NEW IN GERMAN RESEARCH

From the Licking County Lantern, Licking County Genealogical Society of Newark, Ohio 4 Nov 1991. via Eastern Nebraska Genealogical Society Roots and Leaves - Spring 1992.

A new source has been discovered which will help many genealogists to find the unknown German places where their ancestors came from. This source is being turned into the BIGGEST DATABASE OF GERMAN EMIGRANTS.

This index includes for example:

- 1 - Deserters from the armies of Prussia (including Baden), Wurttemberg, and Saxony, 1871 - 1918.
- 2 - Young men who did not present themselves to the recruiting office, 1871-1918, and had probably left Germany before, possibly even in their childhood with their parents.
- 3 - Persons who were sought as missing heirs 1871 - 1918, and may have left Germany even decades before.
- 4 - Persons absent from their hometown who were searched for by the authorities, for example for bankruptcy.

The index covers the entire former German Empire, e.e. Prussia (including East- and West-Prussia; Pomerania, Posen, Hanover, Westphalia, and the other Prussian provinces), Alsace-Lorraine, Bavaria, Saxony, Wurttemberg, Baden, Oldenburg, Hesse, and the minor German states. The emigration years range from 1820 through 1918.

What information you shall provide:

If you want to find out whether the German place of origin of your emigrant ancestor is on the file with us, please send his/her full name and approx birth date, occupation and/or denomination, year of emigration or year of earliest appearance abroad, and the same data for all known family members and relatives. Please indicate your knowledge about the German state or Prussian province or origin if available, too.

What we will do for you:

We shall then thoroughly compare your data with the contents of our database. If the place of origin can be found, we shall notify you about the fact and quote a fee to ascertain this place. You may accept this offer or not. There is no obligation. If we cannot find the wanted place immediately, we shall keep your request on file and shall inform you as soon as we are able to detect it in course of extending the database.

There is no risk for you. You pay only for positive results!

QUESTION

C.M. of Huntley, IL writes, "What will be done with all my records and documents concerning the family history after my death? All those documents that I have so carefully recorded in my data files . . . no one in my family is interested enough in genealogy to continue my work . . . yet someone will come along who would appreciate having an ancestor who did research and passed the information along. How or where can I preserve those original documents for that interested descendent?"

ANSWER

I truly hope that every serious genealogist will give thoughtful consideration to this question if he/she has not already done so. And this writer welcomes any additional suggestions from readers.

First of all, using my own materials as an example, a lot of sorting should probably be done. Correspondence that has accumulated over the years (either awaiting replies or being held in case other researchers write) should be labeled as such so that next-of-kin could discard it if need be.

Next, check with a local or state genealogical society in the area where particular families lived, and inquire whether or not they have the ability (or facility) to accept your material for permanent preservation. For example, the Illinois State Genealogical Society does NOT have the facility to accept family histories as such. However, material that was submitted as documentation to substantiate a Prairie Pioneer has been carefully preserved (and even subsequently microfilmed by the Genealogical Society of Utah.) Some persons submitted a tremendous amount of data and that is already available to researchers!

A local genealogical society may accept entire files, but be sure to check it out and determine whether or not their collection is accessible to researchers (microfilmed, indexed, etc.).

Your question referred to "documents". You are probably referring to "copies" of documents. In that case, if your pedigree charts and family group sheets are well documented (that is to say, if each entry refers to a specific document, where and when it was obtained, etc.) with such things as microfilm names and numbers, vital records with identifying numbers, locations, cemeteries, Bible records, etc. a future researcher may be able to re-trace your steps with some exceptions. If the Bible record has not been preserved (as a published copy for example) that record is unique and should definitely be taken care of in a special way.

For example, ISGS accepts xerox copies of Bible records (along with a copy of the title page, and permission from the sender to publish). One volume of Bible records has already been published; another is in preparation. Those records will be preserved. Also, most local genealogical societies accept transcriptions of tombstone inscriptions for publication. ISGS also is in the process of identifying all cemeteries within the state.

So getting back to the pedigree charts and family group sheets, if they have been well documented you may not have to keep the actual copies of the documents themselves and a future researcher should be able to find them again. [I urge all researchers to refer to Richard S. Lackey's *Cite Your Sources: A Manual for Documenting Family Histories and Genealogical Records* - New Orleans: Polyanthos. 1980. 94 pages.]

