From the President,

As a nation, the events of September 11 have challenged us to look within ourselves. We see both strengths and weaknesses. Our pioneers showed some amazing traits. By the 1890's most of Madison County farm land was in production. Most homesteads were $\frac{1}{4}$ section, so Madison County had over 2000 families, living on farms. They came here after the Civil War. Many of the settlers in the Newman Grove area came directly from Norway or from Norwegian settlements in Dane County, Wisconsin. Of those who came, some stayed, some moved on to points west and some moved back to Norway. Stories were collected and published in 1940 in Tri-County Pioneers by H. Halderson.

The H. Halverson family came to Columbus from Wisconsin in 1870. They stayed in Stanton while the father scouted for a homestead location. He sent for his wife and three youngest children. Their eldest, 10 year old Annie was hired out to a farmer to herd cattle for the summer, although she cried when her mother and siblings left. She was able to rejoin them in the fall with enough money to buy food for the family for the winter. Gunder Thompson, a 19 year old boy in 1871 had a claim, a dugout, and a small load of corn. He ground the corn and ate "cornbread and water alternated with corn meal mush and water." He did what he needed to do to improve his claim and provide a future for the family he didn't even have yet. A young woman from Germany, Rosina Lucht lost her husband and infant daughter to sickness. She didn't give up, she wrote her brothers in Germany to come and homestead. She gave them directions from a point north of Columbus, NE. They were to walk beyond a certain landmark, to a high hill in the distance. Rosina would be waiting for them on that hill with a black dog. The brothers almost turned back, but saw one more hill in the distance and met their sister there.

We all share genes of the men and women who endured. Their strengths became our strengths and hopefully we learn not to repeat their weaknesses. They survived disaster, sickness, poverty, and war to continue the vision that is the American dream. When we give in to self-centeredness or self-pity we weaken a link in the chain that is our family history. And each of our family histories blend together to make American history in the 21st century.

The meeting was held at the First Baptist Church on October 16, 2001 at 7:00 pm. Micki Ryan introduced our guest speaker, Mel Hintz. He gave a program on his book, "God Did It!...by Accident???". This book is the story of Norfolk churches, parochial schools and other Christian institutions. Mel is one of our very own members.

The secretary's report was read and one correction was made. Jean Masters is also a member of the program committee. The treasurer's report was given by Dave Zaruba. We have changed banks and have invested in two CD's. New balance in checking is \$1233.42 and new balance in savings is \$500.00 and two CD's of \$500.00 each. The report was accepted.

John Kielty is currently working on an all-name index of the book "Tri-County Pioneers". This book features pioneers around the Newman Grove area. Lenora Kuchar, author of "They Called it Meadow Grove" is considering the possibility of reprinting her book. The Society Library does not currently own a copy. A motion was passed to buy one if it is reprinted. The research center is currently doing family files at the museum. We are all encouraged to submit any research that we do on queries or our own families' and they will file that in the "Family files".

The program committee has been very busy lining up a good assortment of programs for the upcoming months. November's meeting will be on November 20th. Nancy Scheer, Register of Deeds of Madison County, will be our guest speaker. Iola Louthan will make tentative reservations at a restaurant for our January meeting and report back in November.

A possible genealogy workshop in conjunction with the Elkhorn Valley Museum was proposed to the society by the program committee. There are three possible workshops, one on oral interviewing, one on preservation of items and the third on proper writing of family history. April 13th and April 20th were the dates proposed. The Society members present voted to go ahead with the proposal for two programs, on oral interviewing and the preservation of items. Other Society members would definitely like to see the third program presented at a later date. The proceeds will go to items needed for the Research Center and the Society's library.

October Program: God Did It!...by Accident???

In 1999, Kent Warneke, asked me if I would write a weekly series about the Norfolk Churches for the Norfolk Daily News. As I began researching and writing, I could not believe how many churches there were in a town this size. And they all had such interesting stories to tell. The clergy were great.

I thought you might like to know about three questions that people have been asking me. One is "Why did I write this book?" the second is "Whatever does the title mean?" and the third one is "What is the book about?". People began asking if I had every thought of doing a book on all the churches in town. But there were also other stories that should be told. There are eight parochial schools in town. That is unbelievable for a town this size. Most town of 100,000 don't even have eight parochial schools.

Beside the parochial schools, there are a dozen other major Christian institutions in Norfolk. For example, Immaculata Monastery is the priory or headquarters in the whole nation for the Order of the Missionary Benedictine Sisters. In eight short years the Orphan Grain Train has become one of the nation's largest philanthropic operations for the needy overseas. It has facilities from New York City to the Rockies and the headquarters is here in Norfolk. And there are the great stories of the Nebraska Christian College, Norfolk Rescue Mission and Hope House, the Salvation Army community programs, and the incredible Faith Regional Hospital born from a Catholic and Lutheran hospital, which now serves patients from as far as a couple of hundred miles away.

