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From your President, John Kielty

I'd like to talk about setting goals. Does your family history have a goal? Or more correctly, do you have a series of goals, a priority list? Most of us started with just one family name, one goal. Before we knew it we had to set goals among 16 great-great grandparents. We can either set goals or they set themselves.

Family history is a complicated study. Periodically we need to re-evaluate our goals. We have to decide if our research is still on track. We can pick up an ancestor and start more research. We can use a computer to organize, store, and print. We could use scrap booking techniques to present our family history in a pleasing way. We can write a book or a short pamphlet detailing one family name. Now with the use of scanners and quality printers we can organize and present our family history with photos, maps and other documents. If you're feeling burnt out in one area, move to another area of interest.

I was recently excited to learn about the census indexes that are available on-line. I knew the name of my 2-great grandfather, Martin GALLAGHER from a marriage record. That was all I knew. The marriage of Ellen GALLAGHER to Patrick STANTON occurred in 1882 in Omaha, NE. I expected to find the family in Omaha or Council Bluffs, IA. The 1880 census index lists 93 Martin GALLAGERs in the U. S., only 6 were living in NE or IA. Checking the adults I found my 2nd great grandfather in O'Neill, Holt Co., NE. A total surprise! Without the census index, I could have searched forever and never found them. I give all the credit to 'familysearch.org' for the answer.

Even old problems can have solutions. I found a man, his wife, and 8 children. I have a lot more information for goal setting. So set a goal, change direction, do something new. This is a 'great' hobby!

May Program

Marv Gibson will present the program for the May 20, 2003 meeting of the Madison County Genealogical Society. His topic will be "The Importance of Writing Memoirs."

Marv will bring books that were written, published and bound by his grandfather, Fred Yoss, the son of 19th century Swiss immigrants. They are of his life before his marriage, his family's genealogy, and the lives of his relatives. He will also bring copies of memoirs written by his father, Vic Gibson, and a little of the Gibson family history.

Marv is a very interesting speaker, a member of Toastmasters, and an accomplished storyteller. This should be a very interesting program.

March Meeting Notes

The Madison County Genealogical Society met on March 18th. We had 16 members present. The secretary's minutes and the treasurer's report were read and approved. Dave Zaruba suggested that as we have extra money in the treasury that we increase our membership to the Elkhorn Valley Museum be upgraded from Friend at \$100 to Patron at \$250 per year. Mike Moats mentioned that we have the use of all the facilities, computers, and research center along with the meeting room. The motion was approved.

Nancy has a need for more file cabinets in the Research Center. Dave Klitz, director of the Museum, has a need for a lateral file. He has 2 regular file cabinets that he would trade if we would purchase a lateral file cabinet for his office. There is also a legal sized file cabinet with a dent at Western Typewriter that can be purchased at a discount. Jeanne Rix made the motion that we purchase the 2 file cabinets, Ruthie Galitz seconded, the motion passed.

Mention was also made we should purchase a decent chair for her use at the computer in the Research Center. Mike Moats suggested that Nancy pick out a chair that she likes and report back to us at the next meeting.

Those who went to the Courthouse last month had a good time. Marriage license records, burial records, land records, and the military discharge book were things that were investigated. Thank you notes were sent out to Nancy Scheer and Nancy Gross for their kindness.

John presented the newsletters, magazines, and queries that have been recently received. Dave Zaruba will check on the paperwork to become a non-profit organization. Nancy encouraged people to think of "want list" ideas for the research center that members of the society might need. We are in desperate need of local information between the years of 1896 and 1915, especially city directories.

March Program

The March program was presented by Pam Wieser on scrapbooking and how to preserve and display your photos and memorabilia. Be sure to use only archival paper and acid free pens. Do not use the magnetic photo albums or any adhesive style albums as the glues will ruin your photos and treasured items. Plastic sleeves should be polyethylene or archival safe. Anything food grade is ok to store items. So until you can get to it, ziploc style bags and rubbermaid type containers are safe storage items. Many different styles of scrapbooks and trims are available as well as several colors of pens to mark with. All are archivally safe. Members asked questions and made comments. Some members already do this. It was an interesting program.

April Meeting Notes by Karen Rogat, Secretary

The Madison Co. Genealogical Society met on April 15 with 15 members present. The secretary's minutes and the treasurer's report were read and approved. Dave Zaruba suggested that we renew the CD that is maturing on the 20th of April. It was approved.

The file cabinets from Western Typewriter have arrived and are installed in their proper positions and are in use. Nancy Zaruba reported that she has found a chair that she likes. The cost of the chair will be approximately \$280.00. Marge Fuhrman made the motion that she go ahead and purchase it and that it be paid with money from the treasury and Mike Moats seconded. This was approved.

John Kielty presented the newsletters and other mail that has been received. No new queries have been received. The progress of the past queries was discussed.

