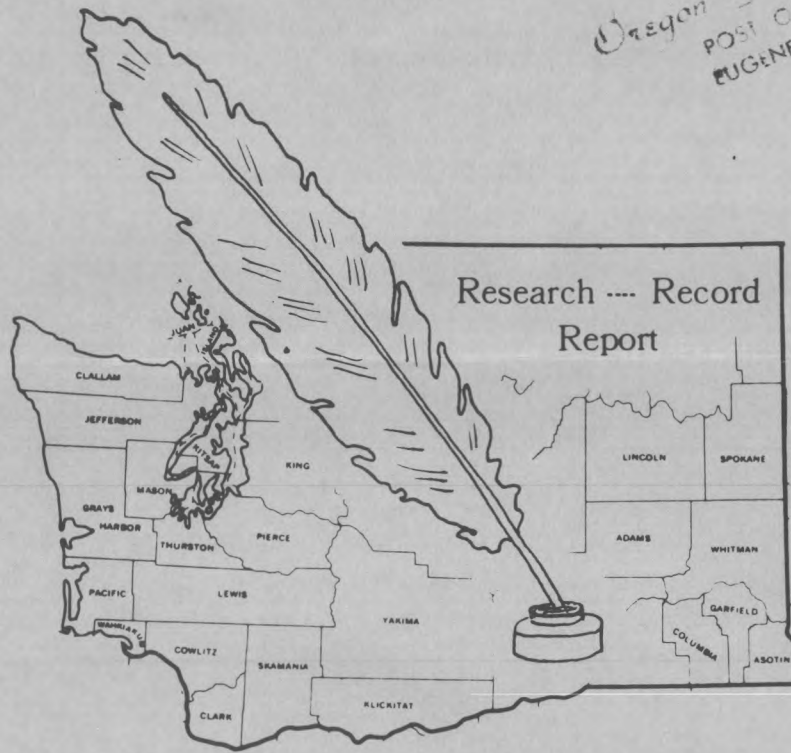

REVOLUTIONARY ANCESTORS
A Bicentennial Feature

JOHN G. RILEY

John G. Riley, son of John Riley of Fauquier Co., Virginia, was born in Virginia about 1750. Brothers were Thomas Riley; Hugh Riley; Edward Riley, whose wife was named Mary; Charles Riley; and George Riley, who married a girl named Sally. Sisters were Catherine Riley, who married a Darnall (or Darnald); Elizabeth Riley, married to George Grayer (or Goar); Lettice Riely, wife of John Fannin; and Mary Riley, who married a Mr. Hill.



In January of 1771 in Fauquier County John G. Riley married a girl named Jalila. On 9 August 1777 he gave the oath of allegiance in the Continental Army, leaving at home his wife and two children. A third child was born in January 1778, while John was suffering through the long winter at Valley Forge with Washington. He served two years in the army in Col. William Edmonds' regiment, which belonged to General Anthony Wayne's brigade.

About 1805 John G. Riley moved his family from Fauquier Co., Virginia, to Lincoln Co., Kentucky. They went on to Mercer Co., Kentucky, about 1814, and John died there on 15 August 1820.

-- BOOK REVIEWS AND ACQUISITIONS --

Smeltzer, Jean Allyn, *Henry Allyn, Autobiography*, Portland OR, published by compiler, 1974. 8½ x 11 mimeo, xiii, 83 pp., card covers, indexed. From the compiler, 4327 N. E. Glisan St., Portland OR 97213.

Those who have used Mrs. Smeltzer's census indexes have learned to expect handsome books from her, but this one is an interesting story as well. She has transcribed her great-great-grandfather's manuscript account of his life from 1812 to 1853 (when he was 59), written in his 81st year. Because it is chiefly about hardships of early surveying crews and the planning and building of Methodist missions, she has prefaced it with an account of the parentage and children of Henry Allyn. This section begins with Ichabod and Elizabeth (Rogers) Allyn/Allen of Colchester CT in the early 18th century. There is an index of descendants and the promise of a future book on James Henry Allyn and his wife, Mary Louisa Goddard. The book is carefully documented.

Adams, Enid Eleanor, C. G., *Ancestors and Descendants of Jeremiah Adams, 1794-1883, Seventh in Descent from Henry Adams of Braintree, Mass.* Victor, Idaho, Ancestor Hunters, 1974. xv, 716 pages, 8½ x 11", hard cover, fully indexed. Order from Ancestor Hunters, Victor ID 83455, \$32.00.

It is hard to say what is most impressive about Enid Adams's family history-- the thorough research, the meticulous documentation, or the beautiful printing and photographic illustrations.

Early in the book she answers the perennial question, "Are we related to President John Adams" by tracing the descent of both branches from a common ancestor. The charts are works of art, and so are the many maps. The fact that Mrs. Adams did research for twenty-five years before publishing this book is well attested to by the careful footnoting. Each source is given, and alternative possibilities are considered.

