








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












KITTITAS COUNTY'S FINE RECORD

Kittitas County, Washington, responded nobly to every call on it in the Great World War. It sent one National Guard Cavalry troop, Troop A, Washington Cavalry, as a unit to France among the first 100,000 men to go overseas. It furnished over 800 men for the army and 160 for the navy, as nearly as present records show, out of a population estimated at less than 20,000, or approximately five per cent of its population, a record much above the average for the country as a whole. The names of 960 of these men, and the record of their service are compiled in this book, which was written and published for the sole purpose of giving accurate information for future generations of the part played by the patriotic people of Kittitas County. Efforts to obtain the names and records of other men who went from Kittitas County have been unavailing. The records of the draft board were sent to Washington, D. C., and closed to the public before it was determined to issue this book. which meant that names of some of the boys who were drafted or volunteered were not available.

Kittitas County "went over the top" in every Liberty Loan drive and for every war work drive of every nature. Men and women alike united in doing everything possible here at home to back up the efforts of the men in the service.

With the declaration of war, a home guard military organization was immediately formed to take the place of Troop A when that organization should be mustered into federal service. With the first call for volunteers for this organization over 200 men went to the armory. For weeks these men were drilled as home guards, then the picked men were formed into a State Guard, which later became a National Guard company, a part of the Third Washington Infantry, one of three National Guard regiments recruited during the war and accepted by the federal government.

In Home Service work the response from men and women, boys and girls was equally hearty. Every call was met instantly. Scores of people gave up half of their time or more to war service work of some kind. Some gave up practically every working hour of the day. Business and professional men, farmers, mechanics and laborers vied in each doing his part. Women worked in the Red Cross and other organizations at tedious work, made easier only by the thought that they were helping to make pleasanter and easier the tasks of the boys who were offering their very lives.

It was no sudden spurt of patriotism, although it sprung to the front at the first break, but it grew more and more substantial, stronger and stronger day by day. Before one hard task was finished, came the call for others and hundreds gave time, work and money beyond anything they could have believed possible before. Sentiment crystalized to the point that everything centered on winning the war. Word that some big task was to be done, some new sacrifice to be made brought a response that showed how high was the patriotism of these people.

Kittitas County, it is true, had its slackers. The summer of 1917 was a season of fear and trembling at unknown dangers, but bravely faced. The I.W.W. came into the county and tried to tie up essential work in the logging camps and other industries. At one time approximately 150 were in the "bull pen" on the lawn of the county court house. Company B of the Third Oregon National Guard was stationed in three counties of Central Washington with headquarters of Captain West at Ellensburg. Company D of the Second Washington was stationed at South Cle Elum and these two organizations did much in purging the county of its worst anarchistic trouble makers.

Vigilante organizations were prepared for any emergency. Hundreds of men were ready at a given signal to meet and combat the foes of government and civilization, who were, almost without exception, aliens who came into the county to try to tie up essential war industries and undo the work of the loyal people of the county. The citizens of every part of the county were equal in their loyalty and their efforts to help.

This book, "With the Colors From Kittitas County, Washington," is dedicated to the boys who went into their country's service. Every effort has been made to obtain absolutely accurate information and to give credit where credit was due. Articles and advertisements were published in every newspaper in the county giving the purpose of the publishers, and urging people to cooperate in making the record of every man and woman complete. Every possible source of information was checked and rechecked. A canvass was made of the county homes of every known soldier and sailor and each in turn was asked for information of others. Lists were published, giving the names of those of whom records had been obtained, and people urged again and again to send names, pictures and records of any soldier or sailor omitted from the list.

The publishers wish to thank the scores of people who have assisted in the endeavor to make all information in this book authentic and complete. Officers of the various welfare organizations, of the draft board, of the heads of the various drives and scores of individuals have contributed. It is the hope and wish of the publishers and the compilers that all the information is complete and accurate.



History of Troop A, First Washington Cavalry

The only organization to enter active federal service as a unit from Kittitas county during the war, Troop A, First Washington Cavalry, of Ellensburg, served more than eighteen months in France and five months in camps in the United States. It was generally known as "Ellensburg's Own" troop, since more than a hundred boys in the troop were from Ellensburg or vicinity.


Naturally expecting to go directly to France after mobilization and see service on the Western front, the troop left Ellensburg early in August, 1918, for Camp Murray, American Lake, Wash.; entrained for Camp Green, North Carolina, September 10. 1918, and at the latter camp received the news that shattered their hope of active participation as a unit in actual hostilities; the squadron was there designated as a unit of Military Police, acting first in that capacity in the city of Charlotte, N. C., and served from then until demobilized as Military Police.

As Military Police the organization received recognition as one of the most efficient in that branch of the service in the American army.

Announce Organization of Troop

On July 6, 1916, shortly after the National Guard of Washington was called out for service on the Mexican border, the State Adjutant General announced that a troop of cavalry would be organized in Ellensburg, and named Fred Stocking, Sr., as acting recruiting officer. The first men to respond to this call were Guy Phare, Lawrence T. Russell, Walter Offield, George Cody and Ivan Wilson.

Following the first call, orders were issued

on July 11, definitely locating the troop in Ellensburg. The first drill commenced on July 17 under A. L. B. Davies, Captain regular army, retired, and assisted by George Orth, Spanish-American War veteran, but interest in the troop died down when on August 3 orders were received suspending the formation of the new troop, and the men who had been enlisted placed on reserve.

Transfer Men From Infantry

However, on October 18, 1916, when the Second Washington Infantry had returned from the Mexican border, twenty Kittitas county men who had enlisted in that regiment were transferred to the Ellensburg organization, which was then known as Troop A, First Washington Provisional Cavalry, and recruiting again became active.

Federal recognition was given to the troop on January 12, 1917, and it was accepted into federal service as U. S. National Guard, and subject to call by the federal government.

Clifford W. Sands was commissioned First

Lieutenant of the troop, and Acting First Sergeant Smith F. Reavis, Second Lieutenant, on January 26, 1917. Lieut. Sands took command of the troop on March 7 when Capt. Davies resigned.

In March when relations were badly strained between Germany and the United States, all units of the National Guard were notified to be in readiness for mobilization at any time, and enlistments increased rapidly.

On April 7 Lieut. Sands was commissioned Captain and given command of the troop, Lieut. Reavis made First Lieutenant, and Marion D. Mills, Second Lieutenant. Gordon Buchanan was First Sergeant.

Mrs. Bertha Tiffany and Mrs. Ralph B. Wiseman of Ellensburg wrote and published a song in honor of Troop A, entitled "I'll Be Wating For You," in April.

On April 10 an indoor range was installed in the armory and rifle practice commenced.

By the middle of May the strength of the

troop had reached 105, despite the loss of eight men on account of dependent relatives.

First Segt. Buchanan was sent to the First Officers Training camp at the Presidio, Cal., on May 24, 1917, and was commissioned Second Lieutenant after a three months' course. He never rejoined the troop.

In June the officers and non-commissioned officers of the whole squadron went through a week's course of instruction at Camp Murray, American Lake, returning on horseback over the mountains.

Mobilized at Camp Murray

On July 25, 1917, the First Washington Cavalry squadron was mobilized. Captain Sands, who had been ill for a considerable length of time, assumed command of Troop A, and intensive drills were commenced imfediately. A large percentage of the troop were assigned to duty guarding the I. W. W. who were caged on the county court house grounds.

The squadron was assembled at Camp Murray, Wash., on August 8.

The squadron consisted of Troop A of Ellensburg, B of Tacoma, C of Wenatchee and D of Spokane, commanded by Captains Clifford W. Sands, Myron B. Cramer, John MacDonnell and Lawson Moore, respectively, and the squadron commanded by Major Hartwell W. Palmer. First Lieutenant William R. Tyree was adjutant. Lieut. Tyree later received promotions to the rank of Captain and Major, being in command of what was left of the original squadron at the time it was ordered home from France.

The following men were discharged on August 18: Stable Sgt. George Cody, Sgt. Ivan Hunt, Sgt. Fred Stocking, Sr., Bugler Frank Kelton, Privates Frank Crewdson, Ray Green, John H. Carter, Gerald Partington, Roy Campbell and Ernest Jones. Wolcott Hubbell enlisted August 23 and was made mess sergeant of Troop A.

The journey east to Camp Greene, Charlotte, N. C., was started on September 10, and when the troop train stopped at Ellensburg that night enroute, fully 2000 people greeted them at the depot and gave them a farewell that the boys have never forgotten.

Word had reached Ellensburg in advance of the arrival of the train that the boys were passing through, and the word spread rapidly to friends and relatives, so that a last farewell was possible to the boys who were going into unknown dangers and strange lands.

The nine day trip to the eastern camp was relieved by six-hour stops at Spokane, Wash.; Helena, Mont.; Mandan, N. D.; Minneapolis, Minn.; Chicago, Ill.; and Paintsville, Ky.; beside short stops for exercise at other points.

On September 19 the squadron arrived at Camp Greene where it remained until November 12, performing provost guard duty in the city of Charlotte, N. C.

The members of the squadron have a pleasant memory of Charlotte, where they were taken into the homes of the residents and shown every kindness and courtesy. According to the newspapers of Charlotte, the citizens were fearful when they received word that men of the "Wild Northwest" were to be stationed at Camp Greene, which is on the outskirts of the city, and expected to see the city invaded by soldiers in the first stages of civilization

For that reason their reception of the boys was the more hearty when they realized that their personnel consisted of men whom they were glad to receive into their homes.

Become Military Police

On October 6, 1917, the squadron bade farewell to its hope of seeing service as cavalry, and Troops A of Ellensburg. B of Tacoma, and D of Spokane lost their identity as members of First Washington Cavalry, being combined to form First and Second companies, respectively of 116th Train Headquarters and Military Police. To Co. A were transferred 20 men from Troop B and 31 from Troop D, making a total of 150 men in Co. A. Troop C of Wenatchee was made Headquarters Troop of the 41st Division.

A few days previous to this Lieut. Reavis was relieved from duty with Troop A and Lieut. William H. McCullough assigned in his place. On October 24 Capt. Clifford W. Sands, commander of Co. A, and Capt. Lawson W. Moore, in command of Co. B, 147th M. G. Bn., mutually relieved each other, Capt. Moore being in command of Co. A until February 25, 1918.

From Camp Greene the 41st division, of which Troop A, was an element, moved to Camp Mills, N. Y., in October and November, 1917, First Co. reaching there on November 12. Provost guard was performed in the towns in the vicinity of Camp Mills, N. Y., until December 12, 1917, when the organization proceeded to Hoboken and boarded the transport "Covington," which sailed the following day with 5000 troops. The "Covington" was subsequently torpedoed and sunk on a return voyage from France.

