From the President,

Spring is a time of surprises. We have had a nice spring so far. It's been cool, with wind and lately some rain. These changes, this variability is part of the charm of living in Madison County, Nebraska. I thought we might skip spring the day the temperature jumped to 92 degrees, but never fear, our high was 43 degrees the next day. Surprises, rain and sunshine. I love this time of year.

Family history has its surprises. We work with the "facts" about our families. We study and ask questions; we do research and begin to believe we know everything. Then we are surprised by something our father says, something our cousin writes in a letter, or a newspaper article about our ancestor. We can do two things when we're surprised. We can deny the validity of the recollection or we can let that surprising tidbit deepen and broaden our understanding of our family. I was surprised to find a printed bibliography of Nebraska County research materials, <u>Nebraska Local History and Genealogy Reference Guide</u> by Sylvia Nimmo and Mary Cutler (1986). The book is organized by county and type of record. I see a map of the City of Tilden in 1916, Newman Grove church histories, and Meadow Grove school records. I can use this book for my own research and as a help to other researchers who send queries to our society.

The insurance for the library, which was due, was dropped.

New publications received were displayed. The next meeting is April 17, at the Elkhorn Valley Museum. Meeting adjourned.

March Program

Commander John Reding presented a program on Norfolk's Fire History. Norfolk was granted the status and rights of a village on September 24, 1881, and a Village Marshal was appointed. In 1884, the first Fire Department, located at 4th and Braasch was organized. Equipment consisted of two ladders, two axes and three dozen good workers. Organized volunteers operated hand-drawn hose carts. In 1913, the City purchased a motor-driven hose cart known as the "Old Indian." An old ladder truck was purchased in 1919 and served the City until 1950. Upon delivery of a bare chassis in 1950, the City designed and built a ladder truck that served until 1974, which was then replaced by a Snorkel truck that can reach up to 80 feet. The Station moved to East Norfolk Avenue in 1940 and in 1965 moved to its present location at 701 Koenigstein. The building underwent major renovations in 1988 and again in 1991.

The first paid driver for the Department was hired in 1910 and was on duty twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. By 1958, there were eleven paid Fire Fighters. Records indicate that by 1970 the Department employed seventeen Fire Fighters, a Fire Chief and a Fire Marshal. Today, Fire Division employees actually do more Paramedic and Rescue services than actual fire calls since today there are better fire prevention techniques, and better building standards.

John brought in many items to show and tell, making a very interesting presentation.

There were many major fires in Norfolk's history, and hopefully John will come back at another time and give us more details of those.

Orvin Marquardt of Courtland, Kansas, is looking for information on **August MARQUARDT**. The Allen Co. Public Library in Fort Wayne, Indiana, is requesting a copy of our first issue of the newsletter to complete their collection.

The Madison County Genealogical Society was invited to have a booth at the Northeast Nebraska Ethnic Festival. This will be held in Norfolk on June 9, 2001, beginning at 11 a.m. Mickie Ryan will contact Connecting Point about the possibility of using a computer and internet.

May 2, 2001, will be a "research night" at the Elkhorn Valley Museum and Research Center from 6 to 8 p.m.

Research Center News

This month's article will talk about City Directories and their uses to genealogists and historians as well as lists some of the most recent donations to the Research Center library collection.

City Directories are valuable research tools for locating an individual or a business in a specific area during a specific time. If you are doing genealogy, city directories will help you pinpoint the years your relative lived in a certain location and give you the address, thus allowing you to search land, real estate, and census records for more information.

One of the greatest features of a city directory is the ability to search by address. You can look up your ancestor's address and see if anyone else is living at that address with them. Often several related families lived together at one address, and this can be a great way to find parents, in-laws, siblings, and other collateral relatives.

City Directories for South Sioux City, Hastings, Falls City, Beatrice, Scottsbluff, Nebraska City, Fairbury, Grand Island, Kearney, North Platte, and McCook Nebraska for 1992 were recently donated. Other city directories recently received or cataloged include Aberdeen, Huron, Pierre, South Dakota, for 1992, and Worcester, Massachusetts, for 1882.