So why would I write "the book?" Norfolk is a great town. It was settled by Christians, and their religion has played a major role in the growth and development of this town for the past 134 years. And I wanted that story to be told. The book contains the names of about 1500 present Norfolk residents, and someday their descendants can read how their parents, grandparents and other relatives played an important role in the history of Norfolk.

Mel explained that the meaning for the book's title was found in a brief chapter in the book, which he read.

"So now, what is the book about? It is about 39 churches, eight parochial schools, and a dozen Christian institutions in Norfolk. Eleven of the churches came to Norfolk in the 1800's.

I thought it might now be interesting to see what was happening in the world when the different churches in town began.

Let us go back to the 1860's. From 1861-1865 our nation is torn apart by the great Civil War. In 1866, the wounds are barely beginning to heal. Out in the prairies of the Midwest 42 wagons of immigrants leave Wisconsin and head for a place in the middle of nowhere that does not even exist. There is no town. There is no state. They start a town. It is to be called North Fork. A year later North Fork finds itself in a new state called Nebraska. When Nebraska is created, the newly created St. Paul's Wisconsin Synod Lutheran Church is already a year old.

In 1870, back east, John D. Rockefeller is forming the Standard Oil Company. Here in Norfolk, the Congregational Church and the Methodist Church are each being formed.

In 1871, P. T. Barnum's Circus, The Greatest Show on Earth, opens in New York City. Three miles northeast of Norfolk, Christ Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, opens its doors.

Ten years later in 1881, President James Garfield is inaugurated in January. He is shot in September and Vice-President Chester Arthur becomes President. In Norfolk, Sacred Heart Roman Catholic Church and Trinity Episcopal Church began and northeast of town Peace United Church is organized

In 1889, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana and Washington become states. In Norfolk, the First Baptist Church is organized.

In 1891, the wireless telegraph is the newest thing and the zipper is invented. In Norfolk, First Christian Church is born.

In 1896, the first modern Olympics are held in Athens and the gold rush to the Klondike begins. Here in Norfolk, the Presbyterian Church begins.

1897 is the year of the first American comic strip, the Katzenjammer Kids. In Norfolk, the Evangelical United Brethren Church is organized. Seventy-one years later, and after building its newest church at 2000 Norfolk Avenue, it will merge with United Methodist Church.

We move into the twentieth Century. In 1902, in America, the minimum working age for boys is raised from 9 years to 12 years, and for girls from 11 years to 15 years. St. John's Lutheran Church is born.

The first twelve churches are summarized above. The talk continued with the other 27 churches that were founded through 1999. There was also audience participation and a question and answer series. Some of them were as follows:

What was the first church (denomination) built in downtown Norfolk and where was it located? (The Congregational Church was built in 1871 on the south side of Norfolk Avenue between second and third streets.)

For which church did Andrew Carnegie of New York City buy an excellent and expensive pipe organ? (First Methodist in 1915, cost was \$2,200.)

Which church was destroyed by a tornado? (Trinity Episcopal in 1892.)

What church was destroyed by fire? (First Congregational in January 1944 on the very day it became free of all indebtedness.)

Which church was once located where the former post office and present McMill Building is now located? (First Baptist, it sold the site in 1903.)

Rinehold Marxhausen, the famous Nebraska artist, who appeared twice on the David Letterman Show and who is the only Nebraska artist who was commissioned to do two murals in the grand gallery of the Nebraska State Capital, designed the reredos or retablo on the altar wall of which church? (Mt. Olive Lutheran Church on Omaha Avenue.)

What modern brick church in Norfolk was built in two days? (Jehovah Witness Kingdom Hall on Channel Road.)

Which building in town is home to people from Switzerland, New Zealand, Germany, Korea, Czechoslovakia, Namibia, Philippines, and Australia as well as sixteen states from New York to California and from Minnesota to Texas? (Immaculata Monastery.)

It was a very enjoyable program.

Sticky Notes not recommended

Sticky notes, those popular little Post-Its, Flags, etc. now made by several companies are not recommended for use in historical documents or books. They leave a residue which is very damaging. In addition, some have such strong adhesive that they can even pull the printed word right off the page. Some libraries and archives are totally banning their use.

The 1930 Census

The entire collection of the 1930 census should be available by April 1, 2002. This census consists of about 2668 rolls of microfilm. By law, census cannot be released until 72 years after it was taken. Several libraries in the area will purchase at least a part of it. Only twelve states used the soundex indexing system on this census. They are Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky (part), Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia and West Virginia (part). With their assistance, the massive project of matching the index cards to the envelopes of the Christian Photo Collection is very nearly completed. It will take about 2-3 weeks to finish this stage of the project. The next step will be to deal with all of the envelopes for which there are no cards which is going to be about 3000. This will take a long time as cards will eventually have to be made. Before that can be done, name spellings will have to be verified and corrected. This will be a challenge as many of the index cards have handwriting that is very difficult to read and thus will have to be verified from city directories and phone books. The Christian Photo collection is a tremendous resource for photographs of relatives, ancestors, confirmations, communions, graduations, weddings, anniversaries, Norfolk businesses, business events, school and college plays, pets, aerial views of the city and other miscellaneous photographs. It consists of negatives, some proofs, and a few slides. Shortly the Research Center will have the computer equipment necessary to reproduce these for anyone interested. We volunteers are excited at the possibilities this collection represents for genealogists and historians everywhere.

