



#### -- NEWS OF THE SOCIETY --

In August (there is no meeting in July) the society met as usual in the home of a member, this time that of Lois Martin, vice-president. Also as usual, the program consisted of "show and tell" time, or as some prefer to call it, "bring and brag."

September's speaker was Frances Ehrig, who presented the program she has given several times for non-genealogy groups, a sugar-coated lesson in research methods. It is built around the portrait of her great-grandmother, Mary Ann Rogers (1782-1848), and is the story of her life, with explanations of the sources from which the story was gleaned, including census records, deeds, will, family traditions, and other records.

The most successful Beginners' Workshop in Genealogy in several years was held on Saturday, October 19, from 9:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. in the Kennewick P.U.D. Auditorium. Fifty-six were in attendance, most of them non-members who chose to accept the offer of T.C.G.S. membership as part of the workshop package. Their names and addresses will be included in the annual membership list in the next BULLETIN.

Speakers at the workshop were Evelyn Massie, Harry Wrangham, Robert Kimbrough Jr., Carol Lundgren, and Frances Ehrig. Marilyn Duel presided, and Mary Cox was in charge of the refreshment break. Margaret Rice took care of the registration table.

"Genealogical Research in England" was the topic chosen by Herbert Pedersen, guest speaker at the November T.C.G.S. meeting. He emphasized the need to learn a new vocabulary in dealing with English genealogy, citing as an example the term "wapentake." As sources for genealogical data in England and Wales he gave most importance to the census, available from 1841 through 1871; civil registration, 1837 to the present; Bishops' Transcripts (1598-1870) and Parish Registers (1538 to the present); and the indexed probate records, 1380 to present.

"Use of the L.D.S. Branch Library" will be the subject of Patricia Ballowe at the December meeting. (See announcement on page 83.)

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#### -- BOOK REVIEWS AND ACQUISITIONS --

THE DESCENDANTS OF HARVEY WILDER (and his ancestors to 1485 in England with a history of the Wilder name and related families of Warner, Barnhard, Benedict, Hepworth, Poore, Crocker, and Newman), compiled by Justin E. Wilder, privately published by Light and Life Press, Winona Lake IN, 1974, 5½x8½", maroon library binding, xii-27l pages, indexed, illustrated with family photographs, original letters, and Coat of Arms in color, \$7.25. Available from the author at 1322 E. Douglas St., Goshen IN 46526. Also available: 8½x1l color prints of the

Wilder Coat of Arms, \$1.00.

The early English and American ancestry (25 pp.) is traced and documented to Nicholas Wylder 1485, Berkshire, England. The Coat of Arms was granted by Henry VII in 1497. Descendants who emigrated were: brothers Edward and Francis Wilder to Virginia and Maryland respectively ca 1645; brothers Thomas and Edward Wilder to Massachusetts ca 1638. Harvey Wilder is a sixth generation descendants of immigrant Thomas of Massachusetts.

Harvey Wilder, born 1805 in Vermont, migrated with his wife and family to northern Michigan in 1844. Six generations of his descendants have been traced and documented. The seven allied lines named in the title are also well researched and much early data is included on these families, each under a separate chapter heading. The index contains over 2800 names. A system of indentations is used to indicate descent and is explained in the preface. This is clear after a little concentrated study. The cost is minimal for a book as well researched, printed and bound as this one. Personally, I am grateful for this excellent publication, as my own Hepworths and allied Davis family married Wilders, and Justin Wilder has generously included much of my research.

The GUIDE is not something you can just leaf through (at least I couldn't). It has a wealth of information on family name references, a short history of Pennsylvania, sources of information, and most important, it is completely indexed, both by family name, nationality, county, etc.

The books are available for rent; some, if there is more than one copy in the library, are for sale. The rental prices are given after each book or article item listed. You may examine the copy, with sufficient time given for a complete examination, and you are permitted to copy any information given.