At dawn on Christmas morn the Ellensburg boys were lined up on the upper deck of the great vessel, in life preservers, in readiness for instant response to orders in event of the sighting of hostile submarines. During each day of the trip across the Atlantic the hours of dawn and twilight were spent in formation on the ship's deck.

There were five transports in the convoy, cach carrying approximately 5000 troops. From New York until the twelfth day at sea the convoy was guarded by a swift cruiser, it being relieved on that day by several small, speedy submarine chasers. At dawn on the last day two hydroplanes appeared and escorted the transports into the harbor. No indications of enemy craft were sighted during the voyage across, which was marked by bright, sunny weather.

Arrive at Brest Dec. 27

After 14 days at sea the ship made Brest Harbor, France, arriving the forenoon of December 27. The troops, however, remained aboard the ship until December 31, when they disembarked and entrained for the divisional area. The 116th Train Headquarters and Military Police Battalion after two nights and almost two days of travel in freezing weather in French "Chevaux 8, Hommes 40" cars, arrived at La Courtine, an old French artillery training camp.

On January 12 the battalion was temporarily split, the main section going to Noyers-St. Aignan, the remainder, together with a part of Second Co., remaining under the command of Lieut. W. H. McCullough, later going to Blois, where they performed Military Police duty for several months.

In the Noyers-St. Aignan area the main body of First Co. was billeted in an old brick kiln. Sixteen days were spent in this area, the two towns of Noyers and St. Aignan being policed, while Sgt. Frank Smithson had a detachment at Selles-sur-Cher.

Move to Montrichard

On January 29, 1918, the company moved to Montrichard (Loir-et-Cher) and from that date until the battalion was ordered home, in June, 1919, was stationed at Montrichard, policing a district of 45 square miles, and covering the towns of Montrichard, Pontlevoy, Monthou, St. Georges, Chissay, Faverolles, Bourre, Thesee, La Chaise, Chennonceaux, Chisseau, Valliers and Sambin.

Montrichard, the headquarters of the company from January 29, 1918, until June 16, 1919, is a town of approximately 3,000 population, located on the Cher River halfway between Vierzon and Tours, and directly south of Paris. The Cher River valley is one of the most picturesque in France, and occupies a prominent part in French history. While in Montrichard the company was billeted in a three-story house on the main street, formerly the home of a wealthy resident.

The first and only death in the organization during its service occurred on January 23. 1918. Supply Sergeant Wilson N. Austin, who had been left, ill, at La Courtine, died or that date at the base hospital at Limoges, France. Sgt. Austin was one of the first to enlist in Troop A and was exceedingly popular.

On February 20 First and Second Companies, 116th Tr. Hq. and M. P. ceased to be known as such, being henceforth designated as Co. A and Co. B., 116th Military Police.

Captain Lawson W. Moore was transferred from the command of the company on February 24, 1918, First Lieut. Stark taking command. However, on March 23 Second Lieut. Edward Kay supplanted Stark and was in command until in June.

Blois Detachment Joins Company


The Blois detachment re-joined the main organization on June 1, and a week later, June 8, the detachment commander Lieut. McCullough was given command of a new organization, the Army Traffic Police, First Army, which consisted of 21 men of Co. A, and the rest from Co. B and other units.

On July 1 Sgt. D. H. Dickson was made First Sergeant, relieving First Sergeant J. P. O'Neill.

When Sgt. Dickson went to the Officers' training school at Langres, France, on July 28, he was replaced by Sergeant Carol V. Cadwell, who was made First Sergeant of the cotapany on August 2. On September 1 Cadwall was relieved by Sergeant Crisler, who in turn was relieved as First Sergeant by Sergeant Harold W. Newstrum on October 13, 1918. The company had two more Top corgeants before it was mustered out of service—Sergeant La Verne C. Wright, on April 15, 1919, and Sergeant McManus on June 1, 1919.

Sgt. Wilson Austin was supply sergeant of the company until his death in January, 1918. He was succeeded by Sgt. Larry Lee whose place was later taken by Sadler George D. Wilson, who was promoted to the grade of Corporal Donald D. Henness was sergeant. company clerk from mobilization until June, 1918, when he was transferred to the newly formed company of Traffic Police, First Army, together with 20 other members of the organization. His place was taken by Harold Newstrum, then a corporal, and who subsequently was made sergeant and first sergeant. Newstrum served in the capacity of company clerk almost constantly until the outfit was demobilized.

A number of the men of the organization saw action in France, some who went to the

front as replacements in combat outfits, and a detachment of sixteen non-commissioned officers who were assigned to train guard duty. They made numerous trips to the front with replacement troops. All of the men in the organization were enlisted men and entered service with the expectation of seeing action and the assignment to duty as military police caused great dissatisfaction.


Captain William R. Tyree assumed command of the organization on June 1, 1918, later receiving a promotion to rank of Major and being placed in command of the battalion.

New Change in Designation

The last of several changes in the designation of the company was made on October 31, 1918, when it became known as the 268th Company, 134th Military Police Battalion. Co. B became known as 267th Co. 134th Battalion. The organization was designated, respectively, Troop A, First Washington Cavalry; Co. A 116th Train Headquarters and Military Police; First Co. 116th Tr. Hq. and M. P.; Co. A 116th Military Police, and 268th Co., 134th M. P. Bn., from its inception to date of discharge.

Comparatively liberal leaves of absence to visit other parts of France were given the members of the organization. At first only 24hour passes exclusive of travel time were granted to visit various cities except Paris, which was not open as a leave area. Later seven-day passes were granted to the men, still exclusive Leave areas were established in of Paris. several parts of France, chief of which was Aix-les-Baines, south of Lyons, one of the most famous pleasure resorts of the country. This was entirely turned over to enlisted men. Biarritz was another noted leave area. In January, 1919, Paris was opened for the first time to men of the A. E. F., and most of them were able to enjoy a three-day leave in the famous French capital.

On January 3, 1919, the War Department announced that the 41st Division would be one of the divisions scheduled for early convoy home. It left France during the month of March, but left the 134th Military Police Bat-

talion still doing duty in the St. Aignan-Montrichard area, much to the disappointment of the boys, who up to that time had been in Europe for fifteen months.

However, early in June, 1919, orders wer: received to prepare for embarkation from France, and the tedious work of preparing sextuple passenger and baggage lists was commenced.

Leave Montrichard for U.S.

On June 16 the organization left Montrichard for St. Nazaire, the port of debarkation, arriving at the latter place on the morning of the following day, and weighed anchor for home at eight o'clock on June 18, 1919, arriving at New Port News, Va., at 3:00 p. m., June 28. After five days at the Virginia camp the trip to Camp Lewis, Wash., and demobilization was commenced. On July 11 the troop train arrived in Ellensburg where the boys made a sevenhour stop to parade on the city streets and greet relatives and friends before continuing the journey to Camp Lewis.

A splendid open-air banquet had been prepared for the boys on the court house grounds where hundreds of relatives and friends assembled to welcome them home after an absence of eighteen months.

July 12, 1919, saw the last day of military service for the boys who volunteered when the first call to arms was sourded, and the war was indeed "fini."

History of the Forty-First Division

With the exception of the Ninety-first, Washington had a greater interest in the Forty-First Division than any other army organization that went overseas, for into it went all of this state's national guard. The Second Washington Infantry; the First Squadron of Washington Cavalry; the First Squadron of Washington Cavalry; the First Battalion Washington Field Artillery; the First Battalion Washington Signal Corps and Washington Field Hospital No. 1 were all included in this division. For the rest, it was made up of Oregon, Montana, Idaho and Wyoming militia.

The division was organized September 19, 1917, at Camp Greene, N. C., where it remained until October 18, 1917. On that date the first unit embarked for France and the last had arrived by January 1, 1918.

Immediately after its debarkation it was designated as a replacement division—the first to be formed by the American army—and ordered to the St. Aignan training area.

Then the entire division was split up, with the exception of the artillery brigade, and formed into training cadres to fill up the gaps caused by casualties in combat divisions. The first replacements to be used by any American forces were drawn from this division, so it is probable that men of the Forty-First served in more different organizations than those of any other.

The division's artillery brigade, in the meantime, had been put through a course of training, and, on July 1, 1918, was attached to the First corps as corps artillery. It served as corps and army artillery throughout its stay overseas, and was engaged in active operations as such in the Marne-Aisne, St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne offensives.

Because it never served as a combat division, no figures are available as to the exact number of casualties in the Forty-First. Men from it figured in the casualty list of almost every American unit that saw active service—but their names appear under the divisions with which they were serving for the moment, instead of under their original one. An idea of the magnitude of the division's task, however, can be obtained from the fact that, during the year of 1918 alone, it forwarded 263,395 replacements and casuals through its area.

The Forty-First was commanded by the following: Maj. Gen. Hunter Liggett, August 16, 1917, to September 19, 1917; Brig. Gen. Henry Jervey to December 6, 1917; Brig. Gen. George LeR. Irwin to January 9, 1918; Brig. Gen. Richard Coulter to February 14; Brig. Gen. Robert Alexander to August 10; Brig. Gen. William S. Scott to October 24; Maj. Gen. John E. McMahon to November 7, and Brig. Gen. Eli Cole to November 11.

The division was known as the "Sunset Division," and had as its insignia a setting sun in red, blue and gold.

The following organizations composed the division: 161st, 162nd, 163rd and 164th infantry; 146th, 147th and 148th Machine Gun Battalions; 146th, 147th and 148th Field Artillery; 116th Trench Mortar Battery; 116th Engineers; 116th Field Signal Battalion; 116th Train Headquarters and Military Police; 116th Ammunition Train; 116th Supply Train, and the 116th Sanitary Train, comprising the 161st, 162nd, 163rd and 164th Field Hospitals and Ambulance Companies.

History of the Ninety-First Division

The New Englander may sing the praises of the Yankee Division, others sound the plaudits of the First and Second, and still others or virtually every organization of the American Army. The far Westerner hears these without protest—he is a fair-minded person and willing to see credit go where credit is due. But down in his heart he knows who it was who won the war—the Ninety-First Division.

And, though sectional pride undoubtedly enters into this belief to a certain extent, it is by no means a mere fancy. The Regular Army man—who is an adherent of no state except in that he is a citizen of all—will tell you that few were the organizations which won more respect from friend and foe alike than that indomitable "Wild West Division"— Washington's Own.

