA, JOHN, MARY A. and EMILY. The first two were twins. This family was all raised as Presbyterians. William died in October 1836 at Bedford. He was buried in the Old Presbyterian Cemetery at Bedford. He left a will of which I have a certified copy. He names all his children in his will.

#7 Generation:

My great-grandfather, CHARLES WOOLSEY, #1 child of the William Woolsey family, a twin to Hiram, was born 27 July 1799 at Bedford, Westchester Co., N. Y. He was a farm boy, but became a merchant in New York City. Here he married (for the first time) ELIZABETH HILLS on 3 Apr. 1820. To this union twelve children were born. Besides being a merchant, Grandfather preached each Sunday for the Methodist Church. In 1837 he left New York City and moved to Carlisle, Illinois. Here he did the same as in New York City until in 1844 he moved to St. Louis, Missouri, and stayed until 1848, at which time he moved once again, this time to Keokuk, Iowa. Here he ran a grocery store and preached. But in 1852 Elizabeth died. She is buried in Keokuk. After Grandmother's death, Charles was ordained a full-time minister of the M.E. Church. The children of this first marriage: WILLIAM HENRY, JOSIAH, JANE ANN, STEPHEN, GRACE, CHARLES THEODORE, ELIZABETH, EMILY, GEORGE WASHINGTON, MARRIETA, FLETCHER, and JOSEPHINE.

#2 Marriage: Rev. Charles married MRS. CHARLOTTE Mc MELLEN on 3 June 1855 at Farmington, Iowa. To this union four children were born, JOHN G., ELLA, (girl), and (boy). I do not know names of the last two children. Rev. Charles served in many towns in Iowa for the Des Moines Methodist Conference. He died in Brooklyn, Madison Co., Iowa, on 17 Aug. 1864 and is buried there. Most of this information may be found in a biography written by the Des Moines Conference historian. A copy may be had at the Wesleyan College at Mt. Pleasant, Iowa.

#8 Generation:

My grandfather was #4 of Charles's first marriage - STEPHEN WOOLSEY, (b. 15 Aug. 1826 in New York City) went through high school, worked as a laborer in Keokuk, Iowa, was married in Iowa, where I know not, in 1848 to ELIZA A. VILES. To this union seven children were born: ADALINE, CHARLES, JENNY, ELMER E., BELLE, FLETCHER, and JOHN VILES. In 1860 Grandfather and family lived in Taylor Co., Iowa, on a farm. In 1862 Stephen went down into Missouri and joined the Union Army. He served till 1865 at which time he was discharged at St. Louis, Mo., as a sergeant. He moved soon after to Warrensburg, Johnson Co., Mo., and established a home. Here he was court recorder for several years. Later he was a clerk in an abstract office for a number of years. Grandmother died in 1879 in Warrensburg and is buried there. A few years after Grandmother's death, Grandfather retired and lived with different members of the family. In his later years he spent his time at the Soldiers' Home in Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. Here he died 31 Oct. 1907. He is buried at Fort Leavenworth. I have copies of Grandfather's army records, also a certified 1880 Census of the family in Warrensburg, Mo. Also there is a family Bible record.

#9 Generation:

My father, JOHN VILES WOOLSEY, the youngest of the Stephen Woolsey family, was born 26 Jan. 1871 in Warrensburg, Johnson Co., Mo. He went through grade school in Warrensburg, worked as a laborer on many jobs before he married. He was married on 29 Mar. 1894 to MINNIE MAY SHEPHERD at the home of the bride in the northwest corner of Warrensburg Township in Johnson Co., Mo. (I have the original marriage certificate.) Soon after marriage John Viles went into the dairy farming business. This was on a ranch four miles out of Pueblo, Colo. In 1896 a girl was born, but only lived a few days. She is buried at the Rose Lawn Cemetery in Pueblo. On 23 Oct. 1904 James Walter was born at Grandfather's farm in Johnson Co., Mo. But my parents still ran their dairy farm in Colorado. In the spring of 1906 my parents moved back to Johnson County to a farm. On 6 June 1906 DORA RUTH came along. My mother was the daughter of James P. B. Shepherd and Dora Bell McDowell. Mother was born on 6 Aug. 1874 at Valley City, Johnson Co., Mo. She was the eldest child of the Shepherd family of five children. John Viles Woolsey died 22 Jan. 1940 and Minnie May died 4 Sept. 1958, both in Warrensburg, and are buried in Sunset Hill Cemetery in Warrensburg, Mo.