The Museum would like us to think about a workshop again this fall. Nancy passed around a listing of books that are available for purchase from Ancestry.com. and asked that we initial the ones that we would like to purchase for the genealogical library. Donations will be accepted for these items and they will only be purchased when enough donations have been received.

Richard Strenge reported that Nancy Gross and Nancy Scheer have again offered the use of their offices after hours for our group. We asked Richard to convey our thanks but we will decline this offer until the fall.

Dave Zaruba checked into the possibility of becoming a non-profit organization. With all the restrictions we decided that this will not be a possibility for our group. Some of the mailings that we receive have a non-profit postage stamp mark and John Kielty is going to check with the post office on the regulations of this.

The program for the April meeting was a video titled "Ballad of the Blue Ridge: a journey through the Blue Ridge Mountains of West Virginia, Virginia, and North Carolina." It was loaned by Lottie Klein.

Genealogical Errors

On March 16, 1928 my uncle, Martin GRAFF, was shot and died instantly in Titus County, Texas. His death certificate states he had lived in the community 25 years, was 22 years old, and was born March 14, 1928. How many mistakes can be made on one paper? There are no birth records to be found at the county or state levels. There is no marker on the grave either. I could cry. I am even told the court records from the trial the next February are no longer in existence, but I have not checked that out yet. We just know he was born between 24 June 1903 and 31 August 1909.

<u>A History of Abandoned Methodist Churches</u> in the Norfolk District of the Nebraska Conference

This booklet was printed by the Newman Grove Reporter, the year is unknown. It was purchased off of Ebay the internet auction site last year. Bits and pieces will be published as space permits in the future.

The introduction, written by E. T. Antrim, notes over sixty abandoned churches in the district. He notes that many letters were written and many were never answered. Information was very difficult to get in some cases. He relied primarily on these letters, conference minutes and Marquette's History of Nebraska Methodism and his own knowledge of the district having spent over 45 years in ministry in this district.

The end note in the booklet is reprinted here:

The history is a work of love by Rev. E. T. Antrim, and is in compliance with the request of the Historical Society of the Nebraska annual Conference of the Methodist church. Rev. Mr. Antrim is well aware that this is not a complete history. If you readers can secure additional material or history of these churches or others completely overlooked, send that information to the Norfolk District Superintendent. Four copies will be made, one sent to Historical Society, one to Nebraska Wesleyan University Library, one to Rev. Mr. Antrim and one kept with the records of the District Superintendent. The sale of this history is to be at cost—no profit will be made by anyone. It is expected that each church on the district will buy at least three copies—one to be kept in the permanent records of the church. John W. 

The 26th Annual Conference of the Nebraska State Genealogical Society was held in Hastings, NE. on May 2-3, 2003. Karen Tippets presented "Census records as a valuable source of information." The different questions asked in each census gives us clues as to their life and where to find further records. She also talked on "Vital records as a source of information." The use of birth, death, and marriage records and the use of church records if you know their religious background can also be of help. Check the delayed birth records for persons who may not have had an original birth record. The use of school records and newspaper articles during the time period your relative lived in the area was also discussed. The cemetery sexton records and funeral homes may give you additional help.

Catherine Renschler spoke on "Researching a House History." This was very informative on looking at the house with its architectural style helping to determine the year it was built or remodeled. To find sources in your search check the library for books on architecture. Check also with the neighbors, prior owners, and the abstract. Look into the Register of Deeds office and Treasurer's office and also the city office for building permits and utility service. The historical society or local museum may have plat maps, city directories, fire maps, tax lists, photographs, newspaper articles, county and city history books for further details. She also talked on the use of "Newspapers as a Source for Family History." You will need **Continued on the back cover.**

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to spend time, as many of the older papers did not list a death in the obituary column, as they do today. It may just be a line or two in a social column or other area of the paper. You can also find births listed when a birth certificate is not available. Clues to cause of death may be found here also. Check the papers for anniversaries especially if they made it 40 or 50 years of marriage or 80 years from birth. Check area towns and towns in neighboring counties newspapers for information.

Todd Arrington shared his knowledge on "Homestead Records." He is with the Homestead National Monument Park at Beatrice, NE. He spoke on the background of the Homestead Act from 1862 and the requirements of the pioneers to obtain government land. Nebraska was third in number of claims at 105,000. There are 2 million files with 30 million pieces of papers at the National Archives in Washington, D. C. He also talked about the fragile nature and the loss of these records and the hopes for the future. A large sum of money, time and co-operation is needed if we are to have a chance on preservation of the records even onto microfilm.

Cyndi Howells topics were: "World Wide Web-Quit Surfing and Start Searching"; "Ohio and United Kingdom Research"; and "Evaluating Websites." This was a great help for many people. She has Cyndislist.com on the internet. The information about evaluating websites was very useful. We need to make sure the information is accurate and can be verified by the actual records. We need to know where they got their information. Not everything out in print or on the internet is true. People who write and extract and retype information can make mistakes that are unintentional. Richard Strenge attended and thought it was an excellent conference. He will share more of this information later perhaps at the June meeting.