Although the Ninety-First saw but two brief months of actual fighting it piled up so memorable a record in that brief time that embryonic historians breathed a sigh of relief when the armistice was signed—they knew it had come just in time; had it been the least

bit delayed the Ninety-First would have made so much history that they couldn't possibly have completed writing it, even by working in eight hours relays, in their natural lifetime.

For, though many divisions were lucky enough to reach France months earlier than the Ninety-First, and therefore fought longer, none fought harder.

The Ninety-First's stay in the trenches was brief—but not so brief as to keep it from being a watchword at General Headquarters that "if you want a bunch that just doesn't know enough to quit fighting, there's the Wild West Division."

The Ninety-First was organized at Camp Lewis on August 25, 1917. The majority of its officers were from Washington, California and Oregon, while the enlisted personnel was drawn from Washington, California, Oregon, Utah, Idaho, Nevada, Montana and Alaska. Great material that—the sons of sturdy pioneers and no less sturdy than their sires.

The division trained through long and arduous months, finally beginning to leave Camp Lewis for the East on June 19, 1918. The organizations went by way of Camps Merritt and Mills to England and then to France, where the last unit arrived July 26—a record passage as the troop ship movement had not begun until July 6.

The entire division, with the exception of its artillery brigade, was transferred to the Eighth Training Area for its final polishing up before going into the trenches. The gunners went to the famous French Artillery School at Clermont-Ferrand.

These days of training were the hardest that the division had seen—here they had been training for months to go overseas, and now that they had arrived it was more training. Gloomy days these, sticking dummies when they felt they should have been using their bayonets on Germans, but finally they passed —as even the gloomiest days will—and on September 6 the division got its long anticipated orders to leave the training area and proceed to the front.

The Ninety-First got its first taste of battle five days later when it was used as reserve in the reduction of the St. Mihiel salient the first all-American battle of the world war, and by far the greatest engagement that Yankee trops had ever taken part in up to that time. It made Gettysburg look like a mere skirmish in comparison, and the entire Spanish-American war was as but an incipient riot to St. Mihiel.

Five hundred and fifty thousand Americans were engaged in this battle as against one hundred thousand on the Northern side in the battle of Gettysburg. The artillery at St. Mihiel fired more than one million shells in four hours, the greatest concentration of artillery fire recorded in history.

The St. Mihiel offensive was soon over, however and on September 14, the Ninety-First was tranferred to an area northwest of Verdun, where, beginning September 26, it took an active part in the Meuse-Argonne drive the greatest battle in history in which Americans fought and pushed forward until October 6, advancing all the way from west of Avecourt to north of Gesnes. One brigade of infantry remained in the line with the First Division until October 16, but the rest of the Wild West men moved to the Nattencourt area.

On October 19 the division passed out of American command to the leadership of Albert, King of the Belgians, and it was under him that it completed its campaign.

The division went into the front line in Belgium on October 31, and for four days forged ahead in the Lys-Scheldt offensive west of the Escaut, or Scheldt river, in the immediate vicinity of Audehrade.

Withdrawing on the 4th for reorganization, the division returned to the same offensive on November 10, on the east side of the Escaut, where it was steadily gaining ground when the orders came the next day to cease firing on account of the armistice.

That ended the Ninety-First's actual fighting, of course, but eleven days later the division was to take part in an event of almost as great interest as the battles in which it fought. This was on November 22, when it participated in the ceremony in connection with the entrance into the city of Brussels, of the King and Queen of the Belgians a great capitol coming to its own again after four years under the tyrants' yoke.

The following month the division began to move back to the Le Mans area where it remained until March when embarkation for the states commenced.

Before mid-summer the division had demobilized and all that remained of it was the glorious memory of its splendid achievements.

If any thing further need be said to prove the valor of the Ninety-First, it may be cited that its men won four Congressional Medals of Honor, 143 Distinguished Service Crosses and one oak-leaf cluster. As the division spent only about twenty-nine days in actual fighting, this means that more than five men were decorated for every day in the trenches.

Such records can be made, however, only at a price and the Ninety-First paid heavily in blood for its achievements.

To summarize, the division advanced a total of thirty-four kilometers against resistance, captured 2412 prisoners and lost 1414 killed and 4364 wounded.

The division's insignia was a green fir

tree, being typical of the Far West, the home of the division, and also, being evergreen, it was emblematical of the state of readiness of each unit in the organization.

The following officers commanded the division from the date of the inception to the time of the armistice: Maj. Gen. Harry A. Greene, August 25 to November 24, 1917; Brig. Gen. James A. Irons, November 24, to December 23, 1917; Brig. Gen. Frederick S. Foltz, December 23, 1917, to March 2, 1918; Maj. Gen. Harry A. Greene March 2, 1918, to June 19, 1918; Brig. Gen. Frederick S. Foltz, June 19, to August 31, 1918; and Maj. Gen. William H. Johnston, August 31, to November 11. The following organizations comprised the Division: the 181st Infantry Brigade, consisting of the 361st and 362nd Infantry; the 182nd Infantry Brigade consisting of the 363rd and 364th Infantry; the 346th, 347th and 348th Machine Gun Battalions; the 166th Artillery Brigade, comprising the 346th, 347th and 348th Field Artillery; and the 316th Trench Mortar Battery; the 316th Engineers; the 316th Field Signal Battalion; the 316th Train Headquarters Military Police; the 316th Supply and Ammunition Trains; and the 316th Sanitary Train, consisting of the 361st, 362nd, 363rd and 364th Ambulance companies and Field Hospitals.

History of the Eighth Division

Some American soldiers hated the Germans because they believed they were a world menace; some because of the Belgian atrocities or U-boat outrages; some because, like Kipling's Black Tyrone, they had "seen their dead"—but members of the Eighth Division had, and still have, a reason all their own. They hate the Germans, with a deep, undying natred, because of the eleventh of November.

For the war was literally "pulled from under" the Eighth. Some divisions had just arrived when the armistice was signed and some had not even received their orders to leave this country, but the Eighth was actually crossing the ocean when peace came. Some of its men had arrived in France a few days before and some were still in America, but the great majority were on the high seas when the fighting ended, and, because of this, they'll never forgive the Germans.

While officially organized December 17, 1917, some of its units were then unborn and the rest were scattered to the four corners of the country.

The 12th Infantry and its offshoot, the 62nd were then at the Presidio of San Francisco, and proceeded to Camp Fremont, near Palo Alto, where they found the 8th and 13th Infantry, and for some time these four regiments constituted the entire division.

Early in 1918 the 2nd, 81st and 83rd Field Artillery joined them at the California camp. The latter two organizations had been cavalry regiments, converted overnight. The 22nd, 23rd and 24th Machine Gun Battalions were organized out of men drafted from the infantry regiments, whose places were taken by recruits. In all this shifting it was, of course, necessary to draw on other divisions, and the 91st, then forming at Camp Lewis, furnished a number, so many Washingtonians served in the Eighth.

Before the spring of 1918, the Division was being built up rapidly. Hardly a day passed that some new organization did not come into being. The 8th Train Headquarters and Military Police, the 8th Sanitary Train, the 8th Motor Supply Train, the 320th Field Signal Battalion, the 50th Bakery Company, the 319th Engineers and Train, the 8th Trench Mortar Pattery and the 8th Mobile Ordnance Repair Shop—piece by piece they were added to the organization until finally it reached its allotted strength.

Col. Elmore F. Taggart was the first Division commander. He was succeeded by Colonel Van Densen, who in turn was supplanted by Brig. Gen. Joseph D. Leitch, Maj. Gen. John F. Morrison, now in charge of Camp Lewis, took command, but he was soon transferred to command the Western Department, and General Leitch came back until Maj. Gen. William S. Graves took his place. Maj. Gen. Eli A. Holmick later supplanted General Graves.

In August, 1918, the Division was just preparing to go overseas when orders were received to transfer General Graves, then in command, a part of his staff, about 100 other officers and 5000 men to Siberia. This meant that weeks must be spent in filling the vacancies thus caused.

The 319th Engineers, however, had been kept intact, and in September they were ordered overseas. They started immediately and were soon in France, where they remained until recently. They never rejoined their division.

On October 1, 1918, the Division was again ready to go overseas, but the influenza epidemic broke out and again delayed them. However, on the 18th movement eastward finally began, and the entire organization was soon assembled at Camp Mills, N. Y.

Embarkation began at Hoboken, N. J., on October 30. However, the artillery brigade, the Trench Mortar Battery, the 8th Infantry and certain headquarters units were the only organizations to get overseas. The rest were either at sea when the armistice was signed, and ordered back immediately, or else they were still in this country.

The 8th infantry is one of the few regiments still overseas. It is in Silesia, Germany. The rest of the units that went abroad have since been returned, and most of them demobilized, as the Eighth will not be continued as a permanent division of the regular army.

Two insignia were adopted for the Eighth Division—one a dark blue shield with a silver figure "8", through which a gold arrow passes upward, and the other a black Indian head in a red c'rcle outlined with blue. The latter insignia was disapproved, however, because of its similarity to the Second's.

Because the Eighth was organized at Camp Fremont, which was named after Gen. John F. Fremont, known as "the pathfinder of the west," it was called the "Pathfinder Division."

History of the Thirteenth Division

In compliance with a letter from The Adjutant General of the Army, dated July 10, 1918, the Thirteenth Division was organized at Camp Lewis, American Lake, Washington. The and 44th Regular Army Infantry regi-1st ments were already stationed at Camp Lewis and a certain number of non-commissioned officers and enlisted men were transferred to form the nucleus of the 75th and 76th Infantry Regiments. The personnel of the Division consisted mostly of the selective service quotas of August and September. Intensive training was begun immediately and by the 1st of November the Division was equipped and ready for overseas service. On January 19, 1919, orders were issued for the demobilization of the division and in the early part of March all commissioned and enlisted personnel except those belonging to the regular establishment had been discharged or transferred.

Major General Joseph D. Leitch was the Com-

manding General of this Division. The shoulder insignia is a disc of blue cloth on which is superimposed a red horse shoe with the opening to the top. In this opening is a figure of a black cat and underneath the figure are numerals 13 in white block figures.

This Division consisted of the following organizations: 13th Division Headquarters Troop; 25th Infantry Brigade; 1st Infantry; 75th Infantry; 38th Machine Gun Battalion; 26th Infantry Brigade; 44th Infantry; 76th Infantry; 39th Machine Gun Battalion; 13th Field Artillery Brigade; 37th Field Artillery; 38th Field Artillery; 39th Field Artillery; 213th Engineer Regiment and Train; 213th Field Signal Battalion; 13th Train Headquarters and Military Police; 13th Supply Train; 13th Trench Mortar Pattery; 13th Ammunition Train; 13th Sanitary Train, consisting of the 249th, 250th, 251st and 252nd Field Hospitals and Ambulance companies.


