The Christmas Party is January 17 at McD's Steakhouse in Battle Creek, 6 p.m.

The Madison County Genealogical Society did not hold their regular November meeting due to bad weather. It was decided to have just a board meeting the following week to make some plans for the New Year and discuss some issues.

It was decided to have the Christmas party on January 17 at McD's Steakhouse in Battle Creek. This is the same location as last year when everyone had a good time.

Some financial issues were discussed and some suggestions made. It seems the Genealogy Society has a fair amount in the treasury at the moment but this is primarily from a couple of large donations made in the past when a member paid for the printing and mailing of the newsletter for over a year and from some large research queries handled in the past. With the current membership numbers, the dues at the current rate and the lack of members willing to do research for others we could soon be in financial problems. The expenses of maintaining the membership to the Museum (which houses our library, provides us with computer, email, telephone, meeting space, etc. at \$250/year), membership to ancestry.com (pay database of research sites, especially census, approx. \$200 per year), and printing and mailing newsletters (approx. \$600 per year) and dues income of about \$600 per year you can see the problem that will arise within three to four years.

Several possible solutions were discussed.

- 1) Request that those members that have email may choose to receive their newsletter via email and thus save printing and postage costs.
- 2) More than a third of our newsletters go to other societies and libraries. The societies mostly send us their newsletter in exchange for ours, not exactly the best arrangement as we publish 6 a year compared to most others publishing 4 issues. (Ours also have more content.) The libraries do not pay or exchange. The suggestion was made to charge a special rate for societies and libraries to cover the costs of the newsletter—perhaps \$7 per year. This rate would not apply to individuals, as members get more benefits even if they do not live here—such as help with research and use of the library.
- 3) The least favored option is to raise dues which we want to avoid if at all possible.

Gleanings from the Honoring Our Ancestors Newsletter

If you have any Swedish roots and are interested in finding your "old country" cousins, you'll want to check out *Sveriges Dödbok 1947-2003*, a searchable CD containing records for 4.7 million individuals who died in Sweden during this time period. Data includes first and last name; street and postal address; place of birth; place of death; marital status and maiden name. Based on tax records, it's like a Sweden's Social Security Death Index, but with more information! These and other items for those interested in Swedish genealogy are available for purchase at Genline.com – a terrific resource that makes me jealous of those of you with Swedish roots!

Angel Island Museum and Genealogical Research Center to Be Built

"Ellis Island was created to let Europeans in," said Robert Barde, deputy director of the Institute of Business and Economic Research at the University of California, Berkeley, who is writing a book on immigration. "Angel Island was created to keep the Chinese out." Between 1910 and 1940, some 175,000 Chinese immigrants (approximately 75% of Chinese immigrants to the West Coast) were detained and interrogated here.

That sums up why it's so important that the President just signed the Angel Island Immigration Station Restoration and Preservation Act into law – after a 35-year effort by the nonprofit Angel Island Immigration Station Foundation. The funding (up to \$15 million) will be used to create a museum and research center, as well as for the preservation of several structures. At present, the immigration station is closed to the public, although it is a national historic landmark.

Irish Census Records to Go Online

We'll have to be patient – it's going to take one to three years – but thanks to an agreement between the Irish and Canadian archive offices, the Irish 1901 and 1911 Census Records are all going to be put online – and made available for free! It's estimated that 70 million people around the world claim Irish roots and all of us will be chomping at the bit for December 2006, when the first phase of the 1911 Dublin census will be released. The records include name, age, sex, marital status, occupation, county and country of birth, literacy level, ability to speak Irish, the number of years women were married, and the total number of children born. For those of us who have struggled with Irish research, having these records in easy reach will be a tremendous benefit.

Having been posted on assignment to Nigeria for a few years, I am reliant on the Internet and RootsWeb for all genealogical research as other sources are nonexistent. However, I keep myself amused by the wealth of imaginative company signs here in West Africa.

The second-best I've seen (after one advertising "Live Frozen Chickens") is for an under-the-tree small company on the outskirts of Jos, proclaiming the "Final Home Construction Company." It is, of course, a coffin-maker!: Previously published in RootsWeb Review: 14 December 2005, Vol. 8, No. 50.

DANISH EMIGRANTS. The Danish Emigration Archives were established in 1932 to "record the history of the Danes who emigrated and to maintain cultural bonds to those who have their roots in Denmark." The archives collections include private letters, manuscripts, diaries, biographies, newspaper clippings, photographs, portraits and more. A number of these resources are now available online. The website is presented both in English and Danish.

The Copenhagen Police kept emigration lists from 1869 to 1940. Prior to 1868 there was a number of scandals where unsuspecting emigrants had been taken advantage of by Danish emigration agents. The Danish parliament passed stricter emigration regulations in May 1868, requiring the Chief of Police of Copenhagen to approve and monitor all emigration agents in the country and to authorize all overseas tickets issued in Denmark. All of the information from each ticket was then copied into a ledger. The ledgers comprise the 90-volume Copenhagen Police Records of Emigrants. There are two series of ledgers -- one for emigrants with direct passage from Copenhagen to the United States and the other those traveling indirectly via other European harbors to destinations overseas.

You can access the Danish Emigration Database by clicking on the Database button on the home page. There are 394,000 records for the period from 24 May 1868 to December 1908. Mormon emigrants are included in the database for the period from 1868-1872 and after 1882. Mormon emigration records for the period from 1873-1882 are kept at the archives, but are not yet a part of the database.

The data fields include name, occupation, age, last residence, parish, county, first destination of the emigrant from Denmark (city, state, country), contract number and date of registration. Information found in the records may include surname, first name, occupation, family status, age, place of birth (from 1899), last known residence, name of emigration agent, ticket number, ticket registration date, name of the ship (for direct passage from Copenhagen) destination, and possible cancellation of the ticket. NORTH DAKOTA DEATH INDEX NOW AVAILABLE ONLINE. The time period covered is 1 January 1881 through 31 October 2005, with monthly updates. The website is maintained by the North Dakota Department of Health's Division of Vital Statistics. Many early deaths were not recorded and there are few deaths listed prior to 1900.

The website is the result of an 18-month project by a committee composed of staff from the State Historical Society of North Dakota, the North Dakota State Genealogical Society (NDSGS) and the North Dakota Department of Health's Division of Vital Statistics. The website was made possible by funding and support provided by the NDSGS, which received an initial grant of \$1,000 from the North Dakota Community Foundation. The NDSGS was then able to raise more than \$2,000 in matching funds/ donations from other genealogical societies and genealogists from North Dakota and other states.
