## RICHLAND SCHOOL HISTORY AND GRADUATES TO 1943 By Martha Berry Parker

(The following article is based on material collected by Mrs. Parker for her recently published book, TALES OF RICHLAND, WHITE BLUFFS, AND HANFORD, 1805-1943.)

The first school on the lower Yakima (later to become Richland) was located on the Yakima River flood plains west of the present city of Richland. It was in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Van Horn, who had homesteaded on the river, at the request of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Rosencrance and Mr. and Mrs. Alexander McNeill. (McNeill was later the first sheriff in Benton County). Mrs. Van Horn was a school teacher The Rosencrance and McNeill children brought their own stools and Mrs. Van Horn received \$1.00 a day. This was about 1897-1898.

A school house was built (between the Knights of Columbus building and the cemetery on the By-Pass Highway) and was called the Van Horn School or the little Red Schoolhouse. Miss Waughtempaugh taught for two years, followed by Lena Douglas and Robert Simmons. Lower Yakima was in Yakima County.

Benton County, the City of Richland and School District #6 were all formed in mid-1905. Mr. Townsman was the first teacher for the new town, which still used the Van Horn School, west of the new town.

In 1906, \$500 was voted for a new grade school in town. Its location was approximately where Lewis and Clark School is now. Howard Amon donated several city blocks for school purposes.

Miss Annie Goff was the first county superintendent of schools.

In August of 1910, a \$6,000 contract was let for a second grade school in the Fruitvale district north of Richland to be ready for students, grades I through 6, in October. This was located just south and a little west of the 300 Area.

The first graduated from the Richland High School were Laura Baskett, Elsye Clements, Elizabeth Van Horn, Jay Long and Bowen Van Horn. The commencement exercises were held in the school gym (built in 1910) May 19, 1911, Reverend Marriott of Kennewick preached the baccalaureate sermon.

The 1912 graduates were Paul Granlund and Edith Fisher.

In 1913, graduates Helgy Anderson, Esther Van Horn, Blanche Clements and Mable Lausch had a new high school building for their commencement.

Kennewick Courier Reporter noted that the 1943 graduates in Richland were handed their diplomas (the last of April) without commencement, baccalaureate or any other customary exercises and continued public school seemed unlikely at that time. On March 6, the government had taken over the lands that were rapidly becoming the Hanford Atomic Reserve and one-half of Benton County- the 2,000 population of the towns of Richland, White Bluffs, Hanford and Vernita, the early bearing fruit orchards and fields- moved aside for the mystery of the atomic industry. The school districts were consolidated into one district #400, and after a few heartbeats, public schooling did continue, at least for Richland and Vernita, but Hanford and White Bluffs were terminated.

Gratitude seems to be becoming more prevalent — we have received several short notes of thanks for similar services, and even two monetary contributions "for the benefit of the society," but never a thank-you more interestingly-detailed and inspiring than this one!

Dear Mrs. Ehrig.

Thank you so much for all your work in trying to help me locate some info on my missing uncle, Wilhelm Menzenbach, from the little newspaper clipping I sent you. I appreciate both your personal help, as well as your running a query for me in your Society's quarterly. So far there has not been any response to that query, but if one should arrive, at least I'll know how they happened to hear of my uncle! Thanks so much!

Meanwhile, since first writing to your Genealogical Society for help on the 6th of April, 1980, the floodgates of genealogical information have opened up, not only regarding this missing uncle, but on that entire line in Germany, to the point that just last April I knew very little of my father's family and was thus trying to find a clue backward in time thru this missing uncle - my only clue and connection to the past, to the point today where enough inquiries similar to the one sent your Society (I think I wrote 50 letters in that two-month period, half written in German to Germany, and the other half written to people or places in this country) that I have now found out who that missing uncle was, and when and where he died. More importantly, knowing this, I was able to make the link to the family in Germany, and can now suddenly boast (quote-quote) of an impressive "Pedigree" going back almost unbroken to an Antonius Zu Wester (no last names then) who died in 1628! And I have located and written to formerly unknown cousins in Germany, who answered my first letter to them with an excited trans-Atlantic phone call (in German yet!) at 3:00 A.M. in the morning - they didn't know what the difference in times were, so just phoned me. We have since

written back and forth, and they have sent me a wealth of family documents and pictures and letters, including a letter my mother wrote their family in 1916, telling them she was expecting (me) shortly, and then they also sent me a copy of my own baby picture.