Student Army Training Camps

More than fifty men from Kittitas County received military, technical and collegiate training at the Student Army Training Camps at Seattle and Pullman, Washington, which were organized on October 1, 1918, when the cantonments were filled to overflowing and the necessity arose for the provision of added facilities for training men. Jay A. Whitfield of Filensburg was assistant educational director of these camps for the Northwest.

Men who enlisted for the course of training at either of these schools were given 42 hours each week in straight collegiate work and 14 hours per week in military training; they were under strict federal control and were subject to service at the front after graduation, or wherever their services were needed.

The inducted men who were sent to these institutions did no collegiate work but were given technical or mechanical training and were also subject to active service after graduation.

The signature of the armistice caused the discharge of all the men in the middle of December, 1918, but had the war continued the men between the ages of 18 and 19 would have been graduated on June 1, 1919; those between 19 and 20, graduated on April 1, 1919; and those over 20, on January 1, 1919.

Machine Gun Company, Third Washington Infantry

The Machine Gun Company, Third Washington, Infantry, wrs originally organized at the outbreak of the war as a Home Guard organization to take the place of Troop A, Washington Cavalry, when that organization should be called into service. From the home guards it developed into the Second Separate Company, Washington State Guards and in June of 1918 into the Machine Gun Company, Third Infantry Regiment, National Guard of Washington.

The Third Washington was one of the three National Guard regiments organized after the original national guard divisions were completed, to be recognized and accepted by the war department. The regiment spent two weeks at American Lake in September, 1918, where it was drilled under supervision of regular army cfficers. The adjutant general's office of the state expected the regiment to be called into federal service as soon as the 13th division was moved from Camp Lewis, which would have been in the winter of 1918. Over 90 men from the company at different times during the war enlisted in branches of the army or navy.

First Call for Drill

The first call for drill of the home guards was issued on March 22, 1917, just before the country's actual entry into war. The first drill was beld a week later with 50 men in attendance. Capt. A. L. B. Davies, U. S. army retired, conducted the drill and was assisted by officers and non-commissioned officers of Troop A. On April 5th, with the outbreak of war the drill attendance mounted to over 200.

On May 5th, 1917, the home guards were dividel into provisional troops; E. J. Merryman was elected captain, F. M. Lash, first lieutenant and Joseph Steiner, second lieutenant of Troop A, and O. E. Draper, captain, with B. Apple first lieutenant and L. D. Sparks, second lieutenant of Troop B. A regular recruiting campaign was inaugurated and hundreds of men obtained elementary instructions in these two organizations.

Under instructions from the adjutant general's office on July 23, 1917, F. M. Lash was appointed acting captain of a provisional military company to be recruited to 100 men at once. This company replaced the home guards and the men had to enlist under provisions largely similar to the national guard enlistments except that the first enlistment blanks provided for service in the state only. At this time there was general difficulty all over the Northwest with the Industrial Workers of the World and it was expected the state guards would be called upon for that class of work.

Officers Are Commissioned

On August 27th, following examinations officers were commissioned for the company, which was then designated the Second Separate Company, Washington State Guards, as follows: F. M Lash, Captain; Wayne Murray, First Lieutenant, and John Sorenson, Second Lieutenant. The following non-commissioned officers were named: Sergeants, Jay A. Whitfield, J. C. Kaynor, Guy C. Williams, S. S. Nesbit, Ralph Cleman, H. C. Bench and Harold Kreidel; Corporals, C. C. McGranahan, Frank Schorman, V. W. Hiddleson, Carl H. Bunch, Dan W. Spaulding, L. C. Munz and Alfred Kleinberg.

The company drilled on an average of twice a week at this time and made rapid progress. As the early contingents of draft men were sent to Camp Lewis the company joined with other civic bodies in paying them honor.

Col. W. E. McClure, commanding the Third Washington Infantry, inspected the company cu October 9th and declared it was making excellent progress.

On November 21, 1917, the commissions of the temporary officers of the company were made permanent.

On November 23, 1917, the company gave its first military ball which was a decided success in every way.

On November 26th, Sergeant J. C. Kaynor of the Second Company, was appointed Regimental Color Sergeant.

On December 10, 1917, Lieut. Col. W. L. Lemon, acting commander of the first battalion conducted an inspection at which the company had 80 men in line.

On January 23, 1918, Capt. F. M. Lash, who left the city was transferred to one of the Seattle companies and Licut. Wayne Murray became commander of the company.

Prepare For Federalization

In January orders were issued to prepare the regiment for federalization and new oaths of enlistment had to be taken. At this time the men took the same oath of enlistment as men entering any national guard regiment, placing the men as individuals and the regiment as a unit subject to federal call at any time.

On February 12, 1918, Regimental Color Sergeant J. C. Kaynor was commissioned first lieutenant and appointed adjutant of the first battalion.

On March 19, 1918, Wayne Murray was commissioned captain and John Sorenson first lieutenant. On April 5th Corporal C. C. McGranahan was commissioned second lieutenant.

On June 11, 1918, the company's designation was changed to Machine Gun company, Third Washington Infantry, with officers the same except that Lieut. J. C. Kaynor was assigned to the company as senior lieutenant.

On July 16th Col. Albert S. Cummins of the regular army inspected the company for muster into the federal service. The company passed a creditable inspection.

On September 15, 1918, the company left for Camp George D. Robertson, Murray Station, American Lake, Washington, the national guard camp. Regular army officers were assigned to the regiment for instruction purposes and the regiment put through an intensive course of instructions for two weeks. During this camp the first outbreak of influenza in the Northwest struck the Ellensburg company and at one time 60 per cent of the company were on sick roll. Under the bracing air at the lake, the men quickly recovered and made a creditable showing.

McGranahan and Studebaker Leave

During this camp Lieut. C. C. McGranahan and Private Herbert E. Studebaker were desigrated to attend the Officers Training Camp at Camp Pike, Arkansas, and left the national guard to attend.

On October 16th it was announced that the department had given official federal recognition to the regiment, as of September 30th, 1918, and federal equipment for the entire regiment was immediately ordered. Before any large portion of this had arrived the armistice vas signed.

In the spring of 1919 the old officers of the company resigned and Lieut. Smith F. Reavis, an overseas veteran of old Troop A was commissioned captain. Sergeants Leslie T. Wilson and Warren T. Bowman of the company and Lieut. Alfred Donahue of the National Army were commissioned lieutenants. These officers served during the second camp at American Lake in July, 1919. Later Capt. Reavis resigned and in November, 1919, Capt. Tony J Bucklin, Signal Corps officers of the famous Fourth Division and a veteran of the biggest battles of the war was commissioned captain. Complete federal equipment including Browning machine guns were received. It is expected that the company however will be turned into a cavalry machine gun troop in the new cavalry squadron to be organized by the National Guard of Washington.



Pershing's Farewell Letter

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American Expeditionary Forces,

France, February 28, 1919.

General Orders, No. 38-A.

MY FELLOW SOLDIERS:

Now that your service with the American Expeditionary Forces is about to terminate, I can not let you go without a personal word. At the call to arms, the patriotic young manhood of America eagerly responded and became the formidable army whose decisive victories testify to its efficiency and its valor. With the support of the nation firmly united to defend the cause of liberty, our army has executed the will of the people with resolute purpose. Our democracy has been tested, and the forces of autocracy have been defeated. To the glory of the citizensoldier our troops have faithfully fulfilled their trust, and in a succession of brilliant offensives have overcome the menace to our civilization.

As an individual, your part in the world war has been an important one in the sumtotal of our achievements. Whether keeping lonely vigil in the trenches, or gallantly storming the enemy's stronghold; whether enduring monotonous drudgery at the rear, or sustaining the fighting line at the front, each has bravely and efficiently played his part. By willing sacrifice of personal rights; by cheerful endurance of hardship and privation; by vigor, strength and indomitable will, made effective through organization and cordial cooperation, you inspired the war-worn Allies with new life and turned the tide of threatened defeat into overwhelming victory.

With a consecrated devotion to duty and a will to conquer, you have loyally served your country. By your exemplary conduct a standard has been established and maintained never before attained by any army. With mind and body as clean and strong as the decisive blows you delivered against the foe, you are soon to return to the pursuits of peace. In leaving the scenes of your victories, may I ask that you carry home your high ideals and continue to live as you have served—an honor to the principles for which you have fought and to the fallen comrades you leave behind.

It is with pride in our success that I extend to you my sincere thanks for your splendid service to the army and to the nation.



THE NAVY

Approximately 160 men from Kittitas county served in the United States Navy during the war in various capacities, chiefly on Submarine chasers, transports and in the merchant marine, and a few serving at the Naval Training Station at Seattle, Wash. Some of the men made as many as fifteen round trips to France on transports, and others in the merchant marine made voyages to nearly every part of the globe. The Sub-chasers were used mainly as Pacific and Atlantic coast patrol.

Discharge of the boys in the Navy did not begin for a considerable period after the order was issued to demobilize the soldiers, and many of them were in the service over two years.

Although no American fleet engaged in actual battle with enemy battle craft during the World War, the navy was intensely engaged throughout the period of America's participation, in combatting the menace of the German under-sea boat and in insuring safe convoy of troop-laden transports to France. American warships, including hundreds of small, swift Submarine chasers, cooperated with the British sea forces and were successful in making a failure of the enemy's effort to win the war by means of sinking Allied shipping. The tonnage destroyed by the German submarines steadily decreased until it was at the minimum during the last month preceding the signature of the armistice, on November 11, 1918. 1. 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HOME SERVICE

The Red Cross

The people of Kittitas County may well feel proud of the work accomplished by the Kittitas County Chapter of the American Red Cross. Faithful work by loyal officers and members, backed by hearty and unwavering support throughout the county gave the Chapter a reputation for efficiency, thoroughness and effectiveness.

At the time of the outbreak of hostilities between the United States and Germany there was no Red Cross organization whatever in Kittitas county. Soon thereafter the Seattle Chapter was organized, and presently the local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution organized an auxiliary to the Seattle Chapter under the leadership of Mrs. John B. Davidson, its regent, which served in a highly commendable manner until the organization of the Kittitas County Chapter of the Red Cross was effected, on July 3, when it was merged with the Red Cross, turning over 500 members and \$627. The new Chapter therefore began its existence with a large membership.