Orville Voss passed away on October 18, 2001 at Heritage of Bel Air Nursing Home in Norfolk. Orville and Mary (Dreesen) Voss were instrumental in the planning, promoting, fund raising, founding, and construction of the Elkhorn Valley Museum and Research Center. The Research Center is named for Mary and Orville. Mary survives him and is a resident of Heritage of Bel Air Nursing Home. Without Mary and Orv the Museum would never have been built. They kept the dream alive for many years after the original little museum on east Norfolk Avenue closed many years ago. Orv was a craftsman and talented woodworker, a member of the American Legion, National Association of Letter Carriers and the Antique Car Club. Even if your soldier isn't there, the database may include a photo of his regiment or of one of the places he fought. Search the database using keywords, then send email (or postal mail) with the photo ID number of any item you're interested in. Early Occupations

The Turners: Wood was widely used in the early days because it was readily available and easily worked. There was the joiner, now known as a cabinet maker, the nailor, who is now called a carpenter, and the turner, who shaped wood with a chisel on a lathe.

A dish turner made piggins, noggins, runlets, kiclars, firkins, buckets, churns, dye tubs, carders, pounding tubs, and the like out of wood.

The roofing applicator, using thatch or hand-made wooden shingles for the most part, was a thatcher, and the dry kiln operator was a clapboard drier. Barrels and casks were made by a cooper, and hoops for barrels were turned out by a hooper.

Logs from which lumber was made were felled in the woods by fellers, axemen, and hewers and cut to size by sawyers. The beam maker converted the logs into beams. Source: Early America at Work by Everett B. Wilson, c. 1963 pgs.65,67

ANNOUNCING TWO NEW WORKSHOPS

The Elkhorn Valley Museum in conjunction with the Madison County Genealogical Society will be holding two workshops on Saturday, April 20, 2002 at the Elkhorn Valley Museum. The workshops will be presented by Making History, Inc. (a historical, museum and archives consulting firm from Omaha, Nebraska). SESSION I: ORAL INTERVIEWING: This will be a dynamite, hands-on workshop. Topics covered will include: Explaining what basic historical questions to ask, ways to phrase questions, best and worst ways to ask questions, kinds of equipment to use, audio versus video, practice writing questions, practice asking questions, practice recording an interview, setting up an interview (including lists and permission slips), using the information you acquire, and where to deposit and preserve your recordings.

SESSION II: PRESERVATION OF HEIRLOOM PAPERS AND PHOTOS

This is also a hands-on workshop. Participants are to bring an old photo or paper item 8 1/2 x 11 inches or smaller to the class. All supplies will be provided. Techniques for cleaning, repairing and preserving paper and photo items will be presented, and then you will actually preserve your heirloom. Other topics will be how to store and display your photos and papers and where to purchase supplies. Brief information will be given about preserving textiles, wood and metal items.

Each session is 3 hours long. You may sign up for one session or both with a limit of 40 participants per session. Reservations must include payment. Full refund up to March 19, 2002.

Cost is \$30 for one session, or \$55 for both sessions. The date and day are Saturday, April 20, 2002. Session I from 11:00 am to 2:00 pm, Session II from 3:30 pm to 6:30 pm. Both sessions to be held at the Elkhorn Valley Museum.

Emerick Methodist Church

C. G. Rouse, a very successful supply pastor, began his ministry at this place. His homestead was at St. Clair Valley not far from Emerick. The Emerick Methodist Church was built in 1891 with John Cruse being the pastor at that time. He was appointed to this charge in 1890 and built the church after the first of the year. He was followed by Wm. Stanner, then J. A. Roads, then W.A. Wilson. At that time it was said that this charge was located in a very rich section of the country, was convenient to work and had the making of one of the best appointments. In 1898 A. E. Fowler and in 1899 W. R. Phelps served this desirable charge. The parsonage which had been buildt nearly a mile away was moved to the church lots and remodeled at a cost of \$200. H. A. Hornady served the next two years and Charles Sterner supplied in 1902. G. A. Barker was next, followed by H. P. Williams and W. D. Smith. The last regular supply was Geo. Hill in 1916. After that guests and visitors preached for several years. After the church was no longer used regularly on Sundays, it was still maintained for a number of years and used for funerals. Several Methodists in that community now attend church in Meadow Grove. The parsonage burned to the ground in 1923. In 1947 Paul Green purchased the Emerick Church and moved it to Meadow Grove just east of the White Way Café. It is now a home.