The first chapter covers the English origin of Henry¹ Adams of Braintree, Mass., quoting from charts made by the late Col. Charles E. Banks and tracing the line to the small parish of Barton St. David. As an example of Mrs. Adams's caution and insistence on full proof, she says, "It is in this parish that we find records of the first *proven* ancestors of our own Adams family."

It is a temptation to expand on the fact that Mr. and Mrs. Adams have done every bit of the work, except the hard cover binding, themselves -- all the typing, photographic copying, enlarging and reducing, the platemaking, printing, collating and assembling. My husband and I know exactly what they went through. The result of their efforts is a book that any professional printer would be proud to display and any library should hasten to purchase.

Mrs. Adams is a former Washingtonian, founder and former editor of the *Bulletin of the Seattle Genealogical Society*. Her earlier books include *The Maurer Family*, *Golden Memories of Tibbetts* (a church history), and *Our Bateman Ancestry*.

Your German Ancestors

WILL BE EASIER TO FIND IF YOU ATTEND

A COURSE IN GERMAN GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH



The above was the heading for a flier sent out to introduce a two-day course sponsored jointly by the T.C.G.S. and the Richland Stake Branch Genealogical Library. It took place March 14 and 15 at the Richland L.D.S. Stake Center and was conducted by Charles M. Hall, professional genealogist in Utah and author of *The Atlantic Bridge to Germany, Vol. I, Baden-Wuerttemberg; Vol. II, Hessen, Rheinland-Pfalz*. Mr. Hall is a former member of the T.C.G.S.

About 56 genealogists attended the course and enjoyed the luncheon served by the library staff. Proceeds are being used to purchase library books, particularly books on Germany.

During the session, sheets were circulated by Gayle Cavalli, member of the Walla Walla Valley Genealogical Society, for recording names of those who attended and the surnames and locations on which they are doing research. 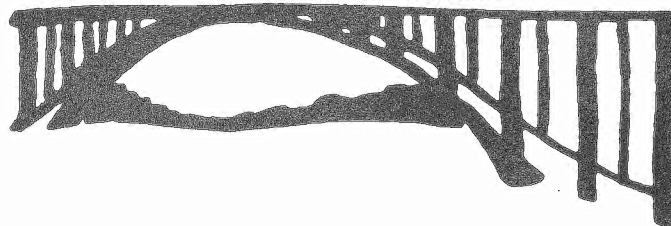

The first meeting of the Board of Directors was held in Yakima WA on March 14, 1975, in conjunction with a workshop presented there that week-end by Art Fiske. Following a no-host dinner at the Royal Fork, attended by a large number of Yakima Valley Genealogical Society members, the board adjourned to the home of the president, Jack Lines.

After approving bills incurred by the steering committee, the board reviewed the purposes of the organization as outlined in literature sent to prospective member societies and individuals. Mr. Lines then explained a proposed project, Abstracting County Records for Historical Purposes (as outlined below), and Art Fiske moved that the board of directors formally ratify sponsorship of the project. The motion carried.

PROJECT: ABSTRACTING COUNTY RECORDS FOR HISTORICAL PURPOSES

The object of the project is to provide a readily available source of information about the early settlers in each county for use in historical and genealogical studies and thereby to further promote an interest in the heritage left to us by these pioneers.

The work will consist of abstracting and transcribing, with proper cross-referencing, information from the records of births, deaths and marriages prior to 1907 and from the probate proceedings to the same date. Any possible derogatory invasion of the privacy of any individual would be avoided.

These abstracts should be done under adequate supervision to insure proper uniformity in their preparation and publication so that they will provide maximum benefit from their use.

A copy of the work done in a county would be provided to the official in charge of the office in which a particular set of records is kept, and to the State Archives.

The preparation of these abstracts is not believed to in any way encroach on any of the offices involved - in fact it is believed it will relieve them of considerable nuisance business, if the experience of Massachusetts, which prepared similar records for 80 towns in the 1930's is observed. The abstracts would not be official records, but would enable many historians and genealogists who seek copies of official records to learn where they may be obtained.

Personnel requirements:

To accomplish this project from one to three individuals in each cooperating county should be employed and trained in the proper procedures. Each of these individuals should be able to read properly the varied types of handwriting used in the preparation of these early records and be able to carefully transcribe the information legibly and accurately.

In addition to these individuals, there should be one or more individuals who can accurately type or hand-letter on 3"x5" index cards for later use in publishing or microfilming these records.

Proper schooling and supervision of the project is essential and should be provided by a supervisor and an assistant supervisor who has had experience in the abstracting and publication of such records.

A school or schools of instruction should be held to insure a thorough and uniform knowledge of the work to be done.

To insure continued accuracy in the abstracting of the records, adequate provision should be made to permit from at least one to three supervisory trips, of suitable duration, to be made to each cooperating county by the supervisor and/or his assistant.

To ensure proper editing of the abstracts, provision should be made for the supervisor and/or assistant supervisor to review the work of each abstractor before the data is transferred to the index cards, and provision should be made for proof-reading of the index cards against the abstracts, the proofreading probably to be performed by some of those who did the abstracting in each county.

This project could be funded through Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA). See your Man-Power centers for applications.