Upon the organization of the Chapter on July 3, 1917, the following officers were elected: Ralph Kauffman, Chairman; Mrs. Henry Kleinberg, Vice-Chairman; Miss Jean Stewart, Secretary, and J. C. Sterling, Treasurer. Also a board of managers, consisting of Harry S. Elwood, Mrs. Katherine Murray, J. N. O Thomson, Rev. F. E. Billington and Mrs. Charles H. Dunning. Mrs. J. C. Hubbell succeeded Mrs. Kleinberg as vice-chairman, and Mrs. W. A. Taylor succeeded Miss Jean Stewart, otherwise the original officers continued to serve throughout.

Branches

Soon after the organization of the County Chapter, branches were organized at Cle Elum, Roslyn, Ronald, Beekman and Easton. John A. Balmer was continuously chairman of the Cle Elum branch; Mrs. Allie Mansfield, Mrs. Wilcox and Mrs. R. R. Short each served as vice-chairman; Frank Carpenter was treasurer.

At Roslyn, Mrs. L. Tasche was the first chairman, later succeeded by Mrs. Tillie Knowles. Mrs. Thos. Eaden was secretary; John E. Morgan, vice-chairman, and Mrs. Wilmot G. Whitfield was treasurer.

Mrs. Kathryn Shaw was head of the Ronald-Beekman branch, and Mrs. A. O. Johnson, chairman at Easton. These various branches were in active operation during the time of the war and for some months after. All their members have done admirable work for the Red Cross.

Since the Chapter organized there have been sold memberships of all kinds aggregating 8,264, yielding \$8,652.00. Red Cross receipts within the jurisdiction of the Chapter from organization until October 1, 1919, were as follows:

Of this sum \$46,074.98 was turned over to General Headquarters, Red Cross, leaving \$36,-789.48 available for Chapter needs, which was used chiefly for the purchase of supplies and material, amounting to \$24,880.74, and for the Canteen, on which was expended \$2,692.38. Later surplus funds amounting to \$3,921.17 were donated to Red Cross headquarters.

\$23,800 was spent in the purchase of material for surgical dressing, knitted wear, hospital garments and hospital supplies, refugee garments for women and children, and many other articles for the comfort of the soldiers and sailors and for the inhabitants of devastated portions of Europe. These supplies filled nearly 200 large packing cases, and the value of the products when they left the various work rooms is estimated at \$45,000. Mrs. W. A. Taylor was chairman of the Packing and Sh'pping Committee, assisted by Mrs. Harry L. Anderson and Mrs. Chas. H. Dunning.

Working Committees

The surgical dressing department was supervised by Mrs. J. C. McCauley from the beginning of the work until the work ceased in February, 1919.

The knitting work and hospital and refugee garment department was under the direction of Mrs. Charles H. Dunning, who gave to the work almost her undivided attention for over two years, and was the only person in the county to win a medal for having done 2400 hours work for the Red Cross. On the committee working with her were Mrs. J. P. Munson, Mrs. C. W. Johnsone, and Mrs. Ed Crane. Mrs. John E. Morgan was chairman of the knitting committee at Roslyn, assisted by Mrs. George Temperly and Mrs. George Prier. Mrs. B. L. Titus was chairman of the sewing committee in Ellensburg, her assistants being Mrs. K. O. Kohler, Mrs. C. W. Stewart, Mrs. R. F. Johnson and Mrs. C. W. Nicholson. Of the sewing committee at Cle Elum, Mrs. J. C. Beeson was chairman.

Hundreds of patriotic women in Kittitas county were enlisted in this work, and their faithfulness and efficiency can be judged not only from a consideration of the quantity of the output, but also from the fact that its quality has invariably met all the rigid inspection requirements in force at Division and National Headquarters.

Red Cross Drives

Judge John B. Davidson acted as chairman of both Red Cross drives, Henry Kleinberg being manager of the First and Harry W. Hale of the Second. The collections on account of the pledges secured were made by and through the banks of the county, to whom much credit is due for the success of the drives.

The first drive for memberships was under the management of Newton Henton, the second under that of F. E. Craig. Both were successfut, the second despite the prevalance of influenza at the time.

The Chapter made three separate drives for used clothing to be sent to Europe, all of which were successful. They were managed by A. L. Kreidel and between eight and nine tons of material was collected.

Linen Shower

Mrs. J. C. Hubbell, in the fall of 1918, managed a linen shower which netted bed and toilet linen to the value of \$1,000 which was sent to France.

Shells for Gas Masks

When the government issued a call stating its need for fruit pits and nut shells to be used in the manufacture of gas masks, J. N. O. Thomson of Ellensburg undertook the task of collecting the material. On October 31, 1918, Mr. Thomson shipped a ton of the shells and pits to Long Island, N. Y. Mr. Thomson also collected a quantity of old gold and silver metal, the sale of which netted a considerable sum.

Christmas Packages

Just prior to Christmas, 1917, the women of the Chapter put up and sent to Headquarters some 250 Christmas boxes for the soldiers, and in November, 1918, a Chapter committee headed by Mrs. J. H. McDaniels, supervised the packing and shipping of about 600 Christmas packages to American soldiers in France.

Pledges

Early in 1919 it became evident that the Chapter's needs would demand more funds than had been derived from ordinary sources of revenue. Accordingly a committee under the chairmanship of Beaumont Apple solicited pledges amounting to \$11,000, which was paid in installments throughout the ensuing year, again through the banks, keeping the Chapter's treasury in a flourishing condition. Much money was derived through the two years from public entertainments and not a little from unsolicited donations. All the e totaled close to \$8,000.

Emergency Hospital

At the outbreak of the influenza epidemic, in the fall of 1918, the officials of the Chapter were asked by the authorities of Ellensburg and the county to organize and operate an emergency hospital in Ellensburg, to be conducted at the joint expense of the Chapter, the city and the county. Accordingly a building was obtained and quickly opened for the reception of patients. It remained in operation for five weeks with a full corps of nurses and other attendants, during which time about 100 patients were treated and the mortality rate was remarkably low. The enterprise was in every sense a success, and no doubt many lives were saved; and it can be truly said that the successful carrying out of the hospital enterprise is in itself sufficient justification for the organization of the Chapter.

Civilian Relief

In the line of Civilian Relief the Chapter has done considerable work and has been of much assistance to discharged soldiers and sailors, and to the families of those dependent upon them. Financial aid has been extended to discharged service men in straightened circumstances. Much has been done in the way of bringing about payment of delayed allotments and allowances, procuring the bonus to which men in the service were entitled, as well as travel pay; settlement of claims for disability incurred while in the service, and adjusting matters relative to government insurance.

The Red Cross Canteen

Another branch of the service, in which the Red Cross Chapter takes pride has been the Canteen at Ellensburg. It was organized in the summer of 1918, but its work was very limited for some months while the movement of troops was toward the Atlantic coast. After the armistice was signed, however, and the boys began coming back to Camp Lewis for demobilization, the Canteen became a very busy organization, and by reason or the extraordinary service performed has become famous throughout the United States.

A location was secured near the Northern Pacific station and fully equipped. When sufficient notice was received of the approach of troops a hot meal was always served the men, a number of workers accompanying the train to Cle Elum or Easton, serving the men enroute. These meals were habitually substantial, and were served to 7,800 men; cold lunches were served to about 3,000. As many as 1,000 troops have been fed in one day. In addition to these meals and lunches, hot and cold drinks, tobacco, ice cream, etc., were served many times when meals or hot lunches were not required.

The Canteen officers have received many letters of appreciation from the officers and men whom they have served. It is safe to say that no other Canteen in the United States, considering the size of the community, has done any more elaborate or efficient work than this, and too much praise cannot be given the workers who devoted so much time and

D. A. R. Auxilliary to the Red Cross

Immediately following the declaration of war with Germany, and pending the organization of the American Red Cross in Kittitas county, the Ellensburg D. A. R. organized and formed an Auxiliary to the Red Cross, dividing the city of Ellensburg and lower valley into districts, each district forming a round-table for making Red Cross supplies and comfort kits for soldiers and sailors. There were 25 round tables.

Officers of the Auxiliary were Mrs. John B. Davidson, chairman; Mrs. Blake Beatty, secretary, and Mrs. J. H. McDaniels, treasurer. An executive board consisted of the officers of the D.A.R.—Mrs. John B. Davidson, regent; Mrs. W. E. Wilson, vice-regent; Mrs. H. S. Elwood, registrar, and Mrs. Blake Beatty, secretary-treasurer.

Outfitted Troop A

The first activity of the organization was the outfitting of every member of Troop A, Ellensburg's troop of cavalry, with a comfort kit. For equipping the entire crew of the U. S. Destroyer "Monohan," \$75 was provided, and \$30 for material for working for the Soldiers and Sailors Club. Mrs. Charles H. Dunning was in charge of this work, with Mrs. David Ramsay and Mrs. T. A. Sager in charge of the work of knitting for the "Monohan." Besides these activities the Auxiliary shipped hospital supplies to the Red Cross offices in Seattle.

Active work continued until the organization of the Kittitas County Chapter of the American Red Cross, on July 16, 1917, when the Auxiliary was merged with it, turning over a fund of \$627 and 500 members. Auxiliary officers were instrumental in obtaining the Red Cross Chapter in this county.



HOME SERVICE ORGANIZATIONS

Not to be ignored in a complete history of those in Kittitas County who assisted in winning the World War are the various organizations which labored constantly and tirelessly, and gave unsparingly of both their efforts and finances whenever called upon, which was from the declaration of war until long after the actual war was ended.

Demands were constant, not only for money but for numerous persons to solicit it. The government needed funds with which to carry on its work and launched the four Liberty Loan drives and the Victory Loan drive. It sold millions in War Savings and Thrift Stamps. The American Red Cross sent in call after call for funds in order that its work of mercy would not be hampered. Various welfare organizations, aiding in maintaining the morale of Uncle Sam's soldiers at home and overseas, had to be supported. Insidious traitors menacing the work of the government had to be combatted.

Kittitas County Draft Board

Draft Board which The Kittitas County handled a total registration of 4,945 men under the selective service act and which sent nearly 700 men to camp consisted of Howard Garrison, chairman, Walter Damerow, secretary and Dr. H. J. Felch, medical officer. These men spent hours of time every day for month after month carrying out the provisions of the selective service act in this county and were assisted by scores of men and women who volunteered their services for registration work, medical men who assisted in conducting the physical examination of the men and lawyers who assisted in making out the questionaires.

For all the registrations, men and women volunteered their time without taking one cent of pay and in many cases homes were offered free of charge for the registration places.