There are commercial organizations such as The Genealogical Helper (UT: Everton Publishers) that accept pedigree charts and family group sheets and preserve them on microfiche and a computerized file. These are widely used at their workshops and can also be accessed by mail for a fee.

Last but not least are the computerized files called Ancestral File at Family History Libraries of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (LDS). Anyone who has a computer and has data in GEDCOM (Genealogical Data Communication) format can submit information to Ancestral File. GEDCOM is a data standard for genealogical computer programs that provides a means of transferring genealogical data between two programs regardless of how either program structures its files. The most commonly used genealogical program having GEDCOM is Personal Ancestral File (PAF), which is available from LDS at only \$35. Other programs having GEDCOM and approved as compatible with Ancestral File include Roots III (Commsoft, Inc.), Everyone's Family Tree (Dollarhide Systems, Inc.), Family Roots (Quinsept, Inc.), Family Ties (Computer Services), Family Tree Maker Exchange Utility (Banner Blue Software Inc.), Family Tree Print Utility (Common Sense Software), and Generation Gap Plus (Flying Pigs Software).

Everyone is invited to contribute to Ancestral File. Mail your diskette(s) to Ancestral File Unit, 2WW, Family History Department, 50 East North Temple Street, Salt Lake City, UT 84150. Be sure to keep a copy. Your diskette(s) will not be returned. Ancestral File is updated periodically and is available for viewing in more than 500 family history centers around the country.

Everyone should make prior plans about the distribution of genealogical materials at the time of death

OPEN RECORDS AT NEBRASKA BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS

As many of you may already be aware of the Attorney General has issued an opinion recently that birth and death records qualify as open records under state statute.

The Vital Statistics office is accepting requests for this information. There is now NO FEE and NO REQUIREMENT FOR "PROPER PURPOSE". Genealogists need to provide their own paper and pen or pencil and enough identifying information for an accurate search. The information will be brought to you at the counter by a staff person and you may then copy your information from the material provided. If you do not intend to secure a certified copy advise the staff when you initially apply in order to be given the form especially designed for this purpose. If you then decide to secure a certified copy the fee for a certified copy of the birth certificate is \$6.00 and the certified copy for the death certificate is \$5.00.

This is good news for genealogists. Please take advantage of this opportunity but keep in mind the Vital Statistics office is undergoing a period of transition. Be patient and courteous. This service CANNOT be accessed by mail or phone.

FEES INCREASE

A certified copy of marriage license jumped from \$2.00 to \$22.00 in Missouri.

The increase is going to combat child abuse and domestic violence. The charge for birth and death records is \$2.00 each which includes the search and one certified copy.

1920 CENSUS SOUNDINDEX

The Bureau of the Census created and filmed Soundindex cards for the entire 1920 census. The Soundindex is a coded surname (last name) index based on the way a surname sounds rather than how it is spelled.

The Bureau of the Census used two separate Soundindex cards, the "family card" and the "individual card." Both types of cards are arranged numerically by the Soundindex code and then alphabetically by the first name of the head of the household on the family cards and the first name of the individual on the individual cards.

The family card is arranged by the name of the head of the household. The individual card gives the names of people other than those in the immediate household (husband, wife, son, daughter) that are enumerated with a family. These include grandparents, cousins, boarders, and servants. The card also shows the name of the head of the household or the institution name where the person is living.

The information on the Soundindex card includes the surname, first name, state and county of residence, city (if appropriate), age place of birth, and whether a U.S. citizen. Each card also lists the volume, enumeration district, sheet number and line number where the person can be found on the population schedule.

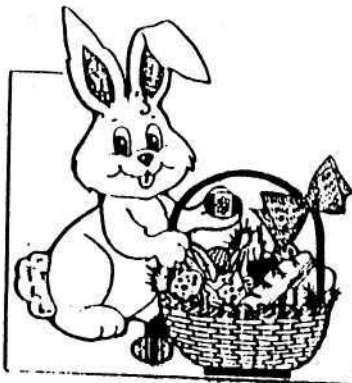