1918 Union Township, Madison County, Nebraska

The following is from the Standard Atlas of Madison County, Nebraska.

This is a selection of business and people found in <u>1918 Patron's Reference Directory of</u> <u>Madison County, Nebraska</u>. The date following a name indicates the length of time the party has been a resident in the county.

The following is a list of individuals in Union Township in 1918. The abbreviations are as follows: S. for Section; P. for Precinct [or township]; P.O. for Post-office address.

Degroat, Anton, Duncan-Mead Farm, farmer and Breeder of High Grade Stock, S. 9, P. Union, P.O. Madison. 1886.

Dieter, John, Farmer, S. 34, P. Union, P.O. Madison. 1870.

Gall, Emil, Farmer, S. 11, P. Union, P.O. Norfolk, 1893. Mr. Gall has served as Director of School District No. 11 for two years.

Gall, Otto E., Farmer, S. 10, P. Union, P.O. Madison. 1884.

Kaiser, Robert, Farmer and Breeder of Graded Stock, S. 7, P. Union, P.O. Enola. 1882.

Malone, J. J., Farmer and Breeder of Hereford Cattle, Pilot Knob Stock Farm, S. 17, P. Union, P.O. Madison. 1881.

Neidig, Ed., Farmer and Breeder of Graded Stock, S. 20, P. Union, P.O. Madison. 1876. Mr. Neidig has served as School Treasurer for five years.

Rowlett, N. P., General Merchandise, Boots, Shoes, Hardware, Oils, and Produce, S. 5, P. Union, P.O. Enola. [year not listed].

Schwank, Emil F. A., Farmer and Breeder, S. 31, P. Union, P.O. Madison. 1889.

Stork, G. B., Farmer. S. 1, P. Union, P.O. Norfolk. 1871.

Tyrrel, P. H., Farmer, S. 20, P. Union, P.O. Madison. 1879.

Varner, H. A., Farmer, S. 7, P. Union, P.O. Enola. 1888.

Prior to 1906, Madison County boasted about its two new Pratt bridges. Madison was among the few Nebraska counties which applied for financial aid to build new bridges using state-approved plans.

Enola is a community in Union Township. The small town acquired its name from its founder, T. J. Malone. One would wonder how that could be, but *Enola* is *Malone* spelled backwards without an *m*. Enola's post office existed from January 22, 1906, to December 31, 1909 (Perkey, Elton. *Perkey's Nebraska Place-Names*).

The county seat of Madison is just south of Enola, and Madison's paper, *The Madison Star-Mail*, occasionally carried news items about happenings in little Enola, like the following:

Miss Viola Carson who is teaching school near Enola spent Sunday with the homefolks (19 April 1907).

J. L. Davis of Enola made a cattle shipment (19 April 1907).

Mrs. T. J. Malone and Mrs. Fay Malone of Enola attended the Episcopal bazaar.... (26 April 1907).

While in Enola Tuesday we had the pleasure of being shown thrown [sic] the fine new home of T. J. Malone which is all modern and up-to-date and speaks well for the growth of that little burg. Fay Malone also has built him a fine new modern home. Business seemed to be rushing and numerous teams were tied to the hitch racks and the merchant, Mr. Diefenderfer, was doing a lively business (26 April 1907).

Miss Hyacinth Malone passed through our city [Madison] Friday evening from Omaha to her home at Enola. She is attending the Sacred Heart Convent and has not been well for a few weeks and came home for a short rest. She will graduate in June (3 May 1907).

Also in *The Madison Star-Mail* is the account of a storm in Madison, which Enola also endured:

The most severe electrical storm of the season occurred last Tuesday evening lasting from 7:30 until 9 o'clock.... A lady in front of the Prince Hotel was knocked from her chair on the porch into the street. Thomas Smith and Harry Lamb both received a severe shock. Lightning striking a tree in front of Smith house. Mr. Smith was rendered unconscious. Mr. Lamb who was sitting along side of him felt the sting of the electricity but received no ill effects. Dr. Gadbois was summoned to the Smith home and found his neck and arm burnt. Albert Fellows who resides in the south part of town also received a slight shock (26 July 1907).