The first registration for men under the selective service law was on June 5, 1917, when every man between 21 and 31 years of age in the country was asked to register. In Kittitas county 1,764 men registered that day. In June and August of 1918 the young men who had reached their 21st birthday after June 5, 1917, registered. The total in this class in Kittitas county was 123.

On September 12, 1918, every man between the ages of 18 and 45, who had not registered on any of the previous registration days was called upon to register. The total in Kittitas county to register that day was 3,058, making a grand total registration for the county of 4,945.

Figures compiled by the war department credit Kittitas county with having 454 sent by the Kittlias County Board accepted for the army at camp.

A total of 359 were accepted for general service, 38 for general service with remediable defects; 73 for limited service and 199 Kittitas county men were disqualified for service because of physical defects.

Of those classified, 593 Kittitas county men were exempted because of dependencies; 65 were granted agricultural exemptions and 17 industrial exemptions.

Draft men from Kittitas county largely served with the famous 91st, or Wild West division, although some served in nearly every division on the battle line in Europe.

Registration days passed quietly in Kittitas county. There was not the slightest disturbance at any time. There were few deserters, although included in the number drafted from this county were men from every nation in Europe, and men speaking a score or more of languages. Patriotism was high and as a rule the great foreign born population in the mining fields of the county responded just as cheerfully as did the pure Americanborn population in the lower valley.

The first medical advisory board consisted of Drs. W. G. Wimberley, J. A. Mahan and E. Z. Kreidel, and when Dr. Wimberly moved from the county Dr. R. R. Pinckard took his place on the board.

The legal advisory board consisted of Judge Ralph Kauffman, C. R. Hovey and Arthur Mc-Guire, assisted by every lawyer in the county. Prosecuting Attorney McGuire also was government appeal agent for the county. Dr. J. C. McCauley of Ellensburg was the medical member of the district board which passed on appeals and industrial exemption claims.

Council of Defense

The first Council of Defense organized in Ellensburg was formed by the grouping together of workers representing every organization working along patriotic lines, to act as a clearing house for all patriotic work. The meeting was called for April 27, 1917, by Beaumont Apple, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce patriotic committee. Mr. Apple was elected chairman of the council.

The ten members of the original council were Beaumont Apple, A. L. B. Davies, J. C. Kaynor, E. K. Brown, Walter G. Damerow, O. E. Draper, Mrs. Harry S. Elwood, Mrs. Thomas Cody, A. C. Spalding, F. A. Kern and Mayor Samuel Kreidel.

This body continued to meet and handle

various problems for several months. In the fall of 1917 with the organization of the State Council of Defense, J. C. Hubbell was appointed by that body as Chairman of the County Council of Defense, which in time took over the supervisory work of all organizations working with the state Council of Defense.

As each new department was started by the State Council of Defense, Chairman Hubbell was called upon to name the various county department chairmen. Mr. Hubbell named J. C. Kaynor as vice-chairman and secretary of the Couny Council of Defense and chairman of the Four Minute Men. Harry W. Hale and C. R. Hadley were named county food directors, A. L. B. Davies in charge of military preparedness, R. B. Wilson as chairman of the fuel division, Linden Mc-Cullough as charman of the Minute Men, Harry B. Averill of Cle Elum in charge of upper county publicity and the Mesdames Harry S. Eiwood, J. A. Mahan, Elizabeth F. Baker and J. B. Davidson in charge of women's work.

The Minute Men

The Minute Men, "The Men Behind the Government," were organized under the direction of the State Council of Delense to gain information relative to any plots, information about suspicious characters, I. W. W.'s and the like, to supply information about men from this vicinity entrusted with important places in army, navy or government work and in general to keep government departments and bureaus supplied with trustworthy information. Later the Minute Men of the State became a division of the American Protective League, organized with the approval and operating under the direction of the United States Department of Justice Bureau of Investigation.

The Minute Men were able to furnish information that led to the arrest of hundreds of dangerous characters in the state. The Kittitas county branch coopercted in every possible way and conducted numerous investigations on orders from government sources, as well as furnishing information that assisted materially in running down many men that were a menace to the country.

Linden McCullough was chairman o? the Minute Men and Beaumont Apple was secretary and manager in charge of all investigation work. Other members of the Minute Men directors in the county were H. A. Greenburg of Cle Elum, John E. Morgan and George Gray of Roslyn, E. H. Turner of Casland, R. F. Adams of South Cle Elum, Guy Williams of Kittitas and Tom Flynn, Phil Adams, Leslie T. Wilson, C. A. Love and F. B. Edes of Ellensburg, and the chairman and vice-chairman of the County Council of Defense.

The Minute Women

One of the most of important and efficient of the organizations which helped win the war, was the Womens' Committee of the State Council of the National Council of Defense, commonly known as the Minute Women.

Thoroughly organized and smoothly operated, the Minute Women gave material assistance in every campaign that was launched in the county during the war.

The organization was sub-divided by school districts throughout the county, each district having its councillor and members, the larger townships of Ellensburg, Cle Elum, Roslyn and Ronald being highly organized with local councillor, captains, lieutenants and sergeants, and the whole organization being under the direction of the County Councillor, Mrs. John B. Davidson.

Mrs. Baker Organizer

On January 28, 1918, Mrs. Elizabeth Baker of Ellensburg was appointed organizer and County Councillor, and organized the women throughout the county; Mrs. John B. Davidson was named councillor for Ellensburg, Mrs. J. C. Hubbell, secretary, and Mrs. C. W. Johnsone, treasurer. Later Mrs. Davidson succeeded Mrs. Baker as county councillor, Mrs. Rodney S. Palmer being appointed councillor for Ellensburg district. Mrs. Corinne E. McKnight was city councillor for Cle Elum, Mrs. Harriet Miller at Roslyn, and Mrs. Neil McGovern and Mrs. Ruth White councillors, respectively, at Ronald.

On May 31, 1918, the Minute Women of the county effected a permanent organization, with the following executive board: Mrs. John B. Davidson, president; Mrs. Rodney S. Palmer, first vice-president; Mrs. Ruth White, second vice-president; Mrs. Leo Stevens, West Side; Mrs. L. C. Hayden, Cle Elum; Mrs. Harriet Miller, Roslyn; Mrs. James Higman, East Side; Mrs. James Kay, South East; Mrs. Dorsey Schnebly, Northeast; Mrs. Katherine Murray, treasurer, and Mrs. J. C. Hubbell, secretary.

Work Was Varied

The work of the Minute Women was varied and constant. Campaign managers of every drive during the war called on them for assistance; they assisted in the Liberty Loan Drives, being given 50 per cent credit in the Victory Loan campaign and 37½ per cent credit for their help in the Fourth Liberty Loan Drive. The Minute Women handled the Christmas, 1918, Red Cross drive practically alone. The United War Work campaign, Y. W. C. A. and Red Cross drives were all greatly aided by them.

They provided speakers at theatres on several occasions; distributed government literature on business economy, food conservation, and food production, etc., as it was issued; and for the upper part of the county obtained and distributed this literature in foreign languages.

A complete census of Kittitas county was made on three occasions, and of Roslyn and Cle Elum twice. The Child Welfare campaign, the weighing and measuring of babies was a big job that was handled by these ladies; in short, this organization was an important factor in practically every work under government control in Kittitas county throughout the war, and following the suspension of war activities, took up the work of Americanization in the county.

The Four Minute Men

The Four Minute Men of the State were organized in the latter part of November and early December of 1917. J. C. Hubbell, chairman of the County Council of Defense named J. C. Kaynor as county chairman of Four Minute Men. Mr. Kaynor also acted as city chairman for Ellensburg and selected H. E. Studebaker as chairman for Cle Elum and Harry L. Brown as city chairman for Roslyn. In the fall of 1918 J. C. Kaynor resigned and Frank N. Graves became county chairman of the Four Minute Men.

The Four Minute Men worked through a state headquarters under the direction of the National organization of Four Minute Men. Their duties were to make four minute talks at theatres and at public gatherings on topics assigned by national headquarters. They assisted materially in the various Liberty Loan drives, Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., National War Work, Thrift Stamps and in a score or more other movements launched by the national government. Among the men who were four minute speakers in Ellensburg were, Linden McCullough, J. H. Morgan, Jay A. Whitfield, Ralph Kauffman, John B. Davidson, F. A. Kern, Seldon Smyser, O. E. Draper, Harry W. Hale, Harry L. Markell, Rev. H. I. Oberholtzer, Rev. W. B. Young, Rev. F. E. Billington, C. R. Hadley, William T. Stephens, C. W. Johnsone and Austin Mires.

The Four Minute Men of Roslyn were Harry L. Brown, chairman, Elroy A. Bannister, Wilmot G. Whitfield, John E. Morgan, Vern Hall, William G. Shaw, J. Servis LaRue, S. B. Reid, James Rees, Andrew Dean, H. M. Smartwood, Charles Lumley, James Nelson and Charles Earton.

H. E. Studebaker resigned as chairman at Cle Elum in the spring of 1918 and was succeeded by J. N. Spicer. The other Four Minute speakers there were J. C. Gleysteen, Walter Steele, J. V. Hoeffler, John A. Balmer and R. A. Wilcox.

Cle Elum Valley Defense League

The Cle Elum Valley Defense League was a patriotic organization which was formed at Cle Elum for the purpose of aiding local and federal government in the proper carrying out of all war time regulations. It sought to stamp out sedition and treason wherever found; to seek out slackers, and to assist all other patriotic organizations and war work campaigns.

H. A. Greenburg of Cle Elum was chairman; the members were John A. Balmer, J. H. Wolcott, Harry B. Averill, R. F. Adams, I. Davis, B. O. Jones, Mr. Doolittle and Chas. Eaden.

Food Administration

The work of the food administrator and his assistants in Kittitas county was of great importance. The enforcement of the many and varied regulations dealing with food conservation and economy demanded administrators of energy, judgment and patriotism, as well as a very large amount of time voluntarily donated.

On January 25, 1918, Claude R. Hadley was appointed Food Administrator for Kittitas county; he served until September, 1918, when he was relieved by Harry W. Hale; Mr. Hale served until his death on February 24, 1919, Mr. Hadley again taking the office. Members of the Food Committee in the county were Ernest DeVine, Kittitas; James Brain and Mrs. James Osborn at Thorp; T. J. Ryan, Easton; Mrs. A. J. Schele, Cle Elum district, and William Shaw, Roslyn-Ronald district.

Groceries, flour mills, restaurants, and bakeries were visited to observe proper obedience of the food regulations regarding sugar and flour; thrashing crews were urged to avoid waste of wheat as far as possible, and a large saving was noted over previous years.

