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## **DR. HENRY A. CARSKADDEN**

If you've had your tonsils removed just lately or if you've broken your arm, you probably are already well acquainted with Dr. Henry A. Carskadden, who has been Oak Harbor's physician for the past twelve years, and know his friendly manner.

But Dr. Carskadden is not only a Doctor- he is also well known as an ardent sportsman.