#10 Generation:

(The author) JAMES WALTER WOOLSEY, the #2 child of the John Viles Woolsey family, was born 23 Oct. 1904, (I have a birth certificate,) at the home of my grandfather, James P. B. Shepherd, in Johnson Co., Mo. I went through grade school, high school, and three years of college in Warrensburg, Mo. I became a house painter. I was married on 5 May 1934 in Higginsville, Mo., to Edna Myrle CAMPBELL, the daughter of Joseph and Laura Dyer Campbell of near Odessa, Mo. To

EFFINGHAM COUNTY, ILLINOIS - PAST AND PRESENT, Hilda Engbring Feldhake, editor; 1968; Effingham Historical Society; Effingham IL, \$10.50, hardbound.

An attractively bound volume, illustrated, with interesting photos of people and places. A map of the county and a list of ghost towns are included with a chapter dealing with "towns that were." Churches and cemeteries by township, schools and educational institutions are noted with many of the early day settlers named and some dates included. Progress of industry, business and agriculture have some importance to the genealogist. Effingham organizations and war records are interesting reading. Several chapter-long biographies of notable pioneers are included along with some vignettes of the past. The book is indexed generally, but does not list the many, many surnames mentioned in the book. A surname index would be most helpful to the genealogist. (Exchange for T.C.G.S. This census lists by district the heads of household in Wilkes County by name and lists members of the family by sex, age, and color as follows: White males from 21 years to 60, white males under 21 years and above 60, white females of every age, blacks of each sex from 12 years to 50, and blacks under 12 and over 50. The 1850 Census listed all members of a family by name, giving age and place of birth. In this volume, "Unless otherwise specified, it is assumed that all individuals were white, and were born in Wilkes County, North Carolina. Other counties noted are located in North Carolina."

Each census is transcribed verbatim, then indexed alphabetically. Mr. Sanders's systerm of running information in long lines is harder to follow than if it had been presented in columns, but admittedly takes less space. Harder to get used to is his practice of using the small letter "o" instead of a zero in transcribing figures -- dates look like 1850 and ages 20, 30, etc. Also questionable are these statements at the beginning of index pages: "NAMES IN INDEX WILL BE SPELLED CORRECTLY: census takers did not always spell them correctly," and "Name in census has been corrected to correct spelling." Nevertheless, Mr. Sanders has done a tremendous amount of work in compiling these volumes, which will be a needed addition to the T.C.G.S. library. He also has several books of Illinois marriages. Hood Genealogical Forum of Clackamas County OR, INDEX TO CLACKAMAS COUNTY, OREGON, MARRIAGE RECORDS, VOLUME II - Mimeographed, 8½ x 11, looseleaf with stiff binder, 145 pp., \$7.50 from the Forum, P. O. Box 208, Oregon City OR 97045.

This volume covers the years from 1900 to 1912, following the society's first book, including marriages from 184? to 1900. A clearly written introduction explains the plan of the book. Even better, it tells what additional information might be contained in the complete record and gives instructions for sending for it. (Exchanged for T.C.G.S. Indexes) * * * * *

A map of Menard County showing the townships as of 1920 and an introduction outlining the history of the county add greatly to the value of this transcription and index. It is a pity, however, that there was not more thought given to the potential lifespan of the book. A flimsy paper cover, plastic binding strip and margins too narrow to allow for trimming make it extremely difficult to rebind the index in a more permanent form for library use. Reduction of the typewritten pages to 50 percent of normal would also make reading difficult for some researchers. (Exchange for T.C.G.S. Index to 1850 Census of Saline Co., Illinois)

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
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