On June 13, 1918, a campaign was launched for the return from every household of all flour in excess of one 49 lb. sack, and from every retail and wholesale establishment all flour in excess of 30 days' supply. The enforcement of this regulation fell upon the county food committee.

The County Minute Women proved of great assistance to the food committee in the distribution of the large amount of literature on food control and conservation which was published by the National Food Committee.

Fuel Administration

R. B. Wilson of Ellensburg was named Fuel Administrator of Kittitas county. His duties consisted of verifying prices and quantities of fuel sold to consumers to insure that yards conformed with regulations of the Federal government.

Soldier's and Sailor's Club

An organization whose efforts were particularly appreciated by service men of the county was the Soldiers and Sailors Club, which worked throughout the war to furnish comfort kits to the men as they entered the service. From its organization to the armistice the club expended \$1,047 for the comfort of the Kittitas county boys, outfitting 402 with comfort kits.

This organization had its beginning in May, 1917, at a small social gathering of 12 ladies at the home of Mrs. John B. Davidson. Each lady present pledged herself to entertain, and to devote the proceeds for a comfort kit fund for outfitting Kittitas county soldiers and sailors, and Mrs. Fred P. Wolff was chosen to act as treasurer. It was named the Kittitas County Naval and Military Relief Society.

Soon after its inception Mrs. J. A. Mahan contributed \$35 from the proceeds of a concert.

Larger Organization Necessary

As the society grew it was deemed best to have a more complete organization, therefore all who had entertained, and a few others were invited to meet at the home of Mrs. Henry Kleinberg early in July, 1917, for the purpose of adopting a constitution. The name was changed to the "Soldiers and Sailors Club," and the following officers electedMrs. J. A. Mahan, president; Mrs. T A. Sager, first vice-president; Mrs. H. S. Elwood, second vice-president; Mrs. O. W. Pautzke, secretary and Mrs. J. B. Moser, treasurer. Later Mrs. Mahan and Mrs. Pautzke resigned, their offices being taken by Mrs. H. S. Elwood and Mrs. George H. Black, respectively.

The purpose of the club was to take the place of the D. A. R. Auxiliary to the Red Cross in taking care of the boys from this county.

Following the suspension of work after the armistice, the club was disbanded and surplus funds were turned over to the Valley Hospital Association.

Officers Were Faithful

It was chiefly due to the untiring efforts of the officers of this organization that the club was very successful.

The members of the following clubs assisted greatly in the work of preparing the kits, and furnishing funds—The Busy Bee Club, Edgemont Sewing Circle, Maryland Women's Club, Episcopal Guild, Thorp Women's Club, Eastern Star Auxiliary, Friday Club, Gallina Club, Presbyterian Aid Society, Kittitas Women's Club, Bridge Club, Thorp Prairie School, Badger Pocket Sunday School, Women's Relief Corps, Mothers' Club and the Young Girls' club. The Red Cross ladies of Ronald sent \$10.00, and the Red Cross at Roslyn contributed \$120.00.

Liberty Loan Drives

It is said that the American army in France turned the tide of the war which was going against the Allies, and made victory possible. In any event, the American army exerted a most tremendous influence on the successful outcome of the war and has received just praise.

Good fighters as the American soldiers undoubtedly proved themselves, their hands would have been tied and a considerable effort been impossible had it not been that the hoppers of war were constantly being replenished with gold; gold with which to buy arms, ammunition, food, clothing and keep up the million and one expenditures incident to the carrying on of war with a powerful enemy.

To raise funds with which to make victory possible, the government was forced to rely on the American people to subscribe to five bond issues, in amounts varying from two to five billions of dollars. The first four, launched during the war, were known as Liberty Loan bonds; the last one, placed on the market in April, 1919, five months after the armistice was signed, was called the Victory Loan.

Money was virtually as necessary as men, and the American people showed their whole-hearted patriotism by the reception they gave the request of the federal government to supply it with funds. Each issue of bonds was over-subscribed by a gratifying amount and by the end of the war there was scarcely a person in the county that did not own at least one of the bonds.

Kittitas county made good in the purchase of bonds, as in every other way during the war. The county failed not once to buy a considerable amount more than its alloted quota.

C. W. Johnsone, vice-president of the Washington National Bank of Ellensburg, was county chairman for the first and second Liberty Loan drives. Of the two other Liberty Loan drives and the Victory Loan, R. Lee Barnes, president of The Farmers Bank of Ellensburg, acted as chairman. O. E. Draper, of the Ellensburg Normal school, was county sales manager for the last four of the drives. For Cle Elum, Frank Carpenter served throughout as chairman of each drive, John E. Morgan of Roslyn also was chairman throughout for that city, and William C. Shaw, of Ronald.

Patriotic citizens assisted faithfully in each drive to make each a success. Hundreds gave a very large amount of their time during each campaign in the work of soliciting.

THE FIRST LIBERTY LOAN CAMPAIGN

The first Liberty Loan bond issue of \$2,000,-000,000 was oversubscribed in the United States by fifty per cent, \$3,000,000,000 in bonds being bought throughout the country. In Kittitas county there was no effort at organization comparable with that in the latter four campaigns. The bonds were on sale in the banks throughout the county, and the quota was considerably oversubscribed with little difficulty. The Boy Scouts were of material assistance.

The quota for Ellensburg in this drive was \$214,000 and subscriptions amounted to \$221,900.

C. W. Johnsone was county chairman of this drive.

SECOND ISSUE

On October 1, 1917, the second Liberty Loan bonds were placed on sale. Kittitas county's quota was \$388,380, but a total of \$500,700 was raised. Ellensburg oversubscribed a quota of \$268,700 by over \$49,000. C. W. Johnsone was county chairman, O. E. Draper, sales manager. Four Minute speakers assisted in the campaign, as did the Boy Scouts of the county. The lower part of the valley was divided into six districts, with captains as follows: Ellensburg, C. W. Johnsone; Nanum, J. N. O. Thomson; Kittitas, B. F. Reed; Thrall, John N. Faust; Cove, A. E. Emerson; Thorp, S. S. Nesbit.

Frank Carpenter, John E. Morgan and William C. Shaw handled the campaign for Cle Elum, Roslyn and Ronald, respectively, assisted by working committees.

THIRD LIBERTY LOAN

Again in the Third Liberty Loan campaign the county "went over the top," subscribing a total of \$463,550, when the quota was but \$274,000. Ellensburg citizens bought \$217,000 worth of bonds, with a quota of \$162,000. The upper section of the county also bought greatly in excess of their quota.

R. Lee Barnes, county chairman, and O. E. Draper, county sales manager, handled the sales in this drive and to their efforts was due in a large measure the success of the campaign in Kittitas county. They were assisted by district captains as follows: Ellensburg, H. L. Markell; Thorp, John N. Faust; Damman and Menashtash, Jack Kelleher; Nanum, J. N. O. Thomson; Kittitas and Badger Pocket, F. A. Kern.

FOURTH LIBERTY LOAN

Kittitas county is also credited with success in the Fourth Liberty Loan campaign. The quota in this issue was much larger than heretofore, \$561,600 being asked of the county. However \$569,350 was subscribed. The city of Ellensburg oversubscribed a quota of \$127,150, buying bonds in the amount of \$149,600. Quota for Cle Elum was \$51,950; subscribed \$58,400. For Roslyn, \$80,000; subscribed \$90,000; Ronald, \$30,000; subscribed \$32,000.

Officers in the drive were R. Lee Barnes, county chairman; H. L. Markell, Ellensburg; Frank Carpenter, Cle Elum; John E. Morgan, Roslyn; William C. Shaw, Ronald; O. E. Draper, sales manager. District captains in the lower valley included H. L. Markell, T. R. Jacobsen, Rev. F. E. Billington, H. W. Higman, Rube Crimp, A. J. Dunnington, John N. Faust.

VICTORY LOAN CAMPAIGN

The war was won, but funds were necessary nevertheless; therefore the Victory Loan bond issue was launched in April, 1919. Kittitas county was allotted a quota of \$442,175. To prove that they were behind the government the people of the county subscribed \$505,400. Ellensburg raised \$117,900, its quota being \$107,-175. Roslyn's quota was \$64,150; amount subscribed \$66,250. Quota for Cle Elum, \$45,650; amount subscribed, \$60,100.

Mr. Barnes was again chairman of this campaign, O. E. Draper being sales manager. The Minute Women of the county earned a great deal of credit for the success of this drive, doing a large amount of solicitation, and distributed government literature to homes throughout the county.

The Y. M. C. A. Drive

In May, 1917, a successful drive was launched in Kittitas county for the purpose of raising a quota of \$1800 to be used by the Young Men's Christian Association in carrying on its war relief work in the army and navy. The Y. M. C. A. was in charge of the educational, religious, physical and recreational work in the American forces and had huts established in practically every camp where American forces were located.

United War Work Campaign

The United War Work Drive, sometimes called the "Seven Sisters' was a campaign for funds for War Relief, launched in November, 1918, in which participated the Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., Knights of Columbus, War Work Community Service, Salvation Army, Jewish Welfare Board, and American Library Board. The drive, which was for a quota of \$24,000, was in charge of County Chairman Charles H. Flummerfelt; S. A. Bartlett was secretary; O. E. Draper, campaign manager; J. C. Kaynor, chairman publicity; Linden McCullough, chairman speaking bureau; J. H. Morgan, boys and girls victory clubs; Mrs. Rodney S. Palmer, director Women's Service. The executive committee consisted of Chas. H. Flummerfelt, chairman; S. A. Bartlett, secretary; H. L. Markell, Y. M. C. A.; Mrs. John B. Davidson, Y. W. C. A.; Phil G. Fitterer, K. of C., A. L. Thrift Campaign

For the purpose of raising funds with which to prosecute the work of winning the war, and to encourage thrift among the American people, the government in June, 1918, placed War Savings Stamps for sale throughout the country. Thrift stamps were sold for 25 cents each, which, with the payment of an additional 12 cents, were exchanged for a War Savings Stamp, which the government agreed to redeem in 1923 for \$5, although the purchaser had invested \$4.12.

C. W. Johnsone of Ellensburg was made chairman of the campaign to sell the stamps in Kittitas county. S. A. Bartlett was secretary, William C. Shaw of Roslyn vice-chairman, and in charge of the sale in the upper section of the county.

A board of directors was chosen, consisting of the three above named officers and H. W. Higman, Kittitas; L. McCullough, Ellensburg; Thomas Walmsley, Roslyn, Frank Carpenter, Cle Elum, and Mrs. Harry S. Elwood, in charge of the work among the women of the country.