PIONEER DAYS OF EASTERN WASHINGTON AND NORTHERN IDAHO, by John Eakin Cochran

This interesting book is a combination of three booklets compiled by Mr. Cochran and published in 1942 and 1950. In 1966 members of his family copied and slightly revised these booklets, added comments and notes, pictures and updated genealogical information, making a single publication. Colorful accounts of his boyhood days in Tennessee, his own large family in the Northwest, his interests and travels make this an enjoyable as well as informative book to read. Some of the allied family included are Bergan, Higgins, Kittrell, Lowry, McCarthy, McCroskey, Montague, Pickard, Shinn and Wortman. 184 pp, uninedxed.

#### BEREEFERE

ROSTER OF REVOLUTIONARY WAR SOLDIERS AND WIDOWS WHO LIVED IN ILLINOIS COUNTIES, compiled by Mrs. Harold I. Meyer for the Illinois D.A.R., Chicago, 1962.

A paperback book of 16 pages, this is an alphabetical list, by surname, with Illinois county of residence and in most cases the state for which the soldier had served. In the case of widows, the husband's name is generally given. T.C.G.S. purchase.

It is not often that a husband and wife both publish family histories, but such is the case with George and Belle West of Durham, N.C., parents of Carolyn West Lutton of Richland, Wash. Mrs. Lutton, reference librarian for Pasco Public Library, lent copies for review and plans to place them later in a Tri-City library. Mrs. West began the family publishing in 1972.

UPCHURCH FAMILY OF ENGLAND, VIRGINIA, AND NORTH CAROLINA consists of 126 pages in hard covers, fully indexed. It is available from the author at 2744 McDowell St., Durham, N.C. 17705, for \$12.00. Much of the information about the family came from the author's mother, a member of that clan, who lived nearly a century. Research in England has led to the belief that the Michael Upchurch who came to Virginia in 1649 or 1650 was almost certainly the son of Richard Upchurch of Dedham, Essex County, England.

The book received an award from the North Carolina D.A.R. in 1972. It is heavily documented. Separate sections treat the family in England, in Virginia and in North Carolina. Fullest information is on the descendants of Isham Sims Upchurch (1824-1916) and his wife Adelia Beavers (1832-1893).

Mrs. West writes with great attention to detail and is very careful to point out possible connections which have not yet been proved. Somewhat distracting is her pattern of placing every name, both Christian and surname, in capitals, a practice which makes it easy to find individuals but difficult to read the book as a continuing narrative.

George H. West broke into print the next year with a volume of his own, WEST GENEALOGY--HOPPER GENEALOGY. The book is  $8\frac{1}{4} \times 11$  inches with heavy card covers and taped spine, 105 pages plus index. It, too, is available from its author at the Durham address above.

An interesting contrast to Mrs. West's professionally printed and bound volume, it is reproduced photographically from typescript and printed on one side only of watermarked, rag-content bond. It concerns the ancestry of both the author's parents, Dr. George H. West and Ada May Hopper, and includes a great many standard pedigree charts. Documentation is largely by coded reference to standard works such as the Maryland Calendar of Wills (MCW).

Progenitor of the West line was Thomas West of Sussex County, Delaware, who may have been a son of Robert West of Northampton County, Virginia. The Hopper line descends from John Hopper ( -1749) of Depford Township, Gloucester County, N.J.

Mr. West's style is terse and crisp with a no-nonsense approach that all but defeats itself in the shortcuts he takes to eliminate wordiness. He, too, is meticulous in pointing out unproved relationships.

Earlier this year Mrs. West published a second volume, this one on her father's family: LUTER-LEWTER FAMILY OF ENGLAND, VIRGINIA, NORTH CAROLINA AND STATES SOUTH AND WEST. It consists of 157 pages and costs \$15.00.

This volume was written with assistance from several other researchers who wrote chapters on branches of the family. Research seems to show that John Luter, who was buried in Shropshire County, England, in 1621, was the father of Henry Lewter of Virginia and Thomas Luter of North Carolina and that Mathew, Hardy and Giles of North Carolina and John of Virginia were sons of Thomas. Mrs. West descends from Hardy Lewter.

Repeated references to the index are necessary to trace an individual to his ancestors. Excellent documentation adds much to the value of the book.

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
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