Meanwhile, in this country - after having the death records checked, year by year in the various states we'd heard my uncle lived, which included a check of the deaths, year by year, in Washington, from 1930 to 1949, my request to check 1950 for a death certificate at Olympia, finally paid off, and I was sent his death certificate - William Mencenbach died in Spokane, Washington on 1 November, 1950. This was the climax of a 45-year search for this missing uncle, by both my father and me, and believe me, when I say that when I held that death certificate in my hands, I just sat here and bawled! So tell all those hard-working genealogists not to ever give up! Letters, then to the Spokane Daily Chronicle brought me the death notice from the newspaper listing the name of an unknown cousin as a survivor, and mentioning the funeral home and cemetery where he was buried, and I have since corresponded with all of them, thus yielding more info about my uncle. I also found a will, which led to the lawyer's name and also names of witnesses - all of whom I've contacted to get additional information which has been most helpful.

The results of that search have even taken me to Alaska - one of the places we had heard my uncle was a gold miner - and I've just found a reference to him in an old diary kept by another miner in 1923 - the diary is in the Historical Library Documents Room of the Alaska State Library, and I'm presently trying to get a photocopy of that part of the old miner's diary.

Sorry - didn't mean to get into so much detail telling you of my fabulous goodluck story, but since it all ties in with my letter asking your Society for help in trying to locate some info on this missing uncle, and then also relating to the query you were kind enough to write up and run for me - well, I thought you might be interested in the stunning results.

The cousins in Germany also sent me a picture of the missing uncle, taken in 1920, location unknown, and it shows a very handsome, well-dressed man with an impressive doubled gold watch chain across his vest, and a small Statue of Liberty tie tack — and the most proud, aristocratic Prussian face you've ever seen and bearing a striking resemblance to my own father. And I'll the time I've been searching for this missing uncle, knowing what I did about him and hearing all the legends about him, I'd always visualized a little old man with a miner's shovel and pack on his back, long beard, tattered clothes and battered old hat, wandering around the gold fields and mines of Alaska, Washington, Oregon, Idaho and such, writing only infrequently to his family, and finally dropping out of sight from them entirely. Incidentally, he was an engineer, and was born 8 Sept. 1876, so my guesswork was pretty close, but I simply can't imagine why he chose to drop out of sight and break all contact with his family — brothers and sisters and parents. Perhaps in time I'll find out. And he never did marry.

Getting a date on the little clipping I sent you will still be a help in trying to place my uncle in a given place at a given time and will help to write his story. Now knowing he was in Alaska in 1923, being mentioned in the old miner's diary then, and then this little newspaper item saying he was an experienced mining man from Alaska, would place this newspaper clipping as from the late 1920's or very early 1930's, since I've also found out that when a cousin went to visit him in 1933, he was in Spokane.

#### -- In Memoriam --

Within the short space of three weeks the Tri-City Genealogical Society lost two past presidents, Ruth Lovejoy Kottwitz and Evelyn Hepworth Massie, two of the most dedicated, dependable and knowledgeable members our society has ever had. Ruth died of cancer August 12, 1980, and Evelyn died, also of cancer, August 31.

Ruth Kottwitz's genealogical interest was in New England, chiefly in Maine, and she contributed many Bible records, queries, pedigree charts, military records and other material to the Bulletin. Evelyn Massie was the author of A Massie Family History, Descendants of James R. Massie of Virginia and Kentucky and His Sons William Redmon Massie (born 1800) and John Colin Massie (born 1816), published in 1972 by Locust Grove Press. It is now out of print. Both women worked tirelessly in T.C.G.S. activities, particularly with workshops.

The society has made a cash contribution to the fund for purchasing a microfilm, "New England Marriages Prior to 1700," in Ruth's memory. Lyle Perrigo is preparing a lecture on medical and genetic aspects of genealogy, tentatively set for March 1981, as a memorial to Evelyn.

#### Evelyn Massie