The schools throughout the county were organized in the work, each school room in the Ellensburg Normal school, the city high and grade schools of the county being organized into a "War Saving Society" for furtherance of the sale of the stamps.

The National League of Women's Service

An organization that consisted of a comparatively small number of workers, but which has to its credit the performance of a large amount of work along varied lines of war relief was the Ellensburg branch of the National League of Women's Service.

The local branch was organized in May of 1917, with the object, "To promote and standardize the work of women along lines of constructive patriotism; to develop the resources and increase the efficiency of women in meeting their every day responsibilities to Home, to State and Nation; to provide recognized trained groups in the community to co-operate with the Red Cross and other agencies in meeting any calamity; and to render such service to the Army and Navy as might be required."

Under the chairmanship of Mrs. John B. Davidson and assisted by committee leaders Hospital Ward No. 23 at the Base Hospital, Camp Lewis, was taken care of and over \$75 spent on making it comfortable; a table, including chairs, glassware, cover and silver was furnished at the Seattle Soldiers and Sailors Club; \$257 was raised for the adoption of French and Belgian war orphans; in the campaign to re-chicken France, the sum of \$176.88 was realized; fruit was given to service men on troop trains, and three barrels of canned fruit was sent to Ward 23 at the Camp Lewis hospital.

\$600 Was Raised

For material for overseas relief \$27.86 was spent, and a cash contribution of \$20 was sent to the state office of the League in Seattle. And besides the war relief work, the local branch of the league came to the aid of the Cle Elum fire sufferers in June, 1917, and sent them 100 loaves of bread, infants' clothing and a large quantity of bed clothing. In all, over \$600.00 was raised and used during the war.

Although the League did a great deal of service of its own initiation, it also co-operated with other patriotic agencies in their work.

The officers and chairmen of the Ellensburg branch of the league were Mrs. John B. Davidson, chairman; Mrs. R. I. Bolster, secretary; Mrs. Katherine Murray, treasurer; Mrs. Otto Klug, chairman finance; Mrs. J. A. Patchett, chairman food conservation; Mrs. Howard Garrison, chairman agricultural work; Mrs. J. H. McDaniels, chairman Home and Overseas relief; Mrs. F A. Home, general service; Miss Libert and Miss Dorothy Mc-Farlane, Home Economics; Mrs. O. E. Draper, city chairman; Mrs. H. S. Elwood, social welfare; Mrs. George Jenkins, motor division; Miss Anne Sander, the campaign to re-chicken France, and Mrs. O. W. Sinclair, chairman War Orphan campaign.

Under the direction of Mrs. J. A. Patchett, the fruit that was shipped to the hospital at Camp Lewis was picked by a detail of boys, and it was then canned by the domestic science class at the Normal school under Miss McFarlane.

Medals were awarded 12 members of the league for meritorious work.

Roslyn-Ronald War Relief Association

The Roslyn-Ronald War Relief fund and War Relief Committee was the outgrowth of an idea first suggested by Verne Hall, at that time, principal of the Roslyn high school. Mr. Hall at a meeting called to devise ways and means of raising funds for war activities, suggested that a levy be made on all citizens of Roslyn for raising such a fund.

A committee was appointed which decided upon three campaigns. The first was before the five local unions of coal miners in Roslyn and was for the purpose of securing an authorization from these local unions for a check-off of one-half of one per cent of each member's gross pay check.

John E. Morgan and Wilmot G. Whitfield presented the idea to each local, and without opposition secured their support. These five locals reached 90 per cent of the men in Roslyn.

General Subscriptions

The next campaign was conducted to secure monthly subscriptions in general equal to onehalf of one per cent of the income from the business, professional and clerical people of the city. The remarkable feature is that in this campaign not to exceed three or four citizens failed to respond generously and of these three or four there was always some question as to their loyalty.

The third campaign was with the coal operators, asking them for monthly contributions to the fund, which was successful.

This plan went into effect the 1st of De-

cember, 1917, and continued for 13 months, being discontinued on the 31st of December, 1919

A committee was selected to have charge of the disposition of the funds. The committee was composed of one member from each local union of miners making a total of five, and six members selected by other means making a total of eleven members on the committee. Of this committee, Wilmot G. Whitfield served as chairman throughout the entire period. Harry L Brown was elected secretary and served throughout the period. L. R. Nelson was elected treasurer. Mr. Nelson, during the year removed from Roslyn and L. Barnes, chief auditor of the Northwestern Improvement Company in Roslyn, was elected to Mr. Nelson's place in the committee and as treasurer.

Cle Elum-Easton War Relief Association

To meet a peculiarly difficult situation in the upper part of the county when calls were received for contributions for various classes of war relief, citizens of the northern part of Kittitas county inaugurated a system of collections whereby committees placed pledged cards before every person in the district except the Roslyn and Ronald district, obtaining their signature to promise a monthly payment of approximately one per cent of their income and earnings.

As a large percentage of the population of Cle Elum and vicinity were employed in the mines, the system was adopted of deducting from the payroll each month the amount of the pledge of each, thus, with no necessity of making drives, the fund of the association was continuously kept up, and made responses to calls for contributions for war relief exceedingly simple.

Local No. 2682 First to Vote

Local No. 2682, U. M. A., was the first to vote in favor of having this deduction, and three months later Local No. 2512 did likewise

It was not until the last of December, 1917, that a public mass meeting was called and an executive committee elected to handle the funds which were being collected. This committee held its first meeting January 3, 1918, John A. Balmer, then Mayor of Cle Elum, acting as temporary chairman. Officers were elected as follows: N. P. Woods, chairman; Isaac Davis, vice chairman; M. B. Doolittle, secretary, and Herbert E. Studebaker, anditor-treasurer. Besides the officers named above the committee consisted of John A. Balmer, Harry B. Averill, B. O. Jones, W. W. Johnson of Easton, Bruce Cooper, and later when Local No. 2512 got into line, Thomas Willette and Charles Eaden.

On May 13, 1918, Mr. Studebaker resigned and was succeeded by Rev. James K. Stewart.

Everybody Donated

Meetings were held monthly until April 5, 1919, when the need of their labors passed. At the time the Association ceased making collections every person under the jurisidiction of the Association was donating one per cent or more of their earnings.

Total collections amounted to \$10,380.00, which, bezides incidental expenses, was disbursed as follows:

Victory Boy's and Girl's Clubs

In connection with the United War Work Campaign in November, 1918, the Victory Boys' and Girls' Clubs were organized by Prof. John H. Morgan, and were of valuable assistance in the drive. Each member pledged to earn and give \$5.00 to help in the United Drive, the quota for the club being \$655. District chairmen were W. G. Whitfield, Roslyn; G. I. Wilscn, Cle Elum; Lynn Markey, Easton; Glenn Hogue, Thorp; W. H. Thompson, Kittitas; Verne Hall, Ellensburg (for boys) and Miss Mildred Struble, Ellensburg (for girls.)

Community Singing

To Mrs. Eslbeth I. Mahan of Ellensburg is most of the credit due for the development of Community Singing in Ellensburg. Early in 1918 Mrs. Mahan was appointed by Chairman J. C. Hubbell of the Council of Defense to take charge of this work, and under her direction "sings" were held frequently, practically every musician in Ellensburg assisting in leading the public to open its full heart in patriotic music. The singing was Successful to a remarkable degree in promoting civic spirit and friendliness, relieving pent feelings and sustaining courage.

The public entered whole-heartedly into the idea and from the first it was difficult to find an auditorium large enough to hold the crowds that thronged the meeting places. Public singing was enjoyed under Mrs. Mahan's direction from February 12, 1918, to March 21, 1919, the date of the last one held.

A committee was appointed to direct in the work under Mrs. Mahan, composed of Miss Floy Rossman, Normal school work; Miss Mildred Struble, high school; Miss Connie Martin, public schools; Sisters of St. Dominic and H. J. Whitney, Ellensburg churches, and Miss Amelia Mayer.

The Community Singing was later sponsored by the Ellensburg Chamber of Commerce, and a committee appointed to assist Mrs. Mahan composed of Linden McCullough, Prof. George H.Black, Rev. W. B. Young and Frank N. Graves.

Soloists and other leaders in the singing included Mrs. Roy Weaver, Mrs. Fred Hofmann, Mrs. Pierre Bolding, Miss Florence Cook, Mrs. W. B. Young, Mrs. E. E. Wager, Miss Anne Yenney, Miss Dorothy Foster, Miss Helen Fitterer, Miss Marie Fitterer, Miss Floy Filer, Miss Elizabeth Brown, Mrs. J. H. Mundy, Rev. H. I. Oberholtzer, and Normal, High School and Lourdes Academy students.

Accompanists were Miss Laureda Hinman, Miss Gladys Kerrick, Miss Marie Clark, Mrs. A. E. Anderson, Miss Floy Rossman, Miss Clara Burch, Miss Mildred Struble, Mrs. Mahan.

Distribution of Books

Many boys in the service were grateful to Mrs. H. L. Stowell, librarian of the Ellensburg Public Library for reading matter during long evenings. Mrs. Stowell through the library acted as clearing house for books which had been donated for soldiers and sailors, and packed and shipped a very large number of boxes of books and magazines to Camp Lewis ard the U. S. Navy Yard at Bremerton, Wash.

The Evening Record Tobacco Fund

In the fall of 1917 the Evening Record undertook to raise a fund to assist in supplying the overseas soldiers with tobacco. In cooperation with the American Tobacco Co. it was proposed to send hundreds of packages, each package containing a 10 cent can of smoking tobacco, two 10 cent packages of cigarettes, three 5 cent packages of tobacco, etc. The Record had scarcely made announcement of the plan before money began to come in from every direction.

Then the nurses of the city gave a barn dance at the Rink November 14, 1917, and all receipts from this dance were turned over to the tobacco fund. The dance was a huge success and as a result of it \$179.65 was raised which would furnish a week's supply of smokes for over a battalion of soldiers.

Not a week passed but what the money

came in. People visiting Ellensburg from towns far away became interested, went home and raised funds and then in turn sent them to the Record. The Record forwarded the money as fast as it was received to the Overseas Tobacco department of the American Tobacco Company. Then the government refused to allow packages longer to be sent overseas and the fund was discontinued. However the money continued to come in and it in turn was sent to the Red Cross at New York City with instructions that it be used for supplying wounded or convalescent soldiers with "smokes." The total amount received by the Record Tobacco fund was over \$500, which in turn furnished 2000 troops with a tobacco kit. Every cent received went to purchase tobacco, all expenses of the local campaign being donated.
